Weiner, of Ridge drive, is the author of a book on stained glass art, "Stained Glass Magic," recently published by Chilton Book Company of Radnor, Pa.

Although some borough residents might feel that recent house thefts signal a rise in area crime, Mountainside Detective Sergeant Jerome Rice does not see any appreciable increase in burglaries

There really hasn't been any particular rise in crime in the area, Rice said, "but this year our investigative methods have been better, and our apprehension rate has exceeded past years."

Rice, commenting on the recent crimes that have plagued the area

According to Rice, most burglaries in the area are avoidable

Most of the houses in this town have inadequate locks, the type that can be forced with a screwdriver," he explained "Any locks on a house should be checked by a locksmith, and preferably replaced or reinforced with

The house site is very important. If bushes cover side or basement windows, trim the bushes back so they won't act as a shield to someone forcing his way in." Rice said.

Whenever a house is entered, the one room that's always hit is the master. bedroom," he continued, "since people always seem to leave their jewlery. there. If a person is going away on vacation, or just for protection. I would advise finding another hiding place

Rice strongly advised against entering a house if there is any sign of a break-in. The first move a possible victim should make, he feels, is to a neighbor's house to contact police.

'The last thing that you want to do is confront the intruder," he stressed. "By going to your neighbor's house, you can not only call police, you can also possibly get valuable information from the neighbor on suspicious cars or persons

Rice urged more residents to use police services, such as information and literature on block associations and the engraving markers available

from the department. 'Often, property recovered is unclaimed or unreturnable because of a lack of identification. If the homeowner engraved his valuable property with his name and his social security number, he would have a much better chance of getting his things back." Rice said.

He observed that the homeowner is often unaware of important facts about his property, such as the names of the companies that issued him credit cards, or the serial numbers of the guns he owns. Rice asked that residents set up ''master files' homes that would contain this

The alert residents of the borough, the support from neighboring police departments, and the help provided by the information in the Mountainside Echo have assisted us in our work, Rice said.



PAMELA BORIGHT Boright names wife to manage Assembly bid

State Assembly candidate Walter E Boright, currently a Union County Democratic freeholder, has named his wife Pamela to manage his campaign for a seat in the State Legislature from District 22, which includes Springfield, Kemilworth and Mountainside. The move was not unexpected since she has headed three previous successful countywide campaigns for him-

In 1965, when both were single and students at Newark State College, now Kean, he made his first bid for county office. Pamela served as his campaign manager and he won by more than 5,000 votes. About a year and a half later, Pamela Zardecki married Boright and they settled in Kenilworth, where he was then a councilman

In 1974, the Democrat was elected to the Union County Board of Freeholders and reelected in 1977 Pamela headed those campaigns; each produced a plurality in excess of 10,000 votes.

The State We're In

The air we're in, here in the state we're in, varies from excellent to doubtful depending on where you are. But wherever you are in New Jersey, you're breathing the stuff of nebulous and complex bureaucratic regulations

and interpretations thereof Not just state regulations, but federal ones too. Right now we're in a transitional stage in which U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) rules are becoming regulations of the state Department of

Environmental Protection (DEP). This exercise in governmental rulemaking will be aired, as it were, at a public hearing starting at 9:30 a.m. Monday at the Rider College Student Activities Center, Rt. 206, Lawrenceville. That's when DEP will explain how and why it's adopting air quality regulations of EPA.

For all practical purposes, the rules are the same, but EPA criteria will become a regulation in New Jersey so that federal laws will be satisfied about this state's adherence to the nationwide air quality program.

At the heart of the bureaucratic exercise is an oft-debated concept which is generally called the emission offset rule. That means that if a manufacturer decides to build a polluting industry in New Jersey, he must show that compensatory reductions in pollution are taking place somewhere else nearby, so that the net overall effect is at least a slight decrease in pollution. Scant

improvement but better than an

This regulation involves only industrial sources of pollution, and pays no heed to vehicular sources, although many of the same kinds of pollutants originate with both industry and autos

The new regulation receiving the public hearing applies in cases where states fail to meet requirements, in which case they are dubbed "Nonattainment areas."

WASHINGTON, D.C.-Rep Matthew J. Rinaldo (R-12) this week announced the appointment of Robert Bladis of Mountainside N.J. as a delegate to the White House Conference on Small Business next January in Washington. Bladis is president of Atlantic Metal Products Inc. of Springfield.

