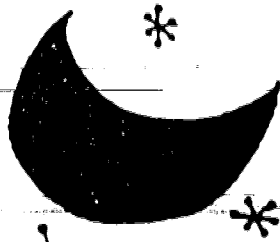

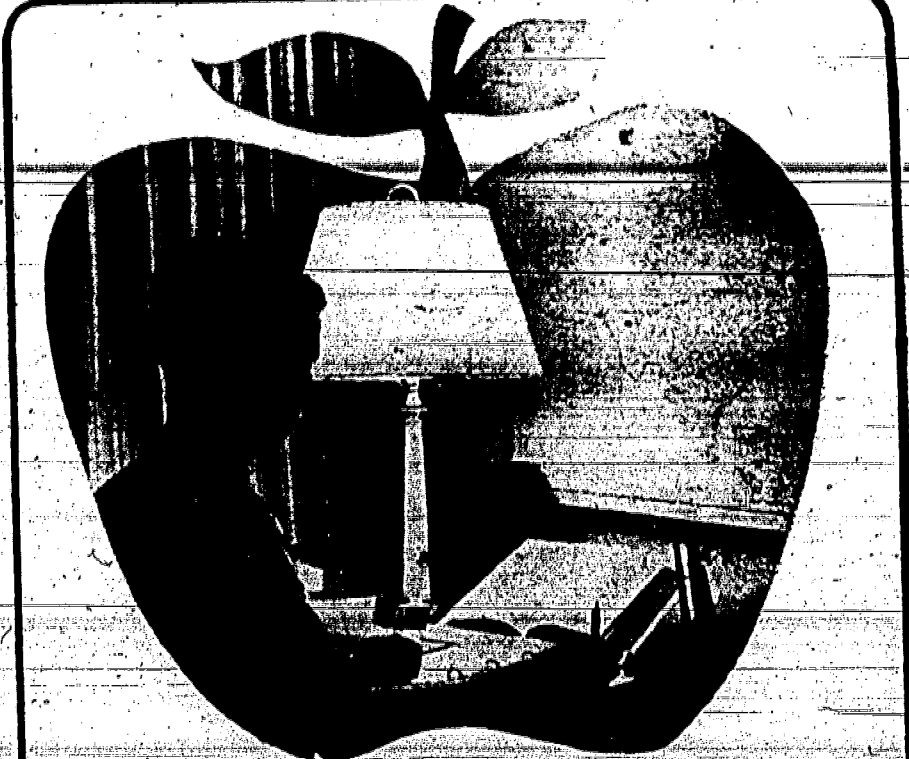
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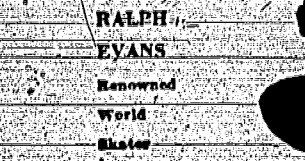

# Dem Candidates Back Swim Pool, Charter Change

The two Democratic candidates for Mountainside Borough Council this week released their seven-point platform for the fall election in which they backed the construction of a borough swimming pool and proposed high-rise apartments.

Their platform includes: "Responsible government that keeps the voters informed, no high-rise apartments, construction of town swimming pool; passage of a meaningful conflict of interest ordinance, elimination of traffic hazard at the Rt. 22 bus stop; improved storm sewer construction; and charter change to open elective office in Mountainside to best qualified men irrespective of party."

"Responsible Mountainsiders of both parties were shocked by the tragic spectacle at San Francisco," said Rose and Styga. "A once-great party with long and honorable tradition was captured by a King of extremists who promptly choked off the voice of moderation and reason in their own deliberations. We again call upon the local Republican leadership to declare their own position. Do you support the national ticket? If not, what is your stand?"

"We also call upon the Republican Borough Council for action instead of evasiveness. For years our needs have been neglected, and now the factional split has replaced inaction by paralysis. Only two-party government, with Democrats represented on the council, can solve our needs. We will carry our case to the voters, and look forward to Election Day with confidence," they added.

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# Police Pay Hike Up For Passage At Next Meeting

A police salary ordinance proposing \$400 a year increase in base and percentage increases for longevity of service will come up for final passage to the Mountainside Borough Council at its regular meeting Tuesday.

The ordinance was introduced at a special meeting Monday night by Councilman George S. W. Weller, Chairman of the Police Pension and Association.

Weller said that the ordinance would become effective January 1, 1965. The ordinance would increase the base salary of police officers from \$10,000 to \$10,400.

Weller said that the ordinance would also provide for a six percent pay raise after two years and a four percent raise after six years.

