Under-21s regarded as major factor in Township Committee offers only local race

A total of 9,728 registered voters will be eligible to go to the polls in Springfield on Tuesday to vote for candidates on the state, county and municipal levels, along with three public questions.

The polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Polling places for the township's 13 districts will be: Districts 1 and 2, the lower level of the parking lot of the Presbyterian Parish House; Districts 3 and 4, the American Legion building on N. Trivett avenue; Districts 5 and 6, the gymnasium of the James Caldwell School; Districts 7 and 8, the gymnasium of the Raymond Claborn School; Districts 9 and 10, the gymnasium of the Raymond Claborn School; Districts 11 and 12, the gymnasium of the Raymond Claborn School; and District 13, the Raymond Claborn School.

Voter registration in Springfield has increased from last year's 9,393. Registration also has increased on the county level from 208,444 in 1970 to 209,634 for this year. The influx of under-21 voters is regarded as a major factor. On the local level, he candidates for two three-year terms to the Township Committee are: Republican Norman O. Banner and William A. Ruocco and Democrat Neil Prager and N. Elton Dry.

On the state level, candidates for the State Senate, of whom three will be chosen are John T. Conroy Jr., Democrat; Jerome M. Epstein, Republican; and John J. Little, Democrat. Matthew J. Rinaldi, incumbent Republican; Christopher DiStefano, Democrat; Arnold J. Gold, Independent; Frank X. McEneaney, Republican Incumbent; the Rev. Elmer L. Sullivan, Independent; and Richard J. Sullivan, Independent.

Town Committee candidates opposed to condemnation of school board land

All four candidates for the Township Committee last week said they oppose taking land from the Board of Education by condemnation to permit widening of S. Springfield avenue in front of the Raymond Claborn School.

The school board earlier this month had opened a request for the Township Committee to permit use of the land for a new traffic channelization system.

The land candidate spoke last Thursday at the Thelma Sandinger School in the annual debate sponsored by the Springfield League of Women Voters. They are Norman Banner and William Ruocco, Republicans, and Elton Dry and Neil Prager, Democrats.

Candidates for election to the General Assembly in District 9 also took part in the candidates' night. They are Donald Lan of Springfield and Henry Gavan of Linden. Democrats Louis Hagan of Union and Herbert Klein of Rahway, Republicans; and David McGuire of Union, Independent.

Ruocco, Banner blame Dems for township's rising tax rate

William A. Ruocco and Norman O. Banner, Republican candidates for Springfield Township Committee, this week asserted that the largest tax increase in a decade this year under a Democratic administration is not good government.

The candidates noted that the Democrats were elected last year on a slogan: Springfield needs change. For an eight per cent increase in taxes, they said, the Democrats have done nothing to change the tax rate.

They stated that the present tax rate of \$1.27 per \$100 of assessed valuation is the highest in the State since George Washington's time. They said that the tax rate in 1969 was only \$1.07 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

