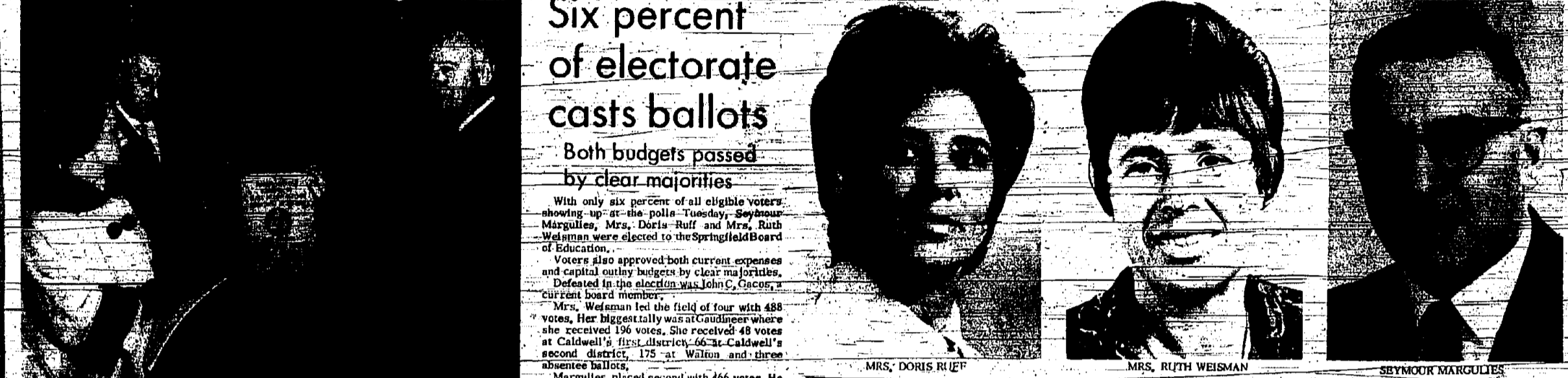

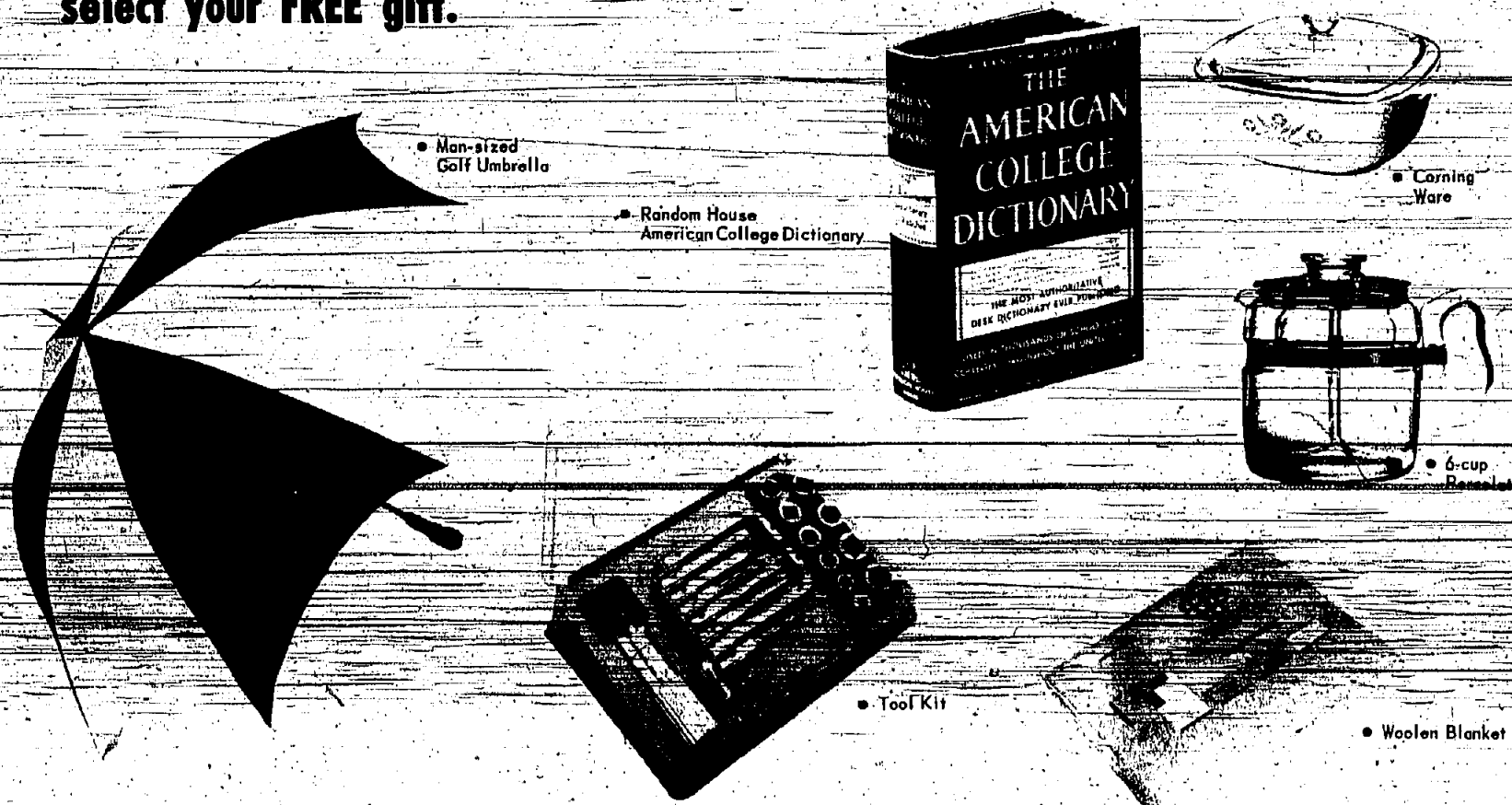

ASPIRA official discusses problems of Puerto-Ricans

Carlos Morales, education director of ASPIRA, recently visited Mrs. Norma Levine's eighth grade social studies classes at Florence Gaudin School. His talk culminated a unit of study on the problems of Puerto-Ricans in the United States. Morales, who is currently studying for a master's degree in business administration at Rutgers University, He related from first hand experience the problems faced by Puerto-Ricans as they struggle to improve their economic conditions. Morales was placed by Morales on the importance of education to the Puerto Rican as the tool to achieve a better life. His agency, ASPIRA, which has branches in many states, was founded primarily to assist Puerto Rican youth from becoming dropouts. Only one out of