High School Teachers' Salaries Kept Pace With Times

West Point Trip Set By Cub Scouts

The facts contained in this history have been taken from the most authoritative sources available.

POST-WAR GROWTH
Teachers' salaries in the Union County Regional High School District from its inception in 1948 to 1964.

In 1948, the salary was \$1,400 per year. By 1964, it had risen to \$14,000 per year.

With the adoption of the new salary schedule, the Board of Education first had to consider the question of the effect on the district's budget.

From the very beginning it was the practice at Regional High School for the principal and director of guidance to visit the elementary schools each spring to administer an intelligence test to the eighth grade pupils.

After much experimenting with the time schedule for the club program, the one which seemed most satisfactory was the after-school program with attendance voluntary on the part of students.

New cubs and den mothers were introduced and plans announced for a trip to West Point as the initial meeting of Cub Scout Pack 152 recently.

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THE FIRST SALARY guide stated that teachers were paid on the basis of their years of experience.

The Board of Education grew rapidly in its understanding of the need for large salary increases as this preliminary statement in the 1948-1949 guide indicates.

1. The guide should attract competent teachers. 2. The guide provides incentive for service teachers with the necessary financial incentive for professional growth.

3. The receipt of a just and equitable salary by a teacher will obviate the necessity of his having to work after school hours to earn additional income.

4. A liberal salary policy makes it possible for the Board of Education, through administrators and supervisors to be more exacting of teachers in the matter of educational background, teaching efficiency and competency.

The Board of Education's Association were always most cordial. While the board did not always grant the increase which the teachers requested, the salary scale was considerably better than the average for the county.

Kelly, Tony Winnicki, Mike Page, Bob Taylor, Robert Shomo and Charlie Shome were a few of the countless others who gave up their weekends to work at the field.  
There were only 18 boys aged eight to 12 who were rostered when Mountainside Little League was organized back in 1953. The names were tossed in a hat and picked at random for assignment to one of the original four teams: the Giants, Dodgers, Indians and Yankees.  
The rough league was formed because the Westfield Little League, which was already overcrowded, turned down a request from the Collins and Ron Farrell to enter the Mountainside team in their league. The two men then formed the community league after enlisting four sponsors who were given four spots out of the team they would sponsor.  
The League became affiliated with the National Little League in Williamsport, Pa. later that same year. Games were played at Echo Park Field until 1955 when a permanent field was built on the grounds near Deerfield School which the Board of Education permitted the League to use.  
The first treasurer, Fred Szejda, bought the original field house and started another team. Growing rapidly, the League added teams to the original four, organized a Babe Ruth League for older boys, and a softball program for girls. By the fifth year, the growth of the League was evident in the program.  
In the first year of 1964, there were 19 Little League teams, six Babe Ruth League teams, six Pony League teams and 17 girls' softball teams. A manager and 21 other adults serve in other official capacities.
