Tennis badges placed on sale

The two courts at Deerfield School and the four at Echobrook finally are emerging from the snow and ice cover. Donald Halbsgut has announced he will not seek a second term on the Mountainside Borough Council, while Councilman Thomas Spina said he will run for one of the two council seats to come before the voters in November. Halbsgut, who has served on the council since 1975, said his decision was based on family and business reasons. "I wish I could devote more time to the council," he said, "but my family and business come first." He is Recreation Commissioner and has acted as the council representative to the Rescue Squad and the Shade Tree Commission.

Spina, appointed by Mayor Thomas Ricciardi to fill a vacancy last October, said "my current intentions are to run for the council this year." A former school board member, Spina was appointed civil defense and fire commissioner and is council representative to the borough's water and lights committees.

Halbsgut praised borough officials for their "dedication to doing a job" and said high property values, a lower tax rate than comparable towns and the decision to convert the Echo Brook School into new borough and police department offices point to "a properly run borough.


"I have no problem with this town," he said. "It's been run very, very smartly.

He said leaders in surrounding communities have commended the borough on its decision to convert an unused school to the Municipal Building instead of constructing a new complex. "They've said that perhaps what we did was the right thing," added Halbsgut—"something they should have done."

The councilman chided borough residents for harboring one-sided views of the community and not recognizing the "extra work" done by borough officials.

"The job done by these people goes unnoticed by the average citizen," said. "There are a lot of dedicated people in town.

School board reaction is mixed concerning task force proposals

members this week expressed mixed views on several proposals handed down by a state task force aimed at improving the efficiency of local school districts. The commission, headed by State Sen. Wayne Dumont (R-Warren), called for dropping voter approval on school budgets and eliminating tenure

Local board members said when questioned that they feared a loss of local control in light of the task force recommendations.

"There's an awful lot of pressure pulling against local control right said board member Anthony now.' Mazzucca. "School districts have to be very, very careful.

Members Charles Speth and Patricia

intact, but other members, including board president Scott Schmedel, saw the merit of abolishing a budget referendum:

"Voter approval happens to be an inefficient way of determining how much to spend on local schools." said Schmedel. He said it was unfair for a small number of eligible voters who "allow themselves to be ignorant about nat they re voting on to decide the fate of a school budget. "People have not done a good job of finding out things for themselves." he said. "A high percentage of voters are not taking the responsibility they should in school affairs. Logomachy wins out Board is wordlisted

Three randomly selected contestants from the Union County Regional High School District Board of Education, which prescribes a vocabulary test for every English class, recently got an unexpected dose of their own lexical medicine

Board president Charles E. Vitale Jr. easily passed-as did the other twobut was still sputtering a bit after

taking the surprise quiz. "I was robbed," said Vitale. "I deserved a score of 80, or at least 75 not just 70."

Dr. Marilyn Hart and Roland Hecker also got a score of 70 apiece, or seven out of 10 correct, in defining the list of words: labyrinth, lackluster, lagniappe, lampoon, liaison, licentious, liturgy, logomachy, lucubration and lugubrious.

Happy to 'stay after' School project success

Some elementary students in Mountainside public schools have been kept after school once a week for the past month.

And they've loved every minute of it. Citing a lack of organized activities for students in kindergarten through third grade, more than 40 volunteers put together an enrichment program for the younger students in the district. The program's chairman, Judy Kolton, said, "Children in the upper

grades usually have something they can do after school. But there is very little for the kids in the third grade on down to kindergarten.

"What we were looking for was something they could do that was socially and educationally sound."

The result was a weekly program that enticed more than 200 youngsters to stay in school after class. The volunteers, mostly parents,

people from the community and older students, offered a four-week program with instruction in science, French, Spanish, dance, string art, macrame, sewing and model building.

"We wanted this program to be more than just a baby-sitting service," Mrs. Kolton added. "We wanted to try to teach them a skill.

"The average class size was 12 students, and we had at least one instructor and one aide in every classroom.

The volunteers hope to expand the program to five weeks next year and add some new courses.

"This is an all-volunteer program," Mrs. Kolton explained. "So it will all depend on who wants to do what."

Barbara Hollister, who served as the program's co-chairman, will be the chairman of next year's enrichment program.

Julia Latzer, a teacher of advancedplacement English at Jonathan Dayton Regional High School, said the board members all performed about as well as the highest scorer on a comparable test administered to her students.

The students take a pre-test-just to judge themselves, not for creditbefore they begin the prescribed unit of vocabulary study. (They can later compare their pre-test scores with their graded performance after studying.) The pre-test includes 50 words selected from 300 in the vocabulary booklet used by advanced-placement students. This newspaper chose the 10-word "L" list from the same booklet as a test for board members.