every 10 Puerto Ricans who enter high school remains to graduate. In the past three years, ASPIRA has counseled over 3,000 Puerto Rican high school youth who have gone on to college. Morales uses resource speakers such as himself to advise as possible to make the most of every moment in the classroom. A school improvement program for New York, was presented from the City College of New York. He is currently studying for a master's degree in business administration at Rutgers University. 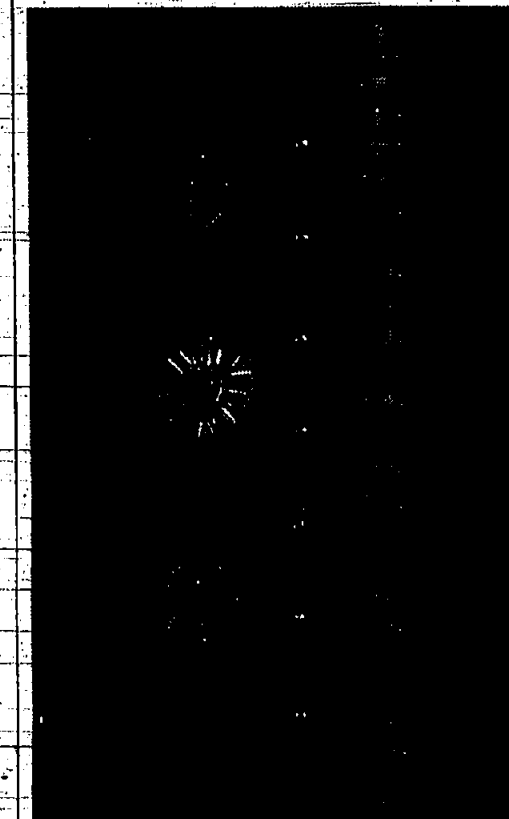

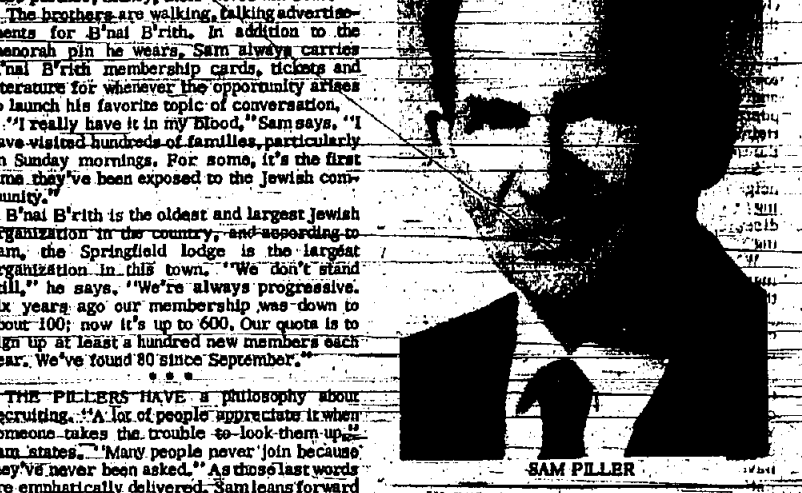

Good gnus for chilly chimps, cobras ... Turtle Back Zoo puts the heat on its animals

When it's freezing outside and there are deep snow drifts, humans have the option of staying inside to avoid the cold. But for the animals at the Turtle Back Zoo, the only option is to huddle up near the heat.

