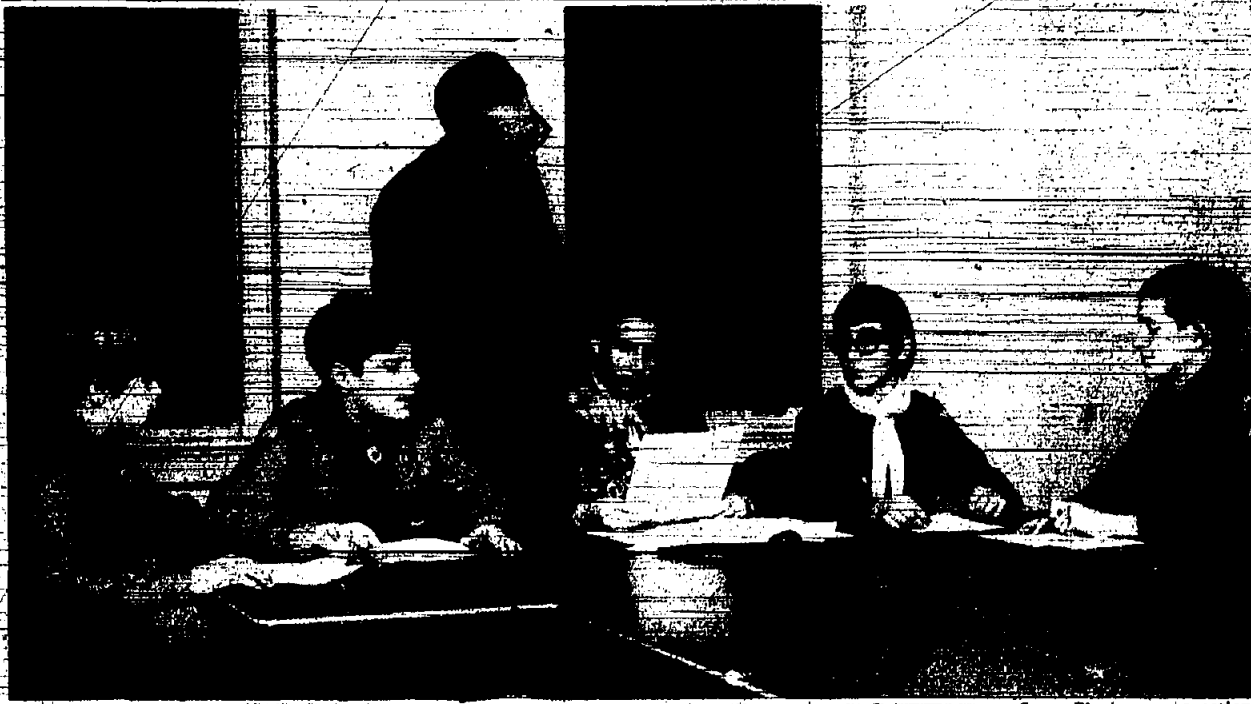

March 30 date set for regional board election

A new date of March 30 has been set for election of members to the Regional High School District Board of Education, a board spokesman reported this week. The date was set by the Mercer County board of education, which had earlier ordered postponement of all regional school board elections from their original date of Feb. 2.

The postponement was designed to await certification of the 1970 census results by Gov. William T. Cahill. In case any regional districts might need reappointment of members. Since the governor had not acted on the census figures, the court ordered that the elections be held.

A new deadline of Feb. 18 was set for prospective candidates for board membership. Three candidates for one open seat had already filed in Springfield, and their candidacies remain valid. The candidates are William Doerfler, Mrs. Sonya Dorsky and Robert Halsey.

Elections to the Regional board will also take place March 30 in two other of the district's six member communities. They are Clark and Berkeley Heights. No members will be elected this year from Mountaineer, Kenilworth or Garwood.

Following the board election, members will hold their annual organization meeting on Monday evening, April 5.

Four seek 3 seats in board race

Schneider, McIntyre, Casale, Adams vying

Springfield voters this Tuesday will elect three members to the township's Board of Education and will render their verdict on the proposed budget of \$3,017,754 for the 1971-72 school year. The local board is responsible for five schools running through the eighth grade; older students are under the jurisdiction of the Union County Regional High School District.

The four candidates running for three seats open on the Springfield board are Zachary Schneider, Michael G. McIntyre, Carlo A. Casale and James M. Adams. Casale and Adams are incumbents.

The polls will be open Tuesday from 3 to 9 p.m. Polling places are: for Districts 1 to 6, James Caldwell School; for Districts 7 to 10, Florence Gaudineer School; for Districts 11 to 13, Edward Walton School.

An unusual sidelight to the election was provided this week by Mrs. Audrey Ruban, school board secretary. She commented that requirements for absentee ballots were relaxed this year to provide for citizens who could not otherwise vote as a result of hours or conditions of employment.

As a result, she disclosed, there have been some 50 applications for absentee ballots, rather than the usual four or five.

ADAMS HAS SERVED on the board for the past three years. A graduate of Seton Hall University, he is employed as a computer programmer. What do these students have in common? For one thing, they're all seniors at the Jonathan Dayton Regional High School in Springfield.

More importantly they are enrolled in a pilot project in independent studies started this year in the Union County Regional High School District. It will be expanded to the Gov. Livingston Regional High School next fall.

The program is offered on a pass-fail basis and is characterized by freedom from constant supervision. It's largely independent of class or other group instruction, according to David Carl, instructor.
