Teen registration growing into a 'landslide'



Firemen use rowboats for two rescues Flood waters termed the worst since 1938

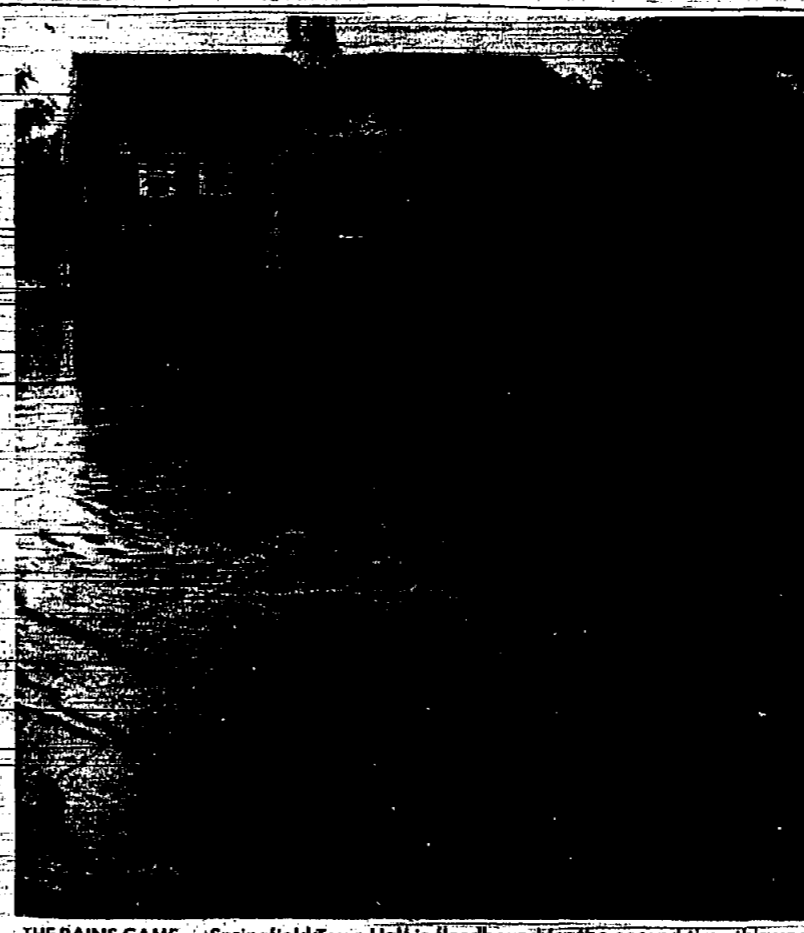

Springfield firemen in two borrowed rowboats rescued two women and four children from their flooded homes in the wake of the storm which hit on Friday and Saturday. According to Fire Chief Robert E. Day, flooding conditions in Springfield reached the worst point since a flood that occurred in 1938 when a dam gave way in Millburn.

Rowboat rescues occurred on Friday evening on Marion avenue and on Saturday morning on Washington avenue, Day reported. Fire crews borrowed the rowboat for the rescue at Marion avenue from the Millburn Fire Department, Day said.

It was that call they rescued Mrs. John Natallini and her four children who were stranded in their home. Day reported that Marion avenue was under about five feet of water at that time.

The second phase of the storm hit in the early hours Saturday morning. At about 5 a.m. fire crews were called to the home of Mrs. Frieda Williams at 94 Washington ave., Day said. She was rescued in a boat borrowed from Frank Ritter of Springfield.

According to Chief Day, the fire department had a large motor-powered boat ready to be put into action if needed, but conditions did not get that bad.

Township, two parties press drive Leaders won't predict effect on local voting

A sudden spurt in voter registration by the newly enfranchised under-21 citizens in Springfield was termed a "landslide" this week by a Town-Hall worker.

Although no cumulative records are kept of new voters, or of those in the 18-to-21 age group, she noted, there had been as many as 90 registrations on several days.

The sudden increase in registration, well before the Sept. 29 deadline, followed campaigns by town officials, the League of Women Voters and candidates of both parties to make sure that young citizens are qualified to take part in the Nov. 2 election.

While urging the new voters to register, local leaders tended to express doubt as to just what the effect of their participation will be on local elections.

Mayor Nat Stokes commented: "I believe that the young people will be very independent voters—certainly on a municipal level. They tend to be liberal in their views, so the Democratic Party should benefit nationwide. Locally, all we can say so far is that both parties and the LWV are working to get the 18-year-old vote out, and we will certainly get a sizable percentage registered. We have already started extra evening registration hours.

"I think the kids are very excited to have the opportunity to register. One result in the future if not this year will be more independent candidates. They will run on all levels: municipal, county and state, besides nationally.

"These kids are going to organize and they will be very independent. Both parties will have to make concessions to these young voters, and I feel this is a healthy development."

