### Deadline listed by Arts Council for grants bids

New Jersey community groups and arts organizations wishing to receive financial aid from the Arts Council must submit their applications to the Arts Council by Feb. 15, 1971, to be considered for grants. The Arts Council is accepting applications for project grants covering the fiscal year July 1, 1971, to June 30, 1972. Aid is made available to non-profit, tax exempt groups throughout the state for the development or expansion of innovative and exemplary projects dealing with various aspects of the arts. As many as 170 grant applications have been submitted to the New Jersey State Council on the Arts for funding in a single year, totalling from \$500,000 to \$2,000,000 per grant. This year the State Arts Council is hopeful of being able to support a greater number of grants to the extent of \$200,000 in combined State and matching Federal funds available by the National Foundation on the Arts and Humanities.

This year, Kelley said, the Arts Council will assign priority to applications in the following areas: "Townscape, creation of art objects, audience education, interpretation, personal evolution in the field of the arts, administrative and technical assistance areas, research and innovative use of the arts for medicinal purposes, such as therapy, recreation and education in social problems. Grants awarded by the Arts Council in these areas have resulted in an extensive series of touring art exhibits, ethnic arts festivals, inner city arts instruction programs, free concerts, arts competitions and awards, drama workshop programs for prisons, art scholarships for needy students and other benefits to the New Jersey community. Generally the Arts Council does not make grants for the salaries of permanent staff members of existing agencies, nor can it support programs previously operated entirely with the help of Federal funds. Funds are not usually available for construction of facilities or for subsistence grants to individual artists.

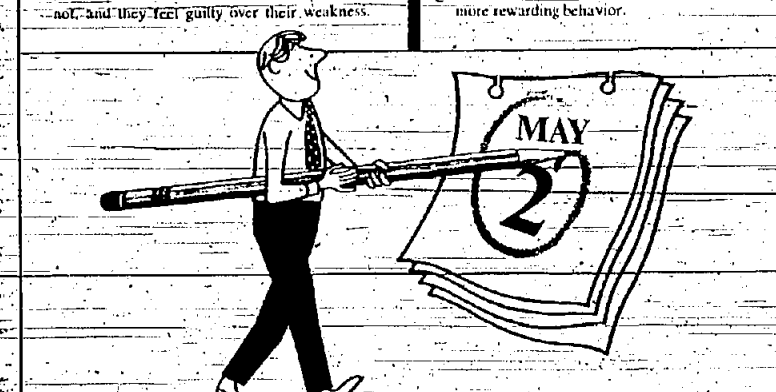

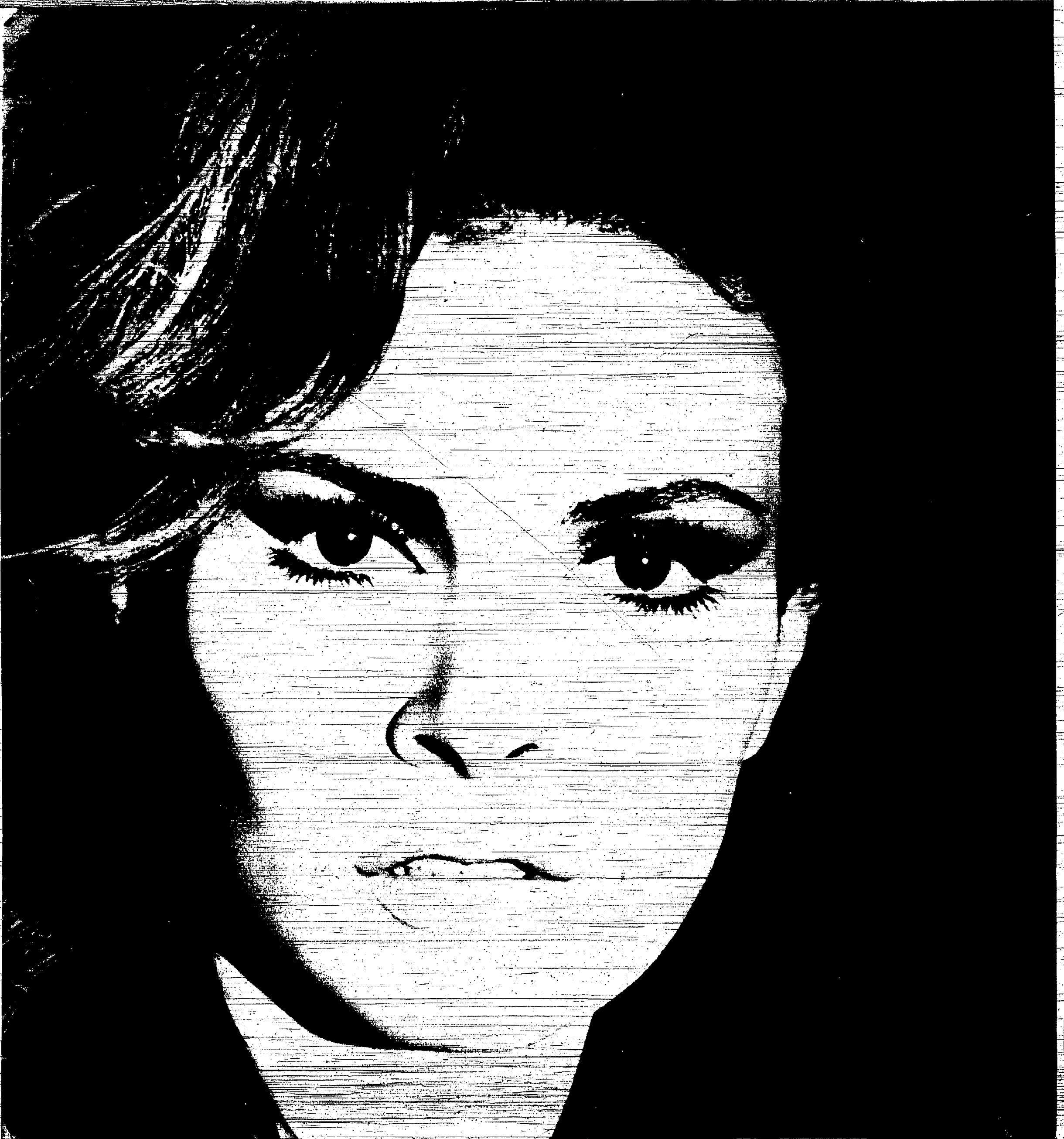
