## YES Helps Young People Earn Money, Gain Valuable Job Experience

A report on its first year of operations was issued this week by the Springfield Youth Employment Service, which entered its first job applications from local teenagers Dec. 20 and 30, 1964.

The volunteer community organization has registered approximately 300 applicants to date, with some 35% of the applications coming from boys. The YES statement added that 154 of these young people are now attending college.

The YES-office reported requests from 215 employers, with 302 jobs filled. In addition, 22 per cent of these jobs led to repeat calls.

The statement also noted a number of "chain reaction" jobs, which would not be listed in the files. These include young men and women hired directly on the recommendation of a former employer or from being observed by neighboring home-owners.

Approximately 80 per cent of all registrants have been placed, the report noted. The only job requests which were not filled were those for which the employers' requirements could not be met.

**THE FIRST ANNUAL** report stressed that the YES office, while located in Town Hall, operates entirely on a voluntary basis, with all work handled by unpaid volunteers.

It added that there have been contributions of office equipment and supplies, as well as cash to pay for telephone service, postage, stationery, office forms and other supplies.

The most frequent calls over the year have been for babysitters, yard and lawn workers and snow-shovelers.

Other young people have been placed in full-time or part-time jobs as office workers of all types, receptionists, mother's helpers, ironers, restaurant hostesses, restaurant bus-boys and counter-boys, cashiers, car-washers, tutors in several academic fields and helping with musical instruments.

Applicants have also been placed as delivery boys, stock helpers, window washers, newspaper delivery workers, telephone solicitors, motel helpers, X-ray laboratory assistants, construction workers, township recreation aides, handymen, house painters, parts assembly workers and apprentices in industry.

A NUMBER of young people were placed in jobs a little further from the ordinary. These categories include dog-sitting, serving and feeding patients in a nursing home, modeling, assisting with a children's art course, typing manuscripts and a college thesis, painting furniture, training for permanent work as a medical secretary, organizing and entertaining at children's parties, helping to serve and

and clean up after large family dinners and assisting and serving as companion to invalids at home.

The YES report went on to say that every applicant interviewed individually, and in person, so that the record will show "every possible angle to help place the registrant in a most suitable job."

## Town Moves Toward School Buses In Rt. 78 Area

### Bender To Leave Education Board

Joseph A. Bender this week announced his resignation from the Board of Education, to take effect in February. He added that he was making the decision public now in order to permit the one-year unexpired portion of his term to be filled at the Feb. 8 school board election.

The deadline for filing to run for this seat on the board, as well as for the three three-year terms regularly scheduled for election, is at 4 p.m. on Dec. 30 at the Board of Education office in the James Caldwell School.

Bender cited increased business demands on his time as the reason for his decision to leave the school board. He has served for the past six years, since he was elected to a one-year unexpired term in 1959. Bender is head of Moldcast Products, Newark aluminum foundry.

As a school board member, he has headed the committees on buildings and grounds and on advisory school planning. He also served as chairman of the construction of the Thomas Sandmeyer School when he first joined the board.

More recently, Bender has had jurisdiction over the addition being completed at the Florence Gaudinier School and over the extensive renovation project at the Caldwell School.

The three members whose terms expire this winter are August Caprio, board president, Richard Werner and Mrs. Ruth Weisman. Both Caprio and Mrs. Weisman have announced plans to seek re-election. Werner has declared that he is undecided on the question of another term.

As of this Tuesday, no positions had been filed by any candidates for election to the school board. It was disclosed, however, that an unidentified woman obtained a petition from the board office on Tuesday morning, declining to give her name.

### Postmaster Asks Speed In Mailing Before Holidays

It is urgent that any remaining Christmas mail be sent out now, Springfield Postmaster A. V. Del Vecchio stressed this week.

Reports from headquarters of the Post Office Department show that more people than ever before have mailed gifts, cards and letters during the past three weeks, he disclosed.

The postmaster said that across the nation every piece of Christmas mail that can possibly be delivered will reach its destination on time. However, at this time of the year, the strain on transportation facilities and the unpredictability of weather can mean unexpected delays. Del Vecchio suggested that mailers consider the use of air-mail and special delivery, especially for out-of-town mail.

He noted that holiday schedules will be in effect on Saturday and Sunday, Dec. 15 and 26. Although Christmas falls on a Saturday and many business hours will be letting workers slip off on Friday, the Post Office will continue to function to insure that all Christmas mail arriving in time for delivery on Friday morning, Dec. 24, will reach its destination.

The only delivery of mail on Dec. 25 will be special delivery and perishable items.

