Congestion ahead

An overhead sign on the Park way just before the Union toll blinks "Congestion ahead, be alert." From an expansive state report "Achieving Genuine Prosperity," a Port Authority report called "Access to the Region's Care," to a campaign of the Tri-State Transportation group, the conclusions are that congestion is bad, getting worse and the solutions are costly.

The math is pretty depressing. The City of New York Department of Transportation estimates the Lincoln and Holland tunnels will each see an additional 4,000 more trips this year. The George Washington Bridge will have an increase of 14,000 more trips. More locally, have you driven on Morris or Westfield avenues recently?

Left Out

Saul Fenster, the scholarly president of NIIT, spoke about the cost of solving the problem last week. His approach was simple, clear, but still painful. The essence of his message is that we have a need to address the problem, and a responsibility to the next generation if we hope to have any sembalance of a transportation infrastructure.

OK, anybody who gets in his car in the county knows there is a problem. On balance some state and county officials are meeting the problem and doing something about it. Maybe the least understood and key element is the movement of freight through our county on the way to New York. It is estimated that only 3 percent of the area's freight is delivered by rail.

Last week at a transportation summit sponsored by the New Jersey Alliance for Action, both our U.S. senators, Robert Torricelli and Jon Corzine, sent out support for a \$5-billion rail tunnel to New York under the Hudson River for freight and passenger service. Corzine called it the "number-one priority." Torricelli predicted "it's going to happen."

The long-term gain in the reduction of costs in items like food and services make the project available. But the negative side is that the project will take 10 years to complete, once it actually gets started.

To their credit the freeholders have done a good job in keeping transit issues on the front burner. Freeholder Mary Ruotolo noted "by initiating a five-year,

\$10-million improvement program, we are making county roads safer and more efficient." She points to the bridge repair work the county has undertaken.

On the longer term plan, she said, "we have encouraged development in the county's urban and industrial care, through Brownfields assistance and economic development grants. This means development where we have existing highways and rail and bus See TIME, Page B2

Law enforcement to track investigative data Traffic stops to document race, age, gender

Local and county authorities in Union County will soon be documenting the age, race and gender of everyone stopped for motor vehicle violations or detained for criminal investigative reasons. The new Union County Traffic Stops and Investigatory Detention Policy, adopted last week by the Union County Police Chiefs Association and Sheriff's Office and unveiled Monday, seeks to maintain and foster public confidence in how people are stopped or searched. The policy will take effect July 1.

Officials believe the policy is a first of its kind in New Jersey, where racial profiling has become an issue at the state level the past several years. The State Police have been accused of racial profiling, the practice of targeting motorists based on their ethnicity or race.

The policy requires certain data by recorded in motor vehicle stops but also any other street detention and/or investigation, Manahan said. He stressed that the policy goes well beyond just traffic stops and is not just limited to race. Authorities also will document ethnicity and national origin as well as the name and badge number of the officer initiating the stop or search, the reason for it, and the result, if any.

"We made it a broad policy because we believe it is important that all our citizens in Union County feel they will receive equal protection under the law," Manahan said.

The policy also calls for monthly data collection to be monitored locally and results on a quarterly basis reviewed by the prosecutor. To the extent provided by the law, the prosecutor said, the data will be public.

"I hope to find that there isn't a problem in

Union County," Manahan said, "but if there is we won't run from it, we will deal with it. When dealing with the confidence of the public in law enforcement, you can't rely on what you intend

"We don't claim this to be an all-inclusive policy. If it falls short of its goal, we must ensure we'll alter it."

If unequal treatment by law enforcement is revealed, the prosecutor said "we must ferret it out," and those responsible will be reprimanded.

Local legislative representatives hailed the new policy as a step in the right direction and one voluntarily taken in Union County as opposed to the state level where a federal consent decree was necessary.

"Without any coercion, this office has taken the initiative that can serve as an example for all of New Jersey," said Assemblyman William Payne, D-Essex, among the most outspoken critics in the Legislature. Payne's district includes Hillside.

