When not in use, hang furs in an uncrowded closet on heavy, supporting coat hangers. The best ones for this use are padded or rounded wooden hangers with wide ends and a long wire to reach from the hanger to the pole.

If a fur coat has gotten damp, shake it gently to remove excess moisture and hang in an after cool place hang in an airy, cool place to dry. Do not brush, comb or rub a damp fur. Light moisture will not harm fur.

Never store fur, whether-wet or dry, near heat. Always keep it in a cool place. Avoid long exposure to bright sunlight. Strong sun-light over a long period of time will cause fading.

Occasionally, shake a fur-gently to remove dust and lint, if a scarr'ts not worn, wipe the neckline with a soft-tissue or towel. Do not spray or place in-secticides or moth preven-tives directly on fur. Never use dry cleaning fluid on any part of fur. When wearing a fur coat,

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
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
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


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Civil Rights group issues publication on racism in U.S.

WASHINGTON, D.C.—The United States Commission on Civil Rights this week released a publication, "Ractard in America and How To Combat It," an easay written by Dr. Anthony

In an introduction, Judge Otto Kerner, U.S. Court of Appeals to the Seventh Circuit, who served as chairman of the Commission on Civil. Obsorders, calls it "must reading for all of us" and says "the examples presented clearly identify racism in its many forms which must be understood before positive programs can be expected to improve relationships and eliminate the prescht interracial sensions."
Judge Kerner endorsed the anti-racism strategies outlined by Dr. Downs and added that while they are not all encompassing, "I that while they are not all encompassing, "I am most impressed by its (the essay's) high-lighting the necessity of involving the minority community in the planning and administration of efforts and the recognition of the private sector's responsibilities as well as governmental."

Of the nine children, kindergartners or first graders, being bused to the Sandmeter School, five live more than two miles away and will continue to ride the buses. The other four will be dropped.