"The highest anybody got was 38 of 50 (or 76 percent)," said Mrs. Latzer about the most recent pre-test she administered to students. "The median was between 21 and 22 (about 43 percent). If the board members got 70 percent, I'd say they did very well." -0-0-

A REPORTER from this paper asked Vitale, a retired construction con-tractor, to lead the board "team" because he is president. Selection of his teammates-Dr. Hart, an associate professor at Kean College, and Hecker, an engineer-was based on their being slower than the other six board members to escape during intermission of a regular meeting. A few of the escapees returned to kibitz.

"Why, everybody knows the meaning of 'lagniappe' and 'lucubration' - or however you pronounce them. I'd tell you, but that would be cheating," joked board member Stephen Marcinak while Vitale was taking the test.

Webster's defines "lagniappe" as "a small gift given a customer by a merchant at the time of purchase; broadly: something given or obtained gratuitously or by way of good measure." The same dictionary describes "lucubration" as "laborious study" or "studied or pretentious expression in speech or writing.'

All three board contestants missed those two---and predicted that nobody else in the room could define either word without looking in a dictionary Charles Bauman, assistant superintendent of the school district, took up the challenge on "lucubration." He whispered a correct definition to the tester, including an explanation that the word was derived from a Latin word meaning "to work by lamplight. The third word to stump the board members was "logomachy." It was also the word on which Vitale felt

himself "robbed" in the scoring. "It has something to do with words talking about words and using words.' said Vitale. ''I know I could choose the right definition if this were a multiplechoice quiz.'

SINCE THE school budget is the only area where the public has a direct say in how its money is spent, Hanigan said, school boards unfairly "take the full brunt of people's dissatisfaction with taxes." But Mazzucca noted that "as long as the budget is prepared by elected officials, the public still has control by whom they elect.

Most board members seemed wary on possible consolidation of the Mountainside school district with a community, but neighboring acknowledged that a declining school enrollment and state pressure may give the borough no alternative.

"I'm not sure there's anything you can do about it," said member Margaret Reilly. Member Linda Espemplare said she "would hate to see Mountainside lose its public school system at any time," but board vice president Arthur Williams admitted, "It may be the direction we're going if we're not in control ourselves.

Although state officials have said consolidation will save money. superintendent Hanigan said he wasn't convinced.

"I'm not opposed to consolidation per se," he said, "but as far as thinking it's going to save money, the state is just whistling Dixie.

Although Hanigan noted that a larger school district allows for greater school program diversity, he said "transportation costs skyrocket" and the savings are lost. And he disagreed with president Schmedel on the possible possibility of a decrease in administrative costs

The rules also included: "Any board member who correctly defines all 10 words will be disqualified for cheating," and "any cowardly contestant may request, and will be granted, anonymity by the newspaper.

None requested anonymity, and there was no opportunity to cheat. The three took the quiz one at a time, with the tester watching.

After passing the test, Vitale was secretly asked to administer a vocabulary quiz the following week to the six escapees. The newspaper tester thought Vitale could take the six by surprise

'They were surprised, all right,'' he later reported. "They just rebelled and wouldn't take it. Vitale said he doesn't know how well

the six could have performed on the vocabulary quiz, but he gave them "F" on following orders.

"Guess they were afraid they could never match my 80 percent," said Vitale, smiling.

"Only 70 percent," replied the newspaper tester. "We're not even giving you partial credit for 'logomachy.' Sort of a penalty for letting the others escape.

Newsroom workers also took the quiz and were generally confounded by the same three words that stumped school board members. Only editor Abner Gold and cleaning contractor Herb Murray could define even one of the three stumpers, "lagniappe."





The Dumont report also called for an end to administrative tenure, and while some board members agreed with the task force recommendation, others noted that eliminating the process is easier said than done.

"On paper it may sound fine," said Reilly, "but when you have to deal with people with contracts that's another story.

Schmedel and Speth stated the concept of tenure for teachers and administrators hurts the school system. Schmedel noted that job security contract clauses make tenure unnecessary.

"Tenure should be out for everybody," said Speth. "It breeds contempt. If there's a chance you might lose your job, you work harder at it.'

The superintendent disagreed, saving it would be "impossible to control employees without your tenure. They wouldn't worry about you because they know you might be gone in a couple of years.

A task force recommendation to eliminate the position of board secretary and give his responsibilities to the superintendent was labeled "ridiculous" by Knodel.

"A superintendent's time would be better spent in the classroom observing the teachers under his jurisdiction, she said. "He should not be expected to be well-versed in administrative and business matters."

