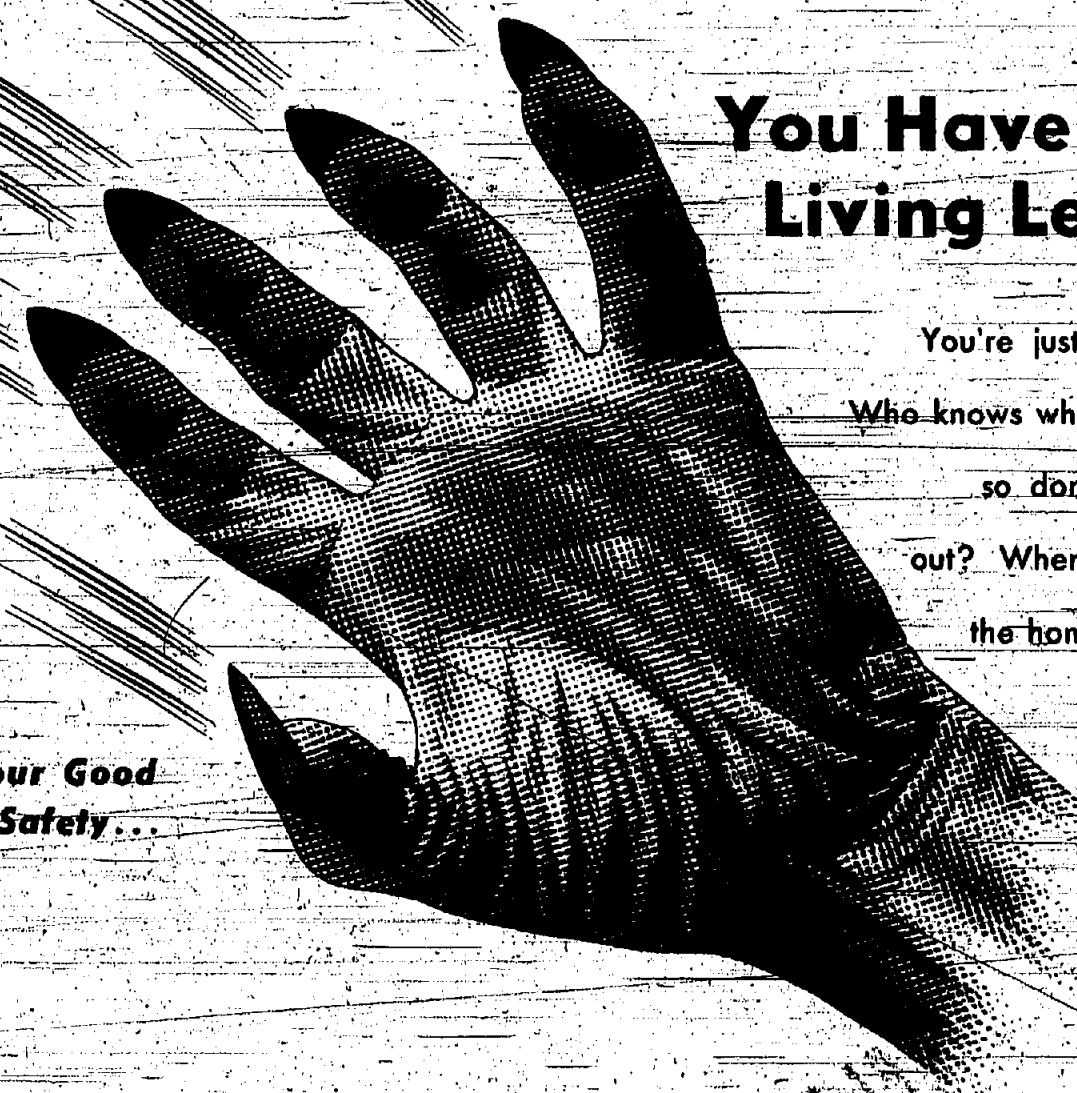
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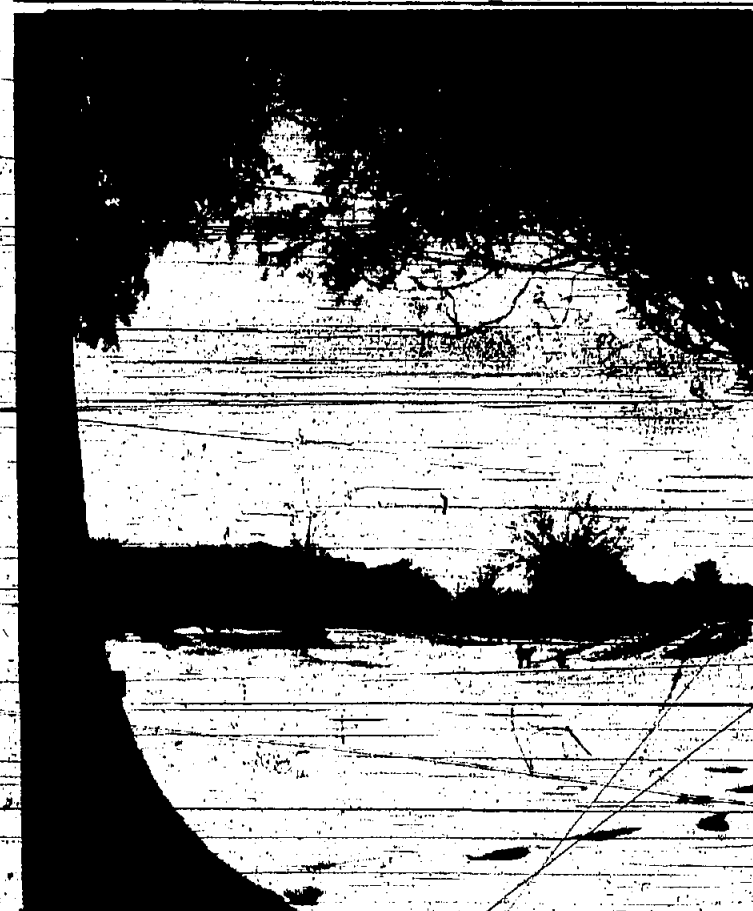

