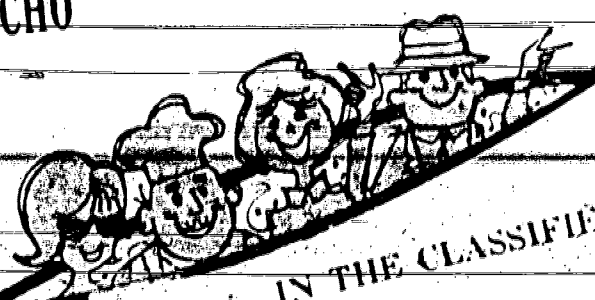
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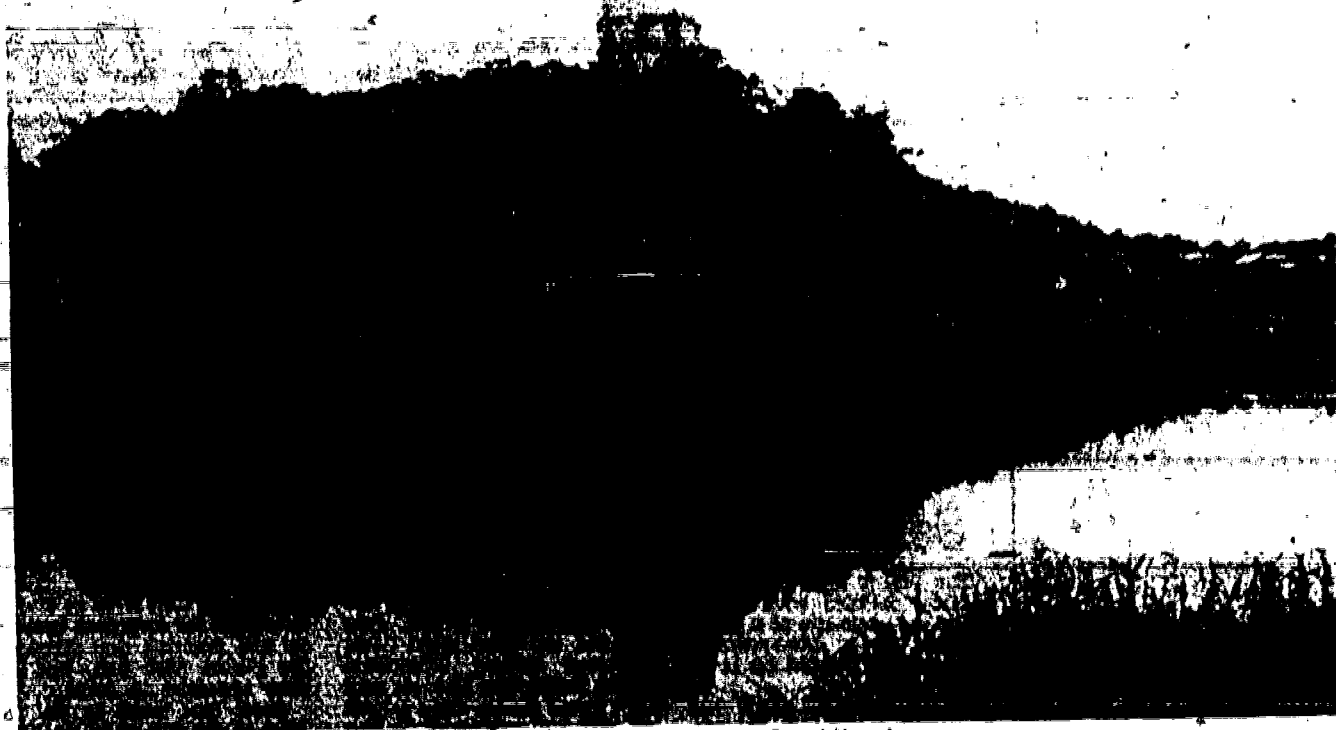
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Tech School Opens For 4th Year Next Month With 3 New Courses

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Some Go Overboard, Others Want To See Pool Proposal Go Dry

"My mother would love it; she has six children," said Susan Grau, 14, of 224 Old Tote rd.

