political and community affairs to broader national and world issues. Each member has been asked to return the questionnaire, unsigned, by this Sunday The commission will then review



LEADER PROFILE

ANDREW ALLAN This may be Andrew Allan's first ex-

perience with Springfield Schools as the new principal of the Edward Walton School, but he comes well-prepared, and filled with a great enthusiasm and much confidence for a successful school term. Allan, who hails from Boston (and his alight, but attractive Bostonian accent verifies it), has been in the field of edu-

cation for 12 years. He taught elementary school - fourth. fifth and sixth grades - at the King

Philip School in West Hartford, Conn., served as assistant principal of Duffy-School and Norfeldt School in West Hartford, then "did some time back at King Philip School-as assistant principal."

He also was assistant principal at Braeburn School in the same city - and from there he came to Springfield.

"This was my first time in Springfield," he says. "In fact, it's my first time in New Jersey." (He lives in Fanwood with his wife, who is a physical education teacher in Edison Junior High School in Edison).

"I HAD HEARD of the availability of a position as principal in Springfield," he says, "and I came down to interview for the job. I liked what I saw - and when they decided on me - my wife and I scratched our heads and made up our minds to move to New Jersey.

"It wasn't an easy decision to make,"he admits, "because it meant that mywife had to give up her teaching in West Hartford, and we had to look for a buyer for our house, then go on a spree looking for a new house in New Jersey.

"No -- it wasn't easy to pull up roots," but we made up our minds. And here we are.'

Allan says that there are "certain state requirements in Connecticut and in New Jersey that are very similar. There are certain courses to be completed. And the requirements are quite similar inasmuch as they are both reciprocal on acceptance-certificates.--

"I had a certificate in Connecticut as an elementary school principal."

Allan, who was raised and educated in-Boston, was graduated from Northern University in Massachusetts and received Boston University. a master's degree in education from

HE SPENT SEVERAL years in the U.S. Army, stationed, principally in Alaska. "My rank?" he laughs, "I got upas high as sergeant. I wasn't lookingfor those bars."

He completed a year beyond his master's degree in elementary supervision and administration. "I received 33 credit hours beyond those required for a master's derree.

During the first week of registration, while Allan was in the Walton School office getting himself "pretty well set up," he had an opportunity to meet "ap-proximately half the staff" and a number of children, who paused in their playing outside the school building and "stopped n to say hello."

Allan explains that "from what I've observed by looking into the parents' program it's guite evident that the programs are similar to those in Connecticut." 'He feels this is one of the many reasons he will be completely at home with the school.

-And-Justice For All

Our judicial system operates on the basic principal that everyone is presumed innocent until proven guilty. That venerable truism is one of the keystones of the structure of American justice, but there has also been an undercurrent of suspicion that the defendant who can afford a high-priced lawyer is more likely to-be more innocent.

In_line with recent decisions. George M. Hillman, president of the N.J. State Bar-Association, last week declared at a State Senate hearing that his organization_favors_establishment of a public defender's office in every county or else comparable steps to insure that every defendant will have adequate legal defense, whether or not he can pay for it.

Speaking for the state's 5,000 lawyers, he declared, "Voluntary, private defender systems must ,in one way or another, fall short of guaranteeing effective representation for the poor and will only tend to perpetuate the lip service which we have for so long been giving to the whole problem of providing-justice for those who cannot afford private counsel in criminal matters.

Hillman told the legislators, "The establishment of tax-supported, profession-ally competent legal defender offices is by far the best way to insure effective counsel to all indigent persons accused of serious crimes, at least in metropolitan areas, and probably throughout the state

Confidence in the judicial process has always been one of the vital elements of American democracy.

The importance of legal counsel for all defendants in order to keep the scales of justice level was well summarized in this declaration by -the U.S. Supreme Court, as quoted by Hillman in his testimony last week:

"That government hires lawyers to prosecute, and defendants who have the money hire lawyers to defend, are the strongest indications of the widespread belief that lawyers in criminal courts are necessities, not luxuries.

"The right of one charged with crime counsel may-not be deemed fundamental and essential to fair trials in some countries, but it is in ours."
