Board To Inspect Nike Site Today With State Aide

Plan To Determine Possibilities For School TV Service

"I can see a time when we'll be producing our own TV programs," Dr. Warren M. Davis, district superintendent of schools, told the Regional Board of Education Tuesday night.

He and Dr. Lewis Fredericks, his administrative assistant, will meet with a representative of the Building Services Division of the New Jersey State Department of Education and Frederick Messer of Union, architect for the board, for an inspection tour of the Nike site in the Watchung Reservation today.

The site has been abandoned as a missile base by the federal government, and Dr. Davis has said that he would like it for use as a straight line television transmitter into the district's high schools.

Nov. 1 Application

The purpose of today's visit is to determine the site's possibilities for TV service. The district is preparing for applications for the site from the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

Meanwhile, he recommended

to refuse a request for a \$200,000 donation to get the program under way. So far Roselle Park and New Providence have been the only Union County municipalities to contribute, Dr. Davis said. Dr. Albert Jones, board member, directed Mrs. Helen Smith, secretary, to write the U.S. department, asking for declining contributions and sympathy for the school.

Thomas Nelson, board of education member, said Tuesday that secretary Mrs. Helen Smith has been authorized to advertise for bids and that specifications have been approved by the Union County Park Commission, a joint agency of the county and the state.

The board's plan is to have the Nike site, superintendent of schools, said that the Park Commission is preparing drawings to accurately locate the site. The board plans to have the field and contour it as a "turtle back," similar to the fields at Clark and Beckley Heights.

Jonathan Dayton, board member, said that each school district is being asked to appropriate \$500 for the program.