"We must make sure the public feels this policy makes everyone feel comfortable," said Assemblyman Gerald Green, D-Union, whose district represents Plainfield.

"We're not only talking about racial profiling. At the end of the day, if law enforcement treats everyone equally, people will have confidence in them."

To fully implement the policy, Manahan said the program will require funding, primarily for computer programs so "each jurisdiction can apply the policy consistently" and in a uniform manner. Estimates on how much funding were unavailable. A mandatory training program also will be implemented for law enforcement

Newest judge seated to bench in Union County

Joseph P. Donohue didn't win the "Definition Derby" in the Essex County Prosecutor's Office, so he'll have to settle for being Union County's newest judge of the Superior Court of New Jersey.

Formerly the deputy first/chief assistant prosecutor for the Essex County Prosecutor's Office since 1997, Donohue was sworn in during a ceremony May 15 at the Union County Courthouse. He is the second judge to take the bench in Union County in as many weeks. Joseph P. Perfilio of Scotch Plains was sworn

Donohue and Perfilio fill vacancies created by the retirements of judges John Boyle and Leonard Sachar, respectively. Donohue was assigned to the Family Division and Perfilio to the Special Civil Division. Superior Court judges earn an annual salary of \$133,330.

Hilary Brunell, executive assistant prosecutor in the Essex County Prosecutor's Office, was sworn in as an assistant prosecutor in 1979 with Donohue. She recalled the many years they worked together in the office, including the various informal contests within the office, which Donohue usually won: the rhyme contest, where he was the only one to rhyme Acting Essex Prosecutor Donald Campolo's last name with Ayatollah; and the pink shirt contest, as he was the only one to come to the office wearing one.

He would have won the "Definition Derby," Brunell said, "had it not been for a ringer with a degree in Russian literature."

But seriously, Donohue became the "go-to guy" in the office, she said, and "shares a legacy with great lawyers" who have come through the Essex office. "His sense of fairness, judgment and leadership will serve him well" as a judge. "This is the final stop on the Joseph Donohue judicial campaign and road

show," brother Tim said as he opened his remarks, a lengthy barrage of barbs on the new judge. "Growing up in Vailsburg we could have said he was destined for greatness; but that wouldn't be true." Following several more playful jokes about the new judge, Tim got serious and said his brother will serve Union County well as its newest member of the bench.

Donohue expressed his gratitude to State Sen. Raymond Lesniak, D-Union. who presented his judicial nomination to Acting Gov. Donald DiFrancesco, and

his brother-in-law Joseph Cryan, who introduced him to Lesniak. He also thanked his family, who was in attendance, including mother Winifred, brother James, wife Cissy and son Joseph, a freshman at George Washington University.

Cryan also is the municipal Democratic chairman in Union and his father, John, was Essex County sheriff for many years. It was John Cryan who first gave Donohue a job in the Sheriff's Office while he attended law school. "John Cryan gave me a job. Out of that I made a career."

UCREHC lawsuit settled

A settlement reached between the Union County Regional Environmental Health Commission and the County of Union calls for the assets of the health commission to be split up, with participating towns dividing threequarters of the remaining assets and the county receiving the remaining quarter.

The crux of the lawsuit, filed in July 2000 by Union County, was whether UCREHC was an agency of the county or an autonomous body. The county had sued UCREHC for equipment and funds it believed belonged to the county.

According to a Feb. 14 consent order filed in Union County Superior Court and ratified by the Board of Chosen Freeholders last week, the Township of Union will receive the largest share, 19.68 percent, of the approximately \$325,000 remaining in the commission's cash management and the \$102,000 remaining in the checking account. About \$9,500 derived from the sale of the commission's assets will be divided equally among the 18 member towns.