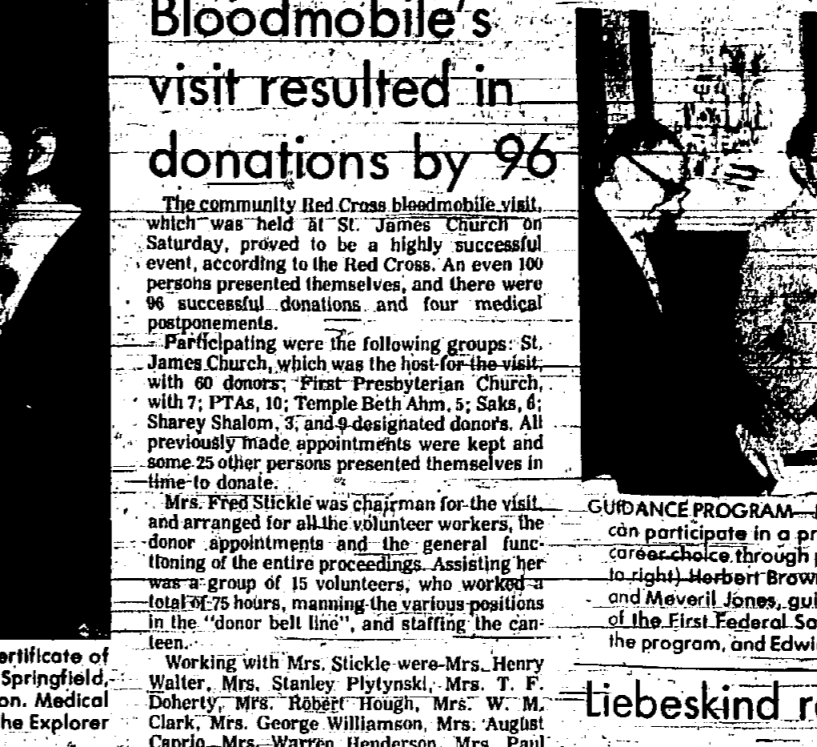

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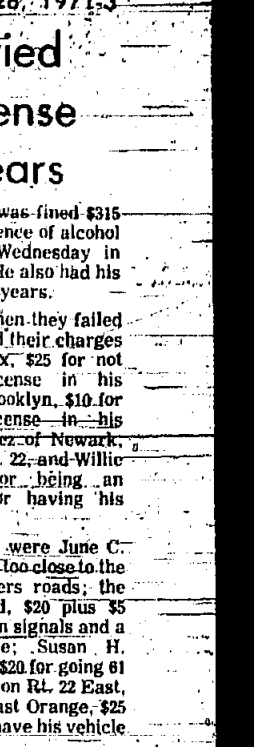

VOTING CHOICES

Next Tuesday's voting presents citizens with a number of choices, ranging from the election of two members of the Township Committee to the naming of freholders, assemblymen and state senators—and a voice on three statewide public questions.

We intend to offer our recommendations on some of these choices—but not all, for reasons which we hope to make clear.

For Township Committee, we endorse Neil Prager, Democrat, and William Ruocco, Republican.

Prager has manifested a background in and understanding of municipal government and local problems well above that of most candidates in any year. We feel that he is developing forbearance with those who might disagree with him on specific issues.

Ruocco's election is important for one major reason. Good government will be helped substantially by having one Republican on an otherwise all-Democratic governing body. We oppose one-party government today with a Democratic majority as strongly as we did in the years of Republican dominance.

In addition, Ruocco has a background of a decade of party campaigning, and his experience would help him to view civic problems in context.

The other two candidates, Republican Norman Banner and Democrat Elton Dry, have certainly merited full consideration.

Banner demonstrated a moral code beyond any to which most of us can aspire. We wonder, however, if he would be flexible enough to govern a community with many and divergent viewpoints.

Dry has displayed a broad understanding of governmental problems and a willingness to learn. We would like to see his name on the ballot again, perhaps with a longer record of community participation.

COUNTY RACES

For the State Senate, we endorse Matthew Rinaldo, Republican incumbent, and John Connor, Democrat.

Rinaldo has served Union County with distinction and diligence in the Senate for the past four years. He has built a reputation as a legislator who does his homework. When Rinaldo takes a stand, whether or not we always agree, it is based on a thorough understanding of the subject.

In addition, Rinaldo, unlike candidates of his colleagues, always strives to represent the best interests of the people of Union County.

Connor is perhaps the most promising candidate county Democrats have presented in two decades. In his grasp of today's problems and his determination to find solutions for all the people, he is a Democrat in the mold initially created by F.D.C. and J.F.K.

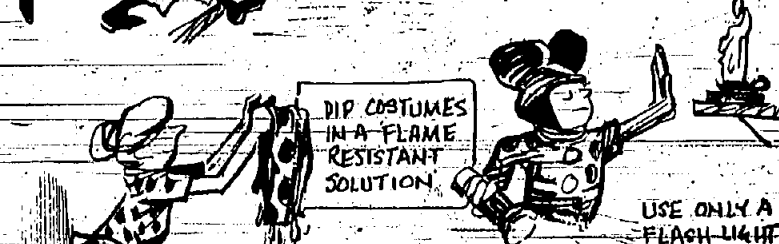
We regret that no other candidate with a third seat to be filled has established comparable qualifications or has shown any real interest in the problems or desires of Springfield.

For the two Assembly seats in District 9-B, we endorse Don Lan, Democrat, and Louis Bassano, Republican.

