

# Boosters keep pressing, with a smile

The aroused Booster Club of Jonathan Dayton Regional High School gave a friendly welcome to the school's new athletic director last week, but vowed to keep pressure on the Board of Education until Dayton sports facilities are on a par with those of the other three campuses in the Regional District

Charles Berchen, the new athletic director recruited from Lindenhurst. NY, appealed to the crowd of 60 to 'give me a chance'' He met with the

club members. Thursday, after his first eight days on the job, and won heavy applause for a brief speech declaring that "I don't have all the answers" to problems such as finding a football coach. "but I want to work with you, communicate with you, help you and get your help

Dayton Principal Anne Romano told the Boosters she had been so favorably impressed by Berchen's approach to his new job "that introducing him to you is one of the happiest duties of my

Boosters learned that Berchen will have full authority to evaluate head coaches at Davton and will work with the head coaches in rating assistants.

Boosters said they liked Berchen's candid approach and-as member the attention from the Board of Education: at recent meetings

But Zahn said Boosters still feel that Dayton is treated as "the stepchild of the Regional District." He said Dayton sports fans want facilities equivalent to

those at campuses in Berkeley Height Clark and Kenilworth

## denies Chatam appeal Judge

Superior Court Judge Milton Feller denied Tuesday the Chatam Realty Co. permission to build a 21-unit condominium on the corner of Rt. 22 and New Providence road in Mountainside. The decision was the second time the company lost an appeal for permission to begin construction at the site.

A spokeswoman for Judge Feller said the decision was that there is no evidence of a need for moderateincome housing in the borough and evidence had been presented with regard to alleviation of possible flood problems in the area should the condominium be built.

There was no evidence submitted that if the variance were granted, flood conditions would be controlled," said the spokeswoman.

The judge's decision was also based in part on his view that the company did not define moderate income housing.

Mountainside Borough Attorney John Post said he is not surprised with the judge's decision. He insisted that he is pleased despite the fact that a hearing has been set for March on the company's contention that the zoning or dinance prohibiting multi-family dwellings is unconstitutional.

Chatam Realty Co. attorney Franz Skok said he was "taken by surprise' by Judge Feller's denial of the variance, but he was quick to point out that the decision "doesn't end the case We still have to challenge the ordinance itself."

Skok said he is confident that the borough ordinance will be found unconstitutional in its entirety and with regard to the condominium question. "We feel strongly about the con-stitutionality of the ordinance." said Skok. "We think it will be found by the court to be unconstitutional.

The Chatam Realty case has been in and out of court since 1973 when the company applied for a variance to build the condominiums. The Zoning Board of Adjustment denied the request in April 1974, and Chatam then sued the borough to overturn the board's decision

In 1975. State Superior Court Judge Cuddie E. Davidson ruled that the board's denial was arbitrary and sent it back to the Borough Council. The

This year's budget features a \$55,866 increase which is said to be attributable. to salary increases and hikes in insurance payments, employee pensions and social security. Superintendent Levin Hanigan said the budget "breaks no new ground" with regard to educational programs and he has defined it as a "hold the line" document which fullfills the requirements handed down by the state through the "thorough and efficient" mandate but does not provide for any locally initiated improvements

The budget allots \$12,500 for an enrichment coordinator . which responds to the state ruling that affords accelerated or "gifted and talented" students a chance to develop their exceptional skills. ## Police probing basement blast

Mountainside authorities are still investigating an incident involving a local juvenile who reportedly suffered injuries when a bomb he had constructed in his family's home exploded.

Answering a telephone call from the boy's mother following the blast, police said they arrived to find the 16-year-old youth bleeding from the hands and face. They said he told them that he had been making the bomb in the basement of the home to take with him on a Boy Scout trip when it accidently went off. An inspection of a basement workshop and adjoining rooms uncovered extensive damage including torn walls and pieces of pipe lodged in various basement fixtures and materials, according to authorities. They said they also discovered firecrackers, sparklers, bottle rockets and an undetermined amount of marijuana and hashish in the boy's bedroom, which is also located in the basement of the home.

The youth was taken by the Mountainside Rescue Squad to Overlook Hospital, where he was treated and released

Charges against the youth have not been specified pending further investigation.

Knodel said she thinks the budget will be passed by default since there is no contest in school board electors and people will stay away from the polls.