Clark will get 10.21 percent followed by Hillside, 9.34 percent; Cranford, 7.22 percent; Kenilworth, 6.69 percent; Springfield, 5.97 percent; Summit, 5.81 percent; Plainfield, 5.77 percent; Rahway, 5.57 percent; Roselle, 4.18 percent; New Providence, 3.97 percent; Westfield, 2.89 percent; Mountainside, 2.79 percent; Roselle Park, 2.78 percent; Berkeley Heights, 2.42 percent; Scotch Plains, 2.18 percent; Garwood, 1.88 percent, and Fanwood, 0.72 percent.

Elizabeth is not a member of the commission and Winfield does not have facilities for source registration while Linden does not participate.

The funds distributed to local boards of health will be placed in special municipal trust accounts to be used solely for duties connected to the performance of functions and responsibilities under the County Environmental Health Act.

Cranford Health Officer Warren Hehl, the current UCREHC chairman, said the peaceful settlement was best for both sides. "We didn't want to

Senior coalition gets ball rolling on reform

Editor's note: This is the first of three parts. Of every \$1 in taxes collected at the state and local level, 40 cents comes from property taxes, slightly less than 20 cents from income taxes, a little more than 20 cents from the sales tax and about 20

cents from various other taxes and fees in the state. That's how Judith Cambria, an education and fiscal policy expert for the League of Women Voters and a staff member of New Jersey Policy Perspective, explains the state's overreliance on property taxes. Overall, New Jersey collects \$35 billion annually in taxes, with \$14 billion generated from

property taxes. Cambria and Henry Coleman, director of The Center for Government Services at Rutgers University's Edward J. Bloustein School of Planning and Public Policy, were the guest speakers for "Property Tax Reform: Making It Fair and Affordable," a public forum at the Township of Union Senior Center, sponsored by the Senior-Legislative-Issues Coalition of Union County on May 9 public forum.

The coalition includes the AARP, New Jersey Citizen Action, the Older Women's League, the NAACP and the Union County Minority Task Force on Aging.

Bob Wolfenbarger, a member of the coalition and past president of the Summit Taxpayers Association, said the forum is the first nonpartisan, grass roots attempt to address property tax reform in New Jersey. Following last week's forum the coalition organized a letter-writing campaign to state representatives.

The income tax is based on one's ability to pay, however, the property tax, Cambria said, is paid regardless of one's ability to pay.

She presented a chart to illustrate how the burden

of property tax outweighs that of the income tax. For a property valued at \$50,000, taking into account a state average tax rate of \$2.40 per \$100 of assessed value, a property owner would pay \$1,200. A person with \$50,000 in taxable income would pay \$805 in income tax. A slightly higher tax rate of \$3.50 would yield \$1,750 in property taxes while a lower rate of \$1.50 would call for \$750.

Tax rates vary from town to town, Coleman said, with significant disparities. There are lows of 50 cents to highs of \$12 with urban areas generally well in excess of \$3 to \$4 per \$100 of assessed value. Tax rates have "profound implications" in New Jersey. If a business owner wants to relocate, it's obvious, he said, one would choose the town with a lower tax rate.

The average home in New Jersey pays annual property taxes of \$4,427.

(Continued from Page B1) exhaust county funds and waste the commission's money" on legal expenses. "It's counterproductive and not fair to the residents in the 21 municipalities of the county."

In 1998, when the freeholders decided to take over the commission's duties, several municipalities passed resolutions asking the board to continue the same services that UCREHC provided without county tax increases or additional fees. All 21 towns had direct representation on UCREHC's Board of Commissioners.

The Union County Regional Environmental Health Commission, its powers, duties and employees were passed to the Office of Environmental Health within the county Bureau of Environmental Affairs. A listing in the county directory now appears as the Bureau of Environmental Enforcement.

UCREHC, formed in 1985, was the leading agency in environmental health programs, responsible for programs controlling air, noise and water pollution, and solid waste such as garbage and hazardous substances. The commission acted as an agent for the DEP, conducting facility inspections, investigating complaints and responding to emergencies. It was an autonomous agency, controlled by a 21-member Board of Commissioners.