Lan, as local party chairman, was the architect of Springfield's present municipal administration. Local citizens know him as a hard-driving organizer with the habit of attaining his goals. Springfield needs his forceful voice in the legislature.

Bassano is a young man with an overriding interest in promoting a healthy ecological balance. On other topics, he has shown a determination to learn. And he has a refreshing willingness to speak out, whether or not the answers may be what his audience might want to hear.

Walter Hulpin, Republican, the incumbent county clerk, has demonstrated ability and professionalism in what we do not think should be an elective office. As

Profile -- Norman Banner

"People asked me to run for Township Committee because they said, 'Just don't like the way the government is being run,'" Norman Banner said in explaining why he became one of the Republican candidates for municipal office this year.

Banner, who is 60, recalled, "I first became aware of the problem from my father. He was an optometrist who served in the Spanish-American War and saw narcotics being used, even then, by men in service." The senior Banner was also a special agent and advisor to the Newark Police Department before a formal narcotics squad was established.

After coming out as an anti-drug staff consultant in Europe during World War II from the Normandy invasion on, Banner received special training in dealing with drug abuse. When the fighting was over, he served in an Army rehabilitation program in Texas for men who had become addicted while they were in the Pacific area.

Since then Banner has continued extensive studies in the field, including drug rehabilitation and addiction. He has served as a lecturer and advisor for drug programs in colleges and churches throughout the State.

FOR THE PAST six years he has been chairman of the Springfield Human Rights Commission. Banner said, "I formed to secure open housing, fair zoning variances and solutions to various problems, the commission was organized in 1964. It has since been an advisory board which makes recommendations to the Township Committee."

On another major issue, Banner said, "I have been a member of the Springfield Republican Club since 1948. I was elected as its president, serving as party leader in District 9-B."

Banner went on to stress that "heroin and marijuana are parts of the same problem. Kids go from one to the other."

He added, "Communist organizations are doing a tremendous job with drugs. They are very definitely organizing the drug traffic in the United States. No matter how much you stop, there more there is coming in."

"The Republican candidate also declared," Banner said, "I would not like to see that there is drug traffic going right here to the Pacific area."

He noted that he had just received a report that drug abuse is getting worse in the Summit area. Banner said, "It is hard for us to find out just what is really going on in the schools."

On another major issue, Banner said, "I have been a member of the Springfield Republican Club since 1948. I was elected as its president, serving as party leader in District 9-B."

Property tax relief called major target

The Wage-Price Freeze

Questions and Answers

This column of questions and answers on the Wage and Price Freeze is provided by the local office of the U.S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service. The column answers questions most frequently asked about the Wage and Price Freeze announced Aug. 15 by President Nixon.

Q. Will exemptions from the freeze be granted for persons with low incomes?
A. While the Cost of Living Council has not granted formal exceptions for low-income persons, it has stated that, during the freeze, the following are allowed: increases that are necessary to maintain the life of a minimum wage legislator; increases that eliminate discriminatory wage practices; increases in welfare payments; and increases in coverage or benefits under Social Security.

Q. How can a customer be sure that a seller's ceiling price for a particular item is not in violation of the freeze?
A. Under the law, the retailer must maintain and have available for public inspection a list of his ceiling prices. The consumer is urged to see these ceiling prices if he has a question. If the consumer believes that the price charged is in violation of the ceiling, he can request that the seller produce supporting records that must be maintained. If the seller does not supply supporting records, the consumer may complain to the Internal Revenue Service, which will review the complaint and follow-up as appropriate. Experience has shown that when local IRS officials review a complaint, it frequently leads to telephone discussion with the businessman to acquaint him with the requirements of the law. In virtually all cases, the problem has been resolved amicably.

Q. The lease on my apartment provides for an automatic rent increase of five dollars next month. Can my landlord make me pay this increase?
A. No. Rents on apartments and houses cannot be raised during the freeze, even if the lease provides for an increase.

Q. Does the freeze cover dividends?
A. No. However, the President requested that American corporations voluntarily suspend their dividends. To comply with the spirit and intent of the President's request, corporations should not declare dividends until a common stock at a rate exceeding the effective rate declared in the most recent dividend period prior to Aug. 15, 1977.