Thousands of children are poisoned by hazardous household substances every year according to the Union County Office of Consumer Affairs Medicines, furniture polishes, lighter fluid and turpentine are some of the potentially dangerous products commonly found in the home, the office said. The packaging is attractive brightly colored and perhaps looks like

An 8year-old drank a bottle of liniment and a 1-year-old girl spent nine days in the hospital after swallowing charcoal lighter fluid from a can left in the yard after a family picnic.

Ellen Bloom, Consumer Affairs Director, has released these facts provided by the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission and suggests a few steps to help poison-proof the home:

No matter how attractive a hazardous product may be, children usually can't be poisoned by something they can't get their hands on Therefore, one key to poison prevention in the home is to keep all medicines and other hazardous products locked up when not in use

 Don't depend on close supervision. It's impossible to watch a child every minute and children can move very quickly

Always read the warning labels on hazardous products. These labels will tell you the seriousness of the danger and list all hazardous ingredients. If your child is accidentally poisoned, the first thing a doctor needs to know is the identity of the poison. The label will also tell you what immediate first aid vou can give

-Keep all hazardous products in their original containers. Never store them in cups, soda bottles, or other containers that would normally contain food or drink.

~Avoid taking medicines in a child's presence. Children imitate adults. particularly their parents.

-Call any medicine by its proper name. Never suggest that medicine is 'candy.

---When giving medicine to children. give them the proper dosage. Don't think that because a little medicine gives relief, more would do an even better job

-Promptly dispose of prescription drugs by flushing them down the toilet once the illness for which they were prescribed is cured.

-Do not store any other hazardous products with medicines that are taken internally. There are many look-alike containers on the market. You or your child could make a tragic mistake.

Grant to boost trooper patrols at key locations

A \$500,000 grant from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration has made it possible to increase State Police patrol strength at high-accidentfrequency locations throughout the state, according to Col. Clinton L. Pagano.

The supplemental patrol program will use troopers in their normal offduty hours teams of not less than five to supplement existing patrols in an effort to reduce the number and severity of motor vehicle accidents in New Jersey.

"We will concentrate our efforts on the state and interstate highways in our traditional areas of responsibility. While New Jersey continues to have the lowest fatality record among the 50 states, last year's increase of 52 highway deaths is an unacceptable trend which we intend to work to reverse in 1978," Pagano said.

Teams of volunteers from the entire state police patrol force, including shift supervisors, will devote full attention to saturation enforcement patrol in identified high accident areas.

Pagano stressed that "public awareness is an important element of the program which is geared to the single mission of accident reduction. We expect long-range statistics to confirm our faith in this new concept.

Flood damage rule amended after hearings

The Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) has adopted state floodway regulations to allow rebuilding of flood-damaged dwellings that are more than 50 percent destroyed providing they don't increase the flood hazard. The revised regulations require floodproofing of these buildings.

Environmental Protection Commissioner Rocco D. Ricci said the revision resulted from recorp mendations from citizens, concerned groups and the Water Policy and Supply Council during meetings and public hearings held by DEP. Ricci noted that the regulations apply

only to a state delineated floodway which now cover about 650 miles primarily in the Raritan and Delaware River basins. Approximately 1,500 additional miles will be included within the next two years. The majority of the flood plain mapping will be in northern New Jersey river basins, particularly the Passaic River basin, the state's most hazardous waterway

Homeowners whose dwellings are more than 50 percent destroyed by flooding will be required to submit reconstruction plans to DEP to see that reconstruction does not increase the flood hazard and to ensure adequate floodproofing.

Structures that are destroyed by 50 percent or less may be rebuilt if they are adequately floodproofed and if they don't increase the flood damage potential. DEP permit requirements for flood-damaged structures will be satisfied if the municipality adopts and enforces a flood plain ordinance in keeping with the federal flood insurance program.

Structures that are damaged by any means other than flooding may be restored provided that the flood damage potential is not increased. DEP recommends floodproofing of these structures.

Average straight time earnings of private sector office clerical and electronic data processing workers employed in the New York metropolitan area rose 5.8 percent between May 1976 and May 1977, it was reported by Herbert Bienstock regional commissioner of the U.S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics.

In an analysis of findings from the latest BLS survey of some 700 business establishments in the area. Bienstock noted that the increase in average earnings of area white collar workers was almost entirely offset by a 3-5 percent rise in New York-Northeastern New Jersev area consumer prices

In the previous year, earnings gains were also largely eroded by inflation Increases of 63 percent for office clurical workers and 6.8 percent for computer related occupations were offset hv a 65-percent rise in consumer prices