### Parents Oppose Board's Refusal Of Special Buses

#### Rt. 78 Construction Termed Dangerous For 106 Youngsters

A group of parents in the north-west section of Springfield reacted sharply last week after the Board of Education rejected their request for special bus transportation for children who must cross Rt. 78 construction areas to reach the James Caldwell School.

Alexander J. Marcel of 38 Colfax rd., a spokesman for the embattled parents, issued a statement saying that he was "ashamed" of the board's actions and vowing "vigilant" board members and Township Committeemen when they face re-election.

Board members, at a special meeting with the parents last week, cited a state law which calls for bus transportation for youngsters whose homes are "remote from any schoolhouse" and which sets a requirement that the children live two miles or more from the schools to receive special bus service.

### State, Contractor Could Be Dunned To Meet Expense

#### 1st Approval Given For \$550,000 Bond To Construct Library

The Township Committee Tuesday night authorized preparations to provide emergency bus service for some 106 children in the north-west part of Springfield who must cross the Rt. 78 construction area to attend the James Caldwell School.

In other action, the committee voted to introduce a \$550,000 bond ordinance for a new library at the corner of Mountain and Hamilton sts.

The library board will hold a public hearing on the proposal Dec. 27 at Jonathan Dayton Regional High School, and the Township Committee's final hearing is scheduled for the following evening.

While moving for the bus service, as an emergency safety measure to meet hazardous construction conditions, the governing body also voted to seek means of recovering cost of the service from the state Highway Department and the contractor for the work in Springfield.

The committee was warned, however, that permission for emergency appropriation must be obtained from Trenton and that a possible conflict in jurisdiction with the Board of Education might complicate the matter.

### PLENTY OF ROOM IN NEW TEEN INN FOR YULE SEASON

The Springfield Recreation Department will sponsor a "Teen Inn" program for boys and girls of junior high school age during the Christmas holiday season, with the Raymond Chisholm School gymnasium utilized. The school gym will be open for a variety of recreation from 10 a.m. to 12 noon and from 1 to 4 p.m. The dates are December 27 to 30.

Facilities will be made available for informal dancing, informal basketball, and table tennis. Dress for boys and girls will be informal.

The entire program will be under the supervision of the Springfield Recreation Department, with Edward J. Rishy, director, and Pat Gannon in charge.

**DOUBLE PROMISES**

Public Safety Commissioner Robert G. Pliner, who brought up the problem of safety in the Rt. 78 area, stressed that developments "in the last two or three days" had convinced him that the Highway Department and contractor would get the job up to repeated promises to guarantee the children's safety.

He said that as much as a 150-foot road covered the regular and temporary sidewalk, particularly in the area of Morris ave. and Morrison rd., that heavy construction machines were sitting dangerously near pedestrians and that children were at times forced to walk out into the roadway.

Committeeman Jay Bloom declared, "The only reasonable solution is to reach down into our pockets and pay for the price for the 15 to 17 months needed." He urged that the township underwrite the price.