UCREHC's budget was approximately \$400,000 - \$135,000 of which came from the state Department of Environmental Protection for six full-time employees.

In fact, the ambitious, hard-working 22-year-old, who appeared in all the musicals during his years at Union High School, and who will be graduating this year from the School of Visual Arts in New York City, had his "The Man Who Knew Belle Starr" in competition last week at the Dusty Film Festival, Clearview's 59th Street East Theater, in Manhattan.

The short film modern-day suspense drama, based on a short story by Richard Bausch, also was shown at the Dusty Film Awards Ceremony on May 17 at the Ziegfield Theater on Broadway. It was seen by producers, directors, cable and internet programmers, festival directors and key industrial people.

Basile explained that this is his thesis this year as an SVA film student. He is working toward a bachelor of arts degree with a major in directing and has completed 114 credits. He carries a grade point average of 3.71.

He has directed, produced and written "The Man Who Knew Belle Starr," among many other short films, including "The Adventures of Captain Steel," "Baby Bambino," "The Crypt of Terror," "Rendez-vous," which won the 1997 Film Festival Award, and the futuristic thriller, "Beyond Dreams," which was entered in the regional finals for the student Academy Award.

Basile also produced two commercials for the Fox News Channel and has worked in production on such major motion pictures as "Scout's Honor" with Bill Murray and Alec Baldwin, "Just the Ticket" with Andy Garcia and Andie McDowell, and "15 Minutes" with Robert DeNiro and Edward Burns.

"I had been making short films since I was 12 years old," said Basile. "I used to use my father's home film camera, first on 8 millimeter and then the home video."

"When I was in the fourth or fifth grade in Union, I would film little horror movies and comedies. And I used to show them to Yvonne Rago, and she would let me have screenings after school. On the last day of school, one year, I showed a short film called 'Crypt of Terror,' which ran about 20 minutes, and featured most of the kids from Union High School."

Basile mentioned that his current film, "The Man Who Knew Belle Starr," which stars Beau Bernarda, Allison Crosby as Belle Starr, and Victor Argo, has local people in the crew. Kevin Glackin of Union also serves as producer, Lauren Monto of Union, helped write the screenplay, and Cindy Lahiff of Westfield is the costume designer.

He said his best work is in doing science fiction short films. "I love them," Basile said. "All of my science fiction films were done for the Visual Arts School. It really depended on how creative you were. I remember, around the house I would build small models and used a lot of camera effects. My friend from art school would work on the models with me."

"For one movie, we built a castle using the inside of a washing machine and added model parts onto it. We wired Christmas lights on the inside, so it looked like lights coming out of the castle. We also used shish kabob sticks for lightning rods atop the castle, and painted all of this. This was for 'The Adventures of Captain Steel.' It was a sort of homage to the 'Flash Gordon' scenes," he said.

"I have always loved movies and storytelling," said Basile, "and I guess I always felt that one of the most collaborative experiences was working on movies to tell short stories. My film, 'Beyond Dreams,' is currently entered in

the Student Academy Awards in Los Angeles. If it wins a Student Academy Award, it is eligible to be nominated for a short film Oscar."

"Eventually, I'd like to work on feature films," Basile said. "The first story I'm adapting will have my own screenplay, and it is called 'The Sun Shines in New Jersey.' It is a comedy about a family in New Jersey, but it is still in rough stages. It won't be ready for a number of

"Right now," he said, "I know quite a few film people in New York and will be working on a production on feature filming in New York or TV."

"You know what I'd really like to do? I would like to adapt the script of Candy Capanegro's horror novel, 'The Breeze Horror.' She has been my mentor for years. And we're discussing turning that into a full-length feature."

The young, ambitious man smiled confidently. "Now, all I have to do is talk her into it. Wouldn't it be great?"

