County Seat Is the ocean the best route for planes?

FAA official challenges Port Authority's study

Eight years ago, Glenn Bales devised a flight plan for the entire eastern seaboard. Now, he regrets it.

"In my 40 years with the FAA, I never looked at what was on the ground when I was making flight paths," Bales said. "I only looked at the airspace."

Bales' plan is the one that most legislators cite when they talk about excessive airplane noise over Union County. And as a consultant for a state citizens group, he says it's time to change that.

"If I broke it," Bales said, "maybe I

Hired by the New Jersey Coalition Against Aircraft Noise, Bales is pushing a plan that would route incoming and departing planes over the water instead of having them fly at low altitudes over land. That scenario has garnered support from the Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders and select lawmakers, who feel the FAA ignores the county's concerns about air traffic noise.

Bales believes that "ocean-routing" is the best way to keep the low-flying... planes from disrupting people.

"Unless you go over the ocean,

you'll affect someone at some time," Bales explained during a hearing in Trenton last week.

However, NJCAAN's plan was dismissed by the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey, whose own consultants found its conclusions unfeasible. They said it would create operational and saftey problems, as well as causing flight delays at Newark International Airport.

The FAA then based its decision not to reroute planes over the ocean based on that Port Authority study.

But NJCAAN maintains that the Port Authority's consultants misrepresented Bales' Oceanic Routing Plan in its analysis, said Pamala Barsam-E own, executive director of the citize is group.

She claimed the authority "has steadfastly stood in the way of scientific accuracy and a truthful record."

Bales told Assemblywoman Maureen Ogden, R-Union, that the Port Authority distorted the routes he proposed, the noise the planes would make, the excess cost and delay consequences of his plan when they determined it would not work. He stressed that there aren't many plans that effectively decrease takeoff and landing noise like his does.

"We never said this is the only way to solve the noise problem," Bales said. "But it is the only one that I know of."

After the meeting, Ogden said she wants the Port Authority's study redone.

"There seems to be an honest disagreement, but there is too much at stake here," Ogden said. "We are talking about people's lives and their enjoyment of their homes. When someone like Glenn Bales says it, you have to listen. I can't think of anyone who has more in-depth knowledge than he does."

She said not correcting the Port Authority's plan would be misleading to citizens.

"That's really what has been unfortunate," Ogden said. "If people believe what the Port Authority said, and it was based on an incorrect model of the plan, then that wrong should be righted. Despite the disputes between these two experts, I feel we can go ferward."

Assemblyman Richard Bagger, R-Union, added he also will ask the Port Authority to re-evaluate its study. "There clearly were assumptions made that possibly were mistaken. It is not a difficult task to make changes

in the assumptions. We owe it to the people."

But William Dunlay of Leigh-Fisher Associates, the Port Authority's consultants, said he had no plans of redoing the authority's study.

"We do have some differences of opinion," Dunlay said. "We acknowledged there are differences. They have their conclusions, and we have ours. But we believe we modeled the plan as they defined it."

NJCAAN members charge that the Port Authority did not communicate with Bales before it formulated its

"All of these 'mistakes' could have been avoided had the Port Authority staff and consultants conferred with Mr. Bales before their version of the plan was modeled," said Michael Schatzki, president of the New Jersey Citizens for Environmental Research.

"Upon learning of these errors, the Port Authority chose to do nothing about them," claimed Patrick Russell. counsel to NJCAAN.

"Free exchange between the two

groups was not an easy task," Ogden said. "It was very, very difficult."

Bales was the architect of the Expanded East Coast Plan. Implemented in 1987, the plan routed planes over local communities.

The consultant said the plan's intent was to increase efficiency and reduce delays at Newark, LaGuardia and Kennedy airports. However, he conceded all it did was increase aircraft noise.

After residents complained about the EECP, the FAA decided to conduct an environmental impact study, which recommended some flight plan changes. However, it concluded that NJCAAN's plan to reroute airplanes in and out of Newark International Airport along the Atlantic Ocean would be dangerous, cause flight delays and increase noise for residents

in other states. "We are now on the fast track to providing relief for many of the state's residents who were affected by the implementation of the EECP,"

Council reaches out to unite diversity

A bipartisan citizen group has announced its plans to serve as a vehicle for the implementation of the governor's diversity agenda in Union County.

