Tuesday hearings set on salary and pool ordinance

Public hearings on two ordinances, one set-ting the 1967 salaries for borough employees and the other-amending the ordinance regulating privately-owned pools, are scheduled for next Tuesday night's meeting of the Borough Council. The meeting is scheduled to open at o'clock in Echobrook School.

The salary ordinance, which amends the one adopted by the Council in May of 1966, authorizes annual raises for all borough employees except members of the police department who are covered by a separate ordinance. The raises range from a \$700 hike for Bough Engineer Robert K him from \$10,400 to \$11,100 annually to a \$200 raise for most of the personnel in the Borough Hall. Elmer Hoffarth, who serves as Borough Clerk, clerk of the Municipal Court and tax collector, will receive a total of \$600 for all three chores, bringing him to \$11,-100 annually, Magistrate Jacob Bauer is scheduled to receive a \$500 raise for a total of \$4,000 annually. Building Inspector Chester Johnson gets a \$250 hike, up to \$4,000 annually Other salaries set by the proposed ordinance

are: Deputy Borough Clerk, \$5,800; Assistant Court Clerk, \$2,940; Assistant Borough Treasurer (a new post), \$4,680; secretary to Borough Engineer, \$4,160; Deputy Tax Collector, \$2,940; clerk-stenographer, \$4,160; plumbing

Five days of waiting and praying ended for Mrs. Charles Tollinche of Mountainside on

call came through from her son, Stanley

Andrews, a seaman aboard the carrier For-

restal which was wracked by explosions and

fire on July 29. The telephone, which had been ringing almost constantly with calls from concerned relatives and friends, rang at 3:30 a.m. that day. An operator asked if she would accept the charges for a collect call from the U.S.S. Forrestal in the Philippines and an overloyed Mrs. Tollinche heard for the first time that her 21-year-old son was alive and

"His first words were 'mother, are you all right," his mother reported, "Then he wanted to know 'is grandma all right?" His maternal grandmother, who lives in Bayonne, had been released from the hospital on the day of the Forrestal disaster. The family kept the bad news from her by removing the tubes from the television and the radio.

The young seaman was so insistent on getting news about the family that he had time only to assure his mother that he was safe well. He indicated that he would explain in a letter how he escaped injury in the disaster which claimed 131 lives.

'There was so much noise on the line, all the other boys behind him waiting to call their homes. I could hear them shouting hurry up, I'm next,'" Mrs. Tollinche said earlier this week.

"I cried a lot while I was waiting to hear but I cried even harder after I knew he was safe, I can't stop thinking of all those other mothers who haven't heard, who will never hear from their sons," she explained emo-

ANDREWS, a 1964 graduate of Governor Livingston Regional High School, entered the service with Dennis Barry of Mountaina ave., Mountainside, in October, 1964, under the "buddy system." The two went through boot camp together at the Great Lakes Naval Station and then were separated. Andrews was assigned to the Atlantic fleet, Barry to

Dems fail to enter ticket for September primary

Louis Parent of 1467 Woodacres dr., Mountainside, is the third man on the Republican ticket for the three seats on Mountainside's governing body. Parent filed as a candidate last Thursday together with Mayor Frederick Wilhelms Jr. and Councilman Donald Robertson who had-previously announced they would

seek re-election, Parent was named by the local GOP screen. ing committee as a replacement for outgoing Councilman Charles Irwin who withdrew his bid for re-election in mid-July when he was named as the Republican candidate for the Union County's newly created Assemblymanat-large seat. The ticket has the endorsement of the Mountainside Republican Club.

No candidates were filed by the Mountainside Democrats who, up until the deadline last Thursday, had indicated they would enter a slate in time for the September primary. The Democrats' failure to file could mean that the Republicans will run unopposed in the general election in November, However, Karl Heinze, president of the local Democratic Coub, did state last week that his party would enter ticket in the November election.

A Mountainside resident for the past eight years, Parent served in the early 1960's on former Mayor Eugene Rau's advisory board to the Planning Board. He has been active in the Community Fund Drive and in the local Red Cross Drive.