She was answering questions put to her in an opinion survey on talk that's been echoing across the mountains that some folks think there ought to be a municipal swimming pool in Mountainside.

Susan's parents weren't home to report their opinions themselves, but Susan thought it would be a "gift to have a pool."

Names were picked at random from the telephone book for the sampling. Of 14 names there were only two who were not in favor of the pool. Most were enthusiastic, and two,

who said they would not use the facility themselves, thought it would be good for their neighbors. Some did not wish to comment and are not included in the sampling.

Frederick Bauer of 1133 Corrine ter is one of those who favors construction of the facility because he thinks it would be enjoyed by his neighbors. He says he's too old to use it himself, but that didn't prevent his wanting the best for his neighbors.

Mrs. William P. Boyle of 342 Rolling Rock rd has two daughters. She thinks a pool would provide excellent recreation during the hot summer months when the children

are home from school. "This would be better than tennis courts," she said, adding that she heartily endorses swimming lessons and courses, life saving for all children.

Joseph Boylan of 1341 Soar Brook la, however, thinks a pool is "not necessary." He said statements to the fact that the facility would not be paid for out of taxation are "opening wounds." He said the "rough" would "eventually" break down.

H. R. Bartlett of 257 E. Green crest has five children and endorses the pool idea. "I see nothing else to do this summer," he said.

Jack A. Lanzer of 1334 Lakeside is in favor of a pool. In

fact, his daughter, Karen, is one of the teen brigade circulating petitions for a municipal pool.

Mrs. Barbara Howe of 1181 Ridge rd would like to know more about the idea. What she heard of it "sounded wonderful," she says. She has two children.

Mrs. Bertha Krooss of 9 Mountain View dr. predicts that taxes will go up if a

municipal pool is built. She is "not in favor of the idea at all," she says. Her own children are grown, she says, adding that even if they were not she would not be in favor of the pool. "Parents should learn to entertain their children themselves," she said.

Mrs. Arthur K. Olson of 187 Blazo ter. is in favor of a pool and has signed a petition saying that she is. But she,

too, would like to find out more about the idea. She has four boys.

Fred J. Filler of 284 Argyle Tree la. also signed a petition approving construction of a pool, although he has no children. "It would be good to have a pool in town," he said.

William S. Eisman of 1122 22 said he will decide after a public meeting has been held on the issue. He has no children.

Allan Dehis of 1401 Deer path said he is "certainly in favor of a pool." He thought he added that it must be in an area that is "not too close to private homes." He said he could use it, but he added that his decision would depend on the choice of a site.

Mrs. Betty Korley of 361 Hodge row has three children and heartily approves of the

idea of a pool. "The children need something like this," she said.

Mrs. Lorraine Leber of 1229 Cedar ave. also has three children and also favors the idea. "It would be nice for the children," she said.

A father whose mother couldn't come to the phone and who didn't seem to know his name, although he said his age is four, said only "I want to go swimming."

Route 22 Accident Jars Driver, 71; Summons Issued

Mountainside police reported Mrs. Nichols, a widow, was taken to Overton Hospital, Summit, for a check-up, police said.

John R. Egan, Jr., 21, of Chatham, who was driving his father's car, said he was driving eastbound in the fast lane. Coming around a bend in the night, he saw a slower traffic and skidded sideways into the Nichols car, which was in the slow lane, according to police.

Patrolman William Ayres issued a summons to Egan for careless driving. Both cars were towed from the scene.

A Memory Like An Elephant Sergeant Spots Ex-Con On Route 22

The FBI is investigating an homicide, injured, who passed under the eagle eye of a police sergeant from Mountainside last week and ended up in the oven.

The eagle eye's prey was Raymond C. Scott of 1122 22, who was passing through the borough on Rt. 22 in a tractor-trailer, when Sgt. James Herick spotted him and remembered the face as that of a man who had jumped bail in Mountainside last Oct. 27.