There's a first time for everything, and the Paper Mill Playhouse in Millburn has proved that "a first time" can turn out to be a success. For the theater's Humanitarian Series' symposium on "Funny Girl," May 8, Bob Dorian served as host of "Florenz Ziegfeld and His 'Follies,' " and introduced the classic 1936 fulllength film, "The Great Ziegfeld," on a big screen on stage. Dorian went on to discuss the history of films, and he accredited New Jersey as a great part of the beginnings of the movies - such as Thomas Edison, who invented the motion picture, and the silent film, "Perils of Pauline," which was filmed in Englewood Cliffs.





Broadway's Majestic Theatre on April 19, 1945. Directed by Rouben Mamoulian and choreographed by Agnes de Mille, starring John Raitt and Jan Clayton, "Carousel" ran in New York for a total of 890 performances, winning both the Donaldson and New York Drama Critics Circle Award for Best Musical. It was revived in New York in 1954 and

1957, at City Center. In 1966, Rodgers produced a Music Theater of Lincoln Center production that again starred John Raitt. Gordon MacRae and Shirley Jones starred in the 1955 film version. In 1994, Lincoln Center Theater, in conjunction with England's Royal National Theatre and Cameron Mackintosh, presented a critically acclaimed production that won five Tony Awards including Best Musical Revival.

The original Broadway production of Carousel featured more wonderful dances by de Mille, following her success with "Oklahoma!" The first musical number written for "Carousel" was the "Soliloquy." 

Local record show unearths old LPs

Most people haven't really thought about what happened to those millions of records and LPs printed from the early '50s on. Were they thrown out? Stashed in attics? Do people care? There are many people who do care, and they can be found browsing through thousands of vinyl "platters" at record shows.

Compact discs debuted in the early '80s and less than 10 years later, record sales had dwindled to a mere trickle. Or had they? Club DJs are constantly searching for fresh grooves on vinyl for their mixes. Record collectors, those purists on the prowl for gem mint LPs and covers, never went away.

Lately, a crop of popular television shows that focus on antiques and collectibles and their potential value has rekindled interest in all things "old," including that box of LPs and 45s hidden at the back of the closet. One place where all of these collectors converge is at record shows, such as the one being held at the Holiday Inn on Route 22 West in Springfield on June 10.

"The show is just as popular as the first day it was held in this location, almost 10 years ago. That's due do the diversity of items available - it ranges from '50s rock and jazz LPs to '60s/'70s soul to brand-new CDs, music collectables, videos — all kinds of music-related items are here," said Dave Lenz, the show's promoter, who has over 20 years' experience in the retail music business.

"Really, vinyl is just as hot as ever. Maybe more so, as people in their 20s are 'discovering' the old record player stuck in a corner of the closet and realizing that instead of paying \$15 to \$20 for a new CD, they can pick up maybe a dozen LPs for the same money. That, and the fact that quite a few small independent record stores have closed their doors means that record shows are one of the few places to find records."

Aithough music videos, CDs and tapes abound at record shows, at cut-rate prices, the main thrust is records - affordable LPs, rare 45s and unusual albums.

Online auctions, a popular aspect of the computer age, can drive prices higher than most would want to pay. At record shows, you can actually see the item you want to buy, a key factor with older records. The shows are an amalgamation of many music vendors in one room competing with each other, giving collectors more clout and giving browsers the opportunity to pick up music treasures at rock bottom prices. The environment is also ripe for selling those records gathering dust in the closet.

The Greater New Jersey Record Show will be June 10 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Holiday Inn, Route 22 West, Springfield. Admission for adults is \$5, seniors \$3, and kids under 12 are admitted free.

Children's touring theater to visit Union County Arts Center again

Missoula Children's Theatre will be visiting the Union County Arts Center in Rahway for the sixth straight year in July.

Missoula Children's Theatre offers a unique experience for area children to participate in the production of a live performance. Based in Missoula, Mont., MCT is the nation's largest touring children's theater and has been touring extensively for 29 years.