### Armed bandits get about \$800 from WILHELMS, A BOROUGH resident for about center drug store

About \$800 in cash and negotiable checks was stolen from the Mountainside Drug Store in an armed robbery that took place shortly before closing time Saturday night. The proprietor, Herman Tenkin of 1329 Morris ave., Union, and one of his employees, David McKinney of Or-chard rd., Mountainside, were alone in the store at 9:45 when two men entered the store by the front door. The men, both of whom were in their 50's jabbed guns into Tenkin and McKinney, saying "don't move, this is a holdup."

Tenkin said the bandits emptied the cash

register but took no merchandise except a pack of cigarettes. He estimated the loss at

the \$800 figure.

Tenkin and McKinney were forced into a washroom in the rear of the store. One of the men then held a gun on them while his companion escaped through the rear door. The second man then closed the washroom door and, when he was unable to lock it, warned Tenken and McKinney not to come out for five minutes. Tenkin raced to the rear door as soon as the second man left but saw no car leaving the

Tenkin has operated the store at the corne of Mountain ave. and New Providence rd. for the past 27 years. This was the first time he had been held up. Tenkin said that normally his store, which also sells liquor, would have been busy at that time on Saturday night. He attributed the lack of customers to the heavy storm that flooded the area Saturday

MOUNTAINSIDE POLICE ARE investigating, Detective Jerome Rice said Monday.

The report of the robbery stirred up repeated rumors of numerous break-ins which are supposed to have taken place in the borough during the past several weeks.

Rice said Monday "there have been a few break and entries this month and last." However, he declined to give details.

### Board may act on bus contract Tuesday night

Contracts for bus transportation for Mountainside's grammar school children will be awarded by the local Board of Education at a special session Tuesday night if bids submitted "come within the board's budget," according to Abe Suckno, the board's transportation chairman.

Bids for supplying the transportation will be received next Tuesday at 2 p.m. in the Board of Education office on Rt. 22.

This is the second time around for bus bids.

The school board rejected a \$29,500 bid submitted by the Beirne Bus Co. on July 11. The Beirne bid, the only one submitted last month, exceeded by about 35 percent the amount allotted for bus transportation in the 1967-68 school budget. It was over \$11,000 higher than the contract awarded to the Lion Bus Co. last year for similar bus transportation.

Suckno cited the urgent need of getting action on the bus contracts. Normally, the contracts are awarded in June to allow board personne time to set up the bus schedules and routes for the opening of the schools in September. Since almost half of the children in the borough are transported to the three public grammar schools and Our Lady of Lourdes, further delay in settling the contracts could create a serious problem, Suckno indicated.

Suckno attribut this year by the local and other school boards in getting bids for bus transportation to the new state law which requires communities to provide transportation for private and parochial school children.

He predicted that the problems would be ironed out within the next year or two as bus companies adjust to the expanded demands on

The board specifications call for the bidders to supply a minimum of five buses on each school day. They also set limits on the time a child may be on a bus and require the bidder to supply liability insurance.

If the contract is awarded Tuesday night, the Board of Education is expected to adopt a school allocation and transportation policy; (Continued on page 3)

### 'Y' introduces registration by mail; lengthens course

registration for its instructional courses this all. The new method will streamline the registration process and elminate the Y's 15year-old procedure of standing in line to register for classes, according to John A. Borton, associate physical director.

The "Y" will also shift this fall from the four 10-week terms in effect in previous years, to three 13-week terms. Borton said he believes the boys enrolled will benefit from the increased length of the sessions since the courses will be intensified, "giving the boys a greater opportunity to perfect their skills."

One of the main advantages of the new system of registration will be the timesaving. Parents often stood in line over two hours waiting to register their sons. In addition, the line-up, which often wound out into the street, "was simply getting out of hand." Borton stated.

Registrations for swim and other classes will be accepted only by mail; no walk-in or telehone registrations will be taken. Registration for the fall swim session will

be accepted from Westfield residents with post marks dated Sept. 5 or Sept. 6. Those in advance of those dates will be processed after the second day's mail. Postmarks must read either Sept. 6 or Sept. 7 from out-of-town residents; out-of-town registration received-prior-to-those dates will be processed after the second date's mail.

