'Bantam Market' Gains Approval Of Planning Bd.

Convenience Shop Intends To Locate On Mountain Ave.

A "bantam food market" geared to a quick shopping short order concept, received approval from the Planning Board Monday.

The store will be located on business property on the west side of Mountain Ave. some 100 feet north of the Barrett and Crain real estate office on the corner of New Providence rd. owned by Robert R. Barrett Jr. of Barrett and Crain.

The Planning Board also approved plans for a \$40,000 brick and plate glass building to be constructed on the property, subject to conditions stipulated by the Board and approval of the commerce committee.

Application was made by Barrett and Walter Selover, real estate representative for the Southland Corp. in Dallas, Tex., which operates a chain of some 1,400 similar stores throughout the United States, 50 of them in New Jersey, under the trade name T-Eleven. The stores are open from 7 a.m. to 11 p.m. seven days a week, Selover said.

'General Store'
The 60-by-40 foot one-story building with a wide front porch would be set back some 50 feet from the property line. Parking would be in the front of the building.

Selover described the operation as a modernized version of the old-fashioned general store where housewives, who need only a few items, can purchase them quickly without waiting in supermarket checkout lines.

Conditions imposed for approval of the project include stipulations that parking facilities be located 15 feet from the curb, a four-foot green sidewalk be constructed to join an existing sidewalk in front of Barrett and Crain, low plantings be installed between the sidewalk and curb, curbing conform with county regulations and a rear access driveway be installed on the north side of the building.

Parking Provisions
Dimensions of the property are roughly 100 feet across the front by 200 feet deep, according to Barrett.

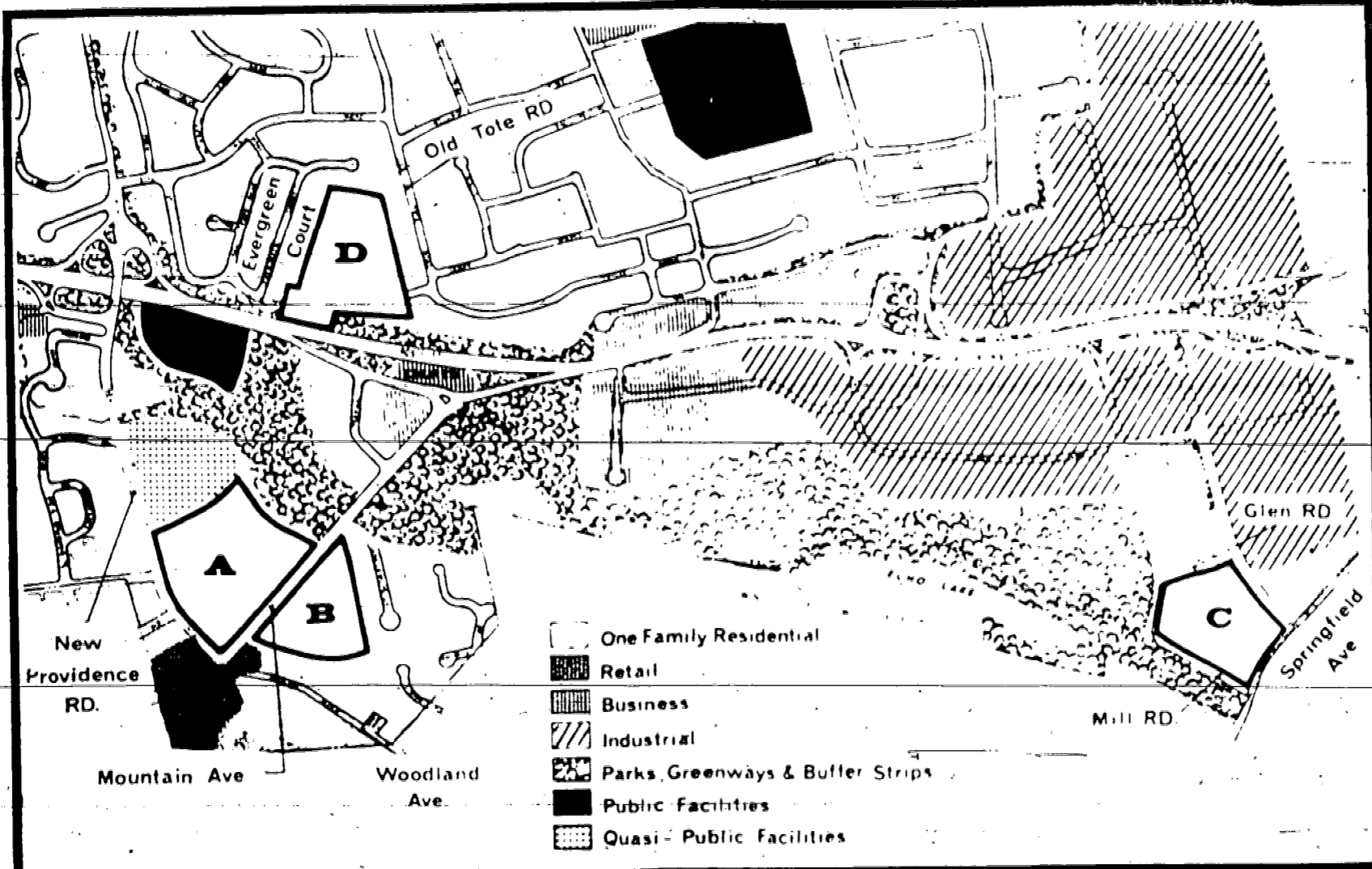
A discussion concerning the legality of parking provisions in the front of the building was resolved when Planning Board Chairman Albert Hartung pointed out that parking in a business zone, according to terms of the zoning ordinance, is restricted to the area behind the building line, which is not the same thing as behind the building.