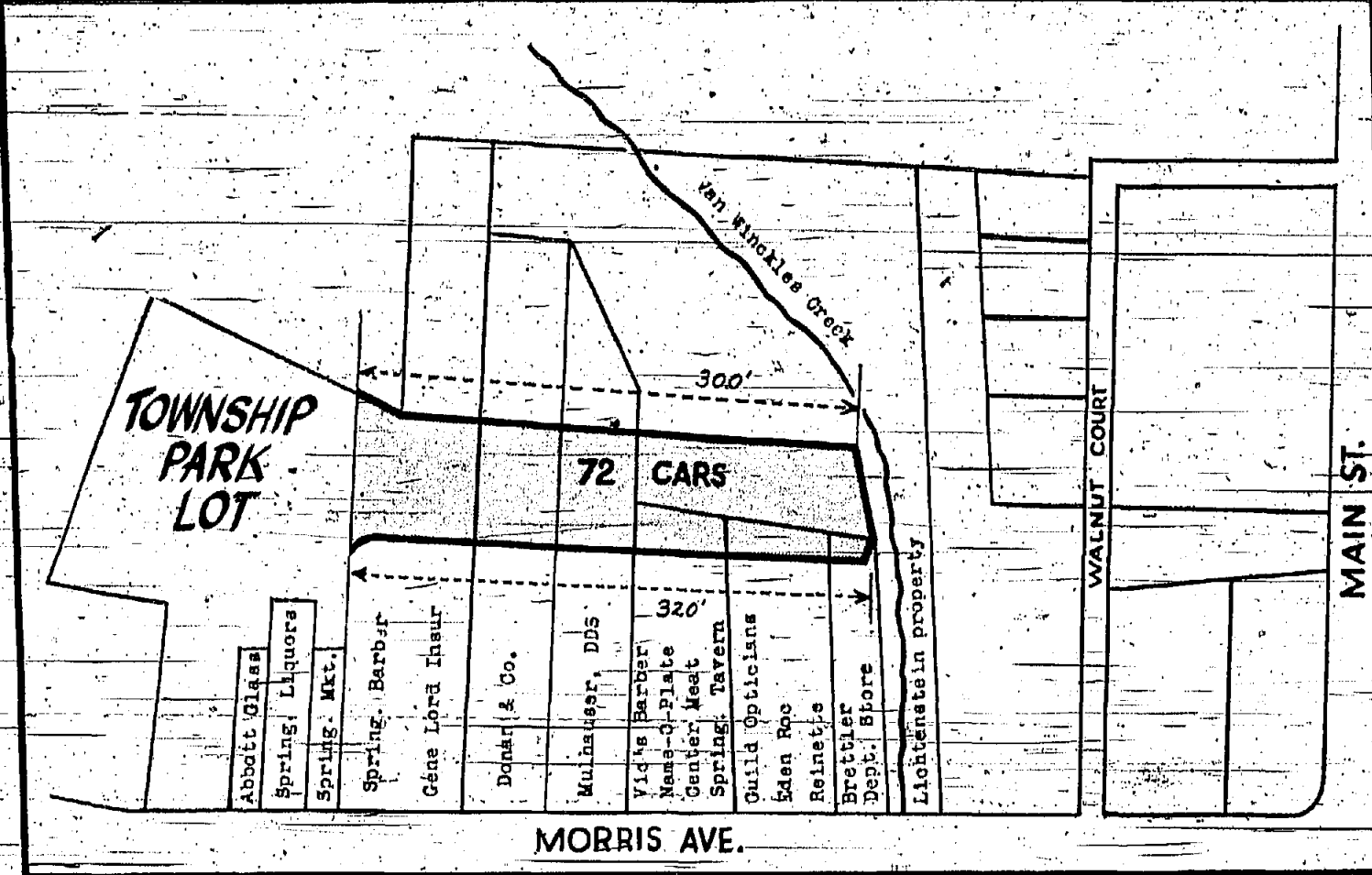
Fair Housing Group To Hear Clergyman

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New Parking Plan Asks 72-Car Lot Off Morris Ave.

Commercial property owners on the north side of Morris Ave. between Municipal Parking Lot 2 and Van Winkle's Creek are negotiating with their tenants on rent adjustments that would enable them to construct a 72-car parking lot on their own property.

John Stifelman, president of the Springfield Chamber of Commerce, who served with Will Salesky, chairman of the Chamber's Merchants Committee and Township Committee member Philip Del Vecchio, on a special committee to draft the parking plan, said that off-street parking in this area is needed to stimulate the flow of business there.

Revenue is lost, he said, through a state-imposed street parking ban between 4:30 and 6:30 p.m. normal retail business hours.

The \$15,000 proposal is the first of two phases, Stifelman said. An extension from Van Winkle's Creek to Main St. is contemplated if the first proposal is approved.

Now under consideration is a lot 320 feet wide by 34 feet long, tapering to 200 feet along the rear. It would include a five-foot wide walk, curbing, drainage, fencing, street lights and metered parking facilities. Access would be through the municipal lot, and walkways between the building would provide pedestrian access.

Stifelman said it is hoped that the Township Committee will install the meters and use the revenue from them for maintenance, police and snow-removal lighting.

The cost of construction would be borne by the six property owners, Stifelman said. The National Rifle Club, which owns a 90-year-old building on the lot, would be responsible for adding to the present building. The club is also being considered for a new building. Some staff members are said to favor this plan because they are confident about the future of the 100-year-old building.

(Continued from Page 1) The Springfield Public Library has two new telephone numbers, according to Mrs. Helen Francis, acting librarian. From now on the numbers to call are DR 6-4038 and DR 6-4031.

Another change is in the time of the monthly Board of Trustees meeting, which will a half hour later at 8:30 p.m. from now on to allow for committee meetings at 7:30. They will still be held on the second Thursday of the month, and they are open to the public, Mrs. Francis said.

Library records were pointed up in this year's operation report which lists 10,700 books, magazines, pamphlets and miscellaneous items loaned — a jump of 101 queries last year. Adult books loaned out totaled 4,100 — 118 over last year; children books, 3,801 — an increase of 101. New books processed came to 372, compared to 340 last year. Twenty-three of those were gifts.

Mrs. Francis announced that 377 computers are provided in the library's "story" hours and that the number of story hours this season has reached 11.

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Bonadies Answers Best On Bonds

Says Industrialist Really In Favor Of State Sales Tax

Vincent J. Bonadies, Springfield Township Committee member and Democratic candidate for State Assembly, sharply answered the criticisms of Leonard E. Best, chairman of the committee opposed to the State Bond Proposal.

letter directed to him, by the Springfield industrialist opposing the affirmative stand the candidate has taken on the issue.

In his reply Bonadies criticized Best's contention of vagueness in the Bond Proposal and charged "either you are misinformed or choose to ignore the true facts."

Bonadies maintained that Best's "true stand" is for a sales tax and called upon him to reveal his stand and to dissolve "his phantom committee opposing the Bond Issue."

