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

MCP waters down opposition, breaks records, nears crown

The Mountainside Community Pool A Swim Team stormed past Willow Grove with a 186-111 victory last Saturday at MCP. While increasing the team's record to 4-0, MCP also assured itself of at least a tie for the Westfield Outdoor Swim League title. A victory next week against Highland will give MCP the championship outright.

The MCP team also established six team records during the meet. Paul Healy lowered the previous marks in both the 50 meter backstroke and butterfly for 15-17-year-old boys. The 8 and under girls 100 ft. backstroke record was broken by Beth Post, lowering the time recorded by her sister, Sarah last season.

Mountaineers ousted in semis; finish season with 10-2 record

By PAUL REITER The Mountaineers-Mountainside's All-Star baseball team-finished their season this week, winning two important games before losing in the semifinals.

M.J. Costello, who has starred at shortstop this year, doubled over the left fielder's head. Rick Van Benschoten singled and Pat Esemplare walked but were stranded when Berkeley Heights retired the next three nen. Berkeley Heights rallied in the fifth for three runs. In the last inning, a running catch by outfielder Kirk Yoggy, a foul catch by Andrew Grett and a backhand snag of a grounder by M.J. Costello ended the game. Mountainside beat its next opponent. New Providence, 11-4. The losing team was not in contention for the lead but was still a formidable competitor. Henry Largey started the game with a single, and stole third before scoring on a sacrifice by Kirk Yoggy. New Providence quickly tied the score but with two men on, M.J. Costello picked up a hard grounder and threw it to third for the second out and a fly to Gary Kane ended the inning.

run. Two more runs came in, making the final score 11-4.

These two victories moved the Mountaineers into the semifinals, the farthest any Mountainside team has ever gone in this competition. Berkeley won the Springfield, 9-6. Berkeley Heights scored two runs in the 1st inning but the Mountaineers' Peter Klaskin smashed a two-run triple to tie the game. Berkeley Heights pulled ahead in the second when a bases-loaded shot to left field got past the Mountainside fielder and bounced all the way to the fence. By the time the centerfielder got to the ball, it was a grand slam for Berkeley Heights. In the third, with one out and a man on, a bunt attempt was popped up and Stewart Jurczak caught it and threw to first for a double play. Down 9-2 in the fourth inning, with two men on, Gary Kane hit the ball far over the fence (241 feet from home) for a home run (a rare achievement in that particular field), narrowing the margin to 9-5. The Mountaineers got one more run but lost the game, 9-6. The '77 Mountaineers and their coach Chuck Fernicola, achieved a 10-2 record, the best ever by a Mountainside All-Star team. In addition, this team won the championship of the Orange competition.

By DENISE KENNER MARTIN There have been national conferences on health, on drugs and on the aging, but for the first time in November, a federally funded and sponsored conference will be held on women.

More than 1,400 delegates from all 50 states and the U.S. territories will convene in Houston for a four-day conference. Myra Terry-Meisner of Mountainside is one of those delegates.

Terry-Meisner was elected along with 39 other representatives from 3500 women at the New Jersey International Women's Year (IWY) meeting held last month in Princeton. The Mountainside resident was among 20 women on the official IWY slate.

The New Jersey delegation to the National Women's Year Conference in Houston backs three main resolutions. Terry-Meisner said all the delegates strongly support legislation in the areas "of human rights, reproductive freedom and passage of the equal rights amendment (ERA).

High schools get mini-grant

The Union County Regional High School District has been selected as one of 50 school districts in New Jersey to receive a \$1,000 mini-grant from Commissioner of Education Fred G. Burke. The mini-grant will be used to train 30 staff members in the four regional high schools in "mainstreaming" special-education students. Dr. Frank Kenny, director of pupil personnel services, developed the grant application and the training program. Mrs. Anita Williams of Springfield, learning disability teacher consultant at the David Brearley Regional High School, will serve as project coordinator. Mrs. Williams will be working closely with the State Department of Education during 1978-79 as she conducts the program within the regional district.