The Inclusion Council of Union County's formation was announced during a press conference last week when Secretary of State Lonna Hooks accepted the group under the state's "Many Faces, One Family" program umbrella.

Hooks, who said the council was the first of its kind, told attendees that people must become involved in order to address "stresses" which exist between various groups of the state's population.

Veronica Desmond, who serves as commissioner to deter criminal activity under the state Division of Law and Public Safety, heard the governor's call for assistance and became involved in the program.

Signing on as the group's chairman, Desmond said when she became involved in this endeavor, she and other council members "examined the global factors that affect our nation, its markets, businesses, different levels of government and the core of our very future," they discovered that the key to future success is diversity.

"If we the people of the United States, the people of New Jersey can understand different viewpoints, respect differences, build on common ground and use our differences as a cumulative advantage to foster positive growth in many areas, then nothing can stand before us," Desmond said during the Aug. 24 gathering at the Elizabethtown Gas Company's building in Union.

"It is Governor Whitman who has ignited the spirit of diversity, the spirit of 'We the People' that you see assembled here today," she said. "And it is Governor Whitman, in the true spirit of entrepreneurship that has given us the freedom to develop our 'We the People' pilot here in Union County."

Through educational forums and testimonials, Desmond said the council will strive to "concentrate on our similarities and celebrate our differences," while also encouraging others throughout the state to follow suit.

The council's boundaries will not stop in Union County, said Desmond, who foresees three regional groups one each in the south, north and central portions of New Jersey. The council, of course, would change its name if Desmond's vision should be realized.

Hooks said she and Whitman have been trying to raise issues of understanding across the state during the past 18 months, and her experiences make her believe citizens will "rise to the challenge and do what is right." The secretary of state noted that for everything people have heard about someone who is "not good-hearted,"

she sees 20 or 30 people a day who are different and want to see things work

Hooks noted that it will take the efforts of people, such as those on the council, and not legislation to begin addressing current wrongs. She said it will take the efforts of people going "street by street" in order to have a significant impact on the populace.

The council is comprised of a diverse group of individuals who represent the following groups: Russ Triolo, youth groups; Louise Yohalem, Jewish-Americans; Rafael Bentancourt, Puerto RicanAmericans; Sue Yang, Asian-Americans; Karen Torian, African-Americans; Carmen Mendiola, Cuban-Americans; Manny Grova, Portuguese-Americans, and Sophie Kauchak, different women's groups in Union County.

In addition to Desmond, others include Jerry Midgette, vice chairman; Sophie Kauchak, secretary, and Maria Sartor, media representative.

Desmond said the council is still looking for representatives of the Italian. Irish and Polish communities.

The group, formed last year, has scheduled a meeting for September,

when it will tackle the subject of property taxes and education. A regional economic summit is envisioned for the spring some time following elections.

According to Desmond, the council's focus will be more on economics than the "Many Faces, One Family" program.

The council intends to develop surveys and "other tools" to measure its impact. Members of the press will be invited to review the group's report card. Information as to how the report card will be developed is still in the planning stages.

College's acting chief is looking for higher standards

When baseballs from the Kean College campus were landing on neighbors' lawns, denting cars and striking homes, there were a lot of angry people.

This matter, which eventually was addressed, succeeded in building a thicker wall between the college and members of the community.

Acting Kean College President Hank Ross says matters such as these can be easily resolved, and would impact greatly in chipping away at the bricks which make up the wall separating Kean and its neighbors.

Enhancing Kean's soured relations with the community is one facet of a three-pronged approach Ross believes is necessary for the college to undertake if it is to become a top-notch institution of higher learning.

Ross* plan is to restore funding to the college, reduce some of the tensions which have existed between assorted groups and refocus energies on campus by strengthening some of the college's programs.

The 51-year-old acting president says he thinks it is a pivotal time for the college, and welcomes the task which lies ahead.

"I think Kean College is standing at a crossroads. I think that staff, faculty

and students have an external community that wants us to do well, so we have a tremendous opportunity," he said. "I think there have been some difficult ears, but I think we can build on the tremendous strengths that we have and they'll bring us to where we have every right to believe we should be, and that is to be one of the premier schools of higher education in the State of New Jersey. We have the building blocks in front of us, so I think it is a tremendous opportunity."

The opportunity for Ross to lead. however, may never really come to fruition, because his role as acting president carries no security. Figuratively, Ross could be out of that post tomorrow, but it is more likely he will hold it until at least the end of the first semester.