An "Extra" In A Series

FOOD SPECIAL Meat is expensive in Africa and is not often eaten by the natives. In fact, a young African couple in Dakor, Senegal, told us that the price of meat was about twice as much than at home. Everything was, they said, except bread. For ten cents they could buy a huge and delicious French bread, but not much else. For us as tourists we found the prices generally high in hotels throughout Africa and on a par with U.S. prices, but meat was always available-at a price, I speak now of meats such as lamb, beef, veal, chicken; not hippopotamus which reportedly, is a fa-vorite with Africans in the interior, Someone said rhinoceros is also eaten, but I tend to doubt it. Nothing could get through that hide

to get to meat. One thing I would have doubted if I could, but the evidence was right before me, and I have no choice but to believe it, is the thing about caterpillars: A choice tid-bit, at least in Ivory Coast where I saw them in the making at a market is -- roasted caterpillars. No roasted peanuts for the Ivoriansi Only roasted caterpillars. Ugh. They look no better than

ON THE MENU AT THE WONDERFUL new Casino Hotel at Victoria Falls in Rhodesia, this item caught everyone's eye: "mon-key gland steak," We were all agog, and that was just what the mischievous young, hotel manager wanted. None of us doubted that it could be so for we had just come from an island in the Zambesi River swarming with monkeys, but we didn't necessarily cherish the thought of eating one of them. Then the manager confessed with a twinkle that it was really regular beef steak cut in long strips. We tried it then, It tasted like very good regular beef steak.

But on second thought, who knew what monkey gland steak was like? That pixie hotel manager did laugh with extra relish, and we had no recipe for that one, to prove things one way or the other.

ON THE MENU FOR SOME AFRICANS on the western side of the continent is a special occasion chicken dish called "Ground Nut Stew," and in South Africa a favorite is "Bobotee." Because of the interest following the article on food in Africa (May 11 Feminine Look) a recipe for the two follows:
GROUND NUT STEW

Four or five tomatoes quartered and prefernably skinned. Three large onions finely chopped.

IIIII By TRUDINA HOWARD HILL One half cup palm oil (Or peanut oil, or

corn oil.) Half cup crushed groundnuts (peanuts). (Peanut butter can be substituted.)

One and one-half cup coconut milk. (One cup boiling water poured over four tablespoons of canned shredded coconut, and then half cup milk added, can be substituted here.) Salt to season.

Two teaspoons sugar. Pepper, both black and red; at least half

a teaspoon each, and more, if a hotter dish is desired. One chicken cut into parts.

Sautee the onions and tomatoes in the oil. When the mixture is golden, add the groundnuts and then the coconut milk. Season the sauce with salt, sugar and pepper, and then add the chicken. Partially cover and stew slowly for at least three hours. If the sauce gets too thin, cook without the cover. If more liquid is needed, add minute quantities of water. When ready to serve, the sauce should be almost absorbed in the chicken.

Serve it with just about anything. Green peppers or shredded coconut make excellent garnishes. Rice is more frequently served with it, and pineapples, bananas, onions or tomatoes either fresh, fried or broiled, make wonderful additions to it.

#### S. AFRICAN BOBOTEE

1 medium onion, chopped

2 tablespoons butter I slice white bread

1 cup milk 2 eggs, well beaten

l pound ground meat tablespoon curry powder

juice of one lemon 1/4 cup chopped almonds

1/4 cup chutney 8 dried apricots, soaked and chopped

salt and pepper to taste 2 bay leaves, broken in pieces

Sautee onions in butter or margarine until golden brown. Soak bread in milk, remove, squeeze dry. Add beaten eggs to milk. Mix the meat with the bread, onions, curry, lemon juice, almonds, apricots, chutney, salt and pepper. Add half of egg mixture id blend well. Place in a greased, shallow baking dish, and hollow center slightly to allow for rising. Stick pieces of bay leaves on top. Bake in moderate oven (350) for 20 minutes. Remove leaves and pour rest of egg mixture on top. Return to oven and continue baking until custard sets, about 25 minutes. Serve with yellow rice. Serves approximately six.



