Ice patrol is tracking stray bergs

The U. S. Coast Guard has begun its annual tracking of Arctic icebergs which threaten North Atlantic shipping lanes. The Coast Guard is broadcasting iceberg information twice a day.

Rear Admiral Mark A. Whalen, commander of the International Ice Patrol, marking its 50th year of operations, the Ice Patrol was started in January 1914, less than two years after the British luxury liner "Titanic" collided with an iceberg 300 miles south of Newfoundland on her maiden voyage and sank with a loss of more than 1,500 lives.

A Coast Guard Reconnaissance flight earlier this month along the Labrador coast indicates that the 1970 ice season will be a heavy one. Some 600 "bergs" are expected to drift south of 48-degree north latitude into maritime traffic lanes. The 48th parallel is considered by maritime officials to be the approximate northern boundary of North Atlantic shipping.

The Coast Guard manages the Ice Patrol services under the provisions of the International Convention for the Safety of Life at Sea. Tracking of bergs is accomplished by Coast Guard aircraft but sightings are also reported by other planes and vessels. Broadcasts concerning icebergs which drift south past Newfoundland into the area of the Grand Banks, important activities are coordinated from headquarters on Governors Island, N. Y.

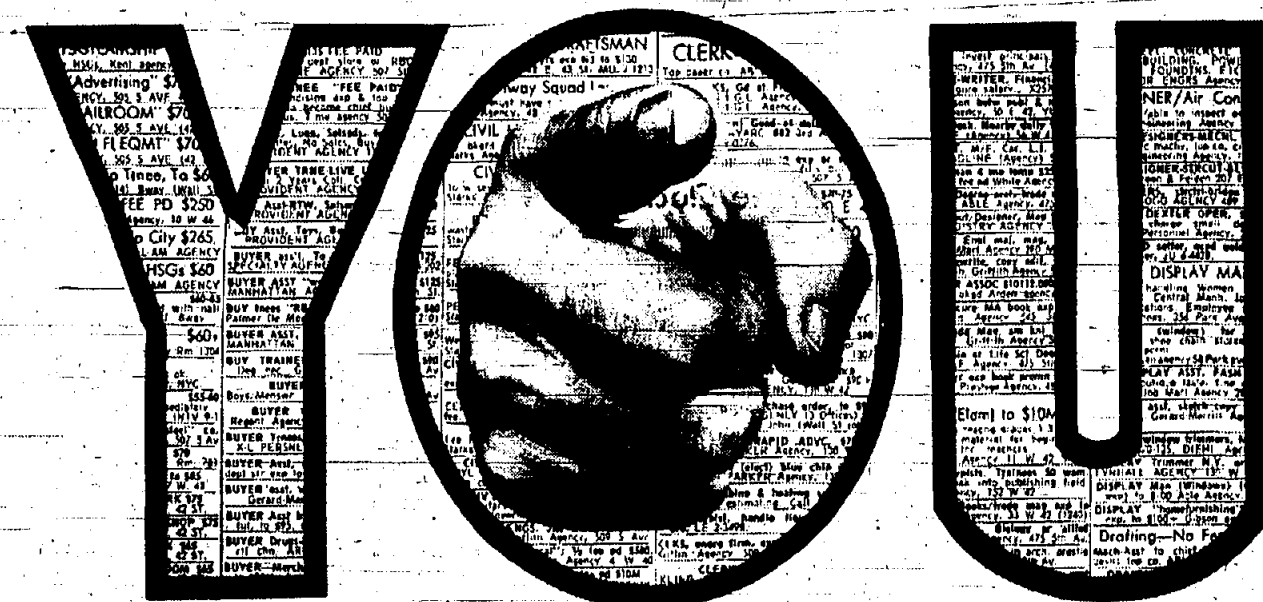

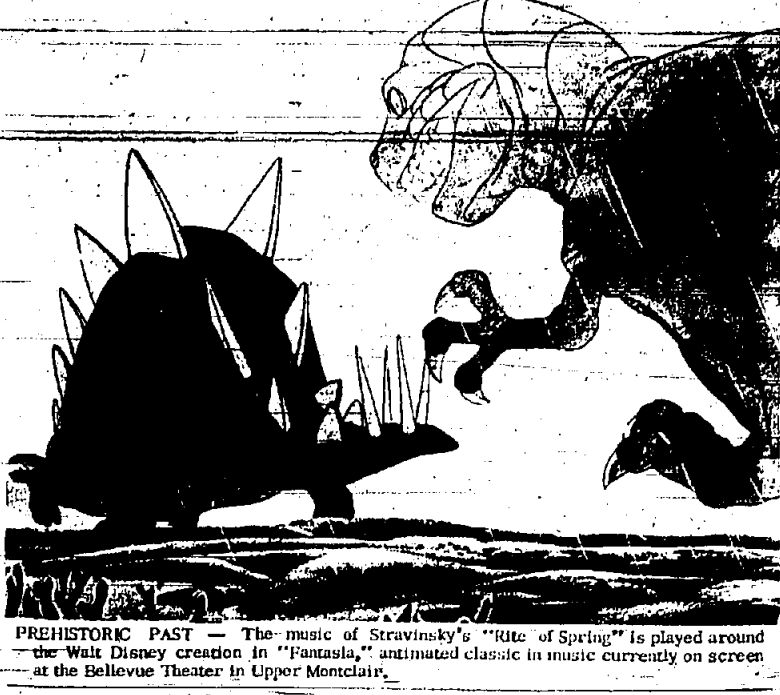

Cherry blossoms highlight anniversary

75th birthday fete for Branch Brook Park

Plans for a 75th anniversary Cherry Blossom Festival to be held in Branch Brook Park in Newark, later this month, were announced today by William Harris, chairman of the Essex County Park Commission's 75th anniversary committee.

In cooperation with the Japanese American Association of New York, original Japanese music and dancing will highlight a special program which is scheduled to begin at 12:30 p.m. on Sunday, April 19, in the Bellevue extension of the Park, north of Heller Parkway. A brief ceremony commemorating the founding of the park system 75 years ago marking the oldest county park system in the United States will be revealed over by the Honorable Hiroshi Uchida, Japanese Consul of New York.