In a letter to Best dated Monday, Bonadies said that he was shocked by the text of Best's communication which he said indicated to him "how badly misinformed even the most responsible people can become on a question of this magnitude and impact."

"When you state that Governor Hughes' 750 million bond proposal does not answer the what, where and how much on the additional facilities for higher education," Bonadies wrote, "either you are misinformed or choose to ignore the true facts."

"Again," he said, "when you charge that the bond package states only the vaguest terms the amount of money to be spent and specifies neither projects nor priorities — you demonstrate a complete lack of knowledge of the facts."

Bonadies said that much time and thought had been spent by the governor and members of your political party to select the exact expenditures on both projects and priorities as regard to education, highways and institutions and agencies, which have been outlined in the press and other literature. "The Bond Proposal is specific in every detail," the candidate said, "both in its financing as well as its application of funds."

What increase Assuring that space did not permit the listing of specific allocation of funds for each highway, institution or college, Bonadies said that the fund allocated for state college construction is designed to increase the student capacity of the six colleges from the present 7,000 to 25,000 by 1970.

The contemplated construction for state colleges is further detailed to the very number of classrooms, additions to libraries, dormitories, auditoriums, heating plants, physical education facilities, special subjects buildings, and as well as acquisitions for each of the six state colleges. All of this is available in all newspapers covered by the Bond Issue and has appeared prominently in the major news papers," Bonadies said.

Governor Hughes' plan to raise the state's New Jersey's higher education in two ways," Bonadies said, "over the five year period of the program, it provides \$125 million for new sixty construction and expansion of the state colleges and provide \$10 million for the establishment and construction of two-year community colleges."

"This represents," he said, "the state's matching share for development of eight county colleges each with an initial enrollment of about 500 students."

He charged that Best's counter proposal could "only accomplish procrastination and stagnation of our present educational system and would only serve to bring about that which you have always wanted — a sales tax."

Bonadies called on Best to "show the strength of conviction in your principles for a sales tax and disband your 'phantom' committee against the Bond Issue." He said he thought Best should tell the people of the state that he opposed the Bond Issue because he is "an advocate of a sales tax."

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Advocates Program For More Ratables

Representation at industrial shows to point up the advantages of industry moving into the township has been advocated by William Koonz, Republican candidate for township Committee. Koonz said he also favors a direct mail approach to companies considering decentralization.

In a release this week Koonz pointed out that he felt it was important to have a well defined program for the purpose of bringing additional industrial ratables into Springfield.

He said that the industrial committee "has made a great contribution in the past and has provided the initial impetus required to aid in the general stabilization of the township's tax structure."

"There is no question in my mind that the impact of the coming highway will place a burden on the taxpayer if the loss of many ratables is not replaced," Koonz said. He said the one sound approach was to interest light industry in the township. He said he felt he could work along with members of the industrial committee toward this end.

"It is apparent that we are situated in an ideal location as far as light industry is concerned," he said. "Springfield is actually the hub in this area."

More To Offer "With our outstanding accessibility from a transportation standpoint, we have far more to offer than many surrounding communities. We also have splendid service to offer the industrialist, with police and fire protection that is more than adequate."

He said that the township was "blessed by so many excellent features that we must take advantage of them. It is so important to have representation on the local government that is qualified and willing to present their features."

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Blackman Urging Tax Study; Gathering Facts On Problem

A study in depth to seek solutions to rising suburban taxes has been advocated by Alex Blackman, Democratic candidate for Township Committee. Blackman said this week that he is attempting to gather facts on suburban tax problems in preparation for municipal budget study.

The candidate said that the time for talking about the rise in taxes is at an end. "It is time to take action," he said.

In preparation for the action, Blackman said he has requested the annual report, table of equalization and abstract of ratables from the State Division of Taxation, and from the State Commission of Education. "Fi-

nancial Statistics-School Districts" including the available data.

Blackman says he has also consulted Ernest Reoch, director of the Rutgers Bureau of Government Research, and author of a recent article on the rise of taxes in suburban areas.

Blackman said he will consult with people involved and study the material. "This," he said, "will enable him to give the 1964 municipal budget 'close analytical scrutiny and present what I think to be in the best interest of the taxpayers.'"

Referring to Reoch's article, Blackman said that the Rutgers researcher showed that taxes in the state had risen on an average of 9.7 percent since 1957. This, he said, included larger urban communities where the school tax rate is stable. In suburban communities, according to Reoch's statistics, Blackman said, some taxes have almost doubled.

