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Mrs. Waldt triumphs in Regional election by wide margin

Teachers vote to try 'talk' again

Strike vote ruled out by margin of 3 to 1

The Regional High School Teachers' Association Tuesday night voted by a margin of three to one against a faction which had called for an immediate strike vote in its contract deadlock with the Regional Board of Education.

The teachers' association, however, to give the mediation process one more try, according to Kenneth Meeks, RTA president. He added that the vote placed a time limit on the negotiation process. The meeting was held at Wileland's Steak House, Rt. 22, Mountaintop, with 306 of the approximately 350 teachers taking part from the four Regional high schools.

Meeks declared: "There was an open, very thorough discussion of all the issues involved. The overwhelming majority of the teachers agreed to pursue fact-finding in the contract impasse with the board."

"That process has been instituted with the New Jersey Public Employees Relation Commission. (Fact finding is not binding on either party, under the law, but it carries more force than the recommendations of a mediator.)"

"There was a standing vote taken with the members voting at least three to one in favor of this course, as opposed to an immediate strike against the Board of Education."

"There was, however, a strict time limit placed on the motion. The Association will meet again to decide on definitive action seven days after the fact-finding report is submitted to the Regional Board of Education."

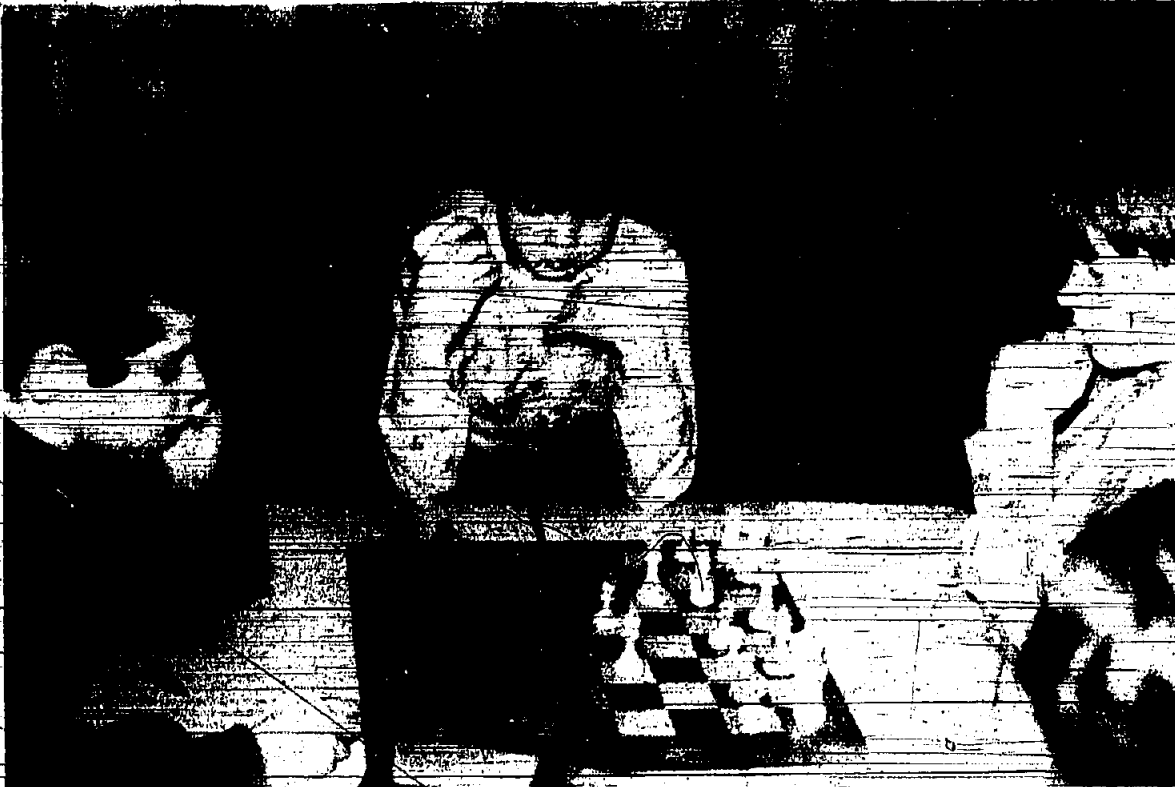
The Teachers' Association represents faculty members at the four Regional High Schools. They are Jonathan Dayton in Springfield, Gov. Livingston in Berkeley Heights, A. L. Johnson in Clark and David Brearley in Kenilworth. The schools serve some 5,000 students from Springfield, Mountaintop, Berkeley Heights, Clark, Kenilworth and Garwood.

