

Surface Transportation Board denies rail peti

Efforts to stop trains from running along the Rahway Valley and Staten Island rail lines were dealt a significant setback Tuesday when the federal Surface Transportation Board denied a request to review the reactivation of the railroad.

The STB quashed a petition from Scott Stone, a Washington-based attorney hired by five Union County municipalities, including Springfield, which sought to reverse a July 2002 STB decision granting Morristown & Erie Railway Inc. the rights to operate on the rail lines.

Gordon Fuller, chief operating officer for M&E, said the railway company was pleased

with the decision of the STB.

"This decision clears the way for M&E to begin to open up talks with the communities and set a pace for cooperation between the railway and the residents," Fuller said. "We have been hampered by these lawsuits. Now we can work much better with communities to address any concerns."

The petition that went before the STB, the federal agency that oversees all railroad operations in the continental United States, focused on the environmental impact of the reactivation of the railway and the process the Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders followed to advance the reactivation project.

The petition was the second lawsuit brought against the railroad by five Union

County municipalities: Summit, Springfield, Roselle, Roselle Park and Kenilworth.

The first lawsuit was thrown out by Union County Superior Court Judge Edward Beghin Jr. in December due to jurisdictional issues.

The railroad also runs through Union, Cranford and Linden but these municipalities did not join the litigation to stop the project.

Rail service to these eight county municipalities is scheduled to begin later this year. The first trains will run from M&E's rail operations at the Bayway Refinery in Linden to the junction in Cranford which connects the Staten Island line with cross-country railroads.

M&E is permitted to operate the Staten Island line west of the New Jersey Turnpike

through Linden, Roselle and into Cranford. The STB is also considering a petition from the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey to reactivate the Staten Island rail lines east of the Turnpike from Linden through Elizabeth and crossing the Arthur Kill into the Howland Hook Container Terminal.

The possibility of ocean container freight rolling over the M&E lines raised fears in many of the five municipalities fighting the reactivation.

According to Fuller, the ocean freight was never part of the railway's plan. "Ocean containers coming out of the ports were never in our market plans," Fuller said. "We are focusing on the (Tosco-Bayway) refinery."

With a new day and life approaching by morning, the students could look back at all they've been through, but at the same time, look ahead at what is to come in their lives.

Fearing the return of Mother Nature in the form of more rain, first-year superintendent Michael Davino briefly congratulated his initial class and moved on with the ceremony and presentation of diplomas.

Afterward, Davino said that the class of 2004 was simply filled with very talented kids, and that he is happy to have gotten a chance to serve as their superintendent.

During the interview process, when he was first being considered for the position, Davino said he was very taken by the students' maturity and how responsible they appeared to be.

Davino said that they weren't just talented academically, but in areas such as arts, athletics, acting and performing, as well.

"Dr. Serson did a nice job putting together a memorable graduation," added Davino of the rain-soaked commencement.

As the graduates proceeded to Project Graduation — the after-party chaperoned by parents and faculty within the district — they left their school grounds as a group for one final time.

Whatever paths they may lead and wherever they spend the next phase of their lives, it is certain that the Jonathan Dayton graduates of 2004 will never forget their high school experience, nor their time with one another.

Committee chooses architect for PD redux

After meeting with various architects, Springfield's Township Committee decided on who they thought would be the best fit for the job of renovating the Police Department in Town Hall Monday night, but said they cannot reveal the company name or any details of the cost until negotiations for work are completely finished.

After narrowing the candidates, the Township Committee interviewed the final four. During the interview process, which also included highly ranked members of the Police Department, the committee also viewed conceptual drawings submitted by the architects.

According to Mayor Clara Harelik, prior work of the architects was looked at closely, as part of an all-around reference check. "The architects were given a list of criteria to better understand what was being

looked-for-in-the-renovations. The drawings incorporated the concerns of parking, security and the best use of space.

"We're planning for the future," said Harelik. "We don't want to do this again. Based upon the conceptual drawings, proposals, interviews and past work, the decision was made."

Harelik said that once negotiations are taken care of, the committee can sit down with the architect and begin to develop a master plan.

Harelik said that the most obvious improvement being made is the centralization of all the officers, as they are currently not all under one roof.

"We want to meet their needs and give them the ability to function most efficiently," said Harelik.