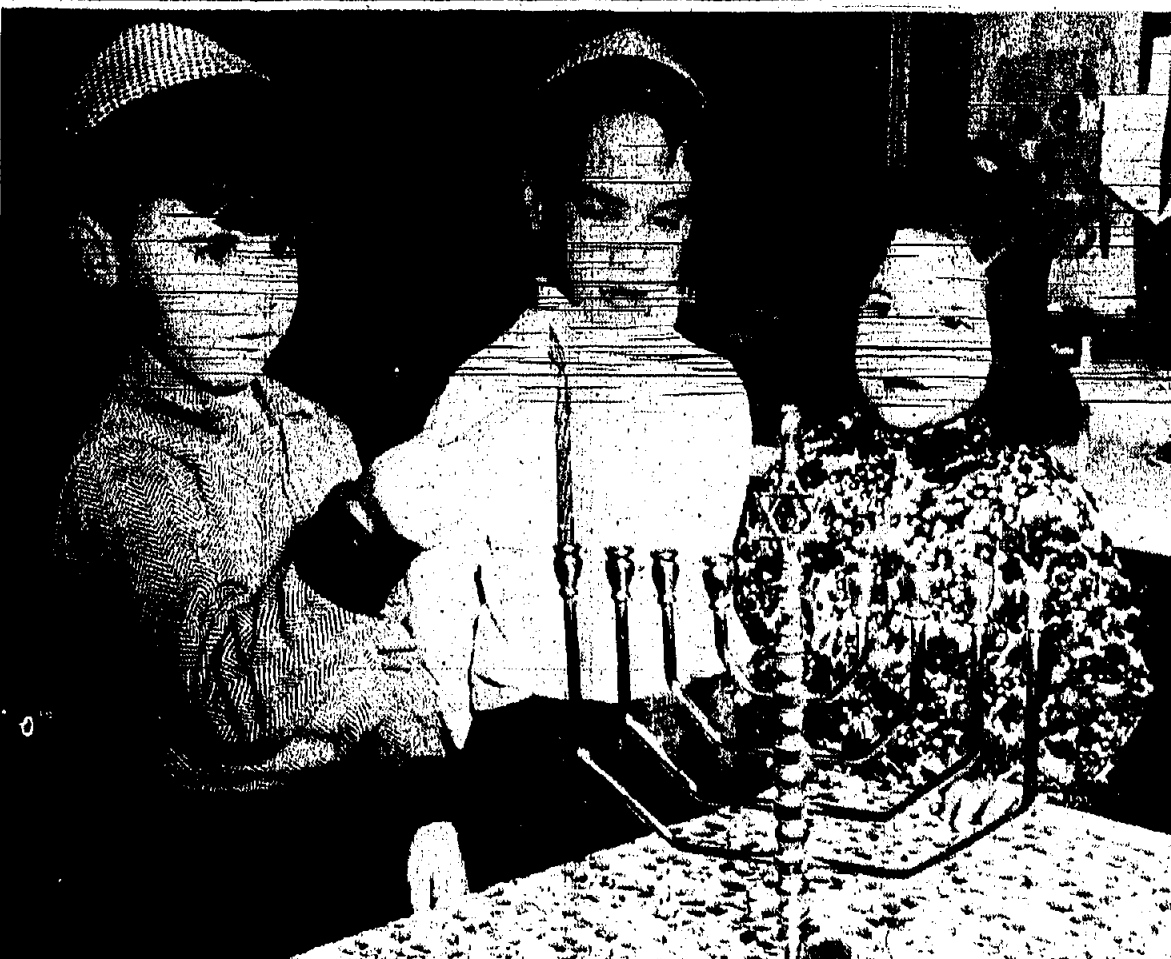

## Jersey Legionnaires Ship Out 150,000 Gifts For U.S. Troops

Brigadier General William C. Doyle, chairman of the New Jersey American Legion's fund-raising drive, announced that 150,000 gifts for U. S. troops in Viet Nam were shipped from McGuire Air Force Base, N. J., to Vee-Nam yesterday.

### Knights Council Confers Degrees

The First Degree of the order was exemplified by Bishop Wigner Council 1886, Knights of Columbus of Irvington and Maplewood, last Monday for four candidates.

The ceremonies in honor of Past Grand Knight William Lawrence of 801 Twain pl., Union, was conducted by the chief officers — Grand Knight Joseph Schelek, Irvington; Deputy Grand Knight Steven Wolf, Union; Chancellor Frank Fierro and Warden Thomas Enright, Irvington.

The gifts, purchased from funds raised since the opening of the drive on Nov. 7, were transported from Dumont High School to the air base by truck trailers on Monday. It is estimated that the total weight of the gifts reached some 16 tons.

At 4 p.m. yesterday, Governor Richard J. Hughes, honorary chairman of the Legion's Committee to raise \$100,000 for the gifts, with Legion officials headed by William R. Huggard, State Legion commander, held ceremonies immediately preceding the loading of the gifts on planes for shipment to Viet Nam, where they will be distributed under supervision of Army officials.

More than \$80,000 has been contributed to the Legion fund to date, with contributions still reaching Legion Headquarters, Trenton, daily from Legion-Auxiliary Posts and Units and individuals and organizations from every part of the state. Contributions will be accepted through Christmas, according to Huggard. Checks should be made payable to the N. J. American Legion Viet Nam Fund, War Memorial Building, Trenton.

The gifts consist of plastic bags containing grooming kits with nail clipper and file, comb, razor blades, cigarettes, air-mail stationery, ballpoint pen, and greeting card marked "Merry Christmas from the people of New Jersey and the New Jersey American Legion."

The packing of the gifts took place at the Dumont High School by several hundred students who volunteered their services through the cooperation of the Board of Education and the superintendent of schools.

**No Budget Money Requested In 1966 To Extend Rt. 278**

State Highway Commissioner Dwight R. G. Palmer has not requested any money in the 1966 budget for the extension of Rt. 278 beyond Linden, it was learned this week. Palmer also was quoted this week as saying that there were no plans for the highway to be extended west of its presently planned terminus at Route 1 in Linden.

