Ruotolo Center dedicated

The buildings that now bear his name will house the things that were "near and dear" to him. The Andrew K. Ruotolo Justice Center at 32 Railway Ave. in Elizabethtown, which was dedicated last week, will be home to the Union County prosecutor's Office and a child care center for county employees.

The former county prosecutor succumbed to cancer in September 1995 at the age of 42.

Nearly 200 people were on hand during the May 26 ceremony to officially dedicate the facility that also will house the Union County Information Center.

"I'm proud to be part of this project," said County Manager Michael Lapolla, who served as first Assistant Prosecutor under Ruotolo. "The greatest legacy was his kids: Andrew, Jayne and Lindsay."

Freeholder Chairman Nick Spartz called the former prosecutor "one of this county's greatest public servants."

"His tenure among us was much too short," said Superior Court Judge

UCC hands out nearly 1,000 degrees at commencement

Under seasonally sunny skies, 925 degrees were conferred in more than 60 disciplines during the 55th annual commencement ceremonies at Union County College in Cranford on May 20, when several area residents were recognized for their various achievements.

Following opening ceremonies, Victor M. Richel, chairman of the college's board of trustees, welcomed graduates, families and faculty to the commencement which was conducted in the parking lot behind the student center.

Representing the graduates, Philip S. Schacter of Linden spoke of the diversity among his fellow students and of the benefits of working toward

ward a common goal. "No matter where we go, nobody can ever take away this day, this feeling of this diploma," he said in his address.

Receiving an emotional high point of the ceremony, Sondra Fishinger of Hawley, chairman of faculty, presented the Post-Day Award to Reginald Johnson III.

Instituted 61 years ago in tribute to two UCC graduates killed in a car accident just prior to commencement, the Post-Day Award recognizes the student who best exemplifies the college's ideals of scholarship, leadership and service. This year, however, the traditional plaque was accompanied by a cash award of \$300, money provided by the UCC faculty in recognition of "excellent" academic performance.

A resident of Roselle, Johnson (joined to school) to receive his GED and work toward a career as a civil engineer. A full-time student and full-time single father of two, he has been inducted into the Chi Alpha Epsilon, Phi Alpha Theta and Tau Alpha Beta honor societies and has been the recipient of the Outstanding Academic Award for freshman chemistry, was cited for Academic Excellence in Mathematics and in Engineering, and has been named to "Who's Who in Union County College," "Who's Who Among Students in American Junior Colleges," and the 1998-99 Talent Roster of Outstanding Community College Transfer Students.

While a student, Johnson served as a peer tutor in the Academic Learning Centers and served as a member of the Educational Opportunity Fund.

Advisor Bilard, a representative of the Student Government Association and the president of the Engineering and Physics Club. Having attained a grade-point average of 3.797, he will attend the New Jersey Institute of Technology to pursue a bachelor's degree in civil engineering.

Starting the spotlight with Johnson was Precya D Souza, also of Roselle.

D Souza was awarded the coveted Alumnae Prize for attaining the highest grade-point average — 4.072 — while maintaining the highest number of credits.

In addition to the academic accomplishments which earned her recognition, D Souza, who received an associate in arts degree in biology, served as a peer tutor on all levels of math, including calculus, chemistry and organic chemistry. She is a member of Phi Theta Kappa, the national honor society for two-year colleges, and earned the Davis Kiefer Wolf Memorial Scholarship for the past academic year.

D Souza, who moved to the United States with her father in 1997 and immediately enrolled at UCC, is the recipient of a full scholarship to Cook College from Phi Theta Kappa.

Less than 30 minutes into the ceremony, Thomas Brown, UCC president, addressed the assemblage and delivered the charge to the graduates.

Offering his congratulations to not only the graduates, but to their families and the faculty for their assistance, Brown entertained a singular and timely message, the millennium and the last UCC graduating class with the prefix "1999."

"Although there may be some dispute about whether the 21st century actually begins in the year 2000 or 2001," he said, "there is no doubt that the years we lived with for the past hundred years will disappear when 2001 rolls around."