Q. We'd like to think the makers of the other new economy cars for giving us such a nice head start. It gave us time to develop an inspection system so ridiculously scrupulous that it checks every .001 to pass 16,000 examinations. It followed us to find out if a reasonably scientific pool how we could locate our horsepower without doubling the cost of your horsepower. The VW still gets about 26 miles to the gallon and costs only \$10,000.

It permitted us to work on things that didn't even have to do with the actual making of the car. Mid-con, the Volkswagen Diagnostic System, for example. Electronic equipment that can spot trouble in a car before it gets to be trouble. When you buy a new VW, you get a free Mid-Car check-up.

Of course, it took great fortitude to resist squandering our time on phony styling improvements. The beetle looks just as good for itself as it did 25 years ago.

School of hard rocks

Upsala prof gathering stones

Associate Professor James S. Yollon is holding a "rock" festival on the campus of the University of Delaware. The festival is a gathering of students from as far west as California are digging it with the help of the state of New Jersey.

Each year the New Jersey Geological Office in Trenton receives an average of 600 requests for New Jersey rocks. The requests come from teachers, students, collectors, lithologists, Boy and Girl Scouts and others.

The problem, however, has been that while the state abounds with rocks there have not been enough collections to satisfy the demand. Prof. Yollon, a geological consultant for the state, has been collecting rocks in the Delaware Valley since 1950. He has about 2,000 rocks and recently he has been assembling kits, each containing a sample rock and an article, "The Brownstones of New Jersey," written by Professor Yollon and describing the history of the brownstone in this state.

Periodically a state geologist comes to the Upsala campus to pick up quantities of kits. He takes them to Trenton for distribution to those who request them.

Prof. Yollon attributes the demand for the rocks to the fact that "a great deal of earth science is being taught from the fifth grade up."

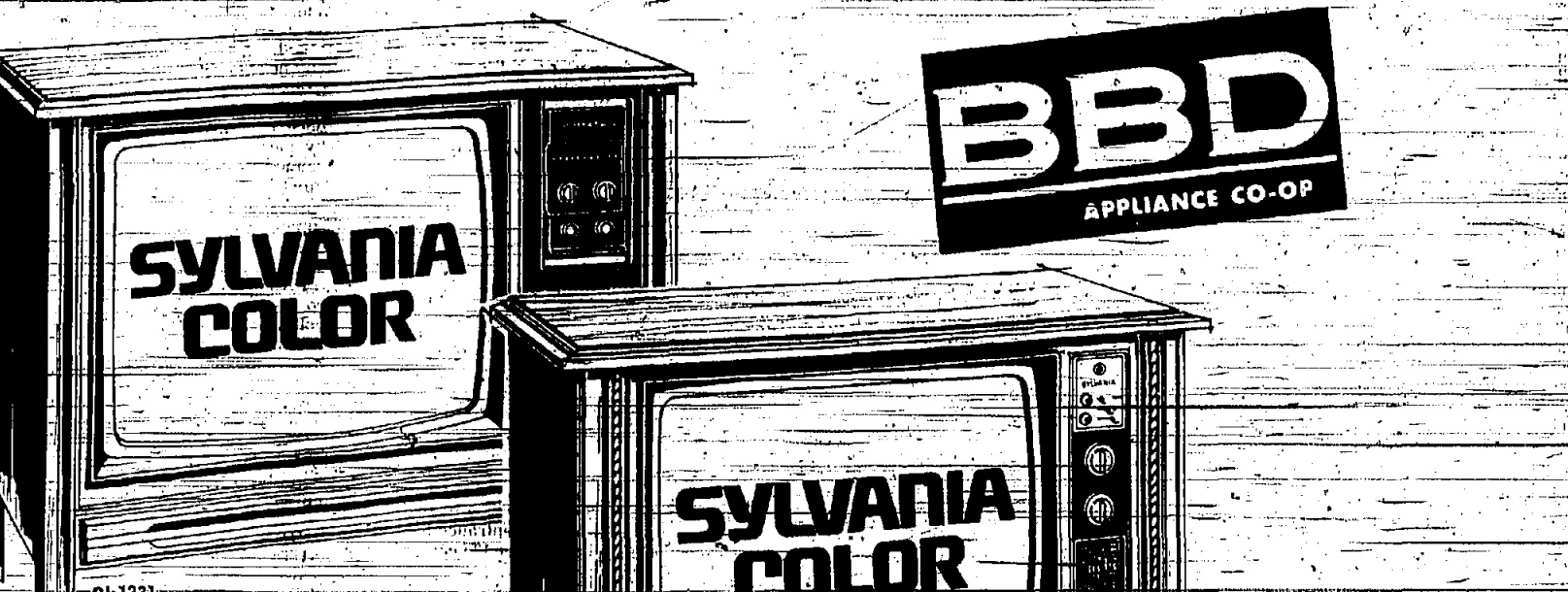
"Teachers from all over the nation—around their pupils to obtain rock samples from various states," Prof. Yollon pointed out. "As a result there is an outpouring of letters to state capitals and Trenton is no exception."

