## Voters say yes to referendum

The majority of Springfield residents who turned out for Tuesday's special election voted in favor of the bond referendum for school expansion, a \$19-million spending plan, with a share of nearly \$15 million funded through local taxpayers. Of 2,935 total votes, 1,508 voted in favor of the referendum, while 1,427 voted against it.

Approval of the referendum means that homeowners will pay approximately \$165 per year for 20 years for the average home in Springfield assessed at roughly \$160,000.

"I think that the majority of the people in town recognized that what was in this referendum was educationally sound and needed for the preservation of the quality of the school district," said Superintendent of Schools Walter Mahler.

The state is providing the school system with \$3,948,980, roughly 21 percent, of the total \$18,918,888 expansion project.

"Those who voted no, it's my belief, that they didn't vote no based on what the project included but it was because of the economic situation that the country is in right now," said Mahler. "I can understand their trepidation of increased taxes at a time when the economy is not that strong."

"My feeling is that the people of Springfield appreciated the importance of this vote to the town," said board member Scott Samansky. "They knew that they had to take action to support their kids and the future of this town."

The district immediately will start

working with its architect to develop the detailed drawings that contractors will look at and then bid for the rights to construct the projects.

"Part of the effort in working out the specific plans will also be a phasing of the projects, which ones should come first in the bidding, which ones are going to be the most important to accomplish," said Mahler. "We have a lot of work in the next couple of years."

The projects will not be separated into schools, rather it will be for the type of work.

"When we go out for the new building construction, it will be one bid," said Mahler. "But some of the work having to do with the electrical distribution and some of the repairs to the plumbing or roofing or the windows can be bid separately."

The bidding will begin as soon as the detailed drawings, including all the dimensions of what needs to be replaced, are completed.

"Now we're going to start doing the specs and the plans because we have the OK from the public to go ahead and spend the money," said board member Stephen Fischbein.

"I appreciate all the people who came out to vote," said Board member Robert Fish. "It's an investment in the children's future and the future of the town. The board acted very prudently and responsibly in bringing this to a vote at this time."

As of mid-December, there were 8,980 registered voters in Springfield, which means less than 33 percent of the township's registered voters came out to vote Tuesday.

The Board of Education gathered

together, waiting for the outcome of the vote.

"Everyone was sitting around waiting for the results to be called in," said Mahler. "We were on pins and needles as each voting district came in and they were closer than we had hoped for but in the end we were very thrilled with the results."

The school expansion will result in pre-K through second-graders attending Edward V. Walton School, third through fifth-graders attending both James Caldwell School and Thelma L. Sandmeier School, and sixth through eighth-graders remaining at Florence M. Gaudinier Middle School.

The expansion project is scheduled to be completed for the start of the 2004-05 school year.

"I think the voters understood the need," said Fischbein. "Although it was another expense, they could justify it based on the return of education for the kids."

New construction at Walton will consist of the addition of 23 classrooms, including special-education facilities as well as gifted and talented facilities. An occupational and physical therapy room, as well as the installation of toilets, stairwells, an elevator, storage facilities, and mechanical facilities as dictated by state code, will also be constructed.

Heavy renovations will also be completed at Walton including the conversion of two classrooms to create a library, the conversion of a multipurpose room to create a kitchen, music room, lobby, conference room, toilets, and storage; a renovation of the existing CDT/guidance

## Budget proposals under way

The Mountainside Board of Education again zeroed in on the makings of this year's budget with detailed worksheets for all to follow at Tuesday night's meeting.

Chief School Administrator Gerard Schaller said, "Tonight, with our budget worksheets continuing, we are doing proposals on special areas of the budget."

He said the worksheets are "clearly defined and easy to read; there were yellow summary sheets showing the increases and decreases in the 2003-04 budget as compared to the 2002-03 budget for the following subjects: music, art, world language, physical education, technology, basic skills, computer education, life skills and gifted and talented. Matching worksheets in white showed the actual breakdowns, not just in these categories, but for both Deerfield and Beechwood."

