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Township flooded once again

Heavy rains KO power in several sites Sunday's downpour cuts off traffic lights

Nowhere were our again Sunday in front of Town Hall at Springfield. Sunday was the hardest hit town in rain-soaked New Jersey. The weather station at Union College, Cranford, reported that 4.86 inches fell on the area from Thursday through Sunday.

This breaks down to .24 inches on Thursday, 2.16 inches on Friday and .66 inches on Saturday, which brings the total rainfall for last month to 7.28 inches, or 2.21 inches above normal for July. Sunday added another .66 inches. The figures are only approximately correct because local thunderstorms do not report rain.

An additional .40 inches of rain fell Tuesday, reported the National Weather Service.

Sunday's downpour was the final touch as many streets in the township became flooded. Electrical power in several areas was cut off for more than an hour and about three-quarters of the burglar alarms in town were set off because of the power failures.

However, there were no traffic accidents caused by the weather, police reported. This was because most motorists stayed off the roads.

The municipality's difficulties began about 2:30 p.m. Sunday. Traffic lights at the corner of Morris and Short Hills Avenues went out of commission and power was also cut off around Forest Drive.

The alarms went off at 2:38 because of the power cut-off and the storm, and kept ringing until after 4 p.m., police said. A house of Kipling Avenue was hit by lightning at 2:45, but there was no damage.

About three minutes later, police began receiving calls about flooding, especially in the area on Mountain Avenue from West Avenue to Briar Hills Circle. Traffic on Morris Avenue near the Rt. 78 overpass was stopped because of flooding.

At 2:50 the area around Town Hall vanished under water. Water broke out from the brook at Lyon place and came down Brook Street. Police had to move their vehicles out of the area to keep them from becoming swamped. The township garage and the cellar at the Legion Hall became flooded. The town's gasoline, which is stored in the garage, was left temporarily unusable because water went into the tanks. The water will have to be pumped out.

Reading patterns reflect the seasons

Librarians observe summer reading habits

Reading habits for patrons of the Springfield Public Library are "fairly regular" but they also reflect the seasons, according to Mrs. Helen Francis, the library's director.

Children, too, have reading patterns. In winter they are influenced by their teachers and in summer they choose a wider variety of books, Mrs. Francis said.

Adults basically read as much during the winter as they do during the summer, Mrs. Francis stated. However, during the summer there are additional patrons who want books to take along on vacation.

Mrs. Doris Rawitz, the reference librarian, commented that there is a slight shift in her department during the summer. Fewer

students come in to ask reference questions. "People are not interested in the serious aspects of reading and knowledge," she added.

Sports are popular throughout the year, skiing and other winter sports reflect that season, while boating and water sports are common summer subjects.

The library staff has observed summer reading patterns, according to Mrs. Phyllis Bouchard, who is in charge of the circulation desk. All kinds of fiction are popular. Earlier in the season books on boating were in demand.

Biographies and nonfiction books reflect the background of current events and developments, such as Egypt and Israel. Books on Vietnam are in demand this summer, reflecting public reaction to recent developments and conditions in the area.

Travelers, especially those who plan to visit the Caribbean, Mexico and Europe, have been reading guides to these places. The most popular are by Eugene Fodor and Temple H. Fielding.

Non-travelers have shown interest in do-it-yourself books. These include building and remodeling and repairing motors on refrigerators and automobiles. Women have been concerned with recipes, interior decorating, crawl work and needlepoint.

IN THE CHILDREN'S department, the youngsters have a free hand to choose what they want. However, teachers have given out reading lists so they can round out their program.

Mrs. Keller said that in the winter children are influenced by their teachers and what they read. There also is more emphasis on assignments or stimulation by the teacher.

Books on the youngsters. If a teacher recommends a book or subject, the children want to read about it," she added.

The children's librarian mentioned topics which today's youngsters do not enjoy. These include nostalgic, horse and dog stories, romantic stories, outdoor adventures and poetry.

To the youngsters, nostalgia is old fashioned and they cannot identify with the situation, Mrs. Keller explained. They want to be able to

identify with what they read. Examples of no longer popular books are Louisa May Alcott's "Little Women" and stories by Laura Ingalls.

Instead of dog and horse stories, such as "Lassie Come Home," the youngsters want to know how to breed and take care of animals.

To them romantic stories are too shallow and artificial. They know that the way things happen in books is not always true. The children do not like books which are too mysterious or involved. Poetry, per se, is not popular, except for simple verses.