Harelik added that one of the utmost concerns is ensuring the safety of everyone in the building, from making sure that the right number of offices and holding cells are available, to having a fully functioning dispatch room.

While there is no specific timeline set as of now, Harelik said that the committee and Police Department are looking to move as quickly as possible, although quality and planning for the future is a first priority.

"The Police Department has been

without adequate space for much too long," said Harelik. "We want it done right."

As the preliminary stages of the most recent renovations concerning town employees begins, the final punch list of items to be finished regarding the new firehouse is coming to an end. Before the new firehouse was built on Mountain Avenue, firefighters shared space with the Police Department in Town Hall.

According to Fire Chief William Gras, there are still several things that need to be done at the new Fire Department headquarters, including replacing the generator pad and locking system.

The current generator pad, which was installed during the course of construction, is faulty, Gras said.

"It's deteriorating and Silcon Inc. is looking into it," said Gras. The pad supports the generator outside of the building, which supplies power to the entire headquarters.

Gras said that there has to be some planning involved in the replacement of the pad, as about 15,000 pounds will have to be moved. Most likely, said Gras, a temporary emergency generator will be put in its place while the faulty pad is corrected.

New locks are also needed throughout the building, as the current locks are wearing down. Gras said that once this is done, he hopes that they will not have to be replaced again. While he does not know exactly when this will be done, he hopes it will be shortly, because "it's getting worse," he said.

Gras said that the supplier of the hardware and other appropriate people will come in to look over the locking system.

"These are both very important issues," said Gras of the generator pad and worn locks.

The building is also in need of minor electrical work, along with a traffic light outside the driveway that will be installed by Union County. Gras said he has no idea when this will be done, as it seems as though it's been in the works for quite a while.

The light will account for Mountain Avenue traffic in both directions, along with Clinton and Tooker Avenues, as well.

Mountainside BOE puts off CSA search

Mountainside Board of Education President Peter Goggi made an abrupt announcement at Tuesday's school board meeting explaining that the search for the district's new chief school administrator has now been called off.

"We have decided to terminate the search for a new chief school administrator at this time," said Goggi, adding that Deerfield School Interim Principal Walter Rusak will serve as CSA of the district "until someone is found in September."

He would not give any further details about why the search has been put on hiatus or how the search would progress during the summer months.

For whatever reason, the person they had already selected for the CSA position had been withdrawn, according to several rumors circulating from people in attendance at the meeting. Rusak will be the only remaining administrator in the district until September.

Thirty applications had been received from candidates seeking the CSA position. Several weeks ago, the school board's interview process had neared its end with three candidates as the finalists and a decision on a final choice pending shortly from the board at that time.

Tuesday's meeting also marked the last one for Chief School Administrator Gerard Schaller, who leaves the district this month.

"I have enjoyed the past six and a-half years very much," said Schaller. Then he spoke to the many parents gathered at the meeting. "I love your kids; that has been the best part."

Frank Geiger, a parent and former Board of Education member, then spoke at the public forum part of the meeting. He had been at odds with Schaller on many previous occasions, but he gave a tribute to him that evening.

"I personally believe when you take the job of CSA and boil it down, I believe that Dr. Schaller has spent his time in doing what that person should do: moving the kids forward," said Geiger. "I think he did a wonderful job for our kids, and I have been behind the scenes every step of the way. For him it has always been all about the children."