The Board also approved a change in lot line requested by Harry Devlin of 443 Hillside ave. that would increase frontage on his property from 20 ft. to 40 ft., and a minor subdivision of one lot into two asked by Harold C. Schrupf of 326 New Providence rd.

(Continued from Page 1) of multiple dwellings have, in most instances, marred the higher tax charges than those of one-family dwellings. Even more significant, Mountainsiders prefer the one-family suburban character of their community to the appearance of neighboring communities that have fallen for the illusion of lower taxes via multiple dwellings. The consensus of the overwhelming majority of Mountainside residents, more than 1,000 of whom recently petitioned the borough government for the strict observance and retention of the one-family zoning ordinance and firm exclusion of multiple dwellings, emphasizes the importance which homeowners attach to the aesthetic benefits of the rural-suburban setting of Mountainside and their determination to keep it so. It is a disservice to Mountainside homeowners to play them with the fiction of more rateables and lower taxes at economic benefits of multiple dwellings. The record to date shows there is less likelihood of significant tax increases in Mountainside with its single family dwellings than in neighboring communities with multiple dwellings. A good example of the downgrading of a community that succumbs to the illusion of plush apartments as high rateables is the City of East Orange. If principal concern is for the welfare of the many families who prefer apartment residences, then let the Smith Associates plan for more apartments in those communities whose zoning regulations permit multiple dwellings," he added.