Mrs. Keller then discussed what the children enjoy reading. They are interested in very up-to-date problems. Books in this category include "Tuned Out" by Mala Wojciechowska and "Escape from Nowhere" by Eyster.

Stories of the supernatural and occult, as well as "mysteries" attract their attention. This probably is a form of escape," Mrs. Keller said.

They still enjoy fantasies and fairy tales, such as by the Grimm Brothers and E.B. White. Youngsters also enjoy reading about handicapped persons, including biographies, and how these people overcome their handicaps. All kinds of sports, especially for boys, also are popular.

Mrs. Francis concluded, "We have about 25,000 volumes. These include \$3,000 for adults and 17,000 for children." There also are 1,200 records, 100 pictures, 25 pieces of sculpture and 145 slides which the public can borrow.

Lights, horns, or audible signals and brakes are required by law on all bicycles. The law also prohibits more than one passenger per bicycle, unless the bike is specifically built for more than one person. Cyclists are required to ride on the right side of the road in a single file.

Noting that there are numerous cyclists using the main arteries in Springfield, Chief Parsell expressed concern for the safety of these cyclists and urged public cooperation in the form of avoiding unnecessary cutting of these lanes.

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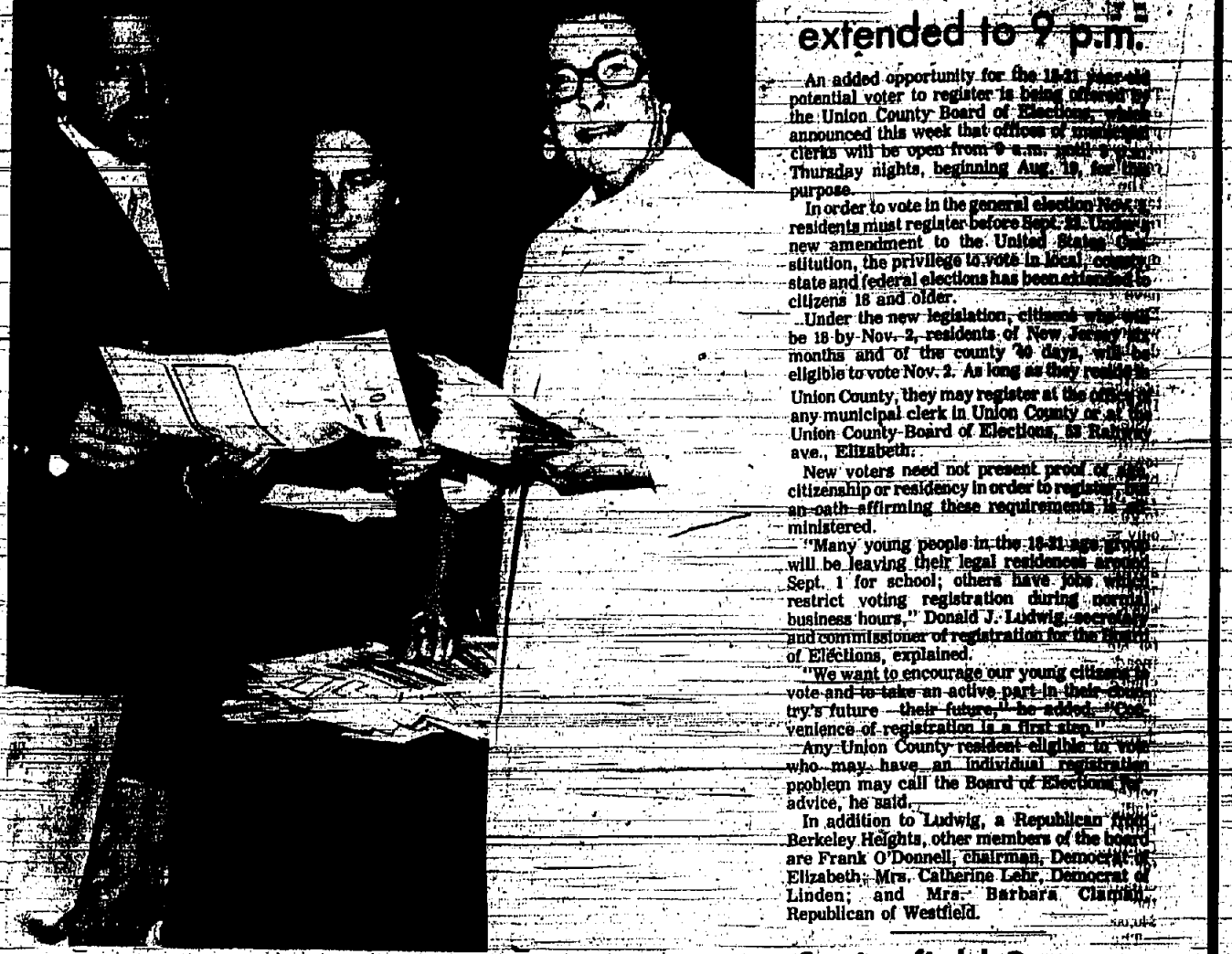