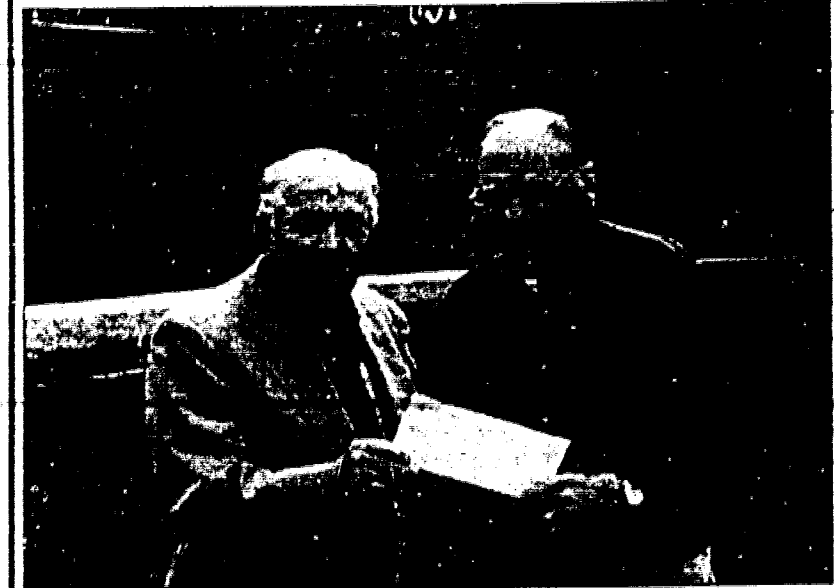

Summit FD receives grant for mobile unit

The Summit Fire Department received a \$52,650 grant from the Federal Emergency Management Agency's Assistance to Firefighters Grant Program.

The grant monies will be used for the acquisition of a mobile fire safety education trailer mobile command center.

The total cost of the unit is \$58,499. The grant will fund 90 percent or \$52,650, with Summit's local share requirement of only \$5,849.

U.S. Congressman Michael Ferguson presented the check on Saturday at the Summit Fire Headquarters.

"The benefits of this project are multifaceted," said Fire Chief Thomas Murray.

On New Year's Day, bulky waste disposal will be \$77 more expensive for residents in Elizabeth, Linden, Rahway, Union and Hillside.

The meteorator in Rahway handles municipal waste, animal and food processing waste, and dry industrial waste.

Currently, other counties within New Jersey are paying from \$63 to \$106 per ton for bulky waste removal.