The Union County Regional High School District serves high school atudents from Berkeley Heights, Clark, Garwood, Kenilworth, Mountainside and Springfield.

Self-described as a feminist, Terry-Meisner said the delegation is not a radical feminist slate. She said it is broad-based including representatives of all ages, religions, races, income levels and regions.

The slate includes women representing labor unions, the National Organization of Woman (NOW), the League of Women Voters, the YWCA, the ACLU and seven members of a Hispanic group.

While at the Princeton conference, Terry-Meisner was part of the program committee that presented 44 workshops on a variety of subjects including rape, problems women have with financial credit, battered women, age discrimination, and rights for homemakers.

--0--0--THE MOUNTAINSIDE feminist helped give a workshop at the state conference on alternate lifestyles. The main body of the conference adopted a resolution coming out of the workshop stating society should accept alternate lifestyles, as it does the nuclear family, if that life is right for the individual involved.

Terry-Meisner is particularly active in fighting for homemakers' rights. She is on a national task force which hopes first to educate women on their rights and then to lobby for national legislation to guarantee those rights.

The task force's main objective is to give some sort of legal status to homemakers. Terry-Meisner suggests this could be in the form of an income tax allowance. But she stressed the education of women is the first step. The group plans to initiate a speaking tour of women's clubs. Terry-Meisner said "when you're speaking of basic rights, more conservative women do not feel threatened," as with more controversial issues.

The self-employed interior decorator has been involved in the feminist movement for a number of years. She is a member of NOW, the Religious Coalition for Abortion Rights and The Right to Choose group.

She said she doesn't believe the majority of women are left out in conferences such as the one in Prince-(Continued on page 4)

Kontra homered in the fifth Esemplare and Largey tripled for one





Visiting aide trained to sub for momor pal

Mom is hospitalized. Dad is trying to visit her and to keep his job. And there's nobody to help with the children and the house-until a telephone call is placed to a small building in Westfield.

This type of home crisis is one of many routinely resolved by the Visiting Homemaker Service of Central Union County, Inc., which has a small headquarters in Westfield and a big list of professionally trained helpers who can be sent to the homes of the agency's clients

The 25-year-old, non-profit agency employs 197 full-time and part-time visiting homemakers, also known as home health aides, who have been trained to assist elderly people, preand post-operative patients, new mothers and others temporarily or chronically in need.

Peggy Meentemeier, director of the agency which serves 17 towns, recently described her unusual job of locally recruiting the homemaker health aides who might be asked to do anything from administering oxygen, to cooking for a patient who is not only on a therapeutic diet but also wants his food Kosher, to caring for an elderly person who speaks only Spanish, French, Italian, German or Greek

A successful aide candidate, Mrs Meentemeir explained, might be a high school dropout or a college graduate, a man or a woman. The consistent requirement, she said, is for the persor to "mature kind, dependable, mentally alert, capable" and "interested in helping people." Ability to speak a foreign language is helpful, she said, and there is a current shortage of Greek-speaking aides.

A would-be aide takes a thorough physical examination and then participates in a 40-hour course given under auspices of the New Jersey State Department of Health. The teaching staff may include psychiatric social

State Department of Health, Subject matter runs the gamut from "Working. With People," some pointers in interpersonal relationships, to "Personal Care," a primer in personal hygiene for clients. Those who pass are certified by the New Jersey State Department of Health. A woman dons a white or lightblue uniform, and a man wears the uniform of the male nurse. The agency's emblem is affixed to the left sleeve or pocket. After 500 hours of service the state association pin is added.