Municipal clerks can register new voters at any time their offices are open. No birth certificate or other documentation is required of native-born citizens.

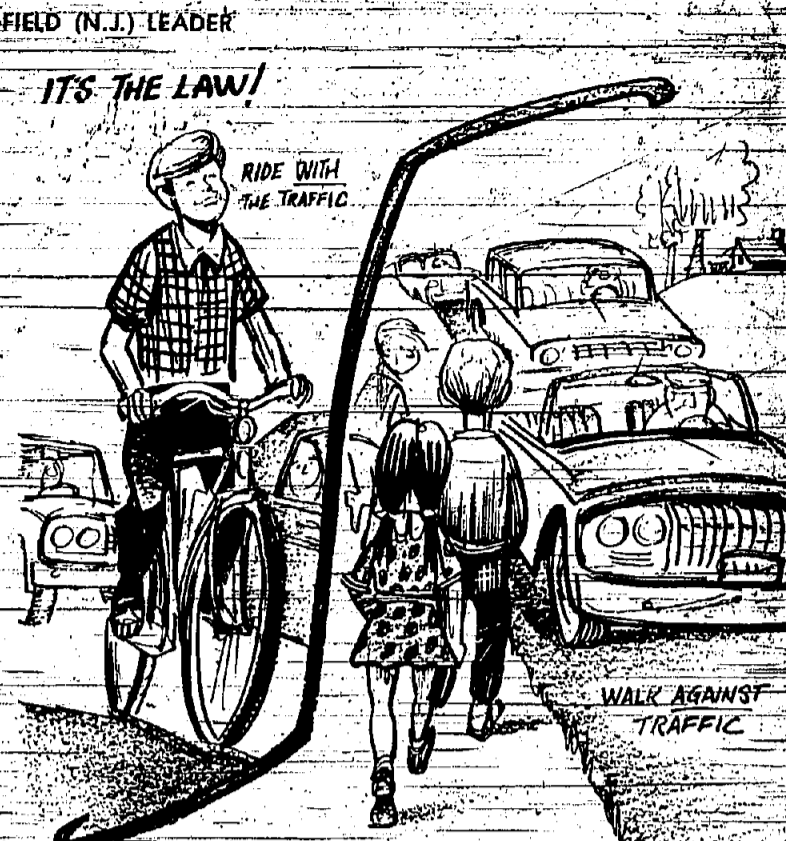
And students who will be away at college can request absentee ballot applications either when they register or at a later date well into the fall.

The local clerks and Union County Board of Elections have reported only a trickle of under-21 registrations since the 26th Amendment, lowering the voting age, became effective earlier this summer.

Williams raps delay by Justice Dept.

WASHINGTON — U.S. Sen. Harrison A. Williams Jr. today rapped the Justice Department for its failure to file a report necessary before legislation can be passed permitting New Jersey and New York to grant an intensive wildlife movement program.

The legislation, a resolution, would allow New Jersey and New York to form a state agency directed at the mounting problems of crows that fly into the New York metropolitan area.