A "brush stroke" version of the planned highway on published maps of this area has shown it cutting through Roselle-Roselle Park, Kemilworth and Union before joining Rt. 78 at Springfield-Center. Officials and residents of those communities have expressed concern and have sought assurances that the controversial road would not go through as indicated on the maps.

Palmer has insisted that there were no present plans to extend it. Earlier this year he ruled out a suggested alignment that would have taken it up the Elizabeth River bed and through the Sayrebrook section of Union.

This week, Fred Colucci, chairman of the Roselle Park 1-278 Committee, noticed published reports that appeared to indicate that Palmer had requested no funds for the 278 extension. Colucci said he called Palmer and received word that a study of possible extensions of the highway beyond Linden was in process. The study, by an independent engineering firm, is expected to be completed in about two months, Colucci quoted Palmer as saying. Palmer also said he would know then if the highway would ever be needed and, if needed, in what direction it would go, according to Colucci.

Colucci also said he had asked Freeholder-elect William Ahern, Mayor of Kentworth, to call meeting with Palmer to get final word on the highway. Colucci said Ahern had promised to comply with the request as soon as possible after the first of the year when the new board takes over.

# Teachers, Civil Rights Leaders Seek End To N. J. Segregation

A New Jersey teachers committee headed by a Union man will meet with civil rights leaders Feb. 1 to evaluate progress made toward eliminating segregation in the state's schools.

Dr. Robert E. Allen, of 1383 Brookfield ave., Union, honorary chairman of the Teachers for Integrated Quality Education (TIQUE), said his group and other interested organizations will plan coordinated action based on the results of the February meeting.

He reported that a TIQUE delegation met recently with representatives of the State Department of Education to urge the Commissioner of Education to exercise positive leadership in ending segregation.

The delegation included Rev. James Williams, educational chairman of the New Jersey NAACP; Andrew Washington, educational chairman, Newark-Duex CORE; Medcline Dworkin, past chairman, Newark Committee for Better Schools; Sam Fuller, staff member, Camp Kilmer Job Corps; and Philip Field-NAACP; Florence North-sult, co-chairman, TIQUE; and Dr. Allen.

State Representatives representing the Department of Education were Dr. Kirk Seaton, director of the Center for Psycho-Social Problems, and Dr. Robert Fleming, assistant commissioner of education.

Dr. Allen said the two state officials told the delegation that de facto segregation was not within their area of responsibility.

However, Dr. Allen added, the two men promised to bring the group's requests to the attention of the Commissioner.

## A FEMININE LOOK

Commentary on a recent National Newspaper Association Study Mission to the British Isles and Scandinavia

### Ninth In A Series HOLLAND

"Five Flics" is not an annoying thought when you are in Amsterdam, but wild as it may sound, a tempting one! That is the name of a very famous restaurant, and it has been said that for a real Dutch treat you must not only go to Holland—you must go to Amsterdam and eat at the Five Flics.

Amsterdam is all bicycles and canals, or so it seems. Of course there are many cars (720,651 of them to be exact, but the bikes are as dense as in Copenhagen, which is dense. There are 12 million people and three to four million bicycles. When you learn, however, that the average annual income is estimated at

about 7,800 guilders or about \$2,000 and that the price of a Volkswagen for instance, is about \$1,800, and that gas per litre comes out to about 50 cents per gallon, you begin to see why the bicycles are popular.

Besides those undeniably good reasons, there is also the nice fact that the terrain caters completely to the cyclist. There is one hill in all of Amsterdam if it can qualify as a hill. A "rise" would be more like it. As far as I could see, it was the only hill in all of the land as well. Anyway, while the cyclists may have an easy time of it, even this mound was almost too much for the motor coach which was carrying our National Newspaper Association Study Mission

Group to the Rijksmuseum, an art museum in Amsterdam, and then to the Hague. It huffed and puffed over it as though it were meeting an honest-to-goodness mountain head on.

Once we made it, though, we chugged out to the country and to The Hague, about 40 miles from Amsterdam, where we attended a meeting at the United States Embassy and the Press Club. Some of our members were interviewed by Philip Wymore of Radio Nederland for broadcast in Europe, and among the subjects Mr. Wymore was eager over were the Los Angeles riots, the Indian lineage of one of our members and our opinions of the Netherlands — to which we had just arrived the night before from London.

THERE IS A SAYING in the Netherlands that "God made the world but the Dutch made Holland." And it certainly seems to be true. With great fortitude the Dutch elched a great part of their land from the sea and even the "scenery" in those areas is therefore man-made. It also seems to be a truth that they made healthy land for out of 12 million people, two-and-a-half million are over 65 and the life expectancy in Holland is 74. But, if the Dutch had built no dikes, half of Holland would be underwater and that would be

equal to the entire state of New Jersey!