In a statement last month, Meeks had declared that there was an impasse in the negotiations — a technical step necessary before a state mediator could be brought into the dispute.

At that time, he stated: "The Association's proposal to the board represented a fair and reasonable professional salary guide designed to attract qualified teachers to the district to replace those who are leaving. The Association has reduced its proposal by more than \$1 million, while the board has offered to increase present salaries and insurance by approximately \$205,000."

The last offer from the board would give teachers holding a bachelor's degree from

Two budget items backed by voters

Mrs. Natalie Waldt was elected Tuesday to her second three-year term on the Regional District Board of Education. She defeated Howard Schwartz for one of the two Springfield seats on the board, 455 votes to 86. The other Springfield seat is held by Dr. Benjamin Josephson, whose term expires next year.

At the same time, voters in Springfield helped the Regional budget sweep to a victory by a margin of nearly two to one. The operating budget of \$7,542,752 won, 1,237 to 44. The total for the capital outlay portion of \$107,435 was 1,191 to 677.

Following her re-election, Mrs. Waldt declared that she "will continue to work as hard as I have the last three years."

She added, "My main concern is the students of the Regional system, and especially those in the town of Springfield." Mrs. Waldt expressed her thanks to the people of Springfield for their "vote of confidence."

She declined to comment at this time on the support expressed for her opponent in a letter sent last week by Union County Freeholder David Zurav, a Springfield Republican, to members of the local GOP organization.

IN OTHER CONTESTS for seats on the Regional board, Charles Scheuermann defeated Herman Bleber, 40-Keelworth, 134 votes to 126, and incumbent Dr. Minor G. K. Jones defeated Mrs. Marjorie Miller, a write-in candidate, in Mountaintop. His margin was 385 to 183.

Another incumbent, John H. Conlin, was elected without opposition in Garwood. He received 76 votes.

Springfield voters favored the operating expense portion of the budget, 379 to 113. They also backed the capital outlay portion, 218 to 124.

In Clark, the operating budget won by a slim margin, 98 to 94, and the capital outlay portion was favored, 102 to 90. Garwood voters backed the operating budget, 48 to 20, and the capital outlay portion, 46 to 21.

The contest for Mountaintop showed the operating budget ahead, 389 to 198, and the capital outlay portion leading, 352 to 206. In Berkeley Heights, the operating budget carried, 277 votes to 121, and the capital outlay portion, 266 to 118.

Keelworth was the only community to oppose the two budgetary items. The operating budget lost there, 36 to 38, and the capital outlay portion, 83 to 116.

Observers at Regional board headquarters at Jonathan Dayton Regional High School, Springfield, speculated that the number of voters may have been reduced by the weather.

Lan issues call for resignation of freeholder

Donald Lan, Democratic municipal chairman for Springfield, this week sent letters to Republican Freeholder David Zurav of Springfield and Freeholder Director Edward Tiller, demanding Zurav's resignation from the Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders for "injuring partisan machinery into the traditionally non-partisan Union County Regional Board of Education election which takes place on Tuesday, Feb. 3."

Lan cited a letter sent by Zurav to members of the Springfield Republican organization which commenced, "Dear Fellow Republicans," supporting the candidacy of Howard Schwartz over incumbent Mrs. Natalie Waldt for a Springfield seat on the six-community Regional Board of Education.

Lan further stated, "while Mr. Zurav is actually, crisis to cover his politically based interference in a strictly non-partisan school board election by citing that Mr. Schwartz is a Democrat and that he, Zurav, is acting as a private citizen and not as a freeholder, this is overshadowed by the fact that this correspondence was addressed to officials of a political organization by one of their leading elected officials."

He quoted Zurav's letter as saying, "...the outcome of an election can be swung by a determined effort on the part of all of us."

Lan added, "By practice, tradition and legislation, the Regional Board is an independent, autonomous, separately elected body, properly intended to be free of the influence of partisan politics, and the pressures and influences of the Board of Freeholders and Mr. Zurav's efforts subvert their policies."

"The citizens of Union County deserve representatives on their Board of Freeholders who support the traditional and ethically proper hands-off attitude toward political infiltration in independent school board matters."

Mr. Zurav has proven by his ill-considered interference in the Union County Regional

Reports on activities in '69 issued by fire, police chiefs

Public Safety Commissioner Raymond W. Forbes this week released summaries of last year's police and fire-fighting activities. The reports were prepared by Police Chief Wilbur G. Selander and Fire Chief Robert E. Day.

Chief Selander said there were 496 accidents last year, 346 of them state reportable (involving personal injury or damage of over \$200) and 150 non-reportable, with one traffic fatality and 121 injuries.

He reported 552 crimes during the year, with 318 cleared and another 34 cases cleared by juvenile charges.