The prosecution stopped, and questioned Scott, who maneuvered. Patrolman Jerome Rucy also spotted him as a bail jumper. "I saw a bail jumper," said the patrolman and the sergeant snatched handcuffs on Scott.

Scott, who was described by Sgt. Herick as a professional house burglar, was issued

eight motor vehicle summonses and placed in jail. The action occurred at 2 p.m. July 28, and the next night Scott appeared before Magistrate Jacob Bauer. The Chicago man was found guilty, fined a total of \$400 and sentenced in lieu of bond as follows:

During a week of a suspended sentence, one month of house arrest, one month of tractor-trailer registration in lieu of one month of imprisonment, 15 days of agriculture that don't count, 15 days of only one piece on the vehicle, 15 days and inspection of vehicle, 15 days.

Scott, who has spent almost half of his 52 years in jail and prison, according to police, went to the Union County jail the next day to serve the total six months. The FBI entered the case with suspicions that the tractor and trailer was stolen, local police said.

The case last October in

Mountainside against Scott who at one time lived in Westfield, was for suspected breaking and entering and larceny. He posted \$100 bail, but he never appeared in court.

Scott first went to jail in 1934 at the age of 22 for larceny of a car, police said. Since then he has been in jail on prison bond at the time, a record of 15 prison records, the latest instance being a three-year term in New Jersey State Prison for breaking and entering and larceny in Scotch Plains. In 1953 he was sentenced to the state prison for six to nine years for breaking, entering and larceny in Union.

Sgt. Herick was commended by Police Chief Christian Fritz, who described him as the type of policeman "who is of great value to any police department."

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Helps Prepare Engineering Book

Walter H. Rupp, Mountainside Board of Education member, participated in the preparation of a recently published book, "Thesaurus of Engineering Terms."

He served on a panel of engineers to draw up the first reference guide of its kind for technical writers, engineers and information specialists. The book was published last month by the Engineering Joint Council, representing 29 major engineering societies and institutions.

The purpose of the book is to improve communication among engineers and assist them in preparation of reports and in their use of technical literature. The 310-page volume contains 10,500 terms commonly used by all branches of engineering.

Rupp is an engineer on the staff of Esso Research and Engineering Co. at Florham Park and a member of the American Institute of Chemical Engineers.

Vehicle Crashes In Hard Rainfall

A Union youth who was driving west on Rt. 22 in a heavy rainfall last week was in an accident that caused possible injury to his 15-year-old passenger from Hillside Mountainside police reported.

His father, also named Christian, was the contractor who built the present Borough Hall, and was borough tax assessor at one time. He died when his son was 11 years old. The chief's grandfather was a borough councilman in 1900.

Chief Fritz has seen many changes in Borough Hall. He went to school there while the Echobrook School addition was being constructed and some 50 youngsters crowded into the borough meeting room for split second classes.

Twenty years ago the meeting room was used for dances, weddings and firemen's chicken suppers, the chief explained.

The white masonry building was constructed around the turn of the century shortly after the borough was incorporated in 1895. Until 1940 the fire department used quarters now occupied by police and garage doors opened on to the highway.

The police chief's office is presently occupied by the judge and borough clerk, and the clerk's office was a combination court room and police headquarters. Two upstairs offices were built last year.

Chief Fritz attended Echobrook School through the sixth grade, when Mountainside youngsters were sent to Westfield for junior school and high school. He attended Ferris School of Fingerprinting in New York City, Union County Police Chief's School for instructors, Rutgers University for courses in community relations and numerous police courses in investigative procedure and traffic law.

He has a strong interest in law and is fond of talking with lawyers. A complete law file, the New Jersey Statutes Annotated, is lodged in the bookshelves that line his pine paneled office in police headquarters. This area of private study has become a valuable complement to the more formal courses he has taken.

fatalities or possible fatalities must be photographed and investigated. The automobile must be checked and an autopsy arranged. Victims must be identified — a job that sometimes takes several days of intense investigation. Deaths of a suspicious nature require special investigation, and the body cannot be removed without an okay from the county medical examiner.

