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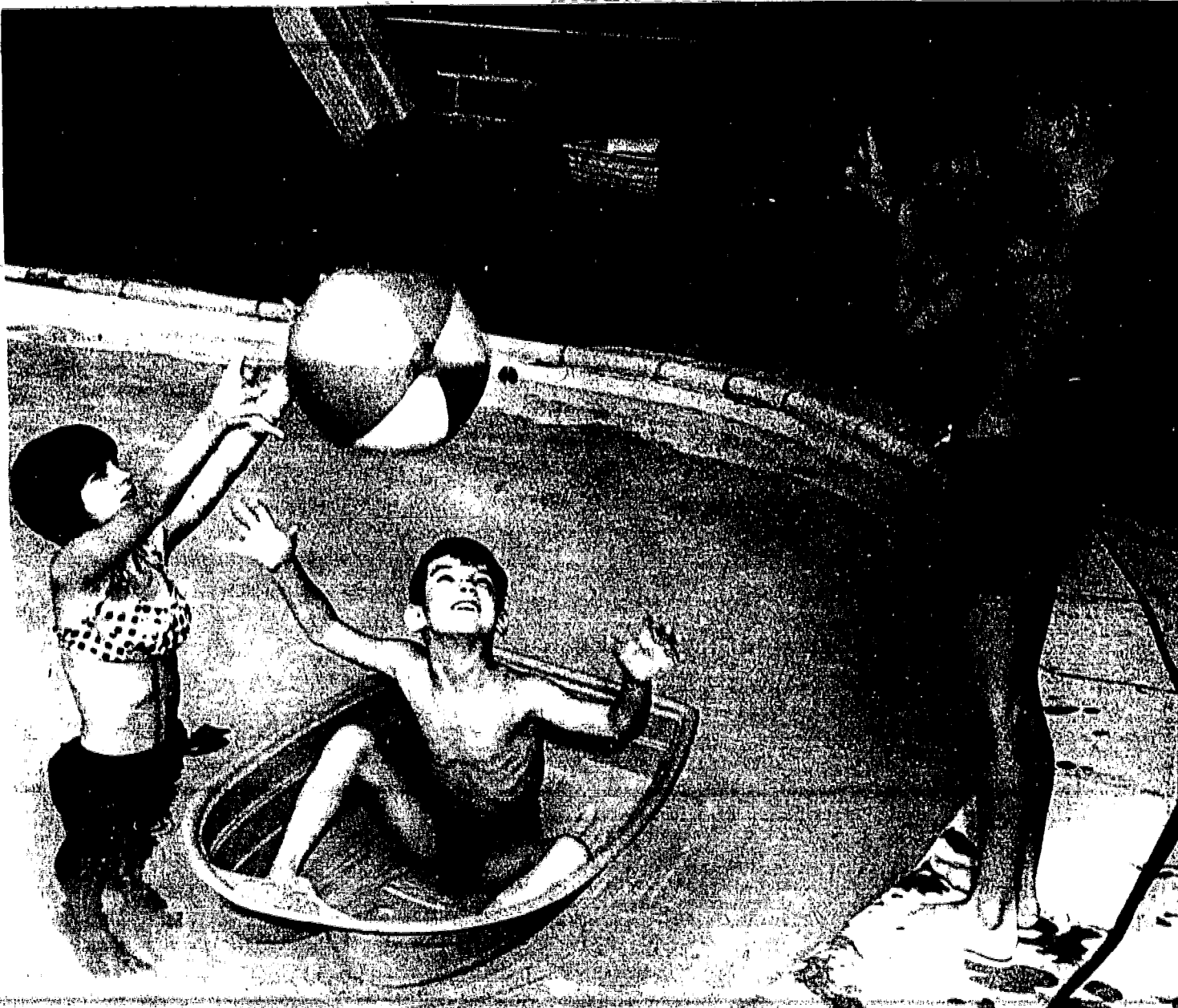

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## Republican borough candidates unopposed in primary

### 'I think I'll come back here every year'

#### Fresh Air youngster happy in Mountainside

Frankie Hopkins, a seven-year-old Brooklyn boy, came into the home of the Thomas Sanders family of 1090 Sunny Slope dr., Mountainside, a few weeks ago and made a quick decision.

After a quick 10-minute look around the house and the yard (which holds a built-in pool), Frankie announced cheerfully:

"I think I'll come back here every year!" The Sanders family, including Wendy, 12, and Gregg, 8, think that's a great idea too. They're looking forward to sharing next summer with the sunny-faced young Brooklynite.

"He's a darling advertisement for the Fresh Air Fund," Mrs. Sanders said recently, shortly before putting a well-kissed Frankie on the bus for Brooklyn.

It's also a pretty good advertisement for the Sanders' hospitality. On his first foray outside Brooklyn last summer, under the Fresh Air Fund program, Frankie stayed only two days — "I was lonesome and I was scared," he explained.

Frankie wasn't "lonesome and scared" at the Sanders. He hardly missed his parents or his two older brothers with whom he shares

a four room apartment located near the Williamsburg Bridge.

MRS. SANDERS has a theory on why her young guest felt that way.

"Basically his background is very much like ours. He is typical of the many deserving children enrolled in the Fresh Air Fund for other than economic reasons. His family is not destitute—both of his parents work and work hard. Frankie is used to the same kind of love and discipline that our children receive. He fits in beautifully."

Frankie arrived at the Sanders home on Aug. 15; he left two weeks later. In between, he managed to captivate not only the Sanders but many of their neighbors and friends.

"People came really expecting to find him difficult to cope with, I don't know why, but so many people seem to think that the Fund sends children only with disturbed backgrounds. That's just not true — many of the city parents are just as concerned about their children as any of us suburban parents. Just because they have less material advantages doesn't mean the children are problems—some of the closest families in the world are the poorest."

Mrs. Sanders said, a little heatedly.

THE SANDERS KNOW that their own children benefited from the experience as much as Frankie did. They learned about his background, his life in the city. Frankie talked freely and at length and at times waxed almost poetic describing the Williamsburg Bridge as seen from his family's apartment.

Mrs. Sanders is a long-time advocate of the value of the Fresh Air Fund, both to the guest children and to their hosts. Her interest in the program goes back to her own childhood when her family took children from the Fresh Air Fund, then the Herald Tribune Fresh Air Fund, to their vacation home in Upstate New York each summer.

The Sanders had another Fresh Air guest last year, "a lovely Italian girl," who, like Frankie, was "nice to have around."

Frankie, the Sanders hope, will be around for many more summers. Mrs. Sanders also hopes that her family's happy experience with him will encourage more local families to participate in the Fresh Air Fund program.

"Ghetos work both ways," she says. "It's important that we in a suburban ghetto get to know those from the urban ghetto. What better way can we help to build understanding in the world in which our children will grow up?"

### Borough churches in UNICEF drive

Three Mountainside churches are participating in the 1967 UNICEF fund raising campaign. The Community Presbyterian Church, Our Lady of Lourdes and Union Chapel are joining forces with other Westfield area churches and synagogues in the drive.

Mrs. Fred E. Christian, wife of the senior minister of the Westfield Presbyterian Church, will be the guest speaker at the kick-off meeting of the campaign at the Willow Grove Church in Clark next Wednesday at 8 p.m. She has recently traveled through the Orient and Africa and has had the opportunity to witness conditions among the people and their need for UNICEF assistance.

### Local Dems still without slate in race

Will name candidates for November -- Heinze

Mayor Frederick Wilhelms Jr. and his two Republican running mates for Mountainside's governing body are virtually assured of nomination in the primary next Tuesday. However, there was still no indication this week of who their Democratic opposition would be in the general election in November.

Mayor Wilhelms and Councilman Donald M. Robertson, who are seeking reelection, and Louis N. Parent, running for the other council post to be filled this year, are unopposed in the GOP primary.

Democrats have not filed with any candidates for the three borough posts in the primary but Karl Heinze, president of the Mountainside Democratic Club, said this week that the party will name candidates for the November election.

According to the Union County clerk's office, the deadline for filing a vacancy on the ballot is Oct. 4. However, this section of the election law normally applies to vacancies created if a candidate dies or drops out of a race for some other reason.

It also would be possible for the Democrats to nominate candidates by write-in votes next Tuesday. A candidate nominated in this fashion would have to accept by Sept. 19 to have his name placed on the ballot by November, county officials commented.

ON THE REPUBLICAN ticket, Mayor Wilhelms is running for his second full two-year term this year. Appointed chief executive of the borough in the summer of 1964, he was elected for a one-year unexpired term that November and re-elected for a two-year term in 1965.

A former member of the Mountainside Board of Education, he is president of Wilhelms Construction Co. in Elizabeth.

Councilman Robertson, principal of Grove Street School in Irvington, is running for his first full three-year term on the Council. He was appointed to the post in 1966 and won election for an unexpired one-year term last November.

Parent, making his first bid for elective office, is seeking the post now held by Councilman Charles J. Irwin. A purchasing agent for Johnson and Johnson of New Brunswick, he served on the Planning Board in the early 1960s.

Irwin, who is a candidate for assemblyman-at-large, was appointed to the Borough Council in the summer of 1966.

He was elected for a one-year unexpired term last November and had planned to run for reelection to the Council this fall. However, he withdrew his candidacy for the borough post when the Union County GOP screening committee selected him as its candidate for the newly created at-large seat in the Assembly.

Irwin is a partner in the law firm of Abrams and Irwin of Newark.

IN ADDITION to balloting on party candidates for the three borough posts and the at-large Assembly seat, borough voters also

### Benninger resigns post as state committeeman

Albert Benninger has resigned from his post as a Republican state committeeman, according to an announcement made this week by him and GOP County Chairman Loree Collins.

Benninger said he resigned because he has moved from Mountainside to Little Silver. He added, however, that he will continue to operate his real estate and development office in Mountainside.

Collins accepted the resignation "with regret," noting that Benninger "has served the Republican Party faithfully in various capacities, including director of the Board of Freeholders, Republican county chairman and Republican state committeeman."

"With Benninger leaving the political scene," Collins said, "it marks the end of an era. The Republican Party is losing a tireless leader who served faithfully for virtually a lifetime." The GOP county chairman added that "when Benninger was at the peak of his career, the Republicans dominated the political scene in Union County."

Collins reported that the county committee,

made up of some 700 members, will elect a successor for the unexpired term, which runs until the 1969 gubernatorial election, at a county convention at LeFree's Restaurant, Roselle Park, on Sept. 19.

Benninger said he has held "several conversations" regarding a possible successor in the state committeeman post. He said he would have a statement for the county committeemen and women "in due course."

The Adult School also offers a high school equivalency program, a tuition course. It is for adults 18 years of age and over who have not completed high school and would like to earn a high school equivalency certificate. Candidates for this program may register at Columbia High on Tuesday, Sept. 19, 8:00-9:30 p.m. The classes will start Monday, Oct. 2, and will convene on both Monday and Thursday evenings, 7:50-10:00.

## Cancer unit plans grants

The New Jersey Division of the American Cancer Society has pledged financial support of cancer projects sponsored by the School of Dentistry at Fairleigh Dickinson University, the Academy of Medicine of New Jersey and the New Jersey Chapter of the American College of Surgeons.

At a meeting in the Monmouth Hotel, Spring Lake, the division's Professional Education Committee agreed to provide \$400 toward supplemental support of a five-day course on Cancer of the Oral Regions, which will be conducted by Fairleigh Dickinson University next spring in southern New Jersey.

The committee also granted \$1,000 to the Academy of Medicine of New Jersey for four symposia on cancer to be held during the fall and winter.