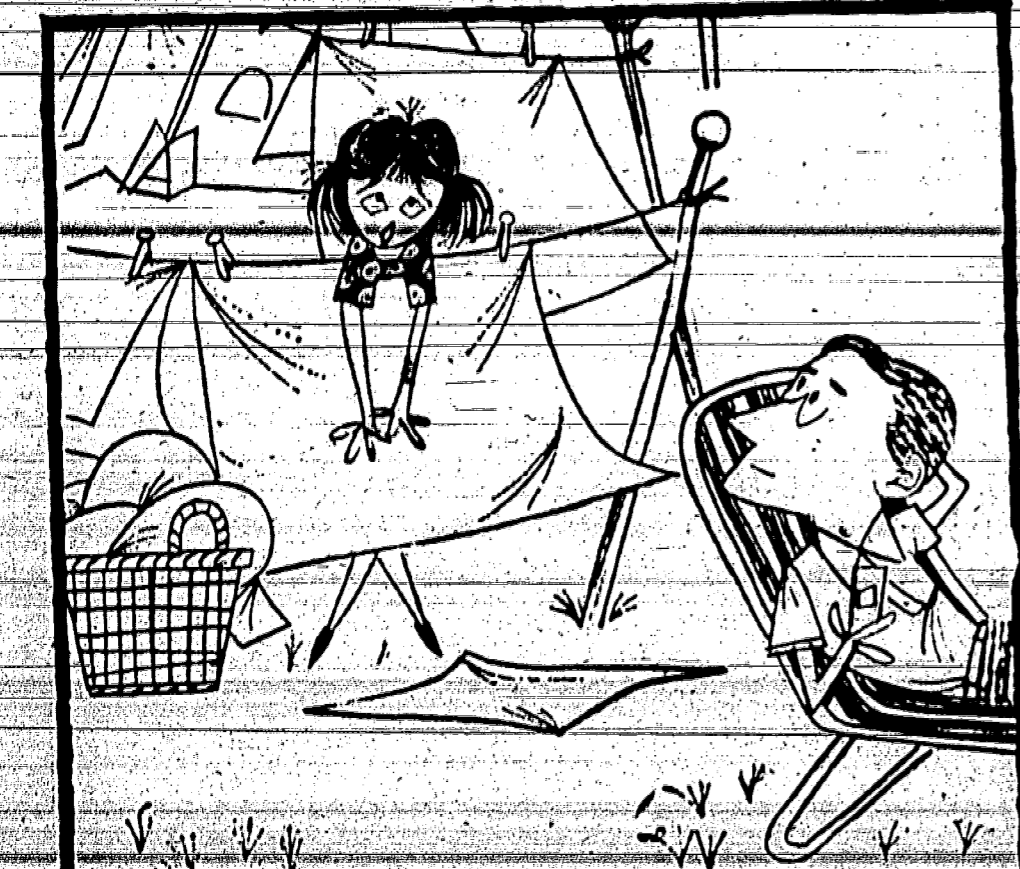

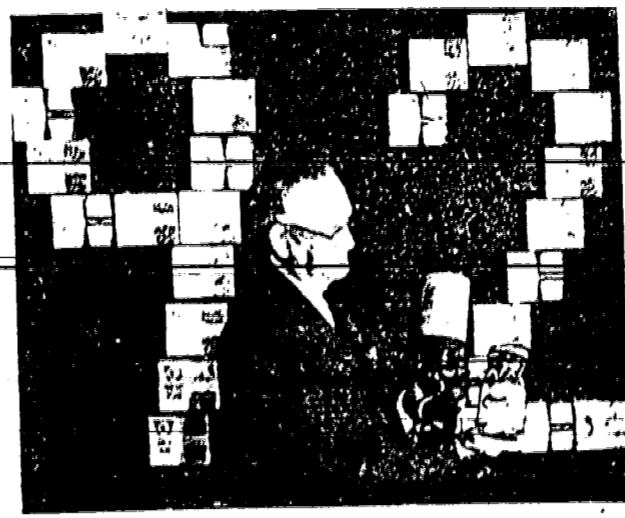
Brotherhood Sets Economic Talk By NCE Professor

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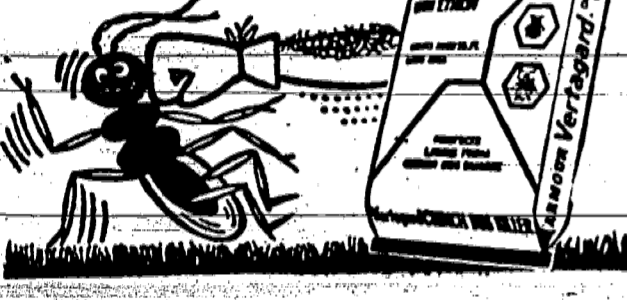