She reported a total of 8.78 inches of rain in a 30-hour period on Friday and Saturday, including 5.35 inches on Friday. The heaviest rain fell between 11:30 a.m. and 3:45 p.m. on Saturday. The rain brought the total rainfall for August to 11.68 inches. The weather observatory commented that this was the heaviest rainfall since a hurricane in 1965 when 9.1 inches fell, but over a three-day period.

School bells to ring out for township youngsters

Classes will start on Tuesday for freshmen at Jonathan Dayton Regional High School and on Wednesday for high school upperclassmen and pupils in the Springfield public schools and St. James School. A number of new programs will be instituted this semester in both the local public schools and the parochial school.

Springfield will be open from the first day for their regular hours. These are 8:30 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. for the sixth to eighth graders in the Florence Gaudineer School and 8:45 a.m. to 3 p.m. for the elementary schools.

Enrollment will drop to about 1,745 from last year's figure of 1,825, according to Dr. Joseph Tamburo, assistant superintendent of schools. John O. Berwick, superintendent, said that there will be 132 teachers.

Individually Prescribed Instruction (IPI) mathematics program will be used in all fourth, fifth and sixth grades. The IPI method had been tested in a pilot program for the past two years. Each math teacher will serve as a learning facilitator who will prescribe work for youngsters according to individual ability.

A new intermediate science curriculum study program will be used for the seventh and eighth grades. Developed by Florida State University and the National Science Foundation, the program is described as laboratory-centered, individualized and self-paced.

An expanded humanities program will use teaching teams to blend knowledge in such fields as English, social studies, art and music.

GOP hopefuls cite need of registration for absentee ballots

William A. Ruocco and Norman Banner, GOP Township Committee candidates, this week urged all those unable to personally file their votes in the township on Nov. 2 to register for an absentee ballot. Absentee ballots are available for military personnel and their families, college students, individuals planning a vacation or business trip and the disabled, they said.

Since the absentee ballot must be filed with the county clerk at least eight days prior to the election, Ruocco advised college students, faculty those between 18 and 20, to register for a ballot before leaving for college in next two weeks.

Ruocco said that applications for absentee ballots are available either through the county clerk or from the township clerk.

Candidates explained that a Civilian Absentee Ballot, which is printed in blue, is for those who will be out of state on election day, those students who attend school out of the township or those who cannot leave home because of physical disability, including blindness and deafness.

Banner said that he and his running mate will provide the transportation and information for the disabled who wish to cast their ballots in person.

A Military Service Absentee Ballot, printed in red, is available to any person in the military service, a spouse and/or dependent of a military person, a patient in a veterans' hospital, a civilian attached to or serving with the Armed Forces and his or her spouse and/or dependent.

Application for a military ballot may also be made by a friend or relative. This application is printed in green.

For all ballots, the requirements are that the voter must be 18 years of age, have resided in New Jersey at least six months and in the county for a period of 40 days. Both candidates urged eligible voters who will be unable to vote in the township to use the absentee ballot as their voice on election day.

First Aiders open fund drive

The annual campaign for funds for the Springfield First Aid Squad will be launched over the Labor Day weekend. Chairman Ed Street announced that the squad members will cover the town in a door-to-door campaign beginning Saturday.

A squad spokesman added, "Funds from past drives have enabled the squad to replace its older ambulance with a new up-to-date, fully equipped vehicle which will be in use shortly. Money raised this year will help replace the working funds to enable the squad to meet running expenses which include upkeep of ambulances, replacement of supplies and property maintenance.

"No amount of money could buy better or faster service than is given by the volunteers of your First Aid Squad. They stand ready to come to your assistance 24 hours a day. Once a year the squad, supported purely by donations, asks for your help and asks three things: Give now. If you are not home when a volunteer member calls, please send in the envelope which he will leave in your door."

Gunman fails to get bake shop's cash, leaves cheesecake

A Sunday afternoon shopper purchasing a cheesecake at the Mountain Spring Bakery on Mountain Avenue, Springfield, turned out to be a hold-up man, police reported. The man, who threatened a salesgirl with a gun, was scared off, police said.

According to the police report, the robbery attempt occurred at about 2:15 p.m. The salesgirl at the bakery described the suspect as a man in his early 20s with long blond hair, wearing red, white and blue striped pants, a suede vest and a white T-shirt with a peace symbol on it, police reported.

They said he began to purchase a cake, and when the sale was being rung up he announced the robbery. When he told the salesgirl he had a gun in his pocket, she slammed the cash register drawer shut and he ran off without the cheesecake, police said.

The suspect fled on foot and then got into a brown car which police believe was driven by an accomplice.

