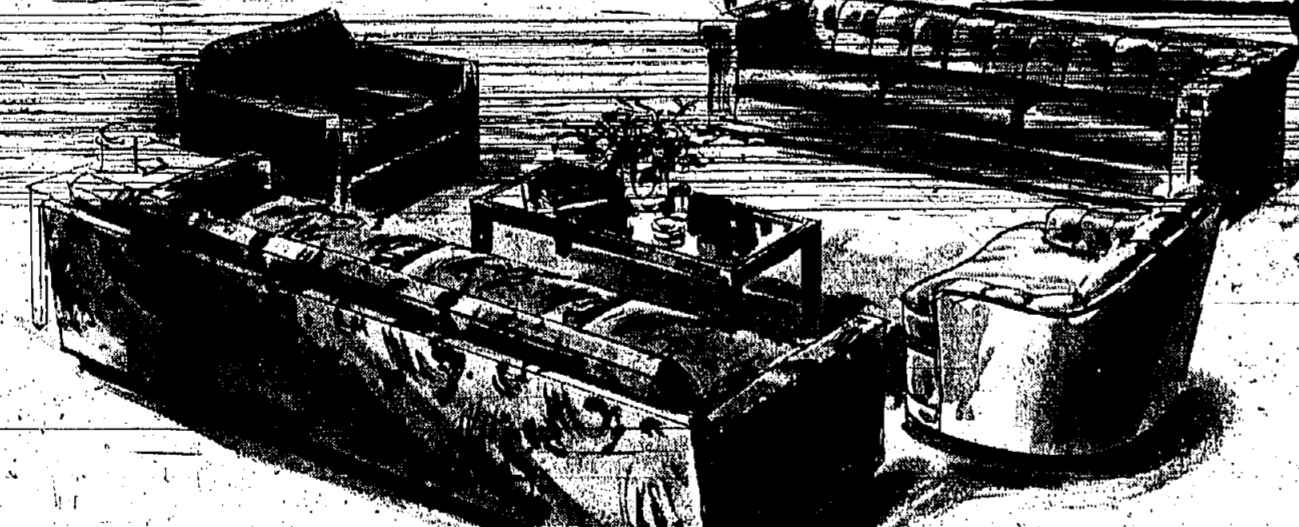
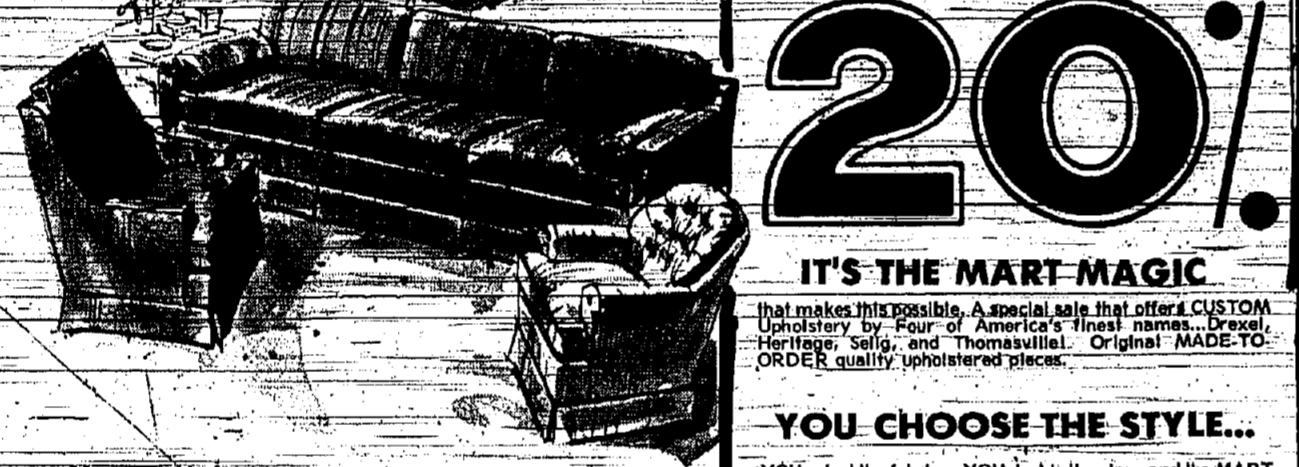
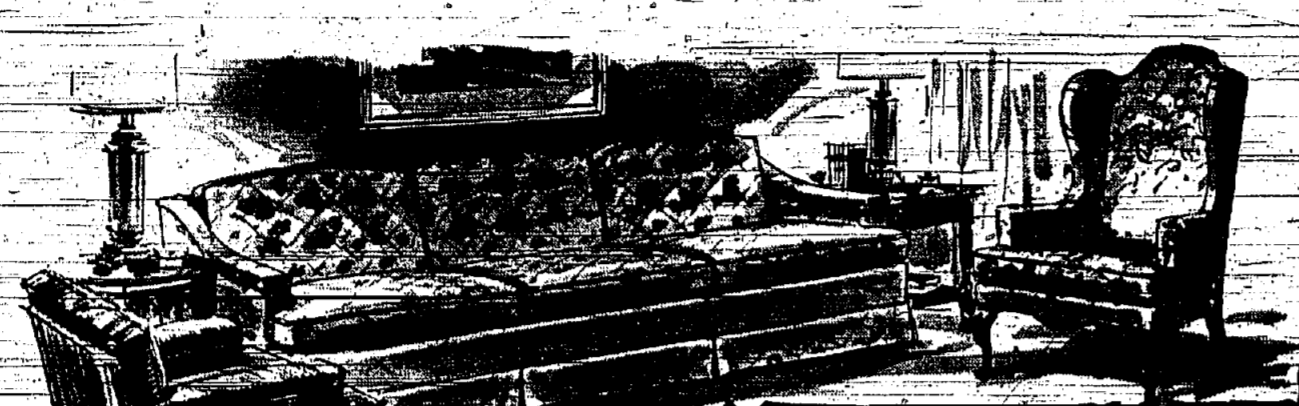