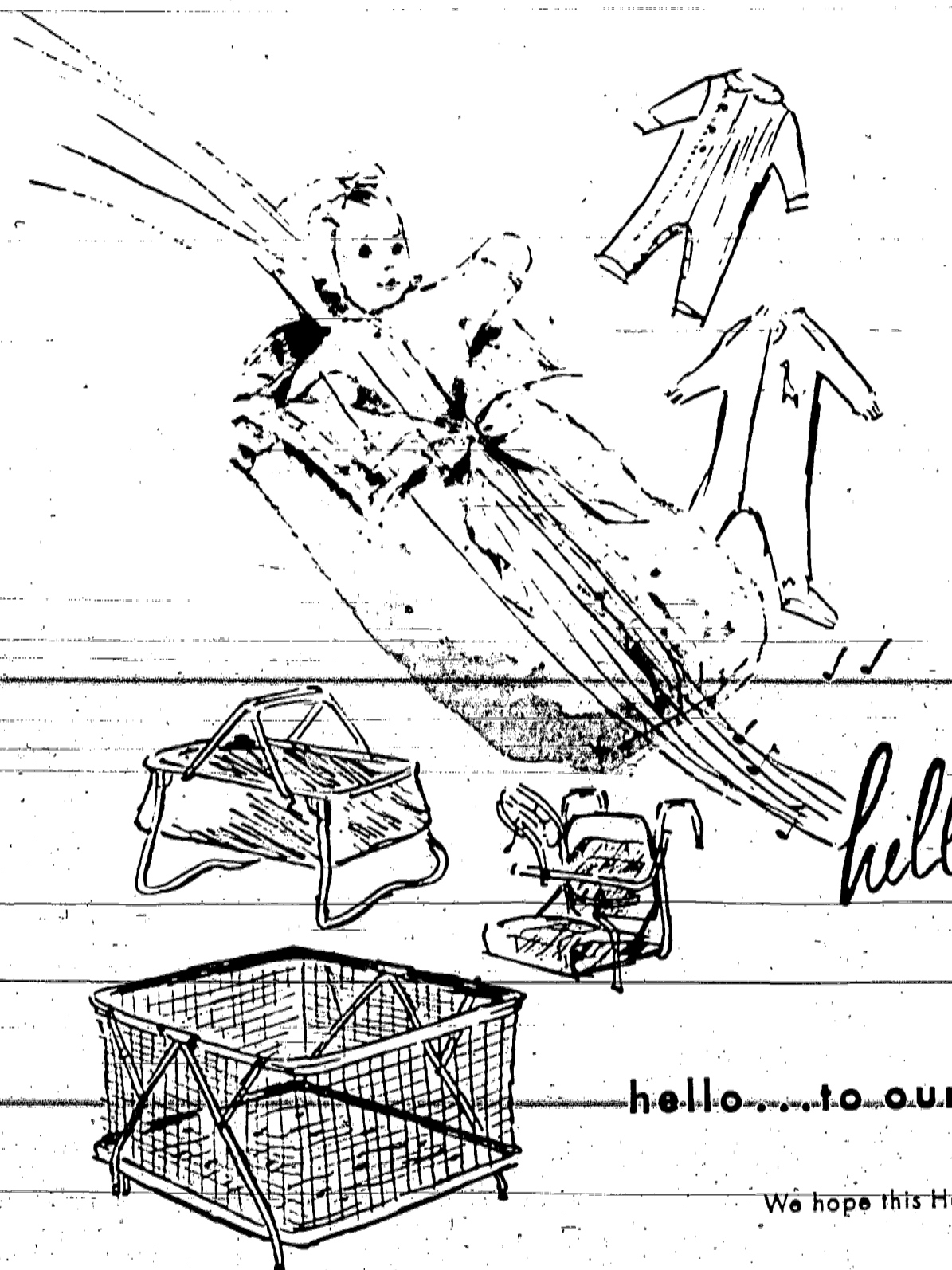

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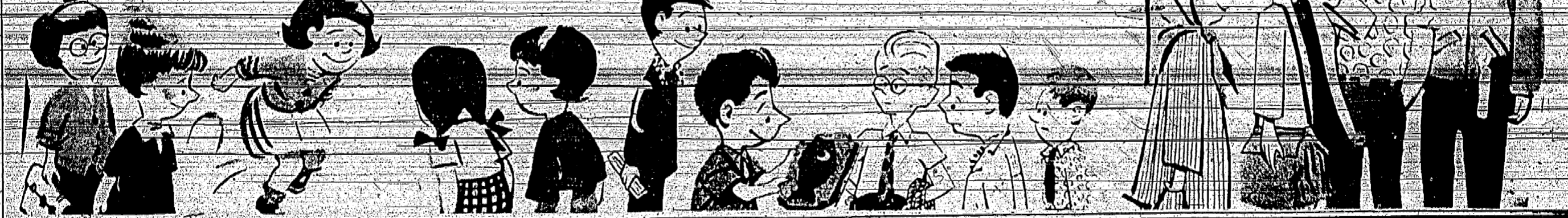

Autos, Fashion, Home Decorating Among Topics Interesting 4H-ers

This is 4-H week to more than 300 Union County youngsters who are devoting their Heads, Hearts, Hands and Health to some fairly urban pursuits these days.

Auto mechanics, fashion, photography and home decorating are just a few of the non-agricultural topics currently of interest to 4-H members. Union County 4-H agent Norman Cohn relates that there are 26 clubs throughout the county, under the leadership of 30 volunteers. But the potential number of clubs is limited only by the number of volunteers

available and the interest of its members.

