## Governing Body Will Meet Jan. 1

Springfield's new mayor will be Township Commiteeman William Koonz, it was learned authoritatively this week. He will take office at the Committee's annual

organization meeting at Town-Hall at noon on New Year's Day. Koonz will succeed Mayor Ro-bert D: Hardgrove, whose term on the Committee expires Dec.

Knonz was elected over Democrat Alex Blackman for a three-year term a year ago.

Now only 32; he is the youngest member of the Republican administration forces. His title as voungest Committeeman has been taken, however, by Jay Bloom, Democrat who defeated Hardgrove in the November vounger.

The mayoralty under Spring-field's Township Committee is primarily an honorary title. The five Committeemen have equal authority, and each year they clect one of their number to serve as Township Committee chairman. He is popularly known as the mayor.

In contrast to some neighboring communities, such as Union F. Edward Biertuempfel nas held the office for 25 years, Springfield under the current Republican regime has rotated the mayoralty.

Philip Del Vecchio and Arthur M. Falkin each served in this capacity for a year before Hardgrove, In 1965,—both Del Vecchio and Falkin will operate under the leadership of Koonz.





Weather doesn't faze him - he loves the great outdoors. Snow or sleet neither discourages nor depresses him; the colder the better — as he strolls along his route with his two-part cart (one part-for letter muil: the other for magazines)

Such a man should be well\_qualified to-serve as president of the Springfield letter carriers.

In fact, such a man is president of the Springfield letter carriers. He is Dave Macdonald, a 31-year-old agile, friendly postal worker, who is quick to smile and ever ready with answers to all sorts of questions

Macdonald, who has been with the Springfield Post Office for about eight and a half years, was elected secretary-treas: urer of the National Association of Letter Carriers, Branch No. 3795, five years ago. The following year he was elected secretary. (They changed the secretary-treas urer office to two offices), and he served in that capacity for two years. The last two-years,-he-has-been-president.-

AS PRESIDENT, Macdonald indicated, my main local job is to represent men-ina case of grievance or discipline. You see, because we work for the Federal Government, we can't strike: we just negotiate./ We try/to get along as best we can.

When President/Kennedy was in office, he signed an order for us to negotiate for contracts. Before-that, we just had verbal agreements.

'Kennedy's way, of course, is better because each side/knows better how to abide by contracts. My main job, actually, handling contracts, grievances, disciplinary action; I assist the state and naorganizations in their legislative work. Occassionally, the state group will help us solve our problems if we can't

"Take a salary drive, for example. There are lots of things that have to be attended to. First and foremost is legislation in Washington to get passage for our

"WE'VE HAD TWO salary raises in the past three years. Now that really took some doing. We had to get the majority on our side. And naturally, there was some controversy about the national raises. ("You know," he grinned, "a lot of people in town think we're paid by the town. I'd like to make it very clear that we're paid by the Federal government.)

'And when a Springfield postman gets a raise, so does a postman in California or New York or a small town out west. It's a-national-raise.

The problem there was that perhaps the men from the South or from Maine can get along on lower salaries, because in small towns the cost of living isn't so high. A fairly-well-provided city wardrobe isn't as necessary to them as it would be to people from New York or California - who would be pretty hardpressed on low salaries.

'Another one of my main jobs," Macdonald continued. "is to keep working conditions in line with certain factors that have to be changed — as rules have to change. We also get a great deal of help from our local Ladies' Auxiliary.

"Years ago, we had to buy our own uniform. Today, we are provided by the government with money to purchase the uniform. But few people may know," he said, "that it took 10 years of work by our national organization to get this bill

Macdonald, by this time, had married carriers' goals for the future include trying to find a way to get credit for some of the sick-leave hours accumulated by the MacDonald, who was born-in Cranford,

"IF YOU HAVE 1,000 hours, for example, that haven been used by the time you retire, you should be able to get at least some credit for them upon retirement. Right now, if a postman has hours coming to him - after he retires, he loses

- Macdonald explained that the letter was educated in Granford schools. - When I was graduated from Canford

High School in 1951, I wasn't dure what I wanted to do. I went to work for an insurance office, and in 1953, I went into the U.S. Army.

'I got my discharge in 1955; I came out a sergeant. Then I went back to the insurance company, but enrolled in Union Junior College, night sessions, majoring in electrical engineering."



## Christmas Plant Introduced By Poinsett Was First United States Ambassador To Mexico

You may not find the name your history book, but re-minders of what he did for

Christmas are all around.
Regardless of his contributions to diplomacy—as this country's first ambassador to Mexico. Poinsett did more than he knew when, 140 years ago, he returned from that ost with a collection of flambinoyant - jungle - plants that have given him a sort of im-mortality in the flower world.

