## Kean University 'hatches' a plan to help arts organizations

Throughout the school year, Kean University Communications and Theater Department provides quality arts education and a forum for both students and professionals to present their craft to the public. The approach of summer typically signals the close of the school and theater seasons, except for this year, when Kean will be hosting up to the summer entertainment series with an exciting program of performers and audiences alike.

Kean University President Ronald Appibian set forth his vision of an interactive university in his first address in September 1996. In keeping with this vision, Kean funded 24 interactive initiatives in June 1998, one of which is The Arts Incubator Project at Kean University, based on an interactive model founded in Arlington County, Virginia, to increase participation in the arts across the development of arts groups and increase visibility of arts events and organizations by providing performance, exhibit, rehearsal and technical space, rent-free to performing artists and groups which do not have a permanent home base or space in which to perform.

Kean's project is the first Arts Incubator to be established in New Jersey, and also the first one to be modified for a university setting. This weekend marks the debut of the Kean Arts Incubator, with a performing arts festival scheduled follows through June 8.

The Arlington County Arts Incubator was founded in 1990, following a four-year growth spurt in Arlington County government's administrative resources for cultural and arts organizations. Impressive in its efficiency, the project recognizes the over-

whelming need of visual and performing artists to have access to suitable and affordable facilities, and the over-scheduling waste of underused public and private venue space. Centralized use of space/resources is the most cost-effective approach as one theater or performance space can accommodate several organizations, eliminating the need for separate funding for each group. Finally, by deferring the incubator embrace to community involvement, leading to a greater array of both community and arts leaders from needs, from research into available space, to production and audience.

"We were looking for something to do with our theaters during the summer because largely they were going unused," according to Holly Logue, chairperson, Kean Communications and Theater Department. "We have five theater spaces here, and they vary in architecture, size, in facility, specifically, Wilkins Theatre, physical theater space, Zelle by Theater Arts, 100 seats, Murph/Dunn Theatre, Black box, 100 seats, Little Theatre, 100 seats, 225 seats, and Last Communion, 325 seats." When the Wilkins Theatre got off its conditioning schedule of years ago, a committee was formed to discuss summer programming. There were lots of different possibilities, but the committee had been able to focus it and narrow it down, and were really struggling when this idea came up, it seemed like the right one.

The Arts Incubator Advisory Committee, consisting of Logue, Deputy Chairperson, Ken Theater Series Director, Karen Hart, Kean Theater Institute Chairperson, Theresa Chatter, Professor, Communications and Theater Department, and Susan Appibian, Project Administrator, invited John Palmer, Chair of the Arlington County Arts Incubator to the university to speak about the project.

"In that sense, we're allowing them to grow in the education aspect of their application," Appibian said. "Kean University residents (Gay Pride Theater) historically based on campus in the summer, sounds out the schedule."

"They've also gone through the application process," Logue said. "There was a pre-existing commitment to this group, to fit them and make them part of this."

- Laud and Hardy Step Together, Kean University Gay Pride Theater, June 17-19, Murph/Dunn Theatre.
- Clay and Dolls, presented by Heart and Soul of Union, July 6-8, in Wilkins Theatre, Morris Avenue campus.
- Threepence Opera, presented by Westfield Young Artists, Cooperative Theater, July 20-21 and Aug. 1-6 and 8-9 in Wilkins Theatre.

The descriptions are timed and placed so smoothly between pieces of dialogue that you are hardly aware they are there.

## Mercedes-Benz Maybach is committed to 'absolute luxury'

The Mercedes-Benz Maybach Design Concept provides a glimpse of the technology and features that the carmaker might incorporate into an ultra-luxury model in the near future. At the same time, the car draws on the rich heritage of Mercedes-Benz as a maker of ultra-luxury cars. Even the name Maybach reaches to the past for inspiration.

The Mercedes-Benz Maybach Concept reaffirms the carmaker's commitment to build the best vehicles in every segment in which it competes. From the small A-Class urban commuter to a large "absolute luxury" vehicle class. While the current Mercedes-Benz S-Class range of sedans leads the premium luxury segment in terms of technology, room and features, the Maybach Design Concept takes luxury to an even higher level.

The Maybach name goes back nearly as far as the automobile industry as Daimler and Benz. Wilhelm Maybach was instrumental in the design of the first Daimler gasoline engine. He later started his own car company, specializing in large, elegant luxury models. The most famous of which was the 12-cylinder Maybach Zeppelin of the 1930s. Maybach Motors GmbH has been part of the Daimler-Benz group since 1961.