One-third of the existing land is below sea-level and when you are in Holland you look UP to the sea.

Much of the land has been reclaimed from the North Sea and the Zuider Zee which is an arm of the North Sea. So much has been reclaimed from the Zuider Zee that what water is left is now sweet water. An estimated 500,000 acres is the total amount of land expected to be gained from this body of water when it is completely drained.

There is no salt water lying around in Holland as one might suspect. The land is reclaimed, not by fill, but by draining. This is the job of the windmill — in pull out the water from the saturated land and drain it off, via canals to the sea. Once there were 20,000 windmills, but today there are only a scant 1,400. Some are still used, but most are left for the tourist's benefit or other farming power. The draining job is now done by electric pumping stations. Ah progress.

The constant nightmare of every Dutchman still is the fear of floods. When storms pile the waves high along the coast, there is always the danger of the water backing up in the canals and spilling over the dikes, or even washing them away. As one Dutchman said, they are "stiff worried."

AN INTERESTING STORY about the windmills is that during the war when Holland was occupied by the Nazis, Dutchmen used to "escape" the country by signals from the arms of the windmills. If the arms were left in an "X" position, or straight up in a cross

position, it meant "danger" for one and "all clear" for the other. Many men escaped this way much to the puzzlement and annoyance of the Nazis. Another war story is told and concerns the town of Scheveningen, a seaside resort near The Hague. In the English spelling, it looks easy enough to pronounce but in the Dutch version it apparently definitely is not, and no German can ever pronounce it correctly. If a man was suspected of being a Nazi spy, therefore he was asked to say "Scheveningen", and there was just no shenningans about Scheveningen. He either said it right or he got shot.

**Firms Awarded Prime Contracts**

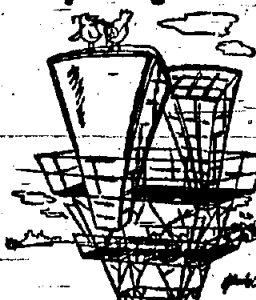
Union and Essex County firms were among 53 small businesses in northern New Jersey which were awarded prime government contracts in October, according to an announcement made this week.

**New Survey Planned By AAA On Sales Tax Vs. Income Tax**

A state sales tax rather than an income tax was overwhelmingly favored last year by motorists of the New Jersey Auto Club (AAA), "but we're taking another poll this month in view of renewed interest in the tax question," F. Kenneth Schultze, general manager of the Auto Club, reported this week.

The previous poll was not published because the Club wanted it for its own certification in the event a new tax on the motorist was proposed, said Schultze. Of 646 AAA members who participated in the poll, which asked what tax would be preferred "if one were necessary," 588 voted for a sales tax, and 46 for an income tax. There were 31 votes for neither tax—despite the phrasing of the question—and eight for a combination tax. Schultze said that the recent gubernatorial campaign and the governor's renewed drive for a broad-based tax prompted the new poll. It is being conducted through the AAA Club's monthly magazine, "The Autolist," which reaches members in Essex, Union, and Mercer Counties.

Schultze said that comments written on the replies to last year's poll cited these reasons for preferring a sales tax:

1. Out-of-staters enjoy the use of our highways and recreational facilities but do not share the tax burden. Yet heavily every state New Jerseyans visit has a sales tax. (An average of 786,000 vehicles cross in and out of New Jersey daily according to the State Highway Department. The Auto Club estimates that 306,000 to 400,000 are out-of-staters.)
2. An income tax has too many loopholes through which some individuals might escape.
3. A "pay-as-you-go" sales tax in pennies is not felt as much as a larger bite out of one's salary.
4. A sales tax would eliminate basic necessities of life from taxation such as food, medicine and clothing.
5. Administrative costs of an income tax would siphon off monies that could be spent for roads and bridges, local school aid and other items.

Schultze said he would welcome responses from all motorists and that they should be addressed to him in care of the New Jersey Auto Club, 1 Hahover Rd., Florham Park.

He stated that information from the new poll would be brought to the attention of the AAA Club's board of trustees and when we decide to go on record favoring one or the other tax, providing additional taxes are necessary.

### VFW Commander Protests Closing Of N. J. Cemetery

Commander Frank G. Rebel of Battle Hill Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Springfield, has expressed the concern of his organization over the closing of the Beverly National Cemetery in Burlington County. He said that the state's only national cemetery for the burial of veterans will be phased out as of Feb. 1.