Ross declines to commit as to vhether he is interested in the president's post, and has indicated he has not been approached by anyone on the board of rustees about the full-time post. He says only that he serves at "the pleasure of the board."

Pat Molden, spokeswoman for the college, said Kean's Presidential Search Committee remains tightlipped about its plans.

The committee held its sixth meeting July 26, when it issued a report indicating that its review of 100 applicants was continuing. Initial candidate interviews are expected to take place in September, with finalists expected to be screened in October.

Comprising the 12-member committee are four trustees, two student representatives, five faculty senate members and an alumni representative.


Presidential Search Chair Patricia Weston Fivera said in the report that "the caliner of candidates we are treviewing is outstanding and the pool is representative of a diverse population. I am sure the campus will be impressed by those selected by the committee for the fall campus visits."

Ross, who resides in Branchburg with his wife, Robbie, had served as special assistant to the president for economic and community development/president of the Union County Alliance before being named acting president in June. The other title he held was director of institutional research.

He has been with Kean for about 25 years, starting shortly after completing graduate school. He has a doctorate in political science from Rutgers University. He initially served as a faculty member and moved to the administration, where he served in assorted capacities.

Ross to target university status for Kean

If Ross inevitably gets the nod, he would make among his priorities whether Kean should move to university status. A number of other state colleges recently have gone that route.

"This has been a desire expressed by many people. I think that's feasible, but that's something that has to be decided by the campus community," Ross said. He noted that it would involve some strengthening of the graduate area, not that such a shift would involve some strengthening of programs,

Another item Ross sees as vital, or in his words "absolutely critical" is restoring he college's funding base. Kean College is among the eight state colleges that receive the lowest level of state funding, said Ross. It receives about \$1,000 per full-time student below the state average.

The state's system of funding colleges and universities changed about 12 years ago, and Kean has been negatively affected, Ross said. Funding used to be based on enrollment, but now funds are awarded based on a college's previous year's budget.

When the state changed this system, Ross said it allowed colleges to do what they wished in terms of enrollment. "A lot of schools took the opportunity to cut their enrollments. What it did," he said, "was to increase their funding on a per-student basis."

But Kean remained "committed to providing opportunities, and we are an institution which really is a college of opportunity with standards of excellenc;" he said. After a certain point, the impact on funding becomes cumulative, said Ross, who noted there had been a deleterious impact on programs.

"We enroll about 7,500 students. That's a \$7.5 million annual shortfall against the state average," he said.

"Our tuition is also the lowest in the state. If we brought that up to the state average, that would be another \$2 million to \$2.5 million. So, in effect, the college suffers from a \$10 million annual shortfall. That's against an \$80 million budget. That's a huge number in any terms, but it's certainly a huge number against \$80 million.

"For u:, that's the difference in being able to fund our program at a level of dequacy as opposed to a level xcellence, which it deserves, he said. "So for our institution to do the kind of job that it needs to do in the best way possible, we've got to restore our programs."

Ross said he does not believe the current political climate will allow Kean to gain more money by simply pleading poverty. "It won't work. What we need to do is demonstrate performance. We've got to show value for value. We've got to demonstrate that we have programs that can make the maximum contribution to the state," he said, "Show how you can do it, why you can do it, what way you can do it based on the value we have to offer. And based on performance, we think we need some enhancement in funding. And I think people are willing to increase funding if they're going to see value for

Ross said it is necessary to put in place a strategic planning process. This would mean coming up with a vision of what Kean envisions for the future. That plan must be "effective," "strong" and "tough," he added.

Another of Ross' goals, and one that many people across the nation will probably be watching, is reducing some of the tensions that existed on the campus during the last several

"I've been spending the last six weeks meeting with groups across the campus, with faculty leadership, with rank-and-file faculty members, with student leaders, with administrators. with different ethnic groups, with all kinds of committees — the union, the faculty senate, executive committee and so on - and basically what I shared with them was an approach that I had outlined when I initially met with the board of trustees in June when I was first appointed," he said. "I said, in my mind, there were three major priorities the college would have to face in the years ahead. They're basic, they're fundamental, and they go to the heart of what we need to do as an institution in my judgment and I certainly invited input

in response to these priorities." Ross was not critical of past handlings of speaking engagements by controversial figures such as the Rev. Al Sharpton, Nation of Islam Leader Louis Farrakhan or Leonard Jeffries

of the City College of New York. On the subject of speakers, two issues exist — one involves freedom of speech and the other has to do with being the institution standing up for

"tolerance and shared respect, civility," said Ross. He said it is important that the president enunciate clearly the college's position and that a response come without delay. The communication, however, that

Ross envisions would not stop with the campus community, but would include the college's host municipality, Union Township. During the past few months, the college has taken steps toward being a better neighbor.