For one thing, he added a popular item to the stock in trade of florists. The wholesale volume of poinsettia busas a half-million dollars a year in New Jersey and about \$9 million in the nation.

But today's poinsettia is a far better plant than the one Ambassador Poinsett proudly distributed among his friends in 1825. The poinsettle has had ways, and much of the credit for its uporinging has been won right here in the Garden

At the beginning of this century, cuttings from descenpretty well distributed around this country, but the showy bracks, commonly called flowers, were cut from the plants and used in arrangements.

Among New Jersey poinsettia growers in the early 20's was the late Lizzie K. Entemann of Jersey City. During the growing season of 1923 her trained eye came upon a plant with such distinct character-istics that she set it apart and called it Oak Loaf.

Poinsettla historians say that the red varieties offered for sale today are descendants of Mrs. Entemann's Oak Leaf.

Another significant impact on the poinsettia world took place a few years later, not gen County. The late Knud Christiansen found among his Oak Lost plants a poinsettia of a notably stocky growth habit and able to retain its red color longer than

He released his plant to the Ecke family which has a widespreading poinsettias a wide-spreading poinsettis farm near Hollywood, Calif. The Christ-iansen selection was named Ruth Eake, of which the most distinguished descendant is the variety called Barbara the variety called Barbara Beke Supreme. Most poinset-tias you see today are of this

But this was not Mr. Chrishansen's greatest schieve-ment. He was the first to grow poinsettis plants that he could sell to his customers for enjoyment at Christmas. His method, now a standard oper-ation, was to start plants in midsummer from softwood-cuttings-taken from a mother

Considering the roundabout routine and the many difficulties of making the poinsettia feel at home outside the trop-los, it's a wonder any New iet bothers to make the at-

first he receives from Cal-Hornis in April what looks like a bundle of dry sticks with roots. These are stock plants — the lower parts of large plants with all but a roots removed. They grew in open fields, probably around Hollywood.

A stock plant miraculously comes to life when planted, bringing Christmas to the breenhouse in late summer. Such a plant is allowed to grow as hig as it will, and a florist may take as many as

100 softwood cuttings from it. From every cutting the florist hopes to grow a plant ready to bloom at Chrisimas. And, thanks to the art and skill residing in a professional green thumb, and the application of the results of research, he usu-

ally does.
From Sept. 20 to Oct. 5, preeisely, this grower and others like him set their times to turn on greenhouse lights for an hour in the middle of every night. This prevents preory night. In a prevents pre-mature formation of flower buds. In doing this, Garden State growers follow the rec-ommendation of the Hutgers College of Agriculture, based on the research of Dr. O. Wes. ley Davidson.



CAN BE A JOY By Mary K. Macdonald, R. N Professional Baby Counselor Listening to baby gurgle, seeing the miracle of that first amile, observing baby's response world-all of these can sources of wonder and excitement for the young mother.

Too often, however, the new mother in an unfamiliar role, finds she has a fussing baby on her hands. The unnecessary fears and tensions that result are enough to spoil any enjoyment she might otherwise get from her offspring.

Experienced mothers know that a baby who is physically comfortable and receives a full measure of love and tenderness, will be a happy baby. By ob-serving a few simple rules designed to promote baby's phy-sical comfort and provide the sense of security baby needs, the new and inexperienced mother can spare herself many hours of anxiety.

I. Sleep is important to the new infant. The mattress should be firm, bedding smooth and well tucked in, coverings light loose to allow free move-

ment.

2. Before baby can move about in his bed by himself, change his position frequently. 3. Keep the temperature in

haby's room an eyem—as—pos—sible, between 70-75 degrees.

4. Baby's room should be well ventilated bit never drafty. 5 Dispers should be soft, absorbent and non-irritating. Even carefully laundered diapers may irritate baby's delicate skin unless all scap has been removed by repeated rinsings. Diaper services guard against this by an elaborate rinsing process and by impregnating the diaper with special antiseptics to help lessen the chances of diaper rash.

6. Make sure baby is always in a clean dry diaper. Cleanse the skin carefully with each change. 7. Don't overdress baby. in-

doors or out.

8. Try not to take baby outdoors when the weather is windy or damp. In winter, dress haby warmly, covering his hands and ears but not his face. 9. Let your baby feel that everything your do-for him is a-pleasure to you — never an unpleasant chore.

10. Play with baby when he's fully awake, after his nap or before his bath. Talk to him, fondle him, rock him in your arms. During the first few weeks, you can't spoil him with oo-much love.