The 4-H program is extremely flexible. For example, any five youngsters can start a 4-H club devoted to virtually any topic, if they or the county agent can find them a volunteer leader. The members may range in age from 9 to 18. Meetings can be held once or twice a week, once or twice a month, or at whatever intervals the members themselves decide is appropriate. They may or may not collect dues, depending on their preference. The projects they undertake can be as simple or as extensive as they wish. Each club elects its own officers and sets up its own format of operation.

Volunteers need no special training in the subject the

club is devoted to. The county agency provides detailed plans and projects for most subjects, including information to help the leaders keep informed. Heading a 4-H Club can help adults learn more about a subject, too.

Right now 4-H agent Norman Cohn is eager to start some

be an "expert" on horticulture, just someone who's interested in some phase of gardening and is willing to share his or her enthusiasm with a group of youngsters. Such a volunteer might already be active in one of the adult gardening groups in the area.

If — or when — such a group is formed, it will be open to both boys and girls. The club will pick its own name and will hold meetings in members' homes. Depending on the youngsters' ages and their eagerness, the members might even decide to build their own greenhouse, or they might take on some civic beautification project.

Some of the active groups in this area include the "Bunny Beavers" in Linden, a group of girls who design and sew their own clothing; the Union County Beekeepers Association headed by Conrad Oberle — a club of horseowners in Rahway and Mountside; a number of youngsters in nearby towns are volunteer dog-trainers for the Seeing Eye Foundation in Morristown. These youngsters raise pedigreed German shepherds from puppyhood to the age of 14 months when the dogs are old enough to begin their schooling as the eyes of blind people.

Union County's growing 4-H program is under the guidance of a former engineer who gave up his technical job

Shanley Blasts Williams' Attack On GOP Hopefuls

Republican senate candidate Bernard M. Shanley this week continued his attack on his Democratic opponent, calling upon U.S. Sen. Harrison Williams to "come out from under that 10-gallon hat and discuss the basic issues of your sorry performance in Washington for the last five-and-a-half years."

In a day-long sweep through Essex, Union, Somerset and Middlesex counties, Shanley emphasized that Williams "is running behind LBJ for all he's worth, but he will find out on Nov. 3 that he is running far behind Johnson and that both are running behind the Goldwater-Miller ticket."

Shanley declared that "Williams' personal attacks on Goldwater are putting him in hot water with New Jersey voters of both parties who are sincerely interested in the respective merits and qualifications of the men seeking to represent them for the next six years."

Declaring that "New Jersey's overburdened taxpayers" would join the so-called war on poverty as "disabled victims, if Williams has his way," Shanley described his opponent as "a fiscal Robin Hood who wants to increase your Federal tax burdens and hit you with a state income tax besides."

"If the Democrat junior senator has his way," said Shanley, "you'll have to worry about take-home pay—you can merely split your check and send half to Washington and the other to Trenton. Williams' sponsorship of bills that would add thirty billion dollars to our present tax load, and his advocacy of a state income tax, are two glaring examples of his obvious belief in 'big brother' government. He makes our billion dollar bond issue governor look like a piker by comparison."

Adams Exchange Telephone Area Expansion Given

Local calling area for residents of the Adams telephone exchange will be increased to include Elizabeth, effective Nov. 1, according to officials of the Public Utilities Commission. There will be no increase in rate.

The area increase follows two years of negotiations by Adams Exchange for inclusion of Elizabeth, Newark and Elizabeth in the Adams exchange area. The Adams Exchange Commission, headed by Herbert Ross of Mountainside, Harry Simon, also of Mountainside, and Mrs. William J. Jones of 346 Old Town Rd., Elizabeth, were the main participants in the negotiations.

Some 2,000 area residents signed petitions last year requesting P.U.C. and the Bell Telephone Co. to add Elizabeth to the Adams exchange area. Ross and Simon were among those who signed the petitions. P.U.C. will telephone company representatives to present their case.

The group's original request was that the changes, Mountainside, Newark and Elizabeth be included in the Adams exchange area. Ross said this week that he will continue to press for inclusion of the Essex County communities, although he heard the decision of P.U.C. in Elizabeth.

A spokesman for P.U.C. said that 200,000 telephones are now included in the Adams exchange area. Six dollars a month for a residential telephone is charged in a sliding scale determined by the number of phones reached within an area. Designation of the local area continues to be made by the P.U.C.

Communities reached without additional charge by Adams exchange phones are Cranford, Fairwood, Linden, Midburn, Plainfield, Rahway, Roselle, Summit, Unionville, Westfield and Mountainside. Next in line is Elizabeth, which will be reached by the Adams exchange.