While only time will tell if those wounds can be mended, one thing's for sure: If Ross does become college president, neighbors' complaints of having to dodge baseballs will be short-live 1.

(Continued from Page B1) said Barry Valentine, FAA's assistant administrator for Policy, Planning and International Aviation, when announcing the results last

Congressman Bob Franks, R-7, charged that the FAA's findings were "an affront to citizens through Central New Jersey who have been pleading for relief from the constant roar of airplanes over their homes."

And four New Jersey Republican House members demanded a meeting with FAA Administrator David Hinson to show support for the ocean-routing proposal as a solution to a problem that "has been hanging over our constituents' heads for seven years."

A joint letter signed by Franks, Rodney Frelinghuysen, R-11, Marge Roukema, R-5, and Dick

Zimmer, R-12, said, "The citizens of New Jersey see an agency that has been unresponsive and has refused to provide or address a reg-

ional solution." The FAA expects its new routes, which they should have in place by 1996, to provide jet noise relief for 18,755 Union County residents.

But Bales argued that ocean routing would reduce jet noise for far greater numbers of residents. He said it would be close to 703,000 residents, while the Port Authority claims it would only help 420,000.

Dunlay projects ocean routing would cost airlines \$72 million in increased travel time and delays. Bales said it would only be \$15 mil-

The FAA is accepting public comment until Sept. 11, when it will finalize its decision.

Conrad puts an audience under his hypnotic spell

By Lisa Ann Batitto Arts and Entertainment Editor Performer Gary Conrad has a successful show when members of his audience fall asleep.

Conrad. a former Linden resident who now resides in Texas, is a hypnotist — not the type that makes people stop smoking or overcome their fear of public speaking - but one who helps people shed their inhibitions and "ham it up" by putting them in a trance. Volunteers from the audience become part of the entertainment when they are led through a variety of scenarios created by Conrad. In the past, volunteers have participated in beauty pageants, imitated fish, lost their feet and spoken martian.

"I assign them roles or I let them select them," Conrad said. "Through hypnosis, they can have a negative hallucination, such as being a performer without an audience; or a positive one, such as seeing a leprechaun. The power of hypnosis is very impressive."

Conrad received his bachelor's degree from Furman University in Greenville, S.C., and he worked as a stock broker in New York City, and in the shipping business in New York and Los Angeles.

His journey into the world of the subconscious began in 1980 as a

way for him to maximize his abilities as a bodybuilder. After studying the craft for several years, he began hypnotizing people in clinical settings before taking his show to the stage.

While hypnotism can make a person do something he wouldn't ordinarily do - like imitating Madorna or forgetting his name -Corrad said it can only go so far in making someone do the unthinkable. This contradicts the belief many people have that they will lose control while under hypnosis. "During my show, I make men think they are Chippendale's dancers and most of them will take their shirts off. However, if a person is uncomfortable with his body or if he doesn't like this kind of thing, he won't do it. You can't make people do anything they find repugnant or reprehensible," he said. "If it's in them, they'll do it. Sometimes people feel repressed by society but they'll do something if they know they can get away with it. When people are hypnotized, their inhibitions are lowered. After the show, they come up to me and tell me they had a great time."

On the chance an audience member has ow inhibitions to begin with, Corrad has spotters who keep their eyes on the volunteers to make certain no improprieties take place.

Another belief Conrad shatters in his shows is that people are put under by swinging a watch in front of them and telling them they are "getting sleepy." He hypnotizes groups of about 14 through relaxing music, voice commands and hand movements. Most people on the stage "take," and Conrad said those who don't probably didn't want to be hypnotized in the first place.

Conrad described the mental state of being hypnotized as somewhere between being awake and



sleeping, and people in this frame of mind e-e not controlled by him.

"At any time they can leave," he said. "The can get up at any time they want if they think it is not to their liking. It is the job of a skilled performer to make them want to stay."