Changes to Ford's Lightning are shocking, but appreciable

A little more power, a little better burnouts, a handful of body style tweaks - and the 2001 SVT Lightning is different from the 2000 model.

The most appreciable change, though, was a little switch to Bilstein shock absorbers.

Ford's Special Vehicle Team has a simple mission statement: "We polish the Ford oval." And, that they do with performance, substance, exclusivity and value, said SVT chief John Coletti. "We're not building garage queens," he said.

As obvious as the power is the value. The asking price of \$32,300 includes most of the important comfort and convenience features. The only factory option is a soft tonneau cover for \$150.

The Lightning is built from a regular cab F-150 pickup and perked up with a supercharged 5.4 liter V-8, the bigger four-wheel disc brakes from the Super Duty F-Series and a lowered and firmed up suspension.

The 2001 model is credited with 380 horsepower and 450 foot-pounds of torque. That's 20 more hp than the 2000 and a boost of 10 in the torque field.

It is — almost — an obscene amount of power. By comparison, the Corvette has 350 hp and 360 footpounds of torque. The 10-cylinder Dodge Viper pulls 450/460.

More horsepower is always appreciated by the muscle-car - or truck - enthusiast, but controlling 360 or 380 horsepower is almost irrelevant if you can't hold the truck to the road. That's where the Bilsteins make history for this truck.

On a recent media preview, I tested both years of Lightnings. Moving from the 2001 model to 2000 the difference was jarring - literally.

Within minutes of driving last year's truck, I could feel the difference. There was greater sensitivity to road surfaces and more jiggle and jolt.

Not that the 2000 was a buckboard, but the Bilsteins give more compliance questbumps and trimmed the wheel hop at highway speeds and in Lightning and Cobra includes the use comering.

Switching to the monotube gascharged Bilsteins is a simple upgrade for owners of older Lightnings.

Tires, too, are important in harnessing horsepower, and new for 2001 is the next generation of rubber compound in the Goodyear Eagle F1-GS

Unencumbered by traction control or an electronic stability program, the Lightning is the burn-out king. When driving it through a slalom course, it's a challenge not to break the tires loose.

And it's a great show for cruise night. Step lightly on the brake and heavily on the throttle and the gravitational churn of the torque easily breaks fat Goodyear F1s loose and spins up great clouds of white smoke.

On the rural test drive, I knew I was going the right way when I pulled up to an intersection and there was a dissipating cloud of tire smoke from the previous Lightning whose driver couldn't resist frying the hides.

Acceleration and horsepower are key bragging rights to SVT ownership. And to boost the 0-60 times, the engineers replaced the 3.55:1 rear gear set with a 3.73. The The SVT Mustang Cobra needs this rear-end, too, but would come at the expense of a gas-guzzler tax.

The "shorter" and therefore more aggressive gearing improved 0-60 performance from 6.2 to 5.8 seconds. To help hold it all together, the drive shaft was beefed up from 3.5-inch steel to 4.5-inch aluminum.

Inside, the Lightning has a suitable high-performance appearance with all the expected conveniences of a \$30,000 vehicle, including the black textured leather seats with graphite gray cloth trim, 40/60 split bench seat and white-faced gauges.





Acura takes its time dressing the MDX sport-utility vehicle

There can be an advantage to coming late to the party.

If any proof of this is needed, just check out Acura's new MDX sportutility vehicle.

By being the latest — and hopefully one of the last — to arrive in the now-crowded upscale SUV segment, Acura was first able to see what everyone else was offering.

Then, their designers were able to shape their objectives accordingly. Acura's goal? Meet or exceed the bench marks established by everything else that's already in the marketplace.

How well did they do?

Well, getting auto writers to agree on anything is about as difficult as teaching synchronized swimming to cats. But for some reason — actually many reasons — this is one mall-terrain vehicle the critics generally rave about.

Media people at this year's North American International Auto Show in Detroit picked the MDX as "Truck of the Year." Yes — we know it's not really a truck. But, the writers' "Car of the Year" choice was the PT Cruiser, which by federal definition is a truck.