Most areas have increased and one of the reasons for that was that all equipment needed was cut out of this year's budget. We are trying to catch up and replace items, such as cannibalizing computers and only replacing equipment desperately needed," explained Schaller.

He briefly went through all of the areas of special departments. All of the teachers had listed every item they deemed necessary to enhance their subjects in their classrooms. Again, he and other board members cautioned that these lists were all speculative.

The staff is fully aware that we must have to go back and re-examine everything," Schaller said. Board member Frank Geiger said, "Then, what we are seeing here is moving curriculum forward, but if we have to take something out, we will."

"Absolutely," said Schaller, "but actually, there are very few areas of discretionary funds." Most items on the lists had been requested and taken out after last year's budget dispute and subsequent cuts. As an example, one large item under music at Deerfield was a classroom "mini-lab" which includes five desktop computers, one network printer, one network hub, three tables, five chairs and three surge protectors, totaling \$7,287.

Parents and visitors followed along with the two comparison sheets, and had no questions on the listings. Board President Richard Kress gave credit to new Business Administrator/Board Secretary Paul Vecchio, who had prepared much of the preliminary budget worksheet with Schaller.

"Two years from now, we anticipate a huge increase of students based on the growth of our kindergarten population now," said Kress. "Seniors going on to Governor Livingston High School represent a large increase in the budget."

"For each child being sent to the high school, we are paying \$1,250 with our contractual relationship with Berkeley Heights."

"Initially we were not able to determine the cost per pupil, and each year the actual costs have been going down for us. This year, we are getting an increase on a monthly basis, but then there were less students."

The budget is based on the assumption that Beechwood School will be up and running by September but this is still not absolutely certain.

## Township tightens up garbage collection rules

By now, Springfield residents have received the township's new garbage collection schedule in the mail. Monday will be the first day the schedule goes into effect.

Bulk waste collection now will be conducted on a quarterly basis, rather than monthly. Both bulk waste and metal items will be picked up on the same day. The day for collection will either be a Wednesday or a Thursday, depending on a resident's address.

For residents whose weekly trash is collected on Tuesdays and Fridays, bulk collection days will be March 26, June 25, Sept. 24 and Dec. 17.

For residents whose weekly trash is collected on Mondays and Thursdays, bulk collection days will be March 27, June 26, Sept. 25 and Dec. 18.

The township employs a zoning officer who will be ensuring that residents do not put out their bulk waste weeks before it is scheduled to be picked up.

"You have now all received new schedules for bulk waste pickup as well as your trash pickup," said Committeewoman Clara Harelik. "It is very important that you all realize if anybody should put out their bulk waste in advance of the quarterly pickup, then unfortunately we're going to have to send our zoning officer out to ask you to put it back because the bottom line is we don't want this town to look like one big garbage dump."

According to Springfield's Solid Waste Collection Regulations, bulk waste shall not be placed outside for pickup any earlier than 6 p.m. of the day preceding the collection date.

"It is all set out in the tier that has come to you so please read it," Harelik said. "It's very important. We hope that you'll understand that this was done for savings purposes and efficiency."

Bulk waste includes larger household waste, such as ashes, broken crockery, old clothing, used wallpaper, old floor covering, cardboard or containers made of paper, discarded household utilities, discarded furniture and appliances, items that will not be collected and are not considered bulk waste are tires, construction materials and debris, concrete and large rocks, logs with a diameter of more than six inches, recyclables, computer components and video game consoles, and all hazardous waste.

There will be no trash collection on May 26, July 4, Sept. 1, Nov. 27 and Dec. 25.

"It's very important that everybody pay attention," said Harelik. "Your street is listed."

Included in the flier was Springfield's curbside recycling pickup schedule. It is conducted on alternate Thursdays through Feb. 13 and 27, March 13 and 27, April 10 and 24, May 8 and 22, June 5 and 19, July 3, 17 and 31, August 13 and 28, Sept. 11 and 25, Oct. 9 and 23, Nov. 6 and 20, and Dec. 4 and 18.

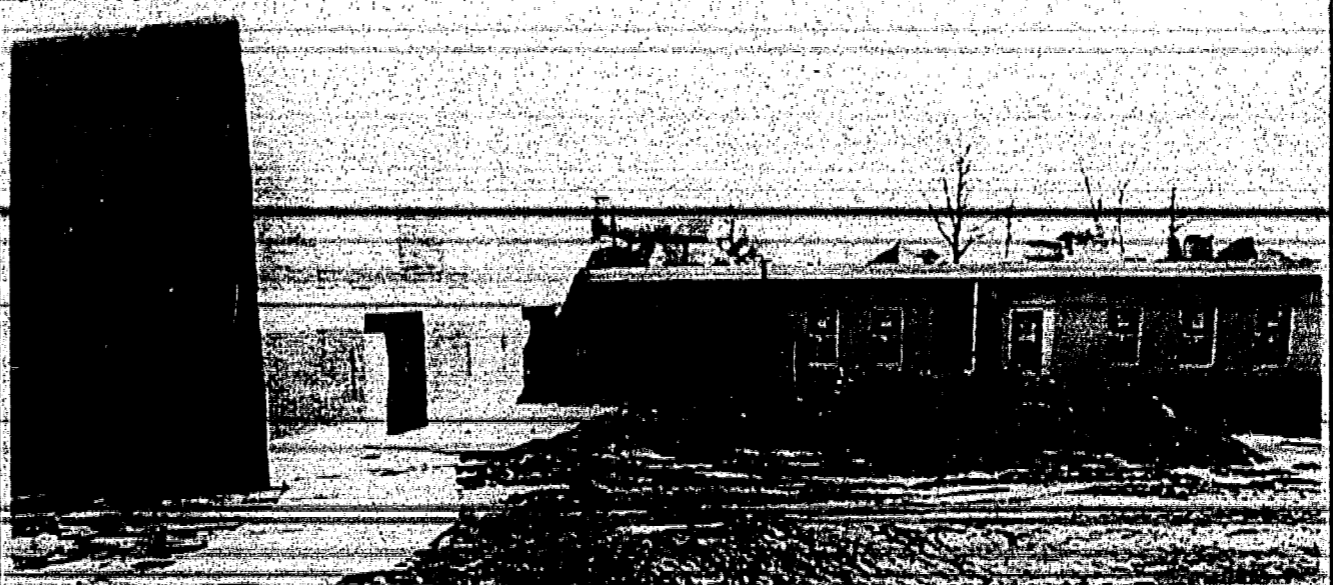

## Council agrees to build restroom facility at school playing field

Mountainside residents won't have to worry about drinking too much Gatorade while playing baseball or softball because the Mountainside Borough Council approved a Capital Improvement Fund of \$70,000 for the construction of a restroom facility at the Deerfield School playing field.

The borough received a \$30,000 Community Development Block Grant to help fund the project.

The new facility will consist of an ADA-compliant men's and women's

restroom and a small storage area for water valves.

The exact location of the restroom will be between the softball field where the girls' and women's league play, and the American Legion field.

Currently, there is a restroom facility on the Deerfield property at the nearby Little League field. However, unless the Little League is playing a game, the restroom is not open.

"If there's no game at that field, then the bathroom is locked," said Recreation Director Susan Wintans.

"As a result there's sometimes soc-

cer games going on over there," said Borough Administrator and Chief of Police James DeBlue. "There's softball games that have nothing to do with Youth Baseball. We need a facility that will be owned by the public and will be open to the public."

Residents using the field prior to the construction of the new bathroom were forced to bang on Deerfield's doors, hoping someone will open them so they could come in and use the restrooms.

"Right now there's not a restroom."

## In anticipation of state aid, board begins budget planning

In anticipation of receiving state aid figures on Feb. 6, the Springfield School District began its budget presentations for the 2003-04 school year.

Superintendent of Schools Walter Mahler said the presentations will enable the district to get its budget in order so the first draft will be into the county office by March 4.