Dems find 3 worries top survey

Headlines of Union County are more concerned about the issues of environment, drugs and the Vietnam War than any other current problems, according to results of a survey undertaken by the four Democratic candidates for the State Senate from Union County.

The questionnaires and telephone survey by John J. Connor Jr., Garrino J. Liotta, Christopher Dietz and Mrs. Jerry F. English drew more than 1,000 responses from county residents.

Connor said the four supported a state Democratic resolution setting a 30-day deadline for troop withdrawal.

"In addition," he said, "we pledge ourselves to continued combat in the battle against drug abuse and against the pollution of our air, water and physical resources."

A member of the Democratic Policy Council's Environment Committee, Connor recently urged Governor Cahill to appoint to the State Waste Management Advisory Council, created more than a year ago but never staffed.

On the drug issue, Dietz, active in juvenile programs, said, "We have been studying the various programs utilized in the various school systems to acquaint students with the facts about drug abuse. Out of this we expect to learn a great deal about the various educational approaches and which programs have worked most successfully."

Democratic efforts to make progress in the two areas of concern—drugs and the environment—contrast sharply with the records of the county's two incumbent Republican Senators, said Liotta.

"One Senator, the so-called Senator from Justice, has been pursuing special interest legislation," said Liotta. "While the other has been churning out press releases on every subject under the sun to make a political but never to accomplish little."

Mrs. English expressed the voters' "gratification and delight" in the response to the questionnaires. "Almost 1,000 questionnaires, representing about a 10 percent response, were tabulated in addition to the telephone survey," she said. "We want to thank those who took the time to read and return our questionnaires."

Eye testing offered free at hospital

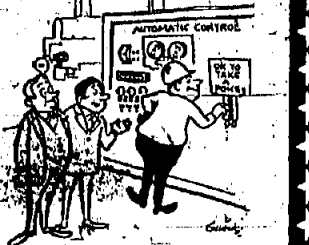

How to dry cellar and halt mildew

BY REAINE MAY
Homeowners who are concerned about mildew in their basements are bound to have a battle with mildew. The damp, poorly aired, poorly lighted basement makes a perfect home for mildew.