The Mercedes-Benz Maybach came about as the result of extensive research, including interviews with current owners and analysis of emerging trends. This research was conducted by the Daimler-Benz Advanced Design Centers in the US and Japan, which collaborated on the design of the Maybach. One notable trend they studied was the growing use of chauffeur-driven vehicles, particularly in Asian markets.

The Maybach Design Concept defines a new class of ultra-luxury and is a large and elegant chauffeur-

driven sedan. The exterior design, while striking with its two-tone paint scheme and fine metal fittings, is not ostentatious. Chrome is used to highlight the shape of the car, while a luminous steel/silver/adjustable for brightness, emphasizes horizontal motion.

The Mercedes Maybach Design Concept is larger than any current production Mercedes-Benz passenger car. It is built on a 139-inch wheelbase, which is 15.8 inches longer than the 123.6 inch wheelbase of the S-Class sedan. At 117.2 inches bumper-to-bumper, the Maybach Design Concept is 22 inches longer than the Mercedes S-Class sedan, but shorter than most conventional limousines. The Maybach stands 61 inches tall, compared to 58.6 inches for the S-Class and its 76.8-inch wheel is 2.4 inches greater than the S-Class.

In the Mercedes tradition, the Maybach Design Concept is extremely space-efficient, making it feel as roomy as larger limousines. In addition, Mercedes has revealed with the Maybach advanced lightweight construction materials, including fiber composites, aluminum and magnesium.

The Mercedes-Benz Maybach Design Concept is designed to provide the ultimate luxury experience for passengers. The interior offers sumptuous seating and trim and the possibility of tailor-made custom equipment. Passengers of the Maybach can even control ambient light inside the car. The electrochromic glass roof allows control over how much light enters the car, and can be set to respond to changing outdoor conditions.

Passengers riding in the rear of the Maybach Design Concept are treated to "electrically" adjustable reclining seats and an onboard bar for hot and cold drinks. Located between the

front seat, the bar features three different serving areas, each of which can be electrically controlled. The compartment for hot drinks provides tea, coffee and fine porcelain. In addition, a "cool box" located under a folding armrest in the rear can accommodate a bottle of wine or champagne. For cigar aficionados, there is a humidor made of walnut and rosewood between the rear seats.

A full complement of electronic equipment gives the Mercedes Maybach unique business and entertainment capabilities. For convenience, there are fold-down tables located under the armrests of the rear seats. The integrated communications and audio system features three telephones, including a dedicated data line. There is a portable computer in the glovebox, which can be used at any seating position. The computer terminal communicates with a central unit using infrared technology, eliminating the need for cables.

A thin-profile 20-inch LCD screen — just two inches deep — is suspended from the roof between the driver and the front passenger. Passengers can use it for video television programs, DVD videos, or tapes from the onboard VCR. They can even play computer games.

The Mercedes Maybach multi-system features both a CD changer and a mini-disc player. Rear seat passengers can control all audio and communication functions using six-inch touch-sensitive screens mounted on the B-pillars. The finishing touch of luxury can be found in the trunk of the Mercedes Maybach Design Concept, two color-coded golf bags, each with a full set of professional-caliber clubs.

The Mercedes Maybach driver's mode has not been ignored. In addition to the suite of the surrounding luxury, the driver is provided with an advanced instrument panel that con-

veys just the information he or she requires. The panel is a multi-view "blend" with analog instrument functions — speedometer, odometer, fuel and temperature gauge — a field of warning messages and current weather and traffic reports, and a screen that displays, via video camera, the view to the rear for parking safety.

The Maybach Design Concept features the latest in Mercedes safety technology and a glimpse at the future. The light beam front lighting is "off-line" anything in production today, and automatically adapts to road and weather conditions. When the light changes intensity, they do so by a "fade-over," rather than an abrupt change. For safety in traffic, the tail light intensity adjusts to ambient lighting conditions, ensuring maximum visibility to other drivers.

The Maybach Design Concept incorporates Brake Assist, the newest Mercedes safety advance which is featured on many of its 1998 passenger cars. Brake Assist can detect a panic stop and apply full brake force automatically, more quickly than the driver could. In the Maybach, when Brake Assist is engaged, the brake lights glow more brightly than normal, to alert drivers following behind of an emergency situation ahead. The light segments use LED technology, which reacts to brake input much faster than conventional lights.

While full details of its powertrain have not been revealed, the Maybach Design Concept lives up to its rich heritage. The engine is a V12, just under six liters in displacement and sharing the innovative three-valve, twin-spark technology of the new

Mercedes-Benz V6 for efficiency and low emissions. There is also a cylinder cut-off function to maximize fuel efficiency.