### **Borough Council defers decision** on appeal of planning board ruling

MOUNTAINSIDE (N.J.) ECHO-Thursday, August 10, 1967-3

The Mountainside Borough Council has deferred rendering a decision on an appeal by Saul Brazer of Samuel Enterprises against a Planning Board ruling that would require him to extend Camelot rd. in his development of the former Finnegan property on Rt. 22.

Final action by the governing body was delayed after Milton Wasch, developer of the homes in the Camelot road area, asked at a special hearing held July 27 for a postpone-ment of the hearing because his lawyer, Irving Silverlight of Plainfield, was out of town. The Council declined to delay the hearing, but, in deference to Wasch's request, posponed handing down a decision until testimony at the hearing-could-be-made-available-to-his attorney. Wasch's attorney has until today to file a legal memorandum on the case. Brazer's attorney will then be given five more days to file an answer to that memorandum.

Wasch described himself at the hearing as a supporter of the Planning Board, which stipulated June 26 that Brazer must extend Camelot road to the eastern boundary of the former Finnegan property. Such extension could permit eventual expansion of the road (if and when other tracts in that area are developed) to connect with Long Meadow road, in accordance with the master plan, the Planning Board indicated,

Brazer's attorney, Frank T. Swain of Dughi, Johnston and O'Dwyer, charged that the in-sistence on the road is "in effect and in substance a taking of property, a taking of it for public use without any compensation to the owner---"


Brazer also claimed that the construction of the road would not allow him to make two standard-sized lots of the rear section of the property, as shown in his plans. In addition, he said the delay on the decision is endangering the closing of the sale of the front portion of the property, on which a home already stands. That sale is contingent on the development of the property as presented in his plans, he stated.

Brazers' plans as submitted would continue Camelot rd. in its present dead-end state



### Warinanco buds bloom into flowers

A display of multi-colored blossoms now greet visitors at the Henry S. Chaffield Memorial Garden in Warinanco Park, Elizabeth and Roselle, where nearly 14,000 annual flowers are planted.

The free-flowering annual plants each year continue as a popular point of interest for home gardeners throughout Union County. The garden will offer color until the first heavy frost in the fall.

The planting was completed late in June to replace 14,000 tulips which provided a colorful May display in the Chatfield Garden. All of the annual plants were grown from seed in cold frames at the Union County Park Commission's nursery in the Watchung

Reservation.

The focal point of the display will be in the center bed with Early Bird Mixed Dahlias offering a variety of color and Petite Yellow Marigolds serving as a border

planting.
The beds in the inner perimeter of the garden include many interesting varieties of annuals such as salvia, perunias, carnations, asters, marigolds, and portulaca.

The outer beds include cleome, gloriosa, daisies, celosia, cosmos, and vinca.

The arrangements were all selected on the basis of their adaptability, beauty, size, color, and length of blooming period which will offer a wide range of tints and hues throughout the summer and early fall months.

The Henry S. Charfield Memorial Garden is a formal Garden designed as a living memorial-to-Henry-S. Chatfield, one of the original park commissioners and the first president of the commission from 1921 to 1927.

The memorial garden was dedicated on May 1, 1938. The garden provides for diagonally massed plantings in twenty geometrically arranged beds radiating from the center. The design forms an overall octagonal shape and is bounded by a dense deep green taxus hedge providing an appro-priate background for the display of annuals.





## Dr. Smith named to head County Anti-Poverty unit

has, assumed the post of executive director of the Union County Anti-Poverty Council, succeeding James Wilson, who will go to the Winston-Salem North Carolina Community Action Program. The UCAPC Board of Directors made the appointment on July 26 at a general membership meeting.

At the same meeting Karl Seib was chosen to assume the newly created post of assistant director in the areas of program develop-ment and fiscal affairs. Seib currently holds the title of UCAPC's assistant director. His new title is the result of administrative reorganization which will allow for a slightly larger staff under increased federal funds.