He went on to offer his individual observation from a more personal point of view. "We've heard about the men of the century," he said, "the

Edward Deplin Jr., but his legacy and inspiration will live on. Riosolo was credited with reducing crime and bringing law enforcement closer to people. His initiatives included creating the county's first domestic violence and anti-bias units and the successful Essex Union Anti-Trafficking Force.
"His presence is still felt in Union County," Scary said. "The relationships he built up and outside the county will be remembered."
It's difficult to imagine someone who always knew what to say, and his widow Mary Riosolo knew because she was a lawyer in a high regard after losing "Lo-Kill" to cancer. He wanted to be like the district attorney book, "Almanac of a South Jersey attorney who represented black men wrongly accused of raping a white woman."
Elizabeth Mayor J. Christian Bollwage related several stories about Riosolo from their time on the golf course. Riosolo was once asked why he did not get into private law practice where he could have more money and be able to have more material things for his family. Bollwage said he believed "service to others was more important than a few extra things."
Once discussed as the potential site of a new juvenile detention center, the office building which once housed a bank as purchased by the county in 1973 for \$2.5 million and renovated at a cost of \$3 million.
The county recently closed on property near the Foxbald-Bridge which will be home to the new detention center. Many officials said they were glad to see a property such as the old Riosolo Center reutilized rather than constructing "another jail" in downtown Elizabeth.
"I am proud to be beginning the construction in two weeks while the procedure office will move in before long. I think the child care center will open Aug. 10. County officials are confident the 63 available slots for child care will be filled by county employees."

Former Union students 'show off' in their hometown

There's a certain satisfaction that one derives from proving that success is inevitable, attainable, and ultimately attained.

For example, take two young Ukrainians, who showed great promise in domains of high school productivity, and who followed through on their promise to continue their education to "career" with careers blossoming.

Gregory Allan Bock and Nicole E. Martone, who thrived Union High School audiences with their versatility and "acting" and musical ability, decided to show off just a little in their hometown.

Together, Bock and Martone assembled two professional performers, Eugene Evans and Allison Reed, and six other well known Broadway musical composers and "essence" in a 1980s-style program in the Casa del Sol banquet hall at 2443 Van Hook Road in Union. "Cabaret at Casa del Sol" will be presented on June 16, 7:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. (adult) and a 7:00 p.m. show.

"It's going to be a homecoming event," explained Bock, the other musician, who he and Martone were friends in their office. "It will be for people who haven't seen us perform in a while. We want to invite everyone to share in this experience."

"It will be a special performance for people who have watched us grow up & perform."

Bock graduated from Union High School in 1995, and this year, from the Tisch School of Arts at New York University, where he majored in dramatic art and received a bachelor of arts degree in fine arts. Martone graduated from Union High School in 1997 and attends the Tisch School of the Arts, Cap 21.

"Collaborative Arts Project, 21st Century. The two connected their friends, Evans, and Reed, both of whom live in New York, and who are involved in other productions.

"All four of us have been at that school," said Martone. "I'm in my third year. Greg, Alan and Jennifer all did that program for three years."

All four performers will sing songs from such Broadway musicals as "Grease," and "Mack and Mabel," which IUHS had staged in the past. "Cabaret," "Gypsy and Dolls," "Man of La Mancha," "Into the Woods," "Forever Plaid," "West Side Story," "Annie Get Your Gun," "Chicago," "Thantom of the Opera," "Les Miserables," "Sunset Boulevard," and "City of Angels." The Casa del Sol audience in Union will thrill to numbers as "The Impossible Dream," "Up Down You're Looking Up the Doll," "Rags to Riches," "The Dicks Dicks," "The Thing," "Maybe This Time," "When I Was a Boy," "I Want to See the Sun Rise," and "Luck Be a Lady."

"I wanted to work with my best friends," said Bock. "And they were very interested. It was the right time," Martine explained that "Alan was in Virginia at the Barter Theater and

one of the leads in 'Sherlock' but he had been interested in doing this with us." He said he would love to work on it with us. And Jennifer is booked with May of next year. Jill Kelly, she will play Lorraine in 'Othello' in New Hampshire, and she's playing Magnolia in the 'Show Boat' national tour from September through May. We were fortunate that she had time to do this show with us."

"Both Nicole and I really wanted to do this," said Bock. "We knew we wanted to do it in New Jersey, especially in our hometown. You know,

he said, "I used to work at Casa del Sol as a waiter for over four years. When did the idea come about? Well, less than a month ago," said Martone.