Chief Fritz lives at 296 Indian trail with his wife, the former Virginia Metley of Plainfield, and daughter, Barbara, a record analyst with the New York Port Authority.

Mrs. Fritz is a first grade teacher at Deerfield School. The couple met when she was teaching at Echobrook and he was a traffic officer stationed at the crossing there.

Fritz is a member of the Juvenile Conference Committee, which seeks to guide youngsters in trouble with the law. Other members of the committee are Dr. Henry Langheinz, chairman, Charles Wadis, principal of Echobrook School, and Mrs. Charles Jerome.

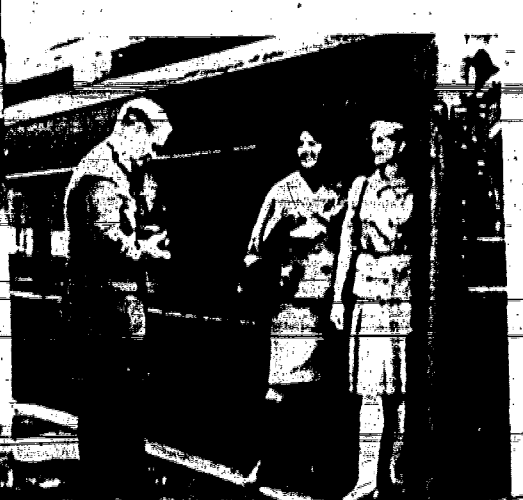

'New Look' Nears For Caldwell Students

"There are going to be some big changes and surprises in the new buildings at Caldwell High School," said William Wagner, superintendent of buildings and grounds for Springfield's public schools, during a recent tour.

"We're adding two new kindergarten classrooms," he explained. "That will be the purpose of the new building. The Board of Education wanted to update the building to the standards of other schools. It was way out-of-date."

"The lighting was also poor. They had a fire alarm in 1936 and the building was built in 1904 and the building has been fairly well renovated since then, but they still had exposed pipes."

THE FIRST AND SECOND floors of the old part of the school are being completely renovated, Wagner indicated. There will be a complete renovation of the heating and air conditioning systems and a new building for the kindergarten will be a completely new structure.

The new building will have a heating system of the automatic, new floors and a three-story building renovation of the old building.

Joseph Bender, who is chairman of building and grounds is supervising in connection with the architects' work.

"The contract Wagner explained was for two weeks before work was out. And that's when it was completed. The new building is going to be built in the fall. You just have to wait at that time, a year and a half and then through the long of summer, the hammering, sawing, adjusting, cranking."

"I know that the teachers and children will be very pleased by the lighting system. It's a big improvement. It's very important to maintain the quality of the building, but it's beneficial to youngsters."

Wagner, who has been superintendent of buildings and grounds for Springfield's public schools since 1958, said that the renovation project should have all its modern facilities ready by the time the youngsters return in September.

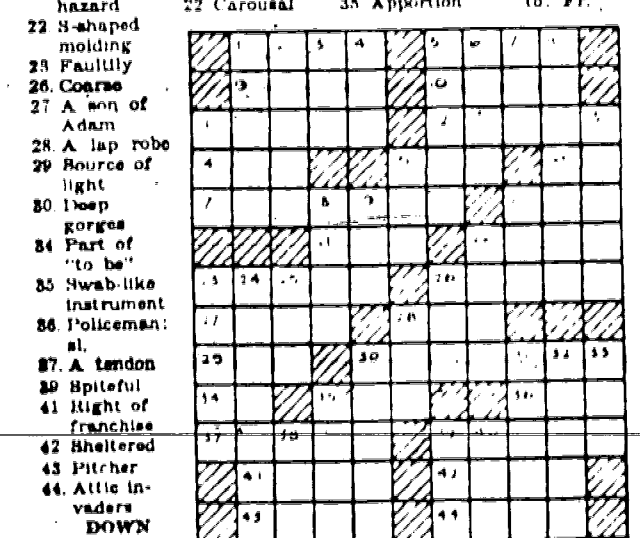