The members of the audience who are not participants in the show get to observe their friends in odd situations, something the performers miss out on. However, Conrad said they do get a residual for all their work, in addition to their 15 minutes of fame.

"Being hypnotized is like riding a bicycle. If someone has been hypnotized by me they've learned how to do it and can now apply it to different areas of their lives," he said. "The trick is for a hypnotist to is on having the audience entertained by their friends. I help you break down your own limitations," Conrad said.

The 1996 Jeep Grand Cherokee now has smoothe and quiet ride

Estensive improvements to the standard 4.0-liter I-6 engine, an enhanced Quadra-Trac all-wheel drive system, and a new, stronger four-speed automatic transmission on V-8-equipped models make the 1996 Grand Cherokee smoother, quieter and an even better performer on- and

Grand Cherokee owners have always used "rugged and powerful" to describe their vehicles' standard 4.0-liter, 185 horsepower I-6 engine. For 1996, their praise will include the words "smooth and quiet" because the Jeep platform team has eliminated keysources of noise, vibration and harshness, NVH, while expanding the engine's already broad torque curve.

These upgrades are the latest among hundreds of continuous refinements that have kept Grand Cherokee the benchmark among sport-utility vehicles since its 1993 debut.

Using Finite Element Analysis computer methods, engineers designed a revised, stronger cylinder blick with strengthening ribs cast into the inner and outer walls. This extra beef makes the new block substantially stiffer, reducing the amount of mechanical noise it transmits.

The stouter block also incorporates a one-piece main bearing brace, which locks the main bearing caps together. Anchoring the bearing caps as a single unit eliminates their natural tendency to move in opposite directions during normal operation — a potential NVH source.

New lightweight pistons and wrist pins reduce reciprocating mais by 26 percent, smoothing the power delivery. The pistons feature shorter, reprofiled skirts for lower friction. New piston rings are also lighter and more flexible for improved sealing.

Following the lead of last year's 5.2-liter V-8 improvement program, Jeep's 4.0-liter I-6 gains a new camshaft for '96. Cam proflies now incorporate revised ramps for quietr valvetrain operation. This 'new' profile also reduces valve overlap for improved idle quality and lower emmissions, while fattening the already broad torque curve. between 1200-3600 rpm — the range where it's most beneficial. Maximum rated torque is 220 foot-pounds at 2400

To complement the internal changes, a new reusable, silicon-beaded, steel backbone gasket seals the valve cover tothe cylinder head. Rubber grommets and compression limiters isolate the valve cover from its fasteners and the cylinder head. This significantly reduces the transmission of valvetrain noise by the cover.

Additionally, Grand Cherokee's engine mounts have been recalibrated, with larger rubber surfaces for improved engine-to-chassis isolation.

Even the sound quality of the '96 Grand Cherokee's exhaust has been improved. 4.0-liter-equipped models feature an all-new exhaust system, incorporating a retuned muffler and larger 2.25-inch tailpipe.

These extensive refinements add up to a significant overall reduction in powertrain NVH, particularly at idle and launch, with no penatly to fuel economy.

Quadra-Trac, Jeep's ultimate all-wheel drive system, has been improved for 1996. The changes provide Grand Cherokee customers with increased on-road flexibility and off-road caction.

Grand Cherokee owners appreciate Quadra-Trac's fulltime, transparent operation in all driving situations. The improved On Demand Quadra-Trac eliminates a planetary gearset which formerly split the torque between the front and rear axles. That function is now managed completely by the system's viscous coupling center differential.

Under dry road conditions, the improved On Demand Quadra-Trac now delivers 100 percent of torque to the rear axle. This greatly reduces driveline friction, while improving slow-speed cornering responsiveness and high-speed

But when the going gets slippery or the terrain is tough, the new On Demand Quadra-Trac instantly delivers maximum torque to whichever axle needs traction. The result is true on-demand capability for all driving situations.

An added feature of the '96 On Demand Quadra-Tracsystem is Lo-Lock. When extra traction is needed - such as in deep mud — the shift system overrides the viscious coupling and provides a mechanical lock in the Low Range position. In addition, torque is multiplied by 2.72, giving increased off-road capability.

Further enhancements to the '96 Grand Cherokee driveline include a new aluminum center housing for the stronger Dana 44 rear axle. The lightweight housing - unique to the sport-utility segment and a first for Chrysler shaves 16 pounds off the previous steel unit's weight.




