Anti-flood efforts, election upset share top 1969 headlines

Del Vecchio offers 8 ideas for future

In his farewell speech to the people of Springfield, given at the final 1969 meeting of the Springfield Township Committee last Tuesday evening at the municipal building, retiring Mayor Philip Del Vecchio presented a list of eight suggestions to his successors.

Better protection for apartment dwellers in the township and the passage of specific health ordinance recommendations, followed by...

ment of a proposed cleanup program for both commercial and residential properties in the town...
The mayor, who was displaced from office by the victory of the Democratic candidate for the Township Committee, Nat Stokes, went on to recommend the bringing in of private utilities to the industrial area and the continuation of good service to the existing industries.

Continuation of efforts for the completion of the flood control project was another of the mayor's suggestions, along with a proposition for the building of a middle-income housing project for the township's senior citizens...
The mayor also emphasized a need for the development of a fair campaign practices commission for the township to be headed by local citizens and to set guidelines for public campaigning in the community.

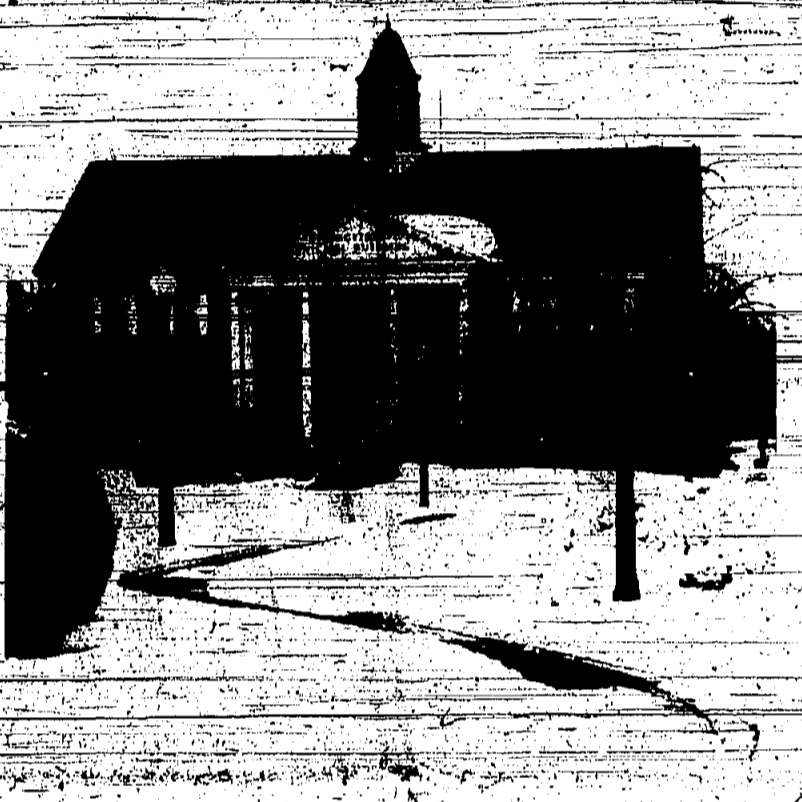
The mayor's colleagues on the governing body then added a few comments, headed by Arthur Falkin, who pointed out...

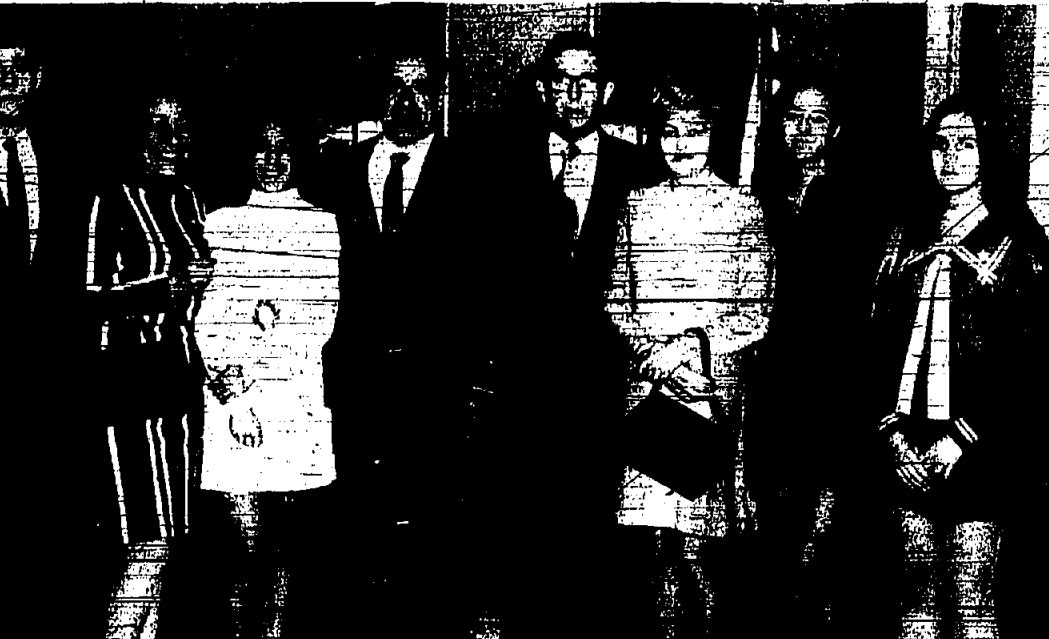