"We all picked the music," added Bock, "and tried to be everything together. It's going to be a show, supper, and familiar music to the crowd in a show that Union hasn't seen yet. It's very elegant, and a first, which is why I'm excited, and I'm excited for the owner of Casa del Sol, is thrilled to have a perform here. And if it's successful, it will open the door to future events."

He's shown a big trust in me to get the crowd in. We've guaranteed that it's going to be a big success — and a lot of fun. We're expecting a full house."

"Good music," said Martone, "good food and good company."

"We're going to entertain our families. And there may be a few surprise guests in the show."

Martone added, "We have a professional accountant, Paul Johnson. We have a really talented group, and we work very well together. Do you realize that between the four of us, we have done over 100 musicals? We're trying to become familiar and as well as some people don't know. There are many great songs and musicals that we'd like to bring to the public."

"We wanted to do it in front of our own family," she said. "We want to start here, kick it up and bring it to New York."

The entertainers expect to be entertaining a crowd of 200 to 250 people at one show. And almost half of the tickets are already gone.

"People will say, 'I did it. I did it.' I look for them to be great compliments. Now we're growing as performers, as professionals, and we're bringing back to show a product of our hard work over the last few years."

"I can't believe that we're really doing this work," exclaimed Martone. "It's a gateway to the stars. And if you don't do it right," she stressed.

"Still," said Bock, "to participate and people to do a cabaret show in Union is really an important thing. It's to show they're our friends, and we all have great caliber of talent."

Only 40 minutes have been set for the show. "We have 90 percent of the show right now," said Bock. "We're directing our sets and a lot of songs from our repertoire. We'll be a week rehearsal in CAP 21 Studios in New York, one dress rehearsal, formal outfits with hints of costumes. And we're going to do a tribute to Lord Andrew Lloyd Webber, with excerpts from his shows."

"We're covering a wide space of music," said Martone.

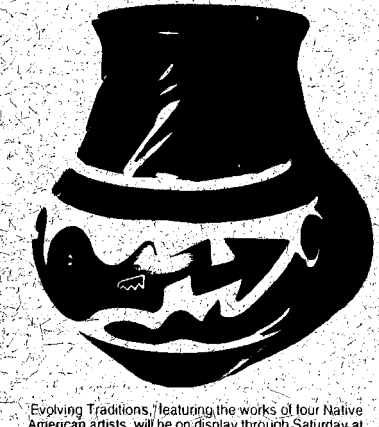

Legislation to limit tier-rating increases for non-at-fault accidents

A bill requiring automobile insurance carriers to explain how new methods of rate-making can be used to raise rates has passed the Democratic Conference. Legislator Anthony Imperato, and Assembly Deputy Minority Leader Neil M. Cohen have introduced legislation that would prohibit insurance companies when a driver is involved in a fault-free accident.

The tier-rating method of assigning auto insurance premiums was established by the Republican-controlled Legislature in 1991. It was part of the 40 percent rate cut and reform package, passed in 1991. The tier-rating system, which only effects the portion of a driver's rate that is based on the driver's insurance history.

When people are involved in fault-free accidents that were not their fault, asked Imperato, "Do you know that bill would address a glaring inequity in our tier-rating system?"

Under the tier-rating system, drivers are grouped into tiers. Drivers with higher tier rates pay more for their insurance. Some companies offer as many as 13 tiers and corresponding rates, while others have only one. Industry officials estimated that about 40 percent of the state's drivers would see their rates increase under this system.

A problem in tier-rating rates is that drivers with as many as six motor vehicle liability claims in the last 10 years can be placed in the same rating tier as a driver with only one claim during that period.

"Prioritizing policy holders with good driving records is ludicrous," said Cohen. "It's unfair to place a driver with a clean record in the same tier as a driver with a poor record and taking away both the other's."

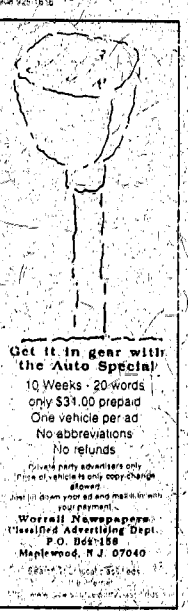