Most buying guides rate the MDX a Best Buy. And recently, Car and Driver magazine selected the MDX as the winner of what it called a "Designer Sport Ute Smackdown" — a head-to-head comparo against seven competitive models — manufacturers of an additional three possible models failed to send a candidate for evaluation.

The MDX was rated Best Overall in four of 11 evaluation criteria—i.e., engine, ride, fit and finish, and value—and tied or near the top in six others.

In fact, the only area in which it was found to be wanting was off-road capability. And Acura plainly states it aimed to build only medium-duty off-highway prowess into the MDX.

More than adequate, it is, for the Soccer Mom Decathlon, the mall parking agility test, the shopping cart torture test, the parking structure autocross, the school zone speed bump enduro and the Campfire Girl/Cub Scout interior volume cram.

Acura built the MDX on a firm, albeit car-based, foundation, using a highly modified Honda Odyssey minivan platform as its starting point.

The MDX is also built in the same busy Ontario, Canada plant as the hotselling Odyssey.

From there, engineers bolted on very proficient independent front and rear suspensions and something called Variable Torque Management, a four-wheel-drive system that is compact, lightweight and efficient.

In normal conditions, the VTM-4 system operates in front-wheel-drive configuration; torque distribution to the rear wheels occurs only when slippage is detected.

Acura says the MDX was designed more to defeat winter than to defeat Baja; a reasonably practical objective, considering its likely uses.

Power comes from Acura's 24-valve 3.5-liter SOHC V-6 with variable valve timing, another component shared with the Odyssey. In MDX trim, this 240-horsepower engine churns out 245 foot-pounds of torque, starting at 3000 rpm.

Fuel economy ratings are 17/23, although we did not average that well in our week-long test.

And, while it needs premium unleaded to perform, it does meet ultra-low vehicle emissions standards in all 50 states — rare indeed, for any SUV. A 2,000-pound towing capacity is listed as standard, but Acura claims

the MDX can pull a 3,500-pound trailer or a 4,500-pound boat.

Unladen, expect 0-60 times near 8.4 seconds — significantly better than anything comparable in its class; the V-6 BMW X5 is next at 8.7.

Braking from 70-0 is a relatively mid-pack 205 feet (compared to the BMW's 177 feet), but the four-channel, four-wheel disc ABS system resists fade, even under heavy loads.

Ergonomically, the MDX shines with three-row, seven-passenger seating, which only the Mitsubishi Montero Limited or Mercury Mountaineer can match in this class.

The value quotient of the \$34,370 base-priced MDX is pumped up with such standard equipment as air conditioning, leather-trimmed power (and heated) seats and a power moon roof.

Even fully loaded at \$39,450 (with a Touring Package and a Navigation System), the MDX is two grand less than a comparably equipped Lexus RX 300, four-thousand less than a Mercedes-Benz ML320, and \$8K under a BMW X5 3.0i.

And the MDX is arguably more vehicle for less money — longer, wider and bigger inside,

In fact, with its five rear seats folded flush into the floor, which they do quite nicely, the MDX offers an

unbeatable 82 cubic feet of cargo room — gobbling up such essentials as a 4-by-8 sheet of plywood, a 130-inch section of pipe and 34 cases of beer. Don't ask why auto writers measure such things, but they do.

We drove the MDX first, then read what everyone else had to say about it. Generally, other writers seemed more impressed than we were. Hmm. How could this be? Did we miss something?

So, we went back and drove it again. This time, armed with others' comments to evaluate, we had to agree with most of their assessments. The MDX is a winner, even if its virtues sort of sneak' up on you.

That said, we still have some nitpicks. It didn't get the advertised fuel mileage, which, combined with its need for premium fuel, pushed operating costs relatively high, in our view.

The gorgeous seats in our test vehicle were leather-trimmed, which meant they had leather surfaces, for the most part. And they were hard and uncomfortable, despite all kinds of power yin and yang and lumbar tweaks.

