AL HECTOR

When Al Hector strides into his home at 41 Wentz ave., Springfield, after a particularly exhausting day at the Irwin Playground where he is senior playground instructor, or from Columbia High School, where he is a physical education teacher, driver education teacher, wrestling and tennis coach and assistant coach of soccer, he really doesn't have to look far to "talk shop" during and after dinner.

His wife, Janet (Stemmle) is right there to provide-some stimulating tidbits about physical education as a special dessert with his coffee, and to offer some pros and cons in the interim between the evening newspaper and the television commercials.

It's nice to have a physical education teacher around the house, particularly if she's your wife and a teacher-at-Gaudineer School; and you're a physical education teacher, too, Hector indicated the other afternoon during a chat about . . . well about physical education.

In a way, Hector seems to think that perhaps evening recreation hours do invite "vandalism."