Moran said it is impossible to remove the ice from the branches for lear of breaking them. "Every birch tree is hanging down." he said and "there's no hope for them unless they go upright

## Mountainside to get \$7,359 in federal funds

Checks totalling more than \$2 million are being mailed to communities in Union County this week in a new round of (ederal revenue sharing announced today by Congressman Matthew J Rinaldo Mountainside will receive \$7.359, bringing its total of revenue sharing funds to date to \$162.897

Rinaldo said the payments raise the county total to \$45.6 million since the nception of the program. The current return of federal taxes is for the quarter. extending from Oct. 1 to Dec. 31, 1977. It is the 21st quarterly distribution since the revenue sharing program was established in 1972

Rinaldo said the money goes to county and municipal governments to help pay for services and programs of their own choice. The largest payment in the current distribution provides the Union County Board of Freeholders with \$568.581 It raises the total county government allocation to \$13.2 million other payments include \$354.081 for Elizabeth, \$171.007 for Plainfield and \$144.194 for Union Township

## Frostbite alert; dress warmly, use buddy plan

With cold, blustery weather is ahead for the Garden State, the Overlook Hospital family practice department this week warned that frostbite is a possibility, especially when the wind combines with sub-freezing temperatures

#### A spokesman said:

"Frostbite means that crystals of ice form between the ceels of the skin and other tissue of the nerves, muscle and blood vessels. One of the dangers of frostbite is that you often don't feel it. The first thing you know, someone else notices that your nose or ear is turning white.

According to the New Jersey Academy of Family Physicians, first aid for frostbite starts with rewarming as soon as possible. The old idea of rubbing the affected part with snow is completely invalid, as false as the notion that rapid thawing can be more harmful A hot bath is an excellent start to the rewarming process. Hot, wet towels gently applied and frequently changed are also advised. If no heat is at hand, place the patient in a sleeping bag or cover with coats and blankets

To prevent frostbite, dress warmly and avoid over-exertion and excessive perspiration, as well as contact of bare flesh with cold metal. The buddy system, pairing off with a friend and watching each other for signs of frostbite, is also advised.

# Menza in the running for U.S. Senate seat

Former State Senator Alexander J Menza has taken the first step toward securing the Democratic nomination for the United States Senate seat held by Republican Clifford P. Case Menza, of Hillside, has formed a campaign finance committee and named his successor in the 20th District, State Sen Anthony E. Russo of Union, as one of his campaign cochairmen.

Menza, 45, developed a reputation during his legislative terms as a leader in the fields of health and human ser vices through the bills he introduced and the commissions he headed. He was recently designated one of the state's top 10 legislators by New Jersey Monthly magazine. However, after two years in the Assembly and four in the State Senate, he chose not to run for reelection in 1977 and voiced his

frustration at serving in Trenton. "I was doing a full-time job in a parttime Legislature," he said. "I was devoting full-time energies in a government that is geared to part-time representation. That's frustration."

Among the Menza bills signed into law are those guaranteeing civil rights for the mentally ill and the developmentally disabled, mandating programs of bilingual education. protecting the public from being bilked by fake charities, and permitting persons discharged from a mental health facility as recovered to have their records of committment expunged. He sponsored laws on child abuse, adoption, newspapermen's privileges and the state's right-on-red

Most recently, he headed the state No-Fault Commission, which conducted an extensive examination on New Jersey's no fault automobile insurance plan As a result of his work. Menza is considered an authority on te subject and recently addressed a national seminar on the threshold and unlimited medical aspect of no-fault.

Menza was also chairman of the Joint Legislative Committee on Mental Health, which conducted a two-year investigation of psychiatric institutions and held hearings on abuses it uncovered The work of the committee led to the most damning grand jury presentment ever issued in New Jersey on conditions in a state mental institution. He was selected to testify before the President's Commission on Mental Health and went to Europe to study compulsory commitment laws over there





# Governor signs ban on child pornography

An anti-child pornography bill introduced by Assemblyman Donald T. DiFrancesco (R-Union, Morris) was signed into law last week by Governor Brendan Byrne

The new law prohibits the sexual exploitation of children under 16 in photographs and films, and prohibits the sale or distribution of such material in the state

"We have just taken an important step in putting the 'smut peddlers' out of business in this state," remarked DiFrancesco at the bill-signing ceremony "New Jersey law enforcement officials now have the muscle they need to put an end to this tragic exploitation of our children."

The DiFrancesco-sponsored law provides stiff penalties for anyone, including a parent or guardian, permitting or participating in the

production or distribution of child pornography. Offenders face conviction of a high misdemeanor, which carries a prison term of up to 12 years

"My research for the preparation of this legislation uncovered alarming statistics on the number of children involved in activities revolving around sex for sale," said DiFrancesco

The 22nd District assemblyman addod, "There are over 264 different boy and girl magazines, some using as subjects children as young as three years, being sold in adult bookstores nationwide. It is gratifying that New Jersey officials have played an important role in eliminating this deplorable activity

DiFrancesco's bill A-3370 was passed unanimously by the Assembly in its first fall session, and was later approved overwheln ingly by the State Senate. 11 \_

Increased public support raised the income of the Leukemia Society of America Inc. to \$9,804,070 in 1977, up from the \$9,404,080 recorded the previous year

The gains enabled the national voluntary health agency to continue the expansion of its triple programs of research, patient aid and education, according to the annual report for the fiscal year which closed in June.

The biggest jump in expenditures was for patient services which rose to \$1,926,313 from \$1,740,189 for the same period last year, according to Harvey H Richer, president of the Central New Jersey Chapter. The funds provided financial assistance in meeting the costs of treatment for 4,142 children and adults with leukemia and allied disorders compared with 3.638 in 1976