No reservations or tickets are needed to attend, according to Harris. "Everyone is cordially invited to bring their families and enjoy this short-run spring extravaganza of cherry blossoms."

The Japanese American Association conducted the display of cherry blossoms at Branch Brook the largest and most unusual in the world. It is anticipated that nearly 400 Japanese Americans will attend, a number of which will be wearing traditional Japanese attire.

YOSHII IMAI, an executive of Watson and Co., Newark, is co-chairman of the outing for the Association. He stated that their association annually visits the park during the blooming of the cherry blossoms. "We are delighted that the Anniversary Committee have asked us to assist this year in making the occasion meaningful for everyone," he said.

There are 2,200 ornamental cherry trees and about 100 different species, in what was in 1895, considered. The first trees were provided by the Felix Fuld family of Newark during the late 1920's. The park today comprises 500 acres of trees, shrubs and beautiful lawns bordered by a parkway and the late 1920's. "A proud accomplishment for our community," said Harris.

The object of the 75th anniversary committee in planning such events as the Cherry Blossom Festival is to focus more public interest and attention on the park system's accomplishments over the last 75 years in order that support may be gained for future park development in the county, according to Harris.

ENTERTAINMENT AT THE FESTIVAL will include the members of Miss Miyoko Watanabe's well-known Japanese dancing group. The group has performed for a number of dignitaries including Prince and Princess Mikasa at the World's Fair, for special performances requested by former UN Ambassador Arthur Goldberg, and for local, state and out of state programs.

Also appearing will be dancers from the Tachibana Dance School in Japan, who have been engaged in the performing arts from coast to coast since 1947. She has appeared at Radio City Music Hall, the Japanese Dance Festival in Los Angeles, and with the Detroit and Philadelphia Symphonies. She has also performed at many of the outstanding college campuses throughout the United States.