The Mercedes Maybach does not compromise handling, response, which the carmaker has always considered an integral safety component of its vehicles. For the best ride quality and handling response possible, the Mercedes-Maybach Design Concept incorporates an Active Body Control chassis. Instead of springs at each wheel, there are hydraulic cylinders which generate counter forces in response to wheel load.

The advanced suspension system provides flat cornering, outstanding handling response, and supporting a car of this type, an unquenchable thirst for "The suspension can be adjusted, depending on passenger preference

## Mercedes-Benz S Class is the top of the line

The Mercedes-Benz S500 sedan is Mercedes' top-of-the-line cruise, mobile, with a 389 hp V12 engine and the biggest and best of everything else the company offers.

It'll do 0-60 mph in 4.5 seconds, the fastest of the S-Class sedans, and has a governed speed of 155.

Treat it nice and you can get 19 mpg around town, 29 on dry highway and with a 2.6 gallon fuel tank, a stock of cruising range. But who's counting gas when buying a limited-edition car that has an asking price of \$134,845?

Mercedes sells about 500 of these a year and about 1,500 V12 cars a year, including the SL600, Tollerator, and CLK600 coup. The S-Class line is built in Sindelfingen, Germany, a suburb of Stuttgart.

The S600 is the gold standard of S-Class sedans, of which there are four other models: the standard wheelbase S320, long wheelbase S320, S420 and W500.

All S-Class sedans have perks such as a seat with "memory" "sliding" feature, which means you don't "lean" the doors or the trunk. You merely close them in their latching point and the pneumatics do the rest. It's a safety design to avoid those annoying "door jolt" situations.

There are also double-paneled side glass, 12-way power front seats with pneumatically adjustable lumbar support and three-position memory for mirrors, head rest and steering wheel; dual zone air conditioning with charcoal filter; leather upholstery; wood trim in 11-speaker Bose Beta stereo; power lift-sliding sunroof; one-touch up and down to the windows and sun-

roof, and infrared rain-sensor wipers to adjust speed and frequency of wipes. The S600 is an overachiever with such extras as multifunction car seats for even more comfort possibilities, two-tone Nappa leather interior, with even more feather trim, electric rear window shade, heated car seats with power adjustable seatback recline, integrated CD changer in the trunk, integrated parking brake, and 10 tie-ups (discharge headlights that have a blue white light safety type of beam).

On the S600, there are electronic helping hands such as:

- Electronic Stability Program that uses ABS and tire-to-control lateral slips of the car. ESP is handy in snowy conditions or even on dry pavement when you come barreling into a turn, panic, lift off the gas and hit the brakes, which by any law of physics will create instant oversteer that may stall you when the rear end breaks loose and the car pivots out of the road.

- Traction control, which keeps the rear drive shafts from spinning.
- Adaptive Driving System for smooth, level riding.
- Parktronic, which is like car sonar. Sensors built into the front and rear bumpers call off a tone if the driver backs too close to something in the driveway.

Safety features include front and rear crumple zones; adjustable three-point seat belts with emergency tensioning pretensioner and belt-force limiters for drivers and front passengers; dual front air bags; air-occupied from side air bags; four-way adjustable head restraints; 10-point anti-missile child seat recognition system; and Brake Assist.

The S600 is the highest end model

not just because of cubic-inch power, but its whole demeanor. It is a masculine car, with a sporting sensibility. It's quite appropriate for a car in our country. There is room for you and three friends to spread out, kick back and crank up the tunes.

Those in the front have 38 inches of head room and 41.3 inches for legs, but many important features are hidden. 57.1 inches of leg room and 40.7 inches for shoulders.

The companies in back will have separate territories separated by a fold-down armrest with cup holders and storage. There is room to cross your legs and read a newspaper. Lighted vanity mirrors fold down from the ceiling and the seatback angle can be power-adjusted.

There is a remarkable 38.5 inches of headroom in back, and 39.6 inches for legs, 37.6 for hips and 61.3 for shoulders. Even with all this inside space, there is still 13.6 cubic feet of trunk space.

Look for the discreet V12 on the side door and the S600 badge on the trunk. It looks like any of the long wheelbase S-Class models.

Because the S-Class is large, it has presence on the road. Sport utility vehicles have little advantage over this car. And while it is enormous, it doesn't drive that way. You can whip into parking slots and do the mall without extra effort.

A redesigned 2000 model year S-Class went on sale in April with an all-new and steamrolled exterior and interior.

It will be offered in two long wheelbase V8 models, S450 and S500. The S530, has been dropped to streamline the model offerings.