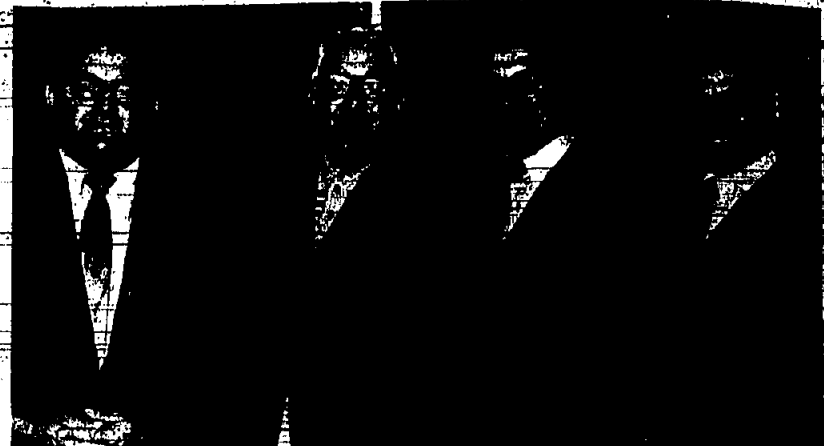
Israeli will chant principal services on High Holy Days

Number of students getting state loans increases this year

The number of students assisted under the State Guaranteed Loan Program has reached an all-time high. Ralph A. Dungan, Chairman of the Higher Education Committee, reported that for the fiscal year ending June 30, more than 20,000 students were granted loans, an increase of 10 percent over the preceding year. The loans were worth \$44 million, an increase of 10 percent. The increases are indicative of the need for additional financial assistance to enable students to meet rapidly increasing tuition and related costs, said Dungan.

New Jersey, a pioneer in offering guaranteed student loans to its residents, continues to have one of the strongest programs in the country. Since the first loan was extended in 1960, more than 1,000,000 loans have been granted worth in excess of \$1.6 billion.

Under the program, students may borrow up to \$1,000 per year, but the total loans to any one student may not exceed \$7,500. Loans may be used for any course of study, undergraduate and graduate. Applications can be secured from a student loan officer at participating lending institutions.

"The success of the program," said Chancellor Dungan, "is due in large measure to the cooperation of many banks, savings and loan associations and credit unions. During the past year more than 25 lending institutions added their names to the growing list of participating lenders."

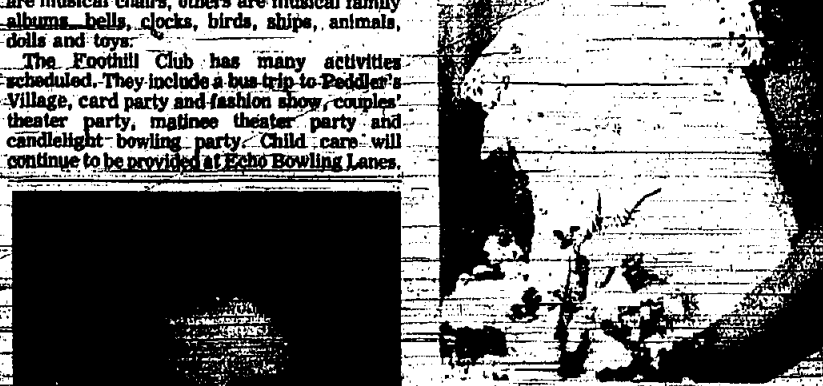

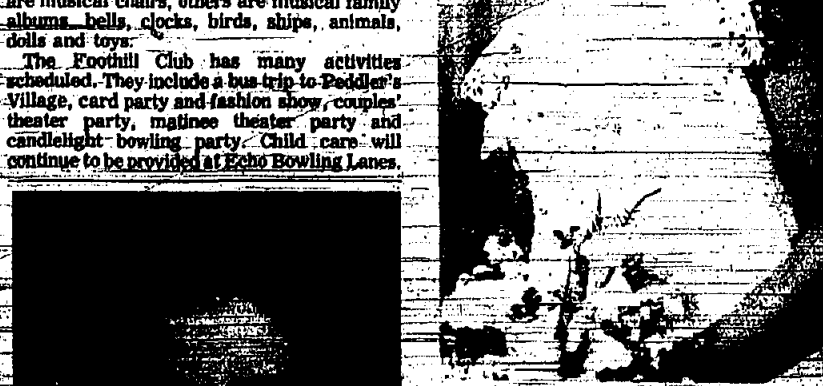

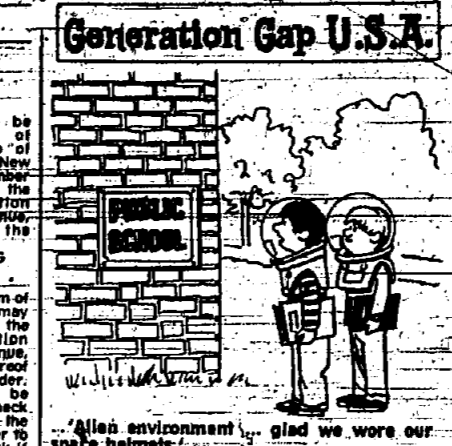