During a three-month probationary period, the new aides work under direct supervision of registered nurses employed by the agency. Even experienced aides have access to 24-hour week-long supervision, explained Judith Wimmers, a spokesman for the agency. She said aides can always use the Visiting Homemaker Service hot

line to telephone about a problem Certified aides are required to take at least six health-related courses a year. and the on-going education also includes a 10-week refresher course after five years of service

Mrs. Meentemeir said that about half of the requests for agency service come, from health-care facilities and social agencies These are handled on a contract basis. The other requests come from private homes. Medicare pays for a specified amount of service while Medicaid pays for an unrestricted portion of the agency's bill

Client fees are the main source of income for this community agency, the director said A sliding scale, based on indidividual need, is used for clients unable to pay full costs. A volunteer Board of Trustees drawn

from Eastern Union County helps run the agency. The elected trustees include Mrs. Peter L. Hughes and Mrs. Frank Pitt from Union and Mrs. Ruth Hurd Minor from Roselle

N Avenue E. Westfield. It is one of the 23 homemaker-home health aide agencies in the state.



NATURAL GAS DECONTROL

In a recent news article, Rep. Matthew J. Rinaldo issued a statement regarding the impact of natural gas price deregulation on the consumer. As the supplier of gas service in most of the area which Cong Rinaldo represents. Elizabethtown Gas Com pany would like to comment on a crucial aspect of this statement

We agree with the release Cong Rinaldo gave to the press stating that the price will go from "\$42.50 per month for 250 therms to \$76.32 " However, the Congressman did not explain the time period over which this price increase will occur. The \$76.52 price would not be reached until 1985. In other words, if all new natural gas came into the market place at the \$2.25-Mcf rate, the customer's bill would rise \$33.82 in eight years, which is less than an 8 percent inflation rate per year

Natural gas in the future will in crease in price along with other forms of energy Hopefully the increases will he at a slower rate than other household expenses congressman Rinaldo's statement regarding price impact should be clarified as to the time period involved

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

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

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Forest classroom at Rutgers Memorial tract is left in natural state

back without seeing the forest," says Richard Frye, a doctoral candidate at Rutgers who is caretaker of the Hutcheson property.

The visitor, a barn builder from Pennsylvania, wanted to see how forests in this area must have appeared to early European settlers. Some of the trees in Hutcheson, a predominantly oak and hickory forest, are nearly 100 feet tall and are thought to be more than 250 years old.

Twenty-six regular Sunday tours are scheduled each year, most during the spring and fall.

A beautiful October Sunday in 1974 when fall colors were at their peak brought out the record number of persons for one tour-150.

"We took them through in four groups," recalls Frye. "We think visitors find small tours more enjoyable because we can answer questions individually.

Groups of more than 10 are asked to contact the Rutgers College Department of Botany to make arrangements for special tours. School groups ranging from third graders to adult school classes have also taken the one-hour walk through the forest and adjacent fields

What do they see?

That varies to some extent with the season and the guide. Leaders have different specialities-botany, forestry, zoology, wildlife management, ornithology

On a recent summer day, when the

The forest shelters a wide variety of mammals, birds and reptiles, including squirrels, rabbits, box turtles, garter snakes and pheasants, but evidences of animal life, such as tracks and missing bark where deer have rubbed the velvet off their antlers, are much easier to find than the creatures themselves, Frye says

The fox population in the forest is high due to the large rabbit population, he reports, and the deer population is fairly high because the forest is close to farm fields planted with corn and soybeans.

Numerous birds have been observed in the woodland, including a nesting pair of great horned owls. "It seems a

forest has to be a certain size before a great horned owl will nest," observes Frye

The pair has come back to the same tree three times. The young are hatched in late winter when it is easiest for the mature owls to find prey to feed their nestlings.

The recorded history of Hutcheson. Forest goes back to 1701 when Mynheer Cornelius VanLiew, a Dutchman,acquired the land.

Successive generations of the same family preserved the forest for more than 250 years. In 1955 the woodland, then known as Mettler's Woods, was purchased from Thomas Mettler by the United Brotherhood of Carpenter's and Joiners

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