Brownstone, Professor Yollon explains, is reddish-brown sandstone used extensively as a building stone in eastern United States during the 18th century. In colonial times the Stockton sandstone was recognized as the best building stone obtainable in the Delaware Valley and it was this sandstone which was chosen for Nassau Hall completed in 1757 at Princeton University. Other buildings of historic interest throughout New Jersey also are constructed of brownstone.

Prof. Yollon spends his weekends in Stockton, collecting the rocks, placing them in bags and then bringing them back to Upsala for storage pending the arrival of a state representative. He said Stockton, which is on the Delaware River across from Pennsylvania's Bucks County, is in an area that is abundant with this type of rock.

A resident of East Orange, Prof. Yollon originally comes from Port Byron, Ill., formerly was a geologist with an oil company in Arabia.

A partner in the law firm of Sills, Beck, Cummins, Radin and Trichman, Newark, Sills attended the Perth Amboy public schools and received a bachelor's degree from Rutgers University and a law degree from Harvard University.

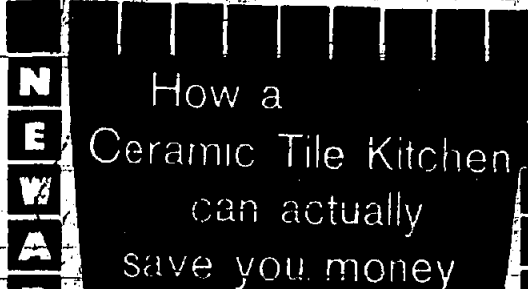

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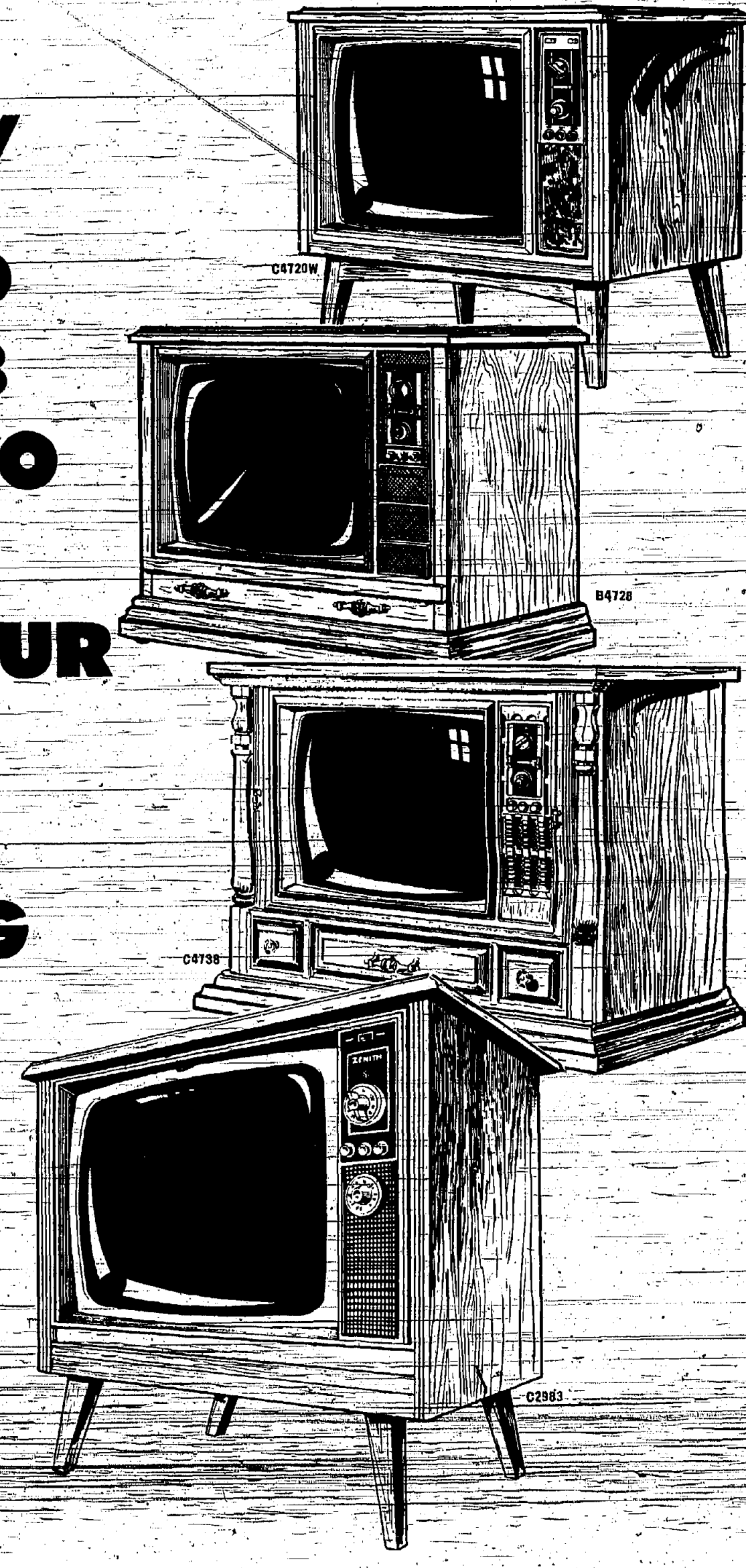