# THE PENDULUM SWINGS Reading Innovation -- Phonetic Alphabet

The Mountainside experiment is part of a larger project headed by Dr. Robert Chaffin of Newark State College. Dr. Hanagan said:

The new method is admittedly still an experiment, but it is rapidly catching fire. Two experimental classes in its use will be conducted in Mountainside this year.

Dr. Lewis B. Hanagan, superintendent of schools, has announced that first grade classes using the initial teaching alphabet, referred to as ITA, is being taught this fall by Mrs. Virginia Fritz at Deerfield School and Mrs. Mildred Heaton at Beechwood. Each are teaching two classes of first graders with carefully matched ability — one of them by traditional methods and one with ITA. Groups will be checked three times a year to compare relative progress. Mrs. Diana Oberlin, school psychologist, has established the matching ability classes to establish validity in the tests.

According to the page volume explaining the method, written by John Downing, reading research officer at the University of London Institute of Education, who was assigned in 1960 to investigate the method, ITA developed out of a theory that the unsystematic nature of English spelling is the cause of a large proportion of reading failures.

The idea of establishing a phonetic alphabet as an aid to beginning reading instruction is more than 100 years old, and experiments in this area were conducted in Great Britain and the United States in the 1890's.

The theory was advanced that traditional English spelling holds two pitfalls for the child learning to read — a lack of consistency in the visual patterns of words and the lack of systematic relationships between symbols of the conventional alphabet and the sounds of spoken English.

Advisability Of L.B.J. - B.G., Television Debate Draws Mixed Reactions

Reaction was mixed among Union County area residents asked in a survey conducted last week if they felt President Johnson and Senator Goldwater should have scheduled televised debates, in the manner of the "Kennedy-Nixon Great Debates" held in 1960.

Some 16 persons in Union, Linden, Springfield, Mountainside, Kenilworth, Roselle and Roselle Park were all asked the following question: "Do you feel a series of October TV debates should be held between this November's Presidential candidates of the two major parties? (Feel free to elaborate)" Of the 16 contacted, two declined to be interviewed on the subject. Six of the other 14 answered "no," five said "yes" and three persons were undecided.

# Wanted: Extra Room In Your Home (And Heart) For A Homeless Child

By BARBARA GIBBONS

Do you have some extra room in your home — and in your heart — for a homeless child? If you do, the N. J. Bureau of Children's Services would like to meet you.

The state-sponsored welfare agency (formerly known as the State Board of Child Welfare) is conducting an intensive drive to find temporary foster homes for its wards.

Being a foster parent is the same as adopting a youngster, Miss Hannah Cohen of the agency pointed out. Foster parents assume no financial responsibility for their wards. The state reimburses temporary parents for all costs including clothing, medical care and other needs plus \$6 a month for room and board. And of course, the arrangement is only temporary, even if it continues for several years. Unlike adoptive parents, foster parents must have the realization that the child in their home will not mate leave when his "real" parents can care for him.

**EVEN THOUGH** foster parents are paid room and board the state bureau cautions would-be applicants against viewing the arrangement as a money-making project. The amount of care needed by the average foster child makes "foster-mom" a fairly low paying job. Women looking for a source of income are much better off working in an office, comments Miss Cohen.

What the agency really wants to find are people who like children and are able to provide the care, guidance, attention and affection needed

by youngsters from broken homes. Most often the foster children are far more troublesome than the prospective parent's own youngster because of the disruptive background he comes from. The foster parents must understand this and be equal to the challenge.

**FOSTER HOMES** are needed for children of all ages and religions, said Miss Cohen. But certain categories of children are harder to place than others. In fact, teenagers are tougher to place than even the school children. Boys are especially difficult to place.

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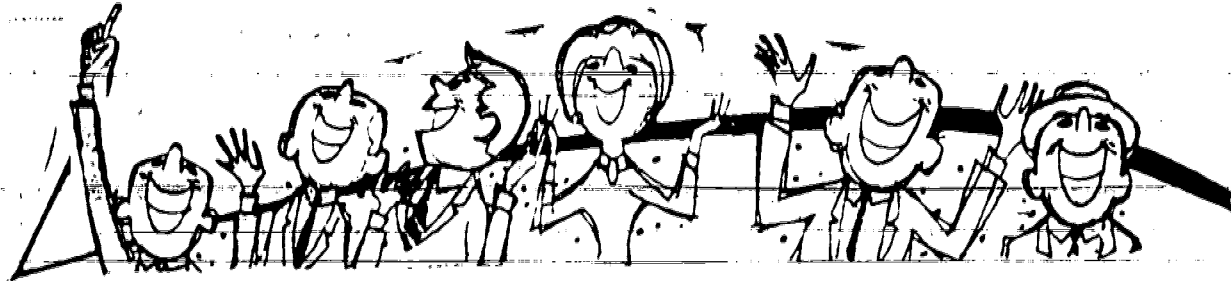