Official word of the closing was received by a three-man committee of the state's 45,000 VFW members in Washington, D. C. The trio, State Commander John W. Cramer of Hasbrouck Heights, State Chairman Arthur R. Morin, a former State Commander of Mount Holly, conferred for several hours with military authorities in the nation's capital. Col. James C. MacFarland, chief of the Memorial Division of the Support Services Command, affirmed the fact that no burials will take place in New Jersey's only national cemetery after this coming January. The facility will be officially closed at that time.

Rebel noted that distance, travel time and costs of relatives desiring to visit the gravesites posed serious deterrents to out-of-state burials. He said that remaining national cemeteries in the east were also seriously congested with their own nearing capacity problems.

"Our deceased veterans have earned the right to be buried in a veterans' cemetery by the nation they served," Rebel stated.

Nothing that the fatalities of the Viet Nam conflict are a new factor to be considered, he termed the Beverly Cemetery closing "ironic, inconsiderate and saddening."

He urged all citizens to write to their Senators, Representatives, the Governor, the State Senators, Assemblymen and municipal officials.

"All of these individuals can help if we undertake a serious campaign of soliciting their aid," he added.

"The VFW pledges to do all we can to extend Beverly or procure burial space elsewhere in the state," Rebel continued, "but every American who has ever had a relative or friend in the uniform of his country honors that individual or his memory by aiding us and taking up with the mightiest of weapons — the pen — now."

### HADASSAH UNIT HOLDS TAG DRIVE FOR CHILD CARE

### Report On Water Listed By League Of Women Voters

Water conservation legislation passed during the first session of the 89th Congress is described by the League of Women Voters in a 16-page report, entitled "The 89th Congress Acts in 1965 — On Water Resources Management."

Mrs. Henry Huneke, president of the League of Women Voters of Springfield, this week described the publication as a "careful analysis of recent major acts affecting U.S. water management." The review also contains a legislative history of the laws discussed.

Now, as never before, the study explains, the Water Resources Planning Act makes it possible for comprehensive, long-range planning for river basins and regions to be carried out jointly by the states and the federal government.

The 1965 legislation places greater emphasis on the state's role in water management. This is especially true of the Water Quality Act, the Water Resources Planning Act, the Appalachian Regional Development Act, and the Water Projects Recreation Act.

The League of Women Voters has been studying federal water legislation since 1956. The League of Women Voters of New Jersey has listed water as a state study item for 10 years and strongly supported the referendum to provide money for the reservoirs at Round Valley and Spruce Run.

The league in New Jersey also, in cooperation with leagues in New York, Pennsylvania and Delaware, supported the Tocks Island project which became a reality last August when President Johnson signed the implementing legislation.

# Income Tax Is Only Solution To Jersey's Headaches -- LWV

Only an income tax can solve New Jersey's financial troubles, says Union County's League of Women Voters.

In a new statement this week, the League reaffirmed its long-held position of an income tax over a state sales tax. The League was the first major group in New Jersey to advocate a personal income tax, and is now waging an intensive campaign as the state appears to be moving closer to adoption of a broad-based tax to increase its revenue.

New Jersey is now the only state in the Union without a sales or income tax.

"Three-fourths of New Jersey's families would pay more with a sales tax, even with food, shelter and clothing exempt, than they would with an income tax of the type proposed by the Governor," said Mrs. Benjamin Nossanbaum of Union, chairman of the Union County LWV Council.

"We estimate that an average family of four, with an income of \$4,000 annually, would pay about \$32 in sales taxes but only \$9 in a state income tax. With an income of \$6,000, this family would pay \$42 in sales taxes but only \$10 in an income tax."

Any defense of the present tax structure as adequate and equitable, she added, "is in denial of the facts which are evident to anyone who reads the newspaper or who is capable of observing the conditions around him."

"We DO need more college space," Mrs. Nossanbaum said. "We DO need vocational training for those not going on to college. We DO need better roads, better mass transportation, more state aid for local schools."

"These needs cannot be met by more local taxes or by piecemeal taxation at the state level. Only a broad-based tax can do the job. And the fairest broad-based tax is an income tax."

Eyes Closed

New Jerseyans, said Mrs. Nossanbaum, "have long closed their eyes to the fact that while maintaining an adamant stand against new taxes—their

existing taxes have gone up steadily year after year.

"As wages in private industry go up, as the cost of materials increases, as the inflation spiral continues, it is inevitable that the cost of government will also increase."