Leading in the number of offenses were 132 break, entry and larceny cases and 124 larceny and theft cases. Other offenses listed by Chief Selander were:

Robbery, seven; auto theft, 16; assault and battery, 13; fraud, 12; embezzlement, two; receiving stolen property, two; malicious damage, three; carrying concealed weapon, five.

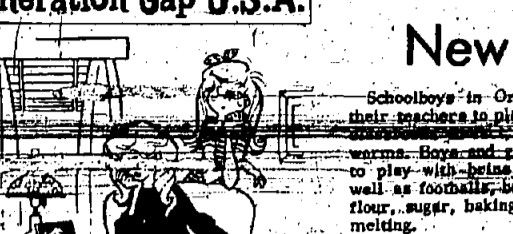

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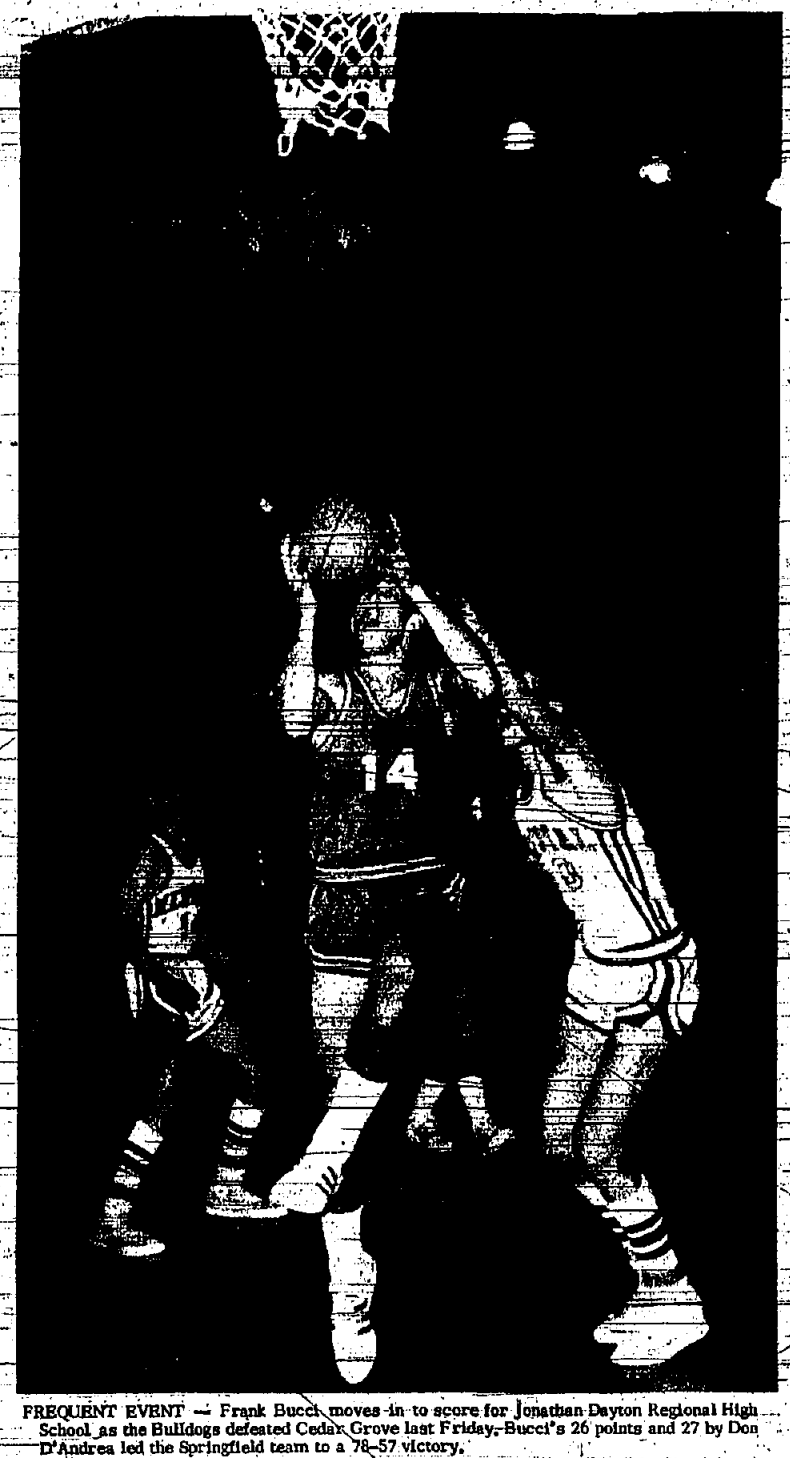
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Dayton routs Cedar Grove for 15th; N. Providence next
