

## 'Just begun,' Lutz declares

All four Democratic candidates in Mountainside may have gone down to defeat at the hands of the ensconced Republicans Tuesday night, but the losers shook each other's hands, patted each other on the back and began to

look forward to next year's campaign. "I'm very proud we had 60 percent (of the voters) turn out," mayoral candidate Stuart Lutz said. "We killed voter apathy. It was really great to see. We're going to have to work even harder next year. We've just begun."

Lutz, dressed in a tuxedo was the last of the candidates to arrive at the Capricorn room of L'Affaire Restaurant, Route 22, where the Democrats gathered election night. He summed up his party's attitude with the

## Voters endorse GOP, blue law, highway debt Mountainside Tuesday night

Borough voters supported every Republican candidate on the ballot local, county and statewide

On the public questions, voters endorsed the transportation bond issue and supported the right for state voters to have initiative and referendum powers. Voters gave a slim edge to Sunday closing, but did not support the higher education facilities construction bond issue.

In local races, incumbent Mayor Tom Ricciardi collected 1750 votes to Democratic challenger Stuart Lutz's 1,097. Ricciardi won in all districts except the 9th, which he lost by one

In the council contests, Dr. Marilyn Hart became the first woman elected to the Borough Council, receiving 1,750 votes, the most of any council candidate. Incumbent Councilman Abe Suckno collected 1,620 Democrats Ray Vaccari and Frances Ehman received 1,202 and 1,126 votes, respectively.

Joan Nemick became the borough's tax collecter, defeating Barbara Byron,

Mountainside voters supported Republican candidates for the Union County Board of Freeholders by roughly two to one Republican Jack Meeker collected the most votes of any mates, Blanche Banasiak and Frank H. Lehr, received 1,672 and 1,761 votes, respectively. On the Democratic slate, Everett C. Lattimore collected 869 votes; Thomas W. Long, 901 votes, and Harold J. Seymour Jr., 870 votes. Independent Rocco J. Gallo garnered 51


In the race to fill the vacancy in 22nd District in the state Senate, Donald Di Francesco managed 1,842 votes to only 856 for Democrat Joanne Rajoppi. Independent Rose Monyek collected 25

Mountainside voters also supported Republican candidates for the state Assembly by a two-to-one margin. Bob Franks and William Maguire each received more than 1,800 votes, while Democrats Patrick J. Cassidy and Walter E. Boright received 847 and 900. respectively. Marie Kisseberth collected 37 votes.

## Police identify missing man's body in swamp

A body found Oct 22 in a swamp off Route 10, Hanover, has been identified as John Kinsella, a 72-year-old Mountainside resident who had been missing since Aug. 29.

A forensic dentist in Jersey City made the positive identification with dental records supplied by the Mountainside police department, according to Detective Sgt. Jerome Rice, who handled the investigation.

Mountainside police received a phone call the day the body was discovered from the Morris County Prosecutor's Office, which matched the body to the description of Kinsella given in a flier issued by Mountainside police.

The body was discovered by a duck hunter in the swamp, which, Rice said, can flood to eight-feet. The corpse was badly decomposed, but the autopsy report showed no signs of violence. Rice

Kinsella was last seen at the Port Authority bus terminal, New York City. Rice said it is possible that Kinsella. who reportedly asked a Somerset Bus Co. driver how to get to Mountainside

from New York, mistook the terminal's ramp 74, which handles buses that service Route 10, Hanover, for ramp 72, which handles the buses to and from Mountainside







Spring finally came; summer too, and car owners are now facing the inevitable again-winter. But the Automotive Information Council says you won't have to face winter car break-downs if you start winterizing

Test your battery's charge level Check the interior water level of the cells, and inspect and clean the battery connections and cables.

Drain and flush the radiator and refill with antifreeze. Have its potency checked. Examine hoses, clamps and fan belts for wear.

Check snow tires for wear before mounting. Buy new ones if necessary Maintain the recommended air pressure and check it often. Underinflated tires get less of a grip on slippery surfaces and also cause accelerated wear

Test and adjust brakes before faulty ones give you trouble on slippery roads. Check brake fluid, adding more if necessary.

Have an engine tune-up and oil change if it is time. Hold the air filter up


to the light and replace it if it's clogged. Check and replace windshield wipers if they are not clearing windows properly. Fill the windshield-washer

reservoirs with anti-freeze solution Spray a shot of dry lucricant onto the door latches and around the rubber rasings to keep them from freezing up

Check the front-end alignment by observing how the car holds its direction Poor alignment can cause steering difficulty on slippery roads, as well as premature tire wear

Check lights, defroster and heater to see if they are working properly. Examine the exhaust system and muffler for possible carbon monoxide leaks