Once excessive water is drained or pumped out, the real concern is to get rid of all dampness. Either an air conditioner or dehumidifier would be of great help. Heating the basement for a short period may be necessary to drive out the moisture. After heating the air, open windows to allow it to escape. An exhaust fan would be helpful. Avoid excessive temperatures, which may cause buckling.

Several moisture absorbing chemicals are available from department stores, drug stores and building suppliers. Included are silica gel, activated aluminas, and calcium chloride. Place the chemical in a tray containing a dehumidifier.

A many odor indicates that mildew-forming mold have begun to grow. By getting rid of the odor, you can prevent further growth and damage. Often the misty odor disappears after the basement is heated and well dried.

If a musty odor remains after drying, additional treatment may be necessary. On cement floors and walls, scrub with a solution of household bleach in a gallon of water. Rinse and wipe as dry as possible. Wash windows open until the basement dries thoroughly.

The best solution may spot tiled floors. On these surfaces scrub with four to six tablespoons of household phosphate to one gallon of water. Rinse and dry.

In cellars with dirt floors, use chlorinated lime to remove musty odors. This product is commonly called chloride of lime or bleaching powder. Sprinkle the lime over the dirt floor. Leave until all mustiness disappears, then sweep it up.

Many items which were in the basement during flooding will require special treatment. Furniture, upholstered pieces, carpets, books, and clothing may have been soaked or dampened. The drying-out process will be slow.