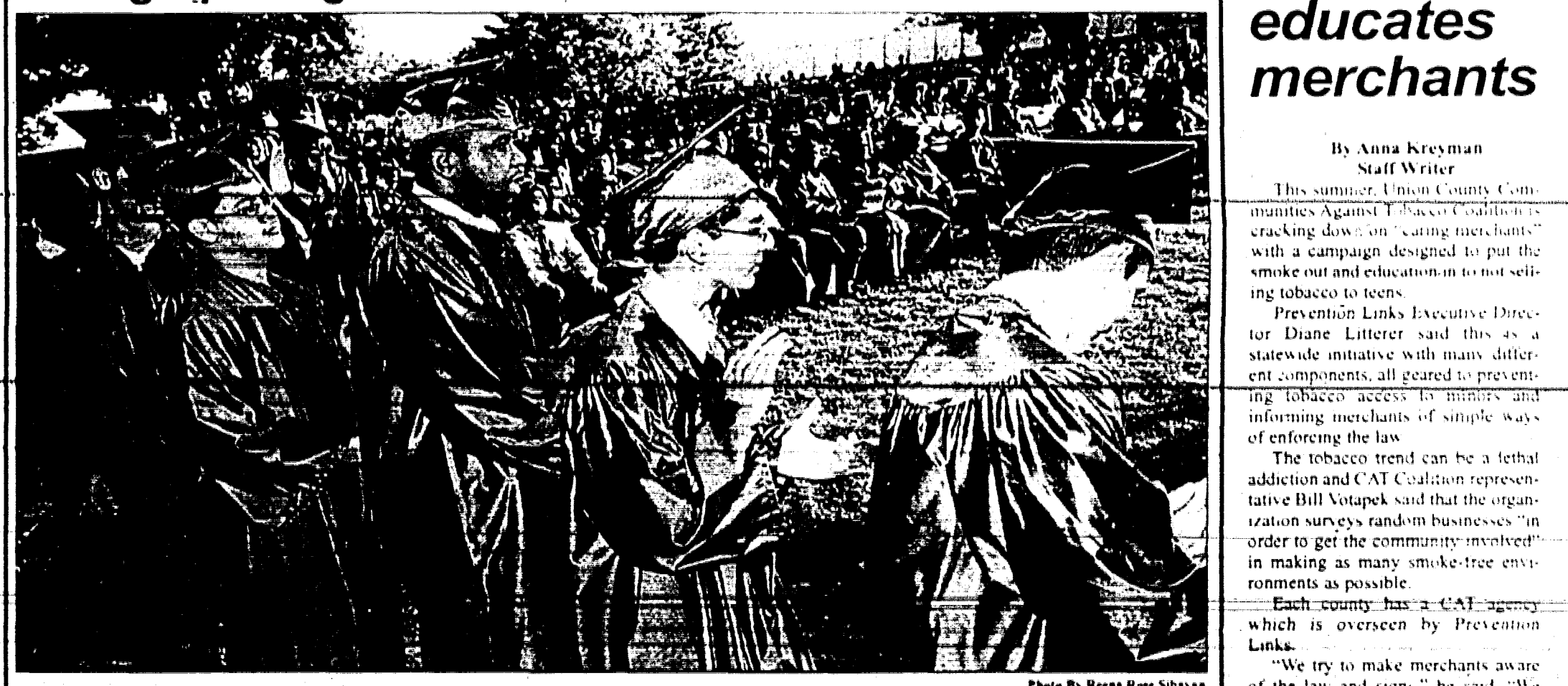

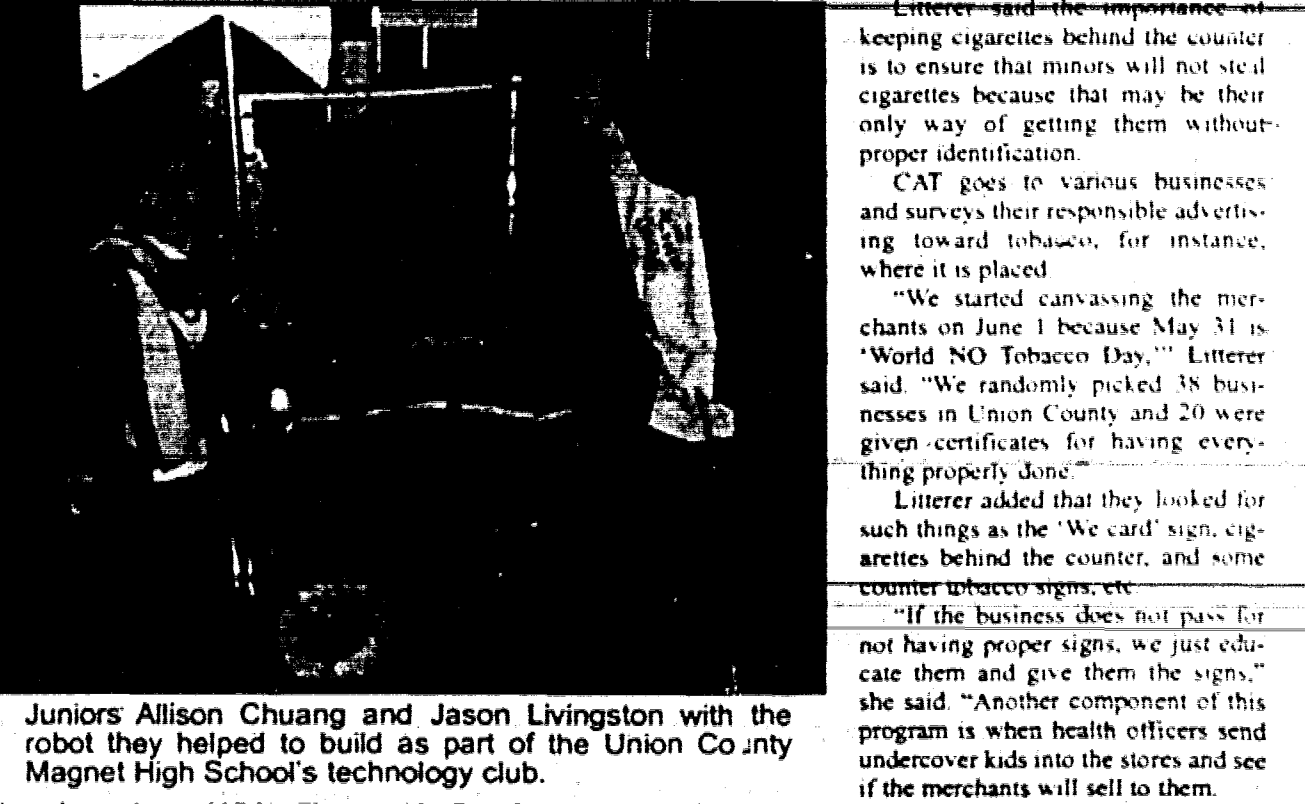


Graduates at the Union County Vocational-Technical School High School line up to receive their certificates and diplomas during last week's commencement ceremony on the Scotch Plains campus.