"In New Jersey, lacking a broad-based tax, the burden of increased state costs has been met by piecemeal methods such as increased taxes on cigarettes, gasoline, liquor, and taxes on corporations. Since these sources of revenue are inadequate even to maintain the services the state must provide, it cannot expand its services to meet present-day needs."

Relief For Propertyowners

"One of the most pressing needs is relief for the local property-taxpayer in the form of increased state aid to local school districts. State aid to education has remained at the same level since 1957, during which time school costs have gone up an average of \$116 per pupil."

"To pay these increased local school costs the municipality has only one recourse—to increase taxes on local property. As a result, property taxes have more than doubled in New Jersey in the past 10 years. In other words, we in New Jersey have a narrow-based tax system which falls most heavily on the local property owner who is not necessarily in a position to assume the burden for the entire populace."

"Property taxes account for 95 percent of total state and local taxes in New Jersey, compared with 46 percent average for the United States."

"A graduated income tax, with suitable exemptions, would distribute the burden over a much greater area and would tax according to ability to pay. It would be deductible from income when figuring the federal income tax, thereby retaining in

New Jersey million dollars that now go to the federal government.

State's Obligations

"In the absence of a broad-based tax, how well is New Jersey able to meet its obligations to its citizens? Do we have a good system of higher education, safe, well-maintained roads, good mass transportation, adequately staffed state institutions?"

"The answer on all counts is NO. New Jersey colleges turned away 25,000 applicants last spring (Rutgers alone rejected 5,000 qualified applicants)."

"Vocational training, so important in an industrial state, is almost non-existent."

"Highways, particularly in the heavily populated northeast section of our state, are dangerously overcrowded, exacting a heavy toll in deaths and injuries."

"State institutions are still heavily overcrowded despite bond issues for new buildings, and understaffed due to the low salary scale."

"Mental patients and retarded children are fed on a \$2 cents per-capita per-day food budget."

"Commuter railroads are in trouble and in need of tax relief and subsidies to keep operating."

Mrs. Nossanbaum said: "We repeat: Only a broad-based tax can do the job. And the fairest broad-based tax is an income tax."

