New corrections hires aim to combat overtime pay

Director James Coleman, conducted a staffing analysis last fall which produced the figure of 40 officers. Over the past five years, Salemme said the jail has consistently been nine officers short of. The additional 31 officers would bring the change to an optimum total of 330.

officers would bring the change to an optimum total of 330.

As it sands now, the jail director, Salemme said, must fill 21 posts every day using overtime, before any yearation or sick time is accounted for. The county jail, which opened in 1990, has a capacity of 1.495 immates. As of Monday, there were 1.361 immates.

Paying the salaries and benefits for 40 new officers. Salemme said, will be less expensive than expanding the overtime pay. The average corrections officer earns \$52 to \$34 per hour for, overtime, time-and-a-half, versus a new hire who would earn \$13 or \$14 an hour.

tions with the union representing cor-rections officers, PBA Local 199. The average salary for a corrections offic-er is approximately \$45,000 white the starting salary in \$25,000. The maxi-mum salary on the scale is \$51,545. however there are officers who doubted that salary last year thanks to overtime.

The tumover in corrections officers is high. Five officers who worked at the jail less than a year recently left after being hired by the Elizabeth Police Department.

Training the officers can cost between \$8,000 and \$9,000, according to Coleman. The topics in training corrections offers may be the same as police officers but the applications are different, he said. "Police officers don't work in jails and corrections officers don't work in ears."

County Manager Michael Lapolla said overtime pay will be high any time there are facilities that must be

manned 24 hours a day, seven days a week such as the jail. "These aren't jobs people get in line to pick. There are no holidays, no anythine."

Other county facilities that require 24-hour staffing are Runnells Special-ized Hospital in Berkeley Heights and the George W. Herlich Juvenile Detention Center on the seventh floor of the Courthouse Annex.

Overtime at Runnells Hospital typi-cally reaches \$1.5 million annually, based on the past several county-budgets. The detention center is oper-ated by the Department of Human. Services and houses juveniles who have been arrest on serious delinquency charges. The Division of Youth Services spent about \$590,000 in 1999 in overtime pay and has budgeted \$620,000 in 2000.

Park supervisors have new deal through 2000 Rank-and-file go to fact-finder

Supervisors will receive a \$300 bonus in the first year, not on the base salary, according to Salemme. They also are eligible to gat a \$500 bonus in years two and drare if they receive an outstanding performance evaluation performance evaluation. Union members believe the fairest Union members bolieve the laitest method for all employees is percentage raises versus flat wage increases. Members are clamoring for increases closer to what other unions, as well as freeholders and department heads, received: between 3 and 4 percent.



Then there's the quiet, ever-calculating 25-year-old Einstein, marvelously portrayed by Terrence Burnette. In its wildest imaginations, the audience can truly picture Einstein looking and thinking like this back in 1904, just like Martin has created him.

The others, all strong individual characters, include Paul Whelihan as Freddy, the owner and barender of the Lapin Agite, Goorge Cavey, wonderful as the handsome Gaston, an older man, who after every intelligent or funny statement, and a drink, must run to the men's froom; Jackie Neill, deep and compodie at the same time, who plays Germaine, a waitress and Freddy's girlfriend; John Martello, who, gives an exceptional performance and control of the cont who gives an exceptional perfor-mance as Sagot, Picasso's art dealer;

Ian August, who stumbles around the stage as a strange young man, Charles Dabernow Schmendiman; and, of course, Ray Mogenis, who entertains the audience as a visitor from the 20th century, who resembles Elvis Presley

One of the most impressive performances given by an actress in three roles is offered by Leonora Gershman, who is Suzanne, at 19, in love with Picasso: The Countess, and a female admirer. She actually looks like three different people. Amazing!

This is not an easy play to direct, and Loewy, who has had years of experience in this field, and who also is the producer and founder of the Forum Theater Co., has offered a valuable contribution of his talents to "Picasso." With the Forum's ever-faithful Vicki Tripodo, whose talents this time around are dedicated to stage managing, and Herrick Goldman as lighting designer, Frank Knox as set designer, Michael Weeks as sound designer and Harrier Salzman as cos-turne designer, "Picasso at the Lapin Agile" is a direct hit.

The artist, a Union resident and a staff writer for Worrall Community Newspapers, has exhibited at various locations throughout New York City and New Jersey. His works appeared most recently in New York City in group shows at Get Real Art, Caelum group shows at Get Real Art, Caelum Gallery and Knickerbocker Gallery. A one-man show of recent abstract work was held this past November and December at ADP Corporate Headquarters in Roseland.

A self-taught artist, Lugara works in a variety of styles, several of which will be included in the present exhibi-tion. His watercolors — semi-abstract portraits and abstractions — self-assistant color — often give the impression of looking through tinted transparencies. Black lines — applied with an inkdipped twig — jump, twist and cut throughout the various planes of col-or. "Watercolor's a mobile medium," the painter said. "I want the pictures to seem like they're shifting, almost as if they're still wet. I want the viewer to feel a kind of edgy anticipation, as if the picture's going to evolve into something else while they're looking

Lugara's black-and-white works on paper, called "moss drawings," are described by the artist as "skeletons of the watercolors, the framework. There's no color; it's black ink applied to damp watercolor paper. They're all about line and tone - and

Despite the fact that the moss drawings, as "skeletons," appear to pre-date the artist's watercolors, the evodate the artist's watercolors, and lution actually occurred the other way with color and around. "I started with color and eventually squeezed it out," Lugara said.

As for the oils, "the forms are more solid than those in the watercolors or black-and-white drawings. I often leave the forms open-ended in water-based mediums, so they're almost airy. 