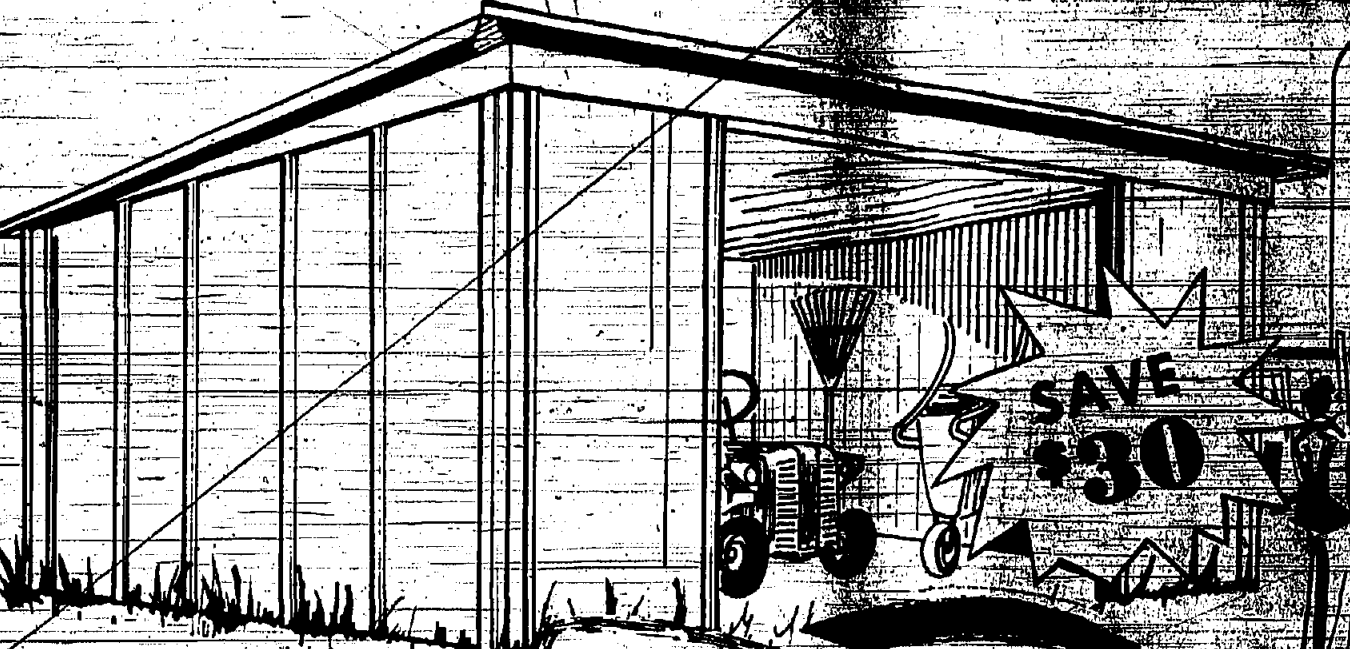

Junior Women to participate in Eye Health Week program

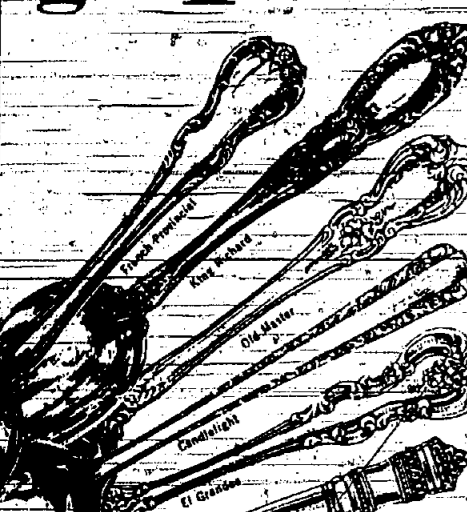
Mrs. Fred Bridge, chairman of the Braille department of the Junior Women's Club of Connecticut Farms, Union has requested that Mrs. Bridge reported that the two major causes of blindness are glaucoma and cataracts. One out of every eight blind persons today is a victim of glaucoma. Practically all of them had normal sight most of their lives, but sometime after 35 they lost vision because of undetected glaucoma. Basically, glaucoma is the building up of fluid pressure in the eyeball. If detected in the early stages, it can be controlled. If a person is fortunate about having it, it is what is called "glaucoma." "Cataract," she says, "is the clouding of the lens within the eyeball that blocks the passage of the light rays needed for sight. There are no forms of medications that can dissolve, absorb, retard or prevent the progress of cataract. There is only one possible cure—surgery. Cataract surgery has been perfected to the point where it is safe and effective."

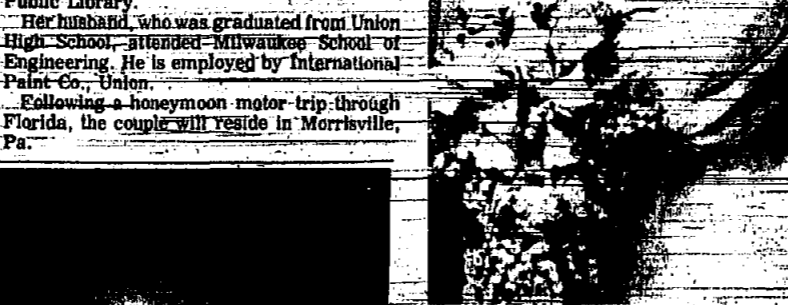

Prime time for variety of tomatoes

Late summer and early fall is prime time for tomatoes throughout the nation, says Mary E. Weaver, County Home economist. So take advantage of this season's variety. However, it may be a little early to start eating them. The reason for this is that the tomatoes are still in the ripening process and if ripened after chilling, the inner structure will become watery.

"Tomatoes add flavor, color, and nutritive value to many dishes. Try using fresh tomato juice instead of canned in your favorite casseroles or sauces. There is a difference in flavor."

You may just wash, core, and cut tomatoes into the blender for instant thick juice to serve as a beverage. If you are going to stuff or bake tomatoes, cover them with foil to prevent collapse easily.

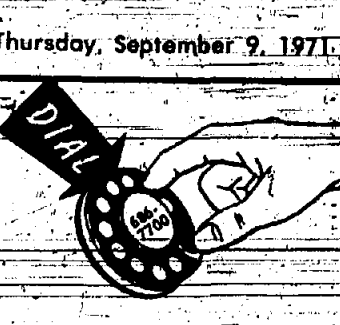