Township organizes for the new year

Mayor calls for support of tenant rights

Board members named as Bullman takes over

Mayor Henry J. Bullman, who took office at the annual organizational meeting of the Township Committee New Year's Day at Town Hall, pledged in his inaugural address to support of tenants the town's improvement plan. He called on those living in apartments to let him know of any problems which might arise in their dealings with their landlords.

Stokes was sworn in at the meeting as the governing body's only Democratic member. Stokes defeated Mayor Philip Del Vecchio in the Nov. 4 election. Mrs. Maria Stokes, another Democrat, was sworn in as tax collector. She will continue with her re-election in November.

The program opened with the presentation of the color poster "The color guard of Congressional American Legion Post. The invocation was by Mr. Francis X. Coyle of St. James Church, and the benediction by Rabbi Reuben R. Levine of Temple Beth Shalom. Bullman announced department assignments for the five members of the Township Committee. Stokes will be in charge of finance and revenue, assisted by Arthur M. Balkin and Robert G. Flansburg.

Flansburg will head public works, aided by Bullman and Flansburg. Flansburg is also in charge of public affairs, including recreation, aided by Raymond W. Forbes and Stokes. Stokes will be in charge of administration, aided by Forbes and Stokes.

THE GOVERNING BODY then appointed a number of members of the new administration. All were approved without comment, although Stokes withdrew several nominations in opposition to those presented by the Republican majority. All failed for lack of a second.

James M. Conley was reappointed as township attorney. Stokes had offered the name of former Township Committee member Jay Bloom. Richard Strickland was appointed as treasurer, despite Stokes' nomination of Martin Sherman. Theresa Fries was named deputy treasurer.

Paul Oberstein was reappointed building inspector, with Stokes voting for Walter Kozub instead. A three-member advisory committee, directed by Mrs. Lajo Johnson as program coordinator.