This report was requested by the Judiciary Committee in December. It was not forthcoming. Then in answer to a letter which I wrote earlier this month, it was informed in a letter dated July 23 by William H. Johnson, associate deputy attorney general, that we realize the importance of this measure to the States involved and share the concern over crow thefts which it represents. 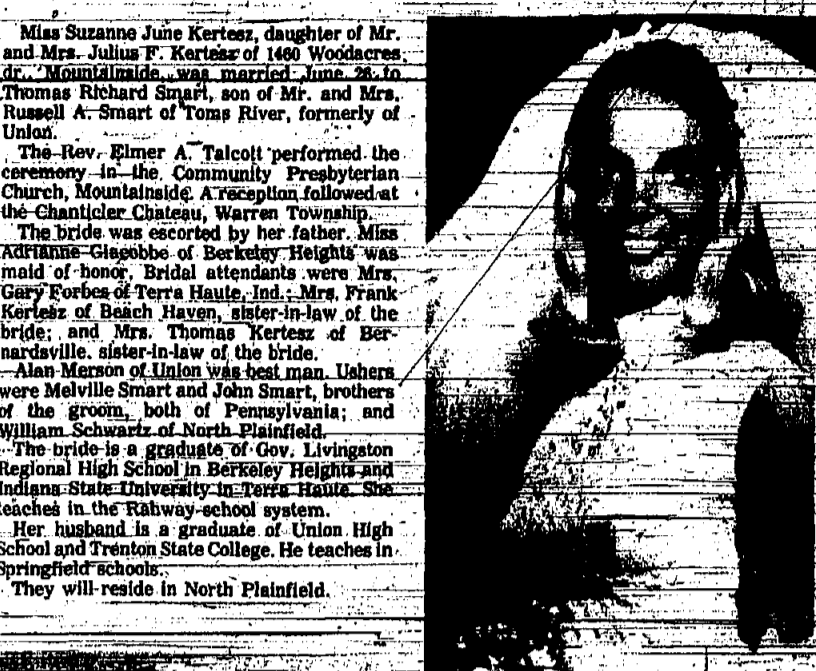

MENTAL HEALTH MATTERS

Young children who show an excess and kind of activity beyond the ordinary range are known medically as hyperkinetic or hyperactive. These overactive children constitute a small but significant portion of the preschool or kindergarten age groups. No one knows for sure how many children are hyperactive or pre-adolescently hyperactive.

Such information is now being developed through research, and scientists of the National Institute of Mental Health have recently identified six characteristics usually associated in a child who when teachers apply the label, "hyperactive."

These are called "trouble" play (over-intense attention to one setting, then rapid movement to something else), play that forces caretakers to intervene, normally or coming child, spilling and throwing, inability to delay gratification, and emotional lability.

Such information is now being developed through research, and scientists of the National Institute of Mental Health have recently identified six characteristics usually associated in a child who when teachers apply the label, "hyperactive."

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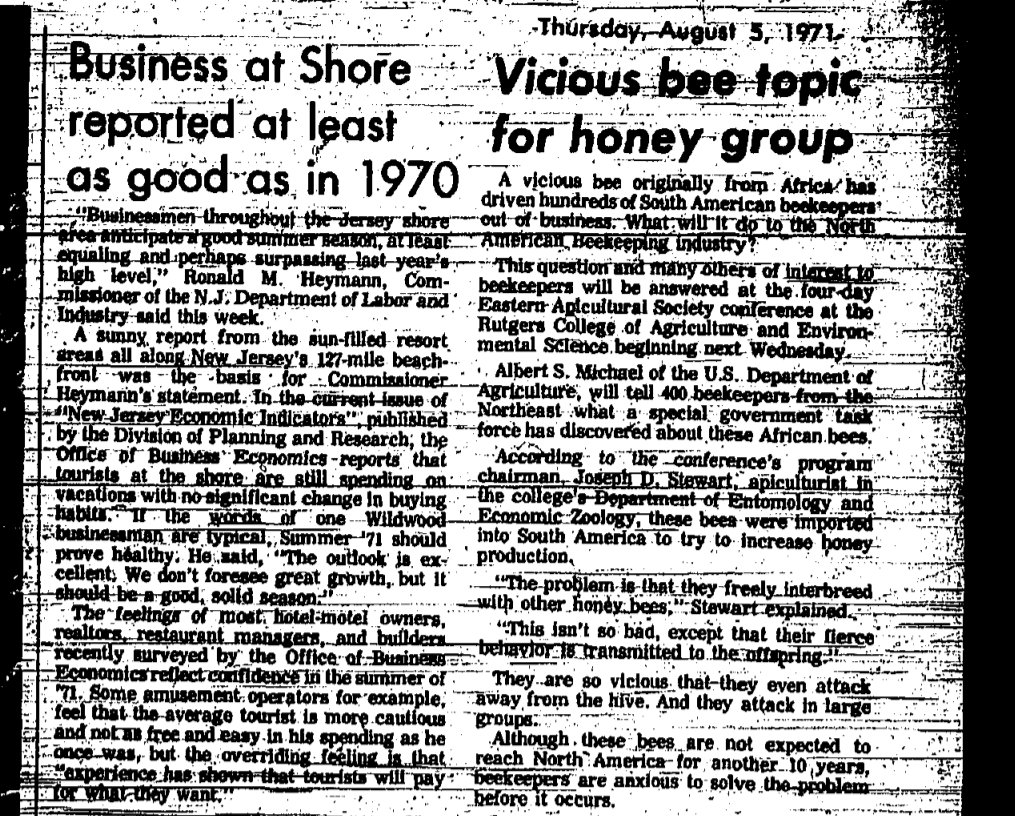

