



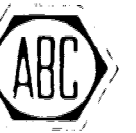

## Variety of activities offered this summer

The Mountainside Recreation Commission is sponsoring a variety of activities this summer for adults and children. Summer Playground, youth tennis lessons, youth tennis team, a paddle ball clinic for adults and children, and a theater arts workshop are on the calendar.

The playground, for children who will be entering first grade or higher in the fall, will be open weekdays from 9 a.m. to noon and 1 to 4 p.m. at the Echobrook field from June 25 to Aug. 17. Arts and crafts, four-square, nok-hockey games, special events and other activities are planned. Bill Krihak is returning for his sixth season as supervisor; Kathy King will be assisting again. Kim Yogy will be in charge of arts and crafts. There is no

registration fee but participants must be registered by a parent with the playground staff during playground hours.

Four sessions of tennis lessons are scheduled for beginners, advanced beginners and intermediates. The registration fee is \$12 per session per person. Children 10 to 16 are eligible. Children who will be 10 during the summer or in the fall also may participate. Class times are available at the Recreation Office.

The youth tennis team, for boys and girls 10 to 16 who are advanced or intermediate players, under the direction of coach Nancy Harter, will play matches with other towns. Practices and matches are scheduled Tuesday through Friday afternoons at the Echobrook courts. The first practice is set for June 26. Registration fee is \$7.50 per person.

A free paddleball clinic will be held Saturday, June 23, at Deerfield School adjacent to the tennis courts at 10:30 a.m. Mel Jonap will explain how the game is played and will give a demonstration. There is no registration fee but those interested in attending should register with the Recreation Office at 232-0015.

The theater arts workshop, from July 16 to Aug. 9, is open to children who will be entering the sixth grade or above in the fall. Linda Dietz will supervise the workshop, which will include writing, technical aspects of production and the performing arts. Fee is \$7.50, early registration has been suggested. For additional information, readers may call 232-0015.

More than 100 people jammed into the Deerfield cafeteria Tuesday night to hear decisions by the Mountainside Board of Education concerning the hiring of two new principals, an increase in hours for librarians, the adoption of a new 1979-80 school calendar and the appointment of members of an ad hoc committee to study the uses for facilities vacated through declining enrollment.

Shapiro and Johnson, unanimously chosen from a field of in-system candidates, will have to negotiate their contracts for the coming school year. Dr. Levin Hanigan, superintendent of schools said the job now held by Shapiro will remain unfilled.

The only differences come on the first day of school when Mountainside has an early dismissal and on the last day of school, which for Dayton falls on Friday June 20 and for Mountainside on Monday June 23.

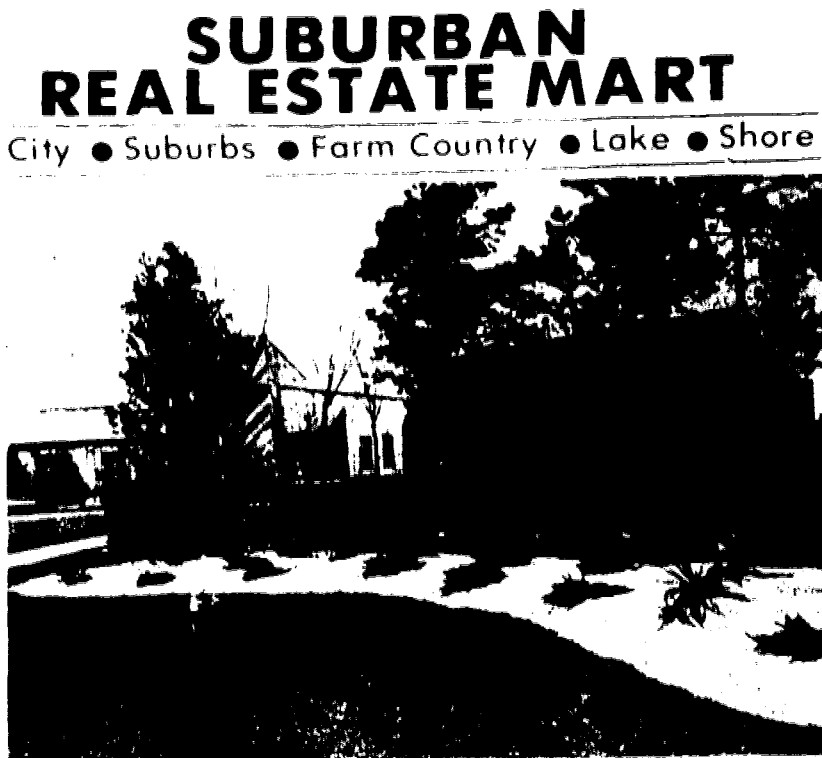

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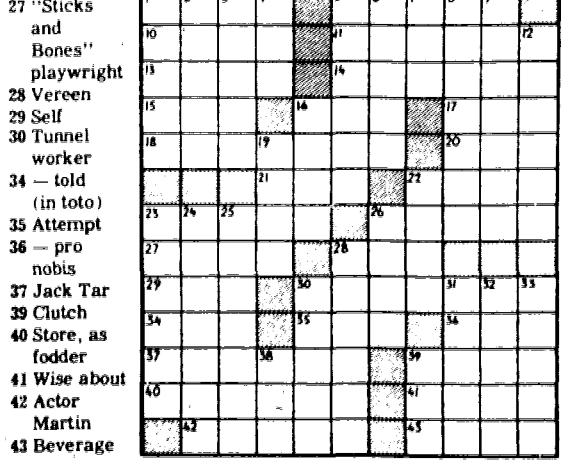

Time, they say, is the true test for any major contemporary music personality. When Natalie Cole burst onto the musical scene and in 1976 won the Grammy for Best New Artist of the year, she quickly dispelled any doubts that she was never primed and ready. It was her time, and since then, Natalie has been getting better...and better...and better.

Musically, "I Love You So" is an amalgamation of Natalie at her best. She has composed three songs on the album, including the rhythm and blues-based "Stand By" (co-written with Marvin Yancy), "Who Will Carry On", and the country-flavored "Your Lonely Heart", which shows a confident Natalie in a surprising musical setting.