Democrat asks action on housing

To halt the escalating deterioration of housing in the state, Mrs. Jerry F. English, Democratic candidate for the State Senate, called for creation of a New Jersey Housing Court with broad powers to enforce housing codes.

An "explosive housing crisis" that has collected in a 11 percent vacancy rate in the state threatens to boil over into violent dissent unless something is done about it, the Summit attorney said.

"Jurisdiction over rental housing matters, for example, is scattered over a half dozen courts," Mrs. English commented. "It is possible for a landlord to be found guilty of maintaining an inhabitable building in one court, while in another his tenant is being evicted for refusing to pay an exorbitant rent increase."

"Centralization of housing matters should lead to more consistent and knowledgeable approach to handling matters of housing control, financing and repair and maintenance."

If elected to the unexpired term, she stated, she will propose legislation to create a Housing Court. She will also specialize in matters relating to housing code enforcement and would have powers to enforce its orders.

Mrs. English envisions that the court would handle damage and nuisance cases; suits to compel provision of services and maintenance; and actions for abatement of rent or of allowances of deductions for repairs.

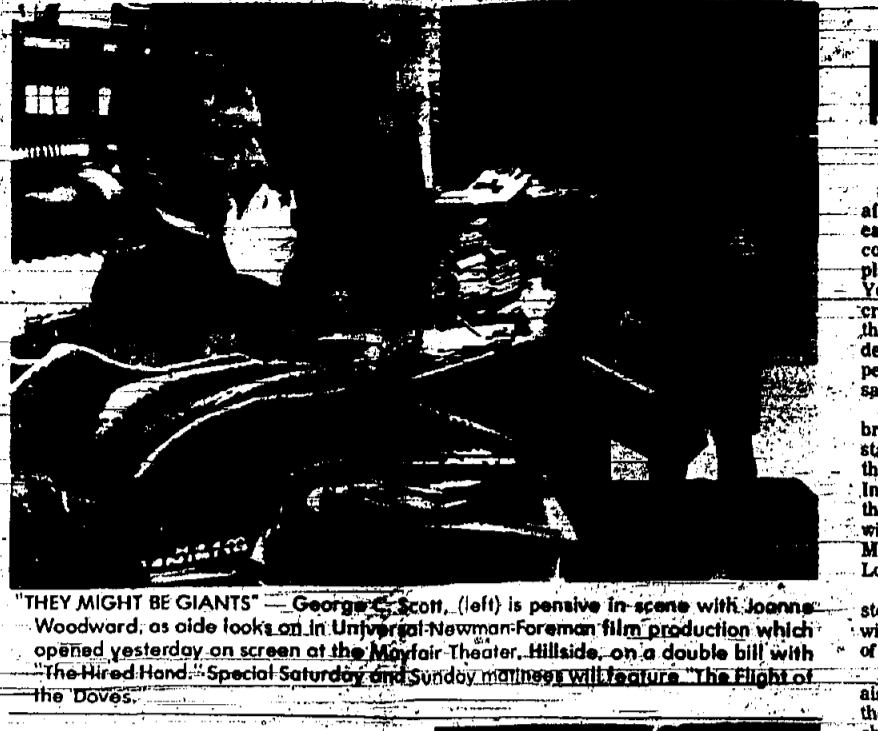

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The Theater Seen
The Incomparable Max
by ROBERT LYONS
Spotting the digression to the main reason for after-dinner entertainment. The theatre should be easy and warm and take the audience into its confidence. What is more familiar to London theatregoers, it is not entirely unheard of in New York. It is a form that receives the least harsh critical judgment and admits it proves that the theatrical banquet table in a democratic age where deserts which appear to be a rightful place with entrees that satisfy.