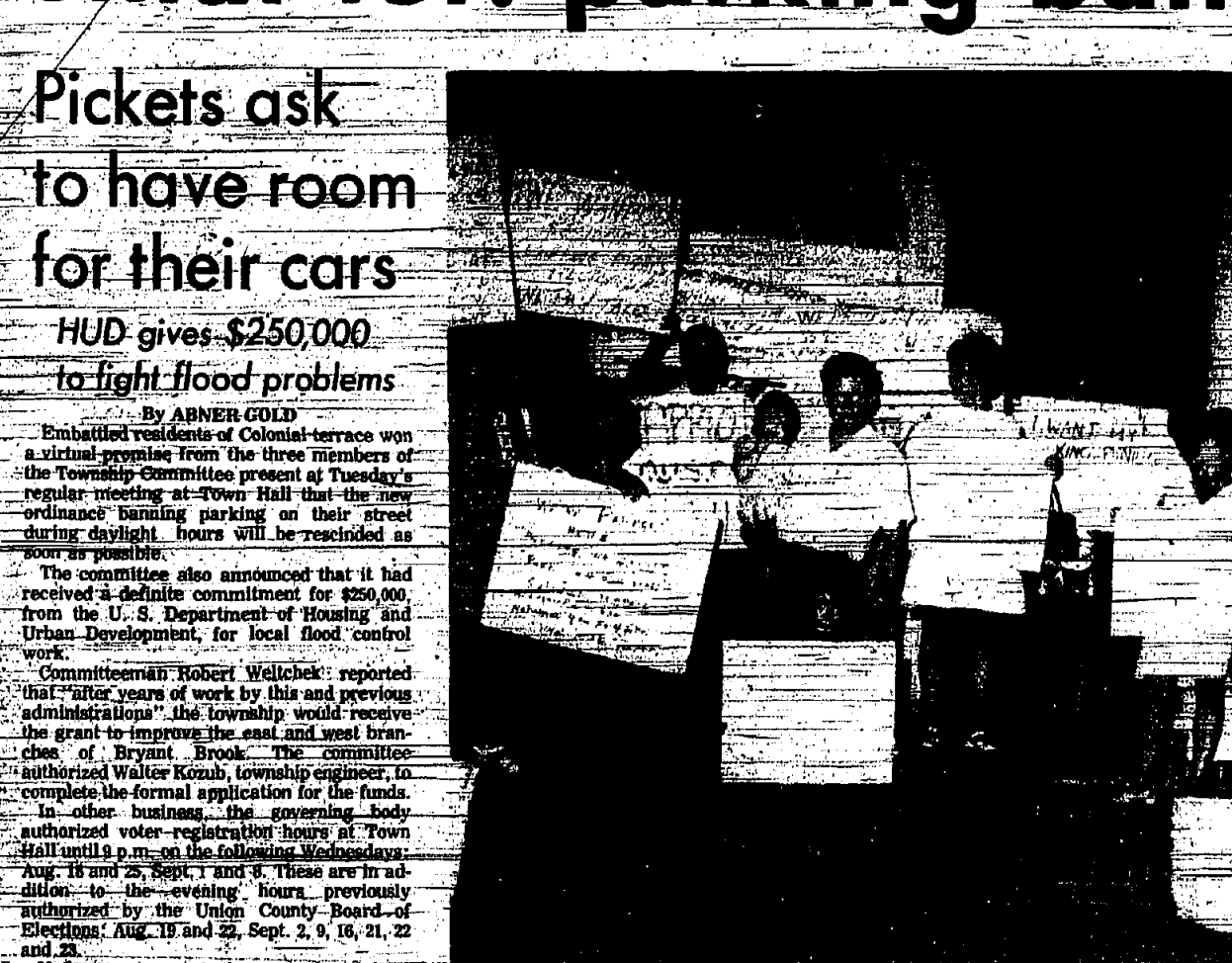
