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Shapiro, Johnson picked borough's new principals

More than 100 people jammed into the Deerfield cafeteria Tuesday night to hear decisions by the Mountainside Board of Education concerning the hiring of two new principals, an increase in hours for librarians, the adoption of a new 1979-80 school calendar and the appointment of members of an ad hoc committee to study the uses for facilities vacated through declining enrollment.

James A. Johnson Jr., a fourth grade teacher in Mountainside for nine years,

and Allan J. Shapiro, vice-principal of Deerfield School for the past 10 years, were named the Beechwood and Deerfield principals, respectively. Shapiro and Johnson, unanimously chosen from a field of in-system candidates, will have to negotiate their contracts for the coming school year. Dr. Levin Hanigan, superintendent of schools said the job now held by Shapiro will remain unfilled.

Board members Pat Knodel and Charles Speth objected in a 5-2 vote that approved the adoption of a school calendar nearly indentical to that of the regional high school-Jonathan Dayton-that most Mountainside students attend. The only differences come on the first day of school when Mountainside has an early dismissal and on the last day of school, which for Dayton falls on Friday June 20 and for Mountainside on Monday June 23.

Action by last year's board adopting a calendar allowing for all legal state holidays, but eliminating the midwinter vacation.drew criticism from parents and teachers. Board members said many requests were made asking the board to adopt a schedule that matched the regional high school's

The 1978-79 school board had reasoned that the original calendar should be used primarily because many teachers took an unscheduled legal holiday on Martin Luther King Day which disrupted the school day during an intense period of teacher contract negotiations, and the only way to prevent this from happening again was


A memorial Mass was celebrated May 31 in Manchester, N.H., for Raymond F. Mueck, 52, a former resident of Union and Springfield.