Jerome Lawrence and Robert E. Lee, who the night in a funny evening when they wrote the stage adaptation of "Auntie Mame," have set the right temperatures in their show. "The Incomparable Max" but they have not put in the right ingredients. The first play is about an obscure and bitter poet who is the devil in order to be transported for a few hours a hundred years into the future to see if he is being appreciated by the readers at the British Museum. He is wretched at discovering that all the literature is one microfilm and has been condensed to fit on a single tape.
Max must now write since it actually does appear a hundred years hence. He is in bits and scraps and only once or twice really laugh when the poet, specifically blamed the limitation of language for his failure.
The second play is about a man who has a certain adhesion to it since it is a true story. He meets a man at a seaside hotel where they are both recovering from influenza. They get into a light-hearted conversation and Max Beerbohm, the famous light-weight London drama critic, reveals that when he has influenza, he also suffers flights of imaginative fancy. I suppose the story is not to take other people's pain too much to heart. I admit that it is not as expounded since the vein is comic, but the comedy was clearly not meant to be taken other than seriously.
The acting in the minor roles in both plays was acceptable mostly because of the careful staging of director Gerald Freedman. Where it was a very good when the dialogue failed: Max Beerbohm, Oliver Rollo, recites rather than plays the role and delivers his lines in a measured, dignified manner.
RICHARD KILEY PLAYS both the poet and the man whose bad cold took on a literary bent. I once walked to see Mr. Kiley and

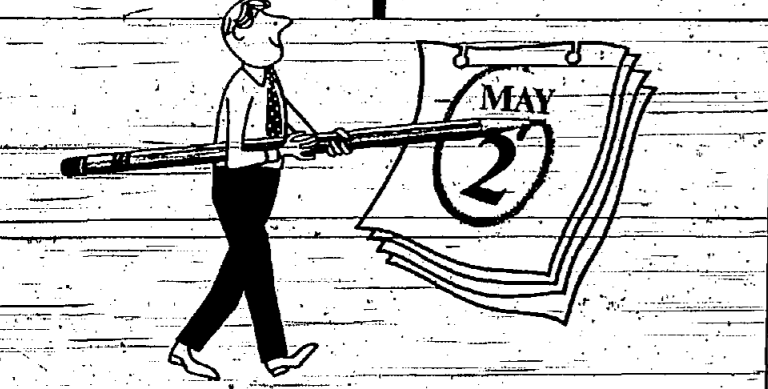

As You Approach Q Day

Many areas willpower as the decisive factor in giving up cigarettes. For them the sense that they can change their own lives is of great importance. They enjoy challenging themselves and, with an effort of will, they break the cigarette habit.

These psychologists describe stopping cigarettes as may be on it. It begins to feel like a new dimension of self-control.

Others often successful in many respects, find that willpower does not help them to give up cigarettes. They try to stop, they do not, and they feel guilty over their weakness.



Try Cutting Down...

An important first step in the process of giving up cigarettes is to gradually reduce the number of cigