



Troopers to trade cars for 'copters; training for wings

Fourteen State Troopers will trade their patrol cars for helicopters, according to Colonel D.B. Kelley, superintendent of the New Jersey State Police.

The troopers will be trained as pilots for the new rotary air wing of the state agency. They will begin their flight training Monday at Ronson Helicopters Inc., Trenton.

Col. Kelley said four helicopters will be

purchased. The rotary wing will make New Jersey the first state in the nation to establish a regular statewide aerial traffic safety patrol.

Three of the new helicopters have maximum carrying capacities of three persons, and will normally be flown with a pilot and observer. The fourth helicopter is a high-speed jet with five-place capacity which can be converted to accomodate two inside litters with sufficient room for a doctor and medical supplies. The helicopter, a Fairchild FH 1100, has a cruising speed of 140 mph and will be able to reach any portion of the state from its base at Trenton within 30

All four machines will be equipped with dual controls, police radio, camera mounts, floodlights, loudspeakers, sirens and litters. They will be capable of landing on any type of terraine, including rivers, lakes, swamps

The newly-formed Helicopter Patrol Bureau. said Col. Kelly, is designed to improve efficiency, availability and overall capability of police patrols in traffic safety and other related law enforcement functions.

The Senator praised the New Jersey legislature for passing the resolution which will

put the question on the ballot. 'The resolution received strong bipartisan support and it received the strongest support of Governor Richard J. Hughes," the New Jersey lawmaker said, "I hope the voters will give the referendum question equal sup-

For too long, we have clung to the sanctity of the arbitrary 21-year-old voting stanhard," he said, "We sometimes forget that in

times past, persons under 21 years of age were considered as adults and treated that way. Many of the persons who founded our nation, fought the American Revolution, and opene the West were not yet 21 years old,

"We currently are witnessing deplorable violence on our college campuses. However, part of the problem may be that participation in the national decision-making process is denied those most vitally affected. That denial

has built-up frustrations."
Senator Williams long has supported the lower voting standard. He currently is a co-sponsor of a U.S. Senate Joint Resolution that would initiate the process of Constitutional amendment to provide national sufferage for 18-year-olds,

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

Rest, picnic areas on Parkway open for travel season

All nine Garden State Parkway rest and picnic areas are now open for the 1969 travel season, with an additional such site under construction to serve motoring families by this

Chairman Sylvester C. Smith Jr. of the New Jersey Highway Authority said the Parkway's four seasonally-functioning picnic areas have been reopened for the spring-summer period with full drinking water and sanitary facilities to join the other five in public use,
At the same time, work is proceeding on the

newest picnic site in the Parkway's Telegraph Hill Park off Exit 116 where such other existing facilities scattered across both sides of the toll road have drawn heavy usage.

The new picnic area with adjoining parking

spaces is being built in the northeast quadrant of the picturesque Park along the Parkway, and will premit pre-show use by patrons planning to attend the evening performances at the Garden State Arts Center nearby there.

The heavily increased use of Parkway picnic areas last summer prompted the authority to assign special personnel there on weekends to assure cleanliness, Such practice is expected to be repeated this summer.

Of the nine Parkway areas, three are limited service units in the Union-Middlesex Counties section maintained by the State Department of Transportation. The other six have full facili-ties provided by the authority. The picnic sites are at Parkway Mileposts

(which start with 0 at Cape May in the south and denote the mileage from there) 23; 61; 71; 87 northbound only; 95 southbound only; 116; 131, sb only; 135; nb only; and 139, sb only.

First of all, what does the word creative mean? For purposes of this discussion we can say that creativity is the special way each person sees, learns and thinks about things. It involves expressing new ideas, feelings and experiences, it is the ability to find pleasure

and satisfaction in all parts of living. You're never too old to learn how to become more creative, Homemakers, teachers, lawyers, salesmen, plumbers and bricklayers as well as school children and preschoolers have

the potentials for being creative. To be creative is learning to express one's uniqueness. It is the ability to be oneself. From the following description perhaps you will be able to select some ways in which you can develop your own and your children's sense of creativity.

What are creative people like? Researchers have found certain characteristics common in creative persons.

Creative people are alert and see many

things in their environment. They use all of their senses in a learning experience-seeing, hearing, tasting, touching and smelling, when possible. The toddlers or young children attempting to explore the world about them are an example of this. They constantly poke, punch or taste things to find out about them.

Creative people like to explore new ideas. They tend to be original in their way of thinking about things. They have unusual ways of saying things. Creative children sometimes make up "new" words to express ideas or feelings. Creative people are often dreamers and they like to imagine and pretend.

Creative people follow through on their ideas.

They like to try out ideas and to experiment with them. Often they are builders and use materials in some of their experiments.

Creative people have confidence in themselves. They believe in themselves and their capabilities. They are independent and do things on their own. They are usually willing to try a variety of approaches in solving a problem and they don't give up easily.

Revolutionary soldiers' graves to be dedicated

The graves of three Revolutionary War can Revolution and former mayor of the Town soldiers and that of the mother of two of the soldiers will be dedicated by the Westfield chapters of the Daughters of the American Revolution and the Sons of the American Revolution, with the cooperation of the Union County Park Commission, on Saturday at

The cemetery is located in the "Deserted Village" area of the Watchung Reservation and contains the graves of Phebe Badgley Willcocks, her sons John and William, and her nephew Joseph Badgley.

The dedication program will include the raising of the colors; a talk by H. Emerson Thomas, a member of the Sons of the Ameri-

of Westfield: the firing of a volley over the cemetery by two companies of the Blues," the first company being members of the SAR; and the second company made up students from Rutgers ROTC program.

Others participating in the dedication pro-gram will include the Rev. George L. Hunt of Fanwood, who will give the invocation; Mrs. Ralph A. Hall, Westfield, past regent of the Westfield Chapter DAR: Clarence Troxell, Westfield, president of the Westfield Chapter SAR; John Ludlow of Westfield; Union County Park Commissioner Francis R. Farley, New Providence; and Edwin A. Baldwin of Summit. The four grave markers have been made

The Willcocks family, the first to live in the area of the "Deserted Village," estab-lished a burying ground of its own at the site, as was the custom of early New Jersey families living in outlying areas. A local historian, Willis Fletcher Johnson of New Providence, wrote in 1882 that the Willcocks' graveyard, which once contained more than dozen graves and had been surrounded by a picket fence, had become a wild unenclosed part of the woods and that its sole remaining headstone was that of John Willcocks, son of the original settler. Peter Willcocks.

Union County Clerk Walter G. Halpin, Fanwood, donated an aluminum flagpole with an appropriate thirteen-starred flag to the park

commission which was erected at the cometer;