Max Sherman was reappointed as even though Stokes proposed Michael J. Scully. Scott Donington was reappointed prosecutor, a post for which Stokes presented the name of Eugene Lewis.

Regional school budget tops 8 million; hearing slated Jan. 20 in Springfield

The current operating expense for next year include \$248,677 for administration salaries, \$4,774,784 for instructional salaries and \$27,239 for textbooks, libraries and audiovisual materials. The total of \$12,000,000 for the 1970-71 school year is an increase of 9.7 percent over the 1969-70 budget and 13.4 percent over the 1968-69 school year budget.

The 800,000 of revenue estimate a balance appropriated from this year of \$475,300 and a local tax levy of \$5,257,741. State aid is expected to be \$364,620 and federal aid \$2,000,000. A sum of \$60,000 is expected from various nations and \$85,019 from miscellaneous sources.

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Health salaries are estimated at \$71,285 and contracted salaries for public employees \$2,000,000. The total of \$12,000,000 for the 1970-71 school year is an increase of 9.7 percent over the 1969-70 budget and 13.4 percent over the 1968-69 school year budget.

Also, transportation, contracted services and public carriers, from \$16,799 and \$25,000, to \$20,235 and \$115,110, and \$124,600, salaries, from \$26,555 and \$27,100 to \$28,300, maintenance, from \$1,000 to \$1,000.

The Springfield Board of Education this week announced a budget of \$2,705,850 for the 1970-71 school year, an increase of slightly less than 10 percent from the current operating figure of \$2,441,077.

STATE'S BOND BACKLOG TOPS BILLION DOLLARS

Although New Jersey's state debt multiplied over the past decade to total almost \$375 million, more than a billion dollars of bond authorizations remain to be raised.

The latest edition of "New Jersey Fiscal Facts" shows that state debt rose from \$102.5 million at the beginning of the 1959-60 fiscal year to \$337.3 million at the start of the current (1969-70) fiscal year last July. The latter total includes only \$75 million of the \$90 million bond issue approved by voters in 1968 for education, transportation and housing. An additional \$15 million in bonds had been issued through December 1, last.

Thus, with the balance of this issue, plus the \$27 million of water conservation bonds approved by voters in November 1969, some \$148,500,000 of bond authorizations remained for issuance in the 1969 calendar year closed. State fiscal officials had deferred issuing them because of the immediate demands of the 1969 market, exceeded the state's statutory 6% interest limitation.

Scuba diver class opens tonight at Y

The YMCA of Eastern Union County will offer 10-week courses in scuba diving beginning tonight at 8 p.m. The conditional classes will be held at the Y pool, 135 Madison Ave., Elizabeth.

Lessons are divided into classroom lectures and pool, enabling the student to learn the principles of diving, safety precautions and how to handle emergencies; the use of scuba equipment and how to become comfortable in the water.

The course is presented and administered by James J. Foran of Hillside, is recognized by the United States Scuba Diving Council. More than 600 have taken the course.

Requirements for taking the course include membership in the Y and knowing how to swim. Participants in Union County will receive a scuba certificate. Scuba equipment may be rented from the Y, but the student must furnish his own mask, fins and snorkel.

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Helping man use the mind

It may be possible to train man to exercise control over his brain waves, according to a psychologist at the University of California, Irvine. The self-hypnotism could help in improving concentration, reducing tension, and possibly in "controlling" some types of epileptic seizures.

In an extended experiment, the results of which are still being evaluated by a psychologist, Dr. Joseph T. Hart, sought to prove that if a person wants to relax he can activate a certain brain wave known as the "alpha rhythm."

Dr. Hart tried to train his volunteers to be able to switch off the required brain wave at will. His method was to monitor their brain waves through electrodes taped to their heads. He then had them relax when they produced the alpha rhythm. He repeated the experiment with a group of 10 subjects supported by a U.S. Office of Education grant. (UNESCO FEATURES)