Dr. Smith has been affiliated with UCAPC (pro tem) since its inception in May, 1965/ At that time she served as its chairman. More recently Dr. Smith served as vice-chairman of both UCAPC's Board of Directors and its Executive Committee. In addition to this, Dr. Smith has been honored by church, civic and professional organizations for years of service both in and out of Union Township. Dr. Smith has been active in the fields of health, human relations and Negro culture. She was also a member of a citizen's committee which secured the commitment of the Union Township officials for the establishment of a "Multi-Service Center" in Vauxhall.

At the meeting Dr. Smith stated that she would give top priority to increasing the participation of the "hard core poverty population" in the agency's policy determination and activities. Health centers and treatment for drug addicts and alcoholics were also cited-by-Dr. Smith as matters for the agency's immediate concern.

### Rinaldo wants state to give aid to cities for police salaries

Republican State Senatorial candidate Mat-thew J. Rinaldo has called for state subsidiz-ation of local police salaries. Speaking to a Young Republican group in Union, last night Rinaldo said the patently poor results of recruitment efforts in this state underscore the need for higher police salaries. It is obvious that police salaries are not competitive with those available in private industry for high school or college graduates. If our communities are to attract skilled, intelligent and able law enforcement officers, there must be a sharp improvement in pay

Rinaldo, whose GOP running mates are Assemblyman Frank X, McDermott and former Elizabeth Mayon Nicholas S. LaCorte, noted that local communities have been "squeezec dry by ever rising property taxes. Most of them can't afford to pay much more in the form of salaries. If higher pay for policemen comes about, the state must help foot the bill. Certainly, some part of the unexpectedly high \$208,000,000 return from the state sales tax during its first year of operation could be applied to this subsidization."

"In one Union County community," he continued, "only 10 men took a recent Civil Service test for police positions. Unfortunately, only one man passed. This is proof that the men of the calibre we should be seeking are not thinking in terms of law enforce-

ment as a carrer.
The unfortunate events of the past few weeks have dramatized the importance of our local police," he went on. "We now must realize even if we have never done so before that the local policeman truly risks his life to maintain law and order.'

"Therefore," Rinaldo concluded, "the pol-iceman must be adequately compensated for his life-saving work. If the state must subsidize his salary—and it appears that it must —I favor such financial support."



### Paint job for room not difficult work --if done right way

By CAROLYN F. YUKNUS SENIOR COUNTY HOME ECONOMIST

Painting a room can be either a man's or woman's job today especially with new paints on the market.

A new paint job is not hard physical work

if you go about it in the right way.
Water base paints have good hiding qualities and dry quickly, but if a second coat of paint is necessary, it can be applied within a few

There are several types of water-base paints. Perhaps the most common are called latex or vinyl. Others are poly-vinyl acetate, acrylic, and a combination vinyl and acrylic

Most water-base paints provice a "flat" finish and are most suitable for the walls in living, sleeping and dining areas. And if good quality paint is used, it will hold up reasonably well and withstand occasional washing,

The poly-vinyl acetate or acrylic water-base paints are likely to be more expensive than the ordinary latex paint. However, they offer greater advantages of durability and resistance to staining and fading.

Alkyd paints are generally oil-solvent base paints. They provide a glossier surface that will withstand scrubbing and hard wear better than water-base paints. Alkyd paints are particularly usable in kitchens and bathrooms.

In most instances it takes more time to prepare for painting than it does for actual painting. Remove small items from the room and protect the furniture and floors with

coverings.

If woodwork is to be painted, it will take less time if the hardware is removed rather

than paint around it and clean it later. Dusting the walls and woodwork may be all that is necessary if the paint is in good condition. If the paint is peeling or chipped,

the old surface should be sanded. If walls are particularly dirty or greasy, such as in a kitchen, then the surfaces will need to be washed with water and household

Holes and cracks should be filled with a ready-mixed vinyl spackling compound for a smoother surface.