Since the zoo is closed until it is warm enough for the public to visit again, it seems reasonable that zoo-creatures like tropical birds, and even some less delicate animals which are used to the hot climates of Asia or Africa, need special attention.

On a recent windy day at Turtle Back Zoo in West Orange, the only public zoo in the area, zoo director Richard Ryan pointed out some of the problems: "Our primary difficulty is the need for indoor heated space here in the winter," he said. "Fortunately we have a number of animals in our collection that adapt well to cold weather. But you can't have a zoo without some tropical animals, and some of these simply don't adapt to the cold."

Up until last year the turtles were the zoo's

biggest headache, according to Ryan. "We couldn't put them outside until June, and then around Labor Day they were still too hot to handle," he said. "When it comes to the turtle being our trademark, (the zoo has the second largest collection in the nation), people expect them to always be available. Thanks to funds being made available two years ago we were able to build a glass 'henry', and now, even if we were open year-round, they are always visible." (The funds were donated by Carter Savings and Loan Association.)

BUILDING ANIMAL SHELTER structures, such as the structure, is "12,000 sq ft," Ryan said. "It must have levels be planned for, but represent the temperature and climate of the Amazon Basin, and the proper ventilation in such a glass building, must be accounted for in the design."

Next to the turtles, tropical birds are the most weather-sensitive creatures in the zoo. Although they aren't as large, individually, as some of the massive turtles, there are many more of them to house.

The iguanas, the cobras and the camels,

are difficult to cope with as they adapt, mostly. However, Ryan pointed out that the zoo has a number of iguanas, and has provided for all zoo inhabitants. The zoo has to improve sometimes to provide for its animals.

As an example they have the rare iguanas that are being boarded separately right now, due to difficulty in getting their now air-conditioned cages built. Although the iguanas for the cages was made available through private contributions early last year, construction has not been completed to date. Until the day, one leopard is housed in the zoo's hospital and the other is in a temporary, weather-proofed outdoor cage.

WINTERTIME BIRTHS also present special problems, Ryan cited the recent birth of a Sitatunga antelope, native to West Africa, in the snow at Turtle Back Zoo in West Orange.

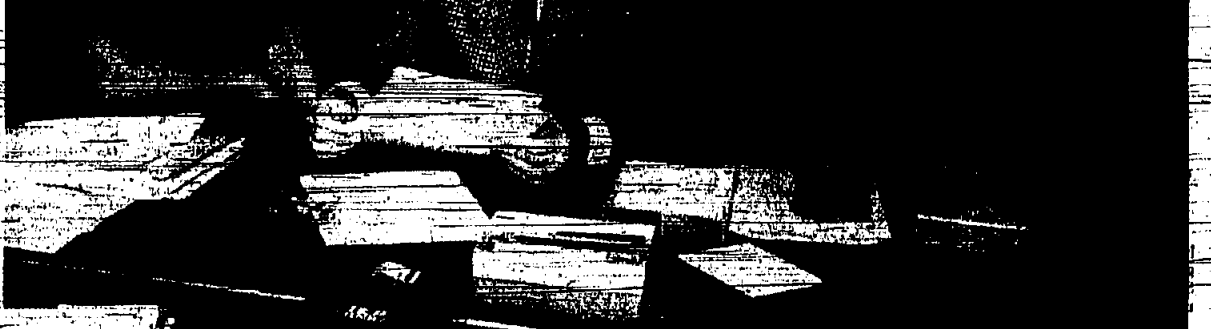

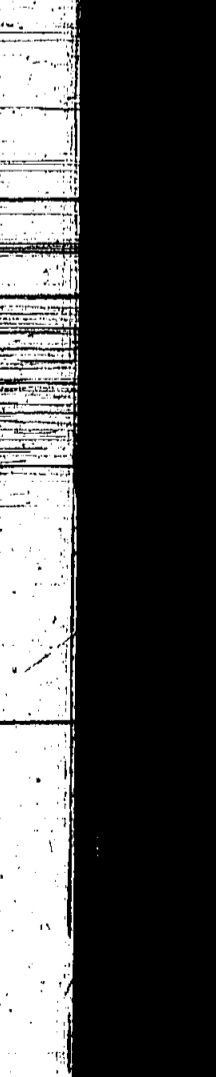