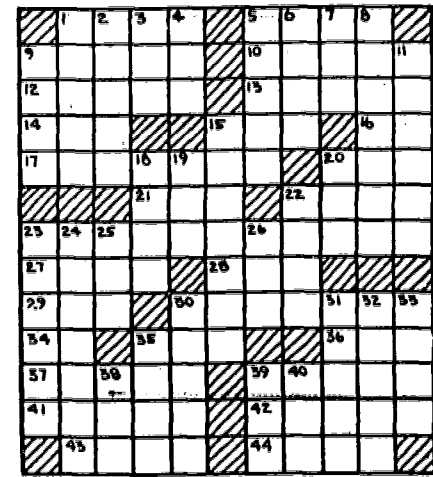

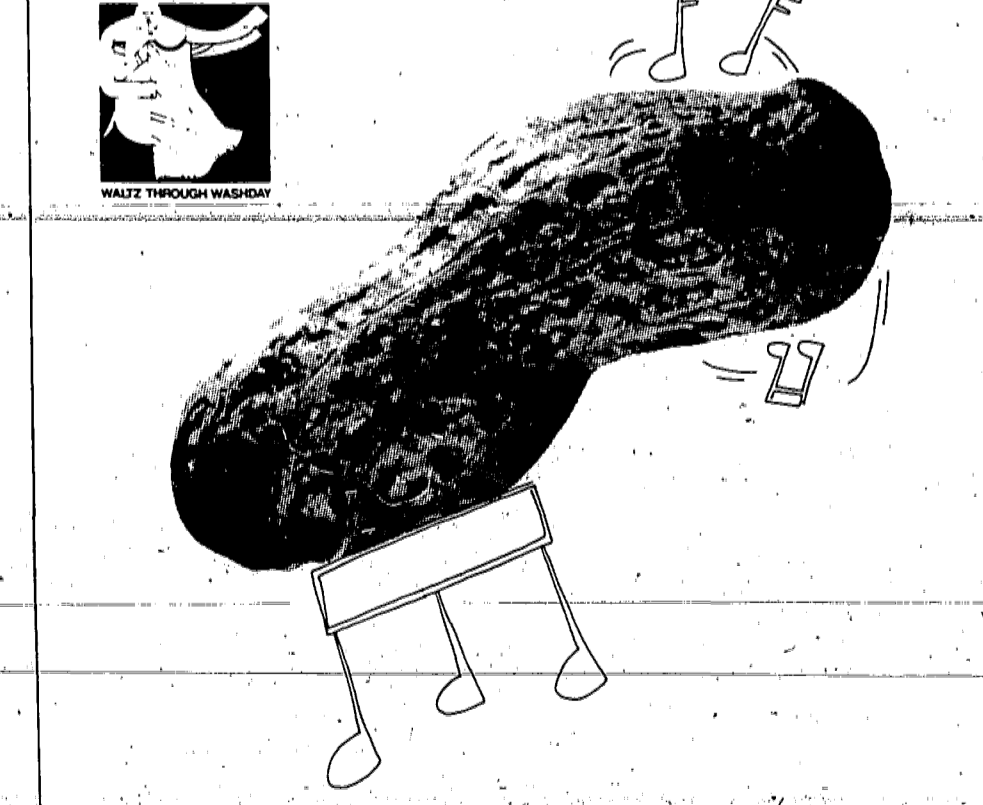

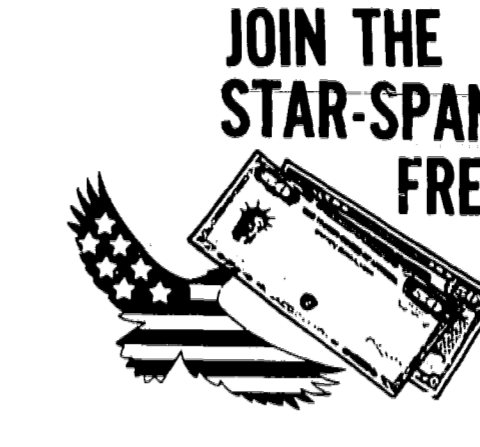