All three of our test drivers, ranging from 5-foot-2 to 6 feet, felt they sat up too high, and couldn't scrunch down into the seat cushion enough to enjoy

the seemingly adequate thigh bolsters. It had a wimpy dead pedal, misplaced for our left feet.

We kept wondering why it had 10 cup holders for seven seats, until someone suggested upscale occupants want room for their Evian bottles and a latte travel mug.

We also found the optional \$2,000 nav system entertaining, but probably for unintended reasons. The interface was fun and invited use more than some others we've seen, but the routes the computer picked were all too often nowhere near the shortest.

It easily got its circuits in an uproar when we went "off-route" — even in parking lots, driveways and alleys. It refused to recognize a surprising number of major roads as existing at all.

And if we ignored its directions, and went the way we knew was best, the system's voice, an annoying, high-pitched one, kept arguing with us that we were going the wrong way.

Other than that, however, the MDX didn't leave us with much to do, except enjoy it. Unlike Acura's earlier, ill-advised venture into the SUV ranks, the SLX, which was essentially a re-badged Izusu Trooper, the MDX is worthy of the Acura name.

Given the company's otherwise well-deserved and hard-earned reputation for reliability, quality and value retention, the MDX is easy to recommend.



Beware! The battery can jump-start you

Did you know that the little black box under your hood called a battery. releases more amperage than most of you even have available to your house? That's right, your house likely has a 100-amp service. Yet, if you have a V6 or V8 engine in your car, it will require about 125 amps just to crank your engine. If you don't believe me, just look at the diameter (gauge) of the battery cable under your hood. It's twice as big as the wires coming to your house!

It's amazing that you can get all that energy from a chemical reaction occurring inside that little black box. But, along with that chemical reaction you get something else: hydrogen vapors. Do you remember the Hindenburg? No. I don't mean you're that old. You probably heard about it from your parents or grandparents, right? Well, let me refresh your memory. Apparently a static electrical spark was all that was needed to ignite the hydrogen vapors that the Hindenburg used to stay afloat.

These same explosive vapors are present anytime your battery charges or discharges. And all it takes is a little spark to ignite those fumes and cause an explosion. Your battery contains sulfuric acid and water. During the chemical action created during charging or discharging, hydrogen vapors are released and then are trapped under the hood.

So, there you are in the parking lot, a damsel in distress has left her lights on, running down the battery. Being a Good Samaritan, you offer to jumpstart her car. You pull out the jumper cables from your trunk and open up the hood of her car.

Stop!

Before you hook those cables up, let those hydrogen fumes out. Create a breeze by waving your hands around or something. Next hook up the jumper cable to her positive battery terminal first — then to your positive cables terminal. Next hook up the jumper cable to your negative battery terminal and then (now pay attention) to her car's engine block. Not the battery terminal.

You see, no matter how hard you try to prevent it, the last connection is going to spark! That's because your

battery is stronger than hers. Duh! That's why you're giving her a jump. By hooking up the last connection to the engine block, you move the spark away from the battery and its fumes, reducing the chances of an explosion.

Some people say you should have your car - the good car - running. I usually agree, not for an electrical reason. I just don't want to be stuck there with a dead battery. The biggest concern is making sure you don't accidentally hook up the cables backward. You may not be aware of this - there is no color code for battery cables. Both cables are normally black on modern cars. When you see a red cable it usually means it has been replaced. Which means it could be on the positive or negative terminal. Be careful! Look for the plus or minus symbol stamped on top of the battery.

During my years of working with batteries, I've had at least a half dozen batteries explode on me, some because I was stupid, others because they just didn't like me. Hard to believe, huh? More batteries explode during connecting and disconnecting cables than for any other reason.

So, if you don't want to be the first man or woman on the moon - that was my dad's favorite saying - make sure you don't create any sparks near the battery and its fumes. Listen up, smokers!