Pointing to the defeat of school budgets in 64 northern New Jersey communities, Blackman said some authorities consider the defeat not criticism of school systems, but a showing of discontent on the part of residents because of rising property taxes.

Blackman said he hopes to study the entire tax picture in order to be a "better candidate and better committeeman."

Democrats Open Headquarters

"Springfield does not need another voice to support the overwhelming majority," Alex Blackman, Democratic candidate for Township Committee, told a group of some 200 at the opening of Democratic Headquarters in Springfield on Sunday.

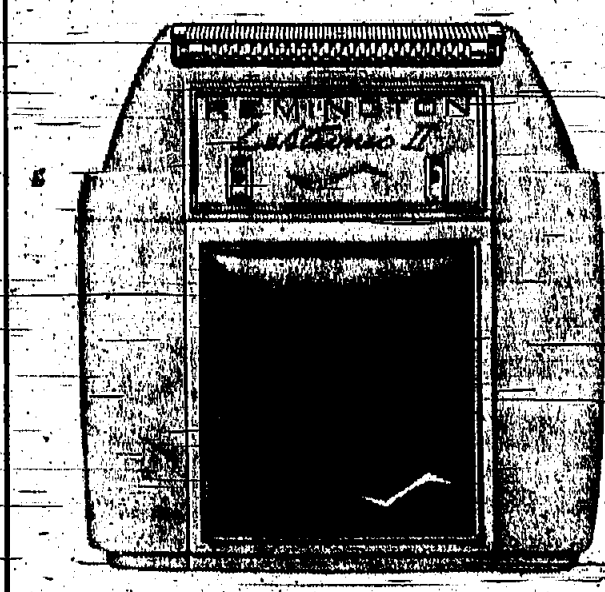

McGowan Asks 'Yes' On Vets' Tax Relief

"Don't let the veteran become the forgotten man again," James M. McGowan, Democratic candidate for the State Senate, urged this week.

Assemblyman McGowan, who is a disabled veteran, said "the citizens of Union County might overlook the necessity for adoption of a \$50 tax deduction for veterans."

Expressing concern over the fact that "this referendum is not receiving the attention it deserves," McGowan emphasized the importance and said that it would be referendum question

No. 3 on the General Election ballot.

McGowan, chairman of the Assembly's Veterans' Committee, for the past three years, has protested the reluctance of the Senate Republicans to allow a referendum on the matter.

"My opponent and his friends in caucus finally agreed in this election year," said McGowan, "but I can't see why it took so long."

McGowan said the referendum question on the veteran's exemption is a guarantee that the New Jersey veterans of the nation's wars will receive fair tax

treatment at a time when their financial tax exemption may well be taken away from them.

"The Republican party in control of the Senate blocked this issue until now," he said. "Finally they had to give in. The tax for the veteran is so strong that they didn't dare oppose it in the year when they answer to the polls."

A "yes" vote on the referendum would guarantee every war veteran a \$50 exemption on his real estate tax. It would replace the historical \$500 reduction in assessed valuation. Court-ordered revisions threaten an average \$50

per cent cut in this tax benefit.

"At this time, when tax regulations are undergoing drastic review and revision, forced by court decisions, the increase in tax bills is certain to wipe out most of the veteran's tax relief," McGowan said.

"Today, such relief is one of the remaining ways in which many people acknowledge their debt for his selfless service. It must be continued."

September Was Month To Forget

September was cold and wet, but it was also a month to forget. The weather bureau reported that this week by Harold Duflo, meteorologist at the Union County College Meteorological Station in Clarkstown.

Duflo said that inches of rainfall was recorded as compared with the estimated normal rainfall in September of 4.55 inches. It rained on eight days with the heaviest rainfall on September 23 when 2.11 inches was recorded.

The temperature averaged from a maximum of 67 de-

grees on Sept. 12 to a minimum of 33 degrees on Sept. 20. The average temperature was 62.8 degrees as compared with an estimated normal of 66.8 degrees. The average maximum was 74.4 degrees and the average minimum was 50.7 degrees. During the month, 121 degree days were recorded, as compared with 128 in 1962, Duflo said.

Thunderstorm activity occurred on Sept. 4, 12, and 13. There were 13 clear days, four partly cloudy days and 10 cloudy days. The first frost of the season occurred on Sept.