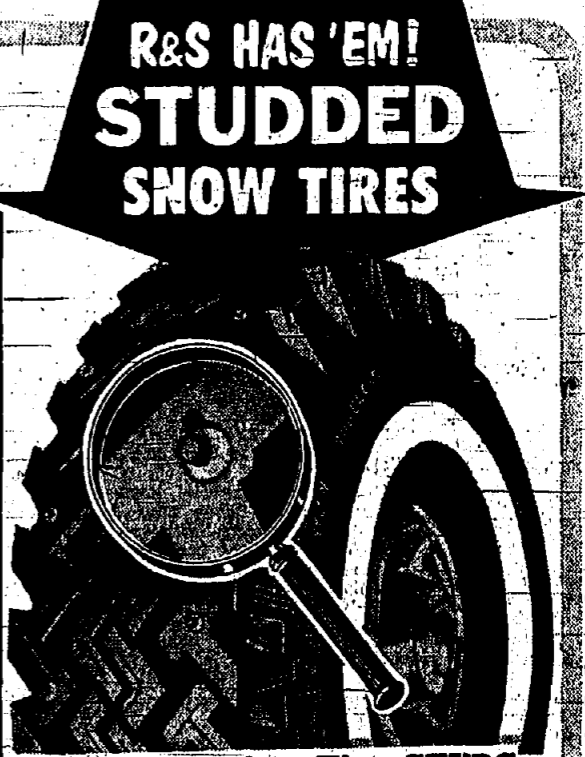

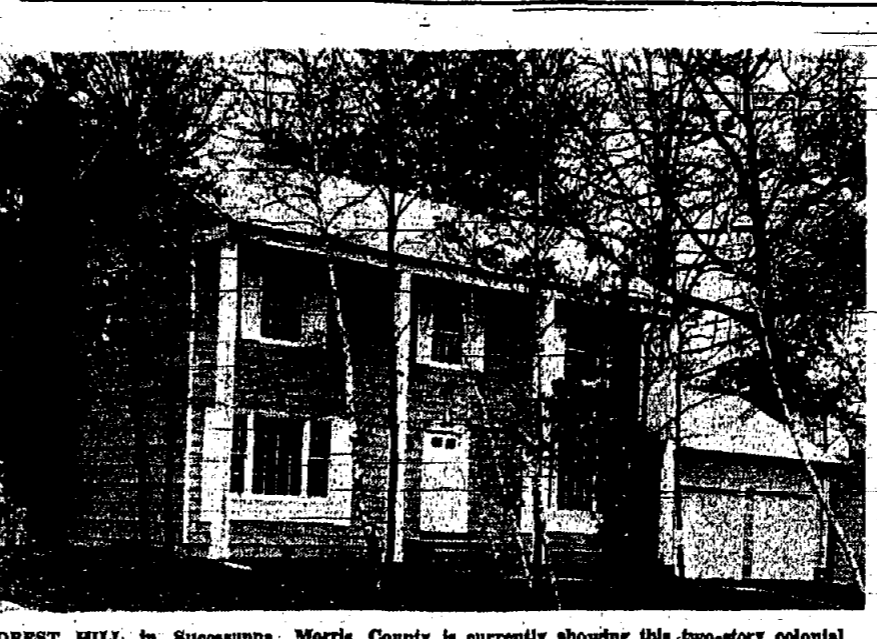

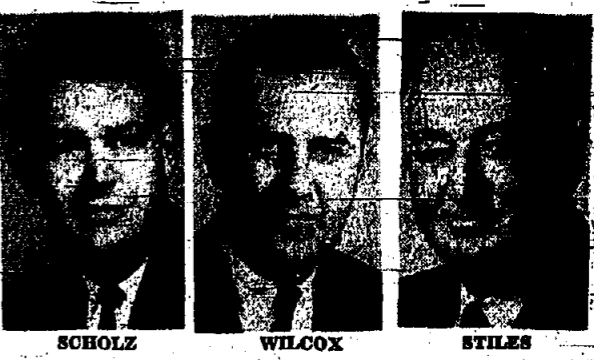

# MacKay Says UJC Will Remain Two-Year Institution

Dr. Kenneth C. MacKay, president of the Union County Guidance and Personnel Association last week that Union Junior College, Cranford, will remain a two-year institution, filling the need for academic programs for freshmen and sophomores.

Dr. MacKay was one of four speakers at the association's semi-annual dinner meeting at the college.

"Our philosophy hasn't changed very much. Our task in the scheme of higher education is to provide at-home education for freshmen and sophomores, as fulltime students in the Day Session and as parttime students in the Evening Session," Dr. MacKay said.

The UJC president said a great deal of thought has been given to the future of Union Junior College, including expansion to a four-year program.

"When the need arises in Union County for a four-year institution, we'll make whatever decision is required. I don't foresee any such consideration for maybe five years," Dr. MacKay said.

"Our business is to be a transfer institution, and we are glad to work with the Union County Technical Institute as a partner. We know there are a lot of things to be done in higher education, but we can only do a little part of the job," the UJC president added.

Dr. MacKay reported that 337 Union County residents have received tuition aid grants of \$200 this semester. He said the new Tuition Aid Plan is available to all Union County residents who win admission to Union Junior College as fulltime students in the Day Session.

"All other things being equal, we will give priority to Union County residents. I predict in the near future 80 percent of our students will be from Union County," Dr. MacKay said.

The UJC president said the entire area of financial aid to college students has "opened up enormously."

"If you know of students who need financial help, we urge you to contact us. We are concerned that more underprivileged students have not availed them-

self of this opportunity to attend Union Junior College. The new Tuition Aid Plan and other financial aid now available makes it possible to solve at least part of their financial problems," Dr. MacKay said.

The UJC president said the Tuition Aid Plan supports the student directly.

"I want to take this opportunity to publicly thank the freeholders for their support of this bi-partisan or non-partisan plan," Dr. MacKay said.

Dr. Kenneth W. Iversen, dean, who welcomed the association to the college, reported on plans for a new science building and for the William Miller Sperry Observatory. Dr. Iversen said construction of the science building is planned to begin in the fall.

John Green, coordinator of the Union County Technical Institute, told the guidance counselors a new high school cooperative program in machine shop is now underway, and this cooperative program will be expanded to 12 areas once additional facilities are provided in Scotch Plains. Under the cooperative program, the student attends the technical institute half the day and his own high school the other half, but graduates from his own high school.

Green said the institute now offers post-high school programs in mechanical, electronics, and chemical technology, data processing and programming, dental

medical assisting, and medical nursing.

John R. Flynn, of the State Department of Education, described the federal aid available under the five titles of the new Elementary and Secondary Act. He said New Jersey has been allocated \$24 million under Title I, "which will have the greatest impact on disadvantaged children." Four or five projects in Union County have already been approved, Flynn reported.

"Many of the projects under Title I involve the expansion of guidance services as well as more psychological and social work services. The impact of Title I in terms of personnel will be greatest in special service people," Flynn said.