The White House Conference on Small Business was created by the President to evaluate the currect status of the small business community and recommend changes in government policy and regulations to strengthen small business opportunities in the 1980s. The conference is being preceded by business forums in each of the 50 states to seek the views of local businessmen and women.

Automobiles account for the vast bulk of oil used in the United States Giving motoriets at least 50 miles to the getton would cut fuel consumption so drastically that, together with the development of alternate energy sources, the United States could pioneet a new era of freedom tran energy problems

Why look to NASA rather than to the U.S. Department of Energy, the U.S. Department of Transportation of the auto industry for the development of such a car"

The answer is that the kind of fuel saving car America needs is likely to be provided earlier and more cost effectively by NASA than by any other

NASA has proven itself able to make spectacular technological breakthroughs and to set and meet demanding deadlines. In addition it has a wealth of technological information gained in space travel that can be directly applied to new concepts of automotive engineering. The U.S. space agency is currently under utilized and could easily handle the development of

fuel saving car as a priority project In contrast the Departments of Energy and Transportation have emerged as slow-moving and often floundering bureaucracies, bogged down in red tape and bock passing

The autoindustry may well have the ability to come up with a gas saving car. But its record is one in which progress takes place slowly and certainty at too leisurely a pace to assure an early solution to America's nergy problems

The spectacular accomplishments of NASA can be effectively utilized to provide swift down-to-earth fuel saving enefits in auto travel.

It poses a challenge as exciting, stimulating and pioneering as the days of Mercury, Gemini and Apollo, and offers the means of reaping another mavs dividend

Know Your Government

N. J. Taxpayers Association PROPERTY TAX APPEALS

DEADLINE AHEAD A real property taxpayer must file an

appeal with the county board of taxation from the valuation placed on his property by the local assessor for the 1979 tax year by Aug 15, the New Jersey Taxpayers Association reports. Tax bills for the last two quarters of the 1979 calendar year, showing the 1979 assessed value of land and buildings, should now be in the hands of all

Under present law, the county boards of taxation must complete their appeals within three months after the last day for filing (Nov. 15). Assembly bill 1858, passed by the Assembly July 19 and awaiting action by the Senate, would extend the appeal deadline to six months (February) and require all judgments to be in writing.

If a taxpayer is dissatisfied with the judgment of the county tax board, he may seek review of the board's judgment by filing a complaint with the Tax Court within 45 days of the service of the judgment of the county board. The new full-time Tax Court replaced the part-time Division of Tax Appeals on July 1. At the time the taxpayer files the complaint with either the tax board or Tax Court all taxes then due and payable must be paid.

One of several new laws relating to the Tax Court allows a taxpayer who owns property with an assessed valuation subject to appeal in excess of \$750, 000 to apply to the county board of taxation to have the appeal transferred to the Tax Court for initial hearing.

A Small Claims Division within the Tax Court has jurisdiction over any complaints involving controversy of up to \$2,000 in taxes. A taxpayer may appear on his own behalf in the informal hearings before the Small Claims Division or be represented or accompanied bу specified professionals.

Taxpayers, particularly in the 65 municipalities in 15 counties which underwent revaluations reassessments which are effective this year, should review new valuations placed on their properties to determine whether there is basis for appeal.

Under another new law, also effective for the first time in the 1979 tax year, a taxpayer whose property has a ratio of assessed value to true value which exceeds the average ratio of assessed to true value of real property for the entire taxing district, plus or minus 15 percent, or the county percentage level (100 percent) has a basis for appealing his assessment on grounds of discrimination first to the county tax board, then to the state Tax Court,

The sales pitch may revolve around any one of a number of products: Gold, silver, coffee, sugar or various commodities. The deal may be called a futures contract, commodity option, leverage contract, managed futures account or deferred delivery account.

Whatever the deal is and however good it sounds, it is essential for you to ask certain questions and obtain certain information before you part with your money. This is the advice passed on by Adam K Levin, director of the New Jersey Division of Consumer

High pressure sales tactics by fast talking con artists are being used to peddle various commodity futures related get-rich-quick schemes. Levin said. A climate of confusion, uncertainty and apprehension in the current economic situation only aids the operators of such schemes

Levin said that many offers related to commodity future contracts, of course,