"That doesn't give us a lot of time, when we get our state aid figures, to make any adjustments that are necessary," said Mahler.

Edward V. Walton School, James Caldwell School, Thelma L. Sandmeier School and the Department of Special Services made budget

presentations Monday night. Florence M. Gaudinier Middle School, Jonathan Dayton High School and the Athletic Department are scheduled to make presentations at the Board of Education's next meeting on Monday.

Walton's requested budget for the 2003-04 school year is \$48,161, an increase of \$5,355 over the 2002-03 school budget of \$42,706.

"Our goal this year, as we built our budget was to enhance our existing educational programs for all the students in all the curricular areas," said Walton Principal Lisa Ferrare.

The school's art, computer education, health, music, physical education, co-curricular, guidance, and health student sup-

port subjects requested the same amount of money for 2003-04 as they received in 2002-03. Only pre-K and kindergarten as well as the school office requested increases.

Walton's current enrollment is 293 students in grades pre-K and kindergarten. Next school year's projected enrollment is 300 students.

Caldwell requested the smallest increase for its 2003-04 school year budget, \$227. The school's requested budget totaled \$86,888 while its budget for the 2002-03 school year was \$86,661.

The only increases in Caldwell's requested 2003-04 school budget are in the departments of foreign language, math, science, co-curricular and guidance. Several of Cald-

well's departments requested less money this year than was received for the 2002-03 school year.

Caldwell's current enrollment is 304 students in grades one through four. Next school year's projected enrollment is 312 students.

Sandmeier's requested budget for 2003-04 is \$92,115, an increase of \$1,309 over the 2002-03 school year budget of \$90,806.

The only departments in Sandmeier that requested an increase in the 2003-04 school budget were English, foreign language, science, co-curricular, guidance and educational media. Just like Caldwell, several of Sandmeier's departments requested less money

this year than was received for the 2002-03 school year.

Sandmeier's current enrollment is 324 students in grades one through four. Next school year's projected enrollment is 330 students.

The Department of Special Services requested budget for 2003-04 is \$1,431,446, an increase of \$223,187 over the 2002-03 school year budget of \$1,208,259.

The Department of Special Services teaches students with learning disabilities.

Mahler said the budget for special services as well as the enrollment is the most difficult to project because students with special needs can move into the district at any time and must be provided for.

include storage areas for music and art and a media center with an office, conference room and bathrooms. Renovations at the school will include the conversion of the school library into a music room, the conversion of the present special education room into an art room, and an expansion of the teacher's work room/dining area. Additional parking will be added to the facility, as well as the carpeting of classrooms with loose tiles, and the replacing of the gym floor.

All of Jonathan Day High School's science classrooms will be remodeled, as well as the replacing of boilers and roofing. The electrical service will be upgraded. The auditorium's lighting, carpeting and seating will be improved.

Classroom's four science labs will be renovated, as well as the replacement of all classroom windows. The vice principal's present office bathroom will be converted into an ADA-compliant bathroom. The conversion of a classroom at Caldwell will develop an improved main office, guidance office, counselor and nursing center. Three first floor classrooms will be converted into libraries with the existing library converted into two classrooms.

To accelerate the completion of the construction, the school district will use modular construction rather than traditional on site construction. Modular construction is a design build construction method allowing project completion to occur in two simultaneous building phases. One phase is the actual site development which includes excavation, foundation and site utilities.

The other phase is the building of the structure off-site in an enclosed construction plant. This simultaneous on and off site building reduces the overall project by as much as 50 percent.

This is why Springfield will continue to be a lighthouse district for other towns to emulate. And Fish Creek will allow police officers to view who is entering and exiting the restroom if there is a case of vandalism once the facility is constructed. Phase II of the project will be the cleaning out of the surrounding wooded areas and the building of batting cages for both youth baseball and youth softball. The construction of the batting cages will be funded by the Recreation Department and PAL.

The restrooms are tentatively scheduled to be completed sometime in March.