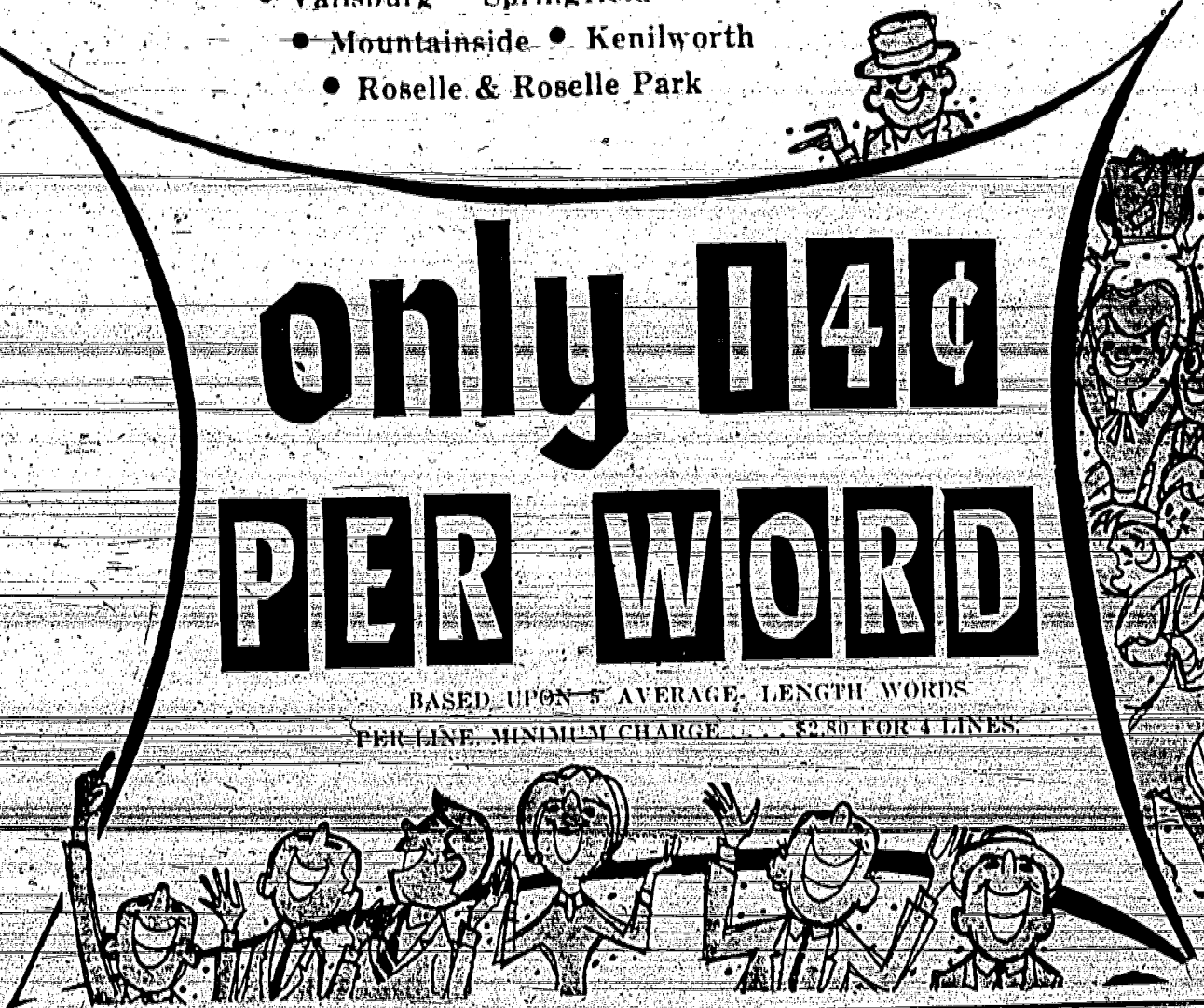

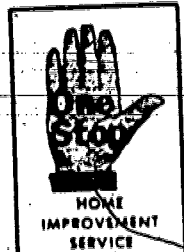
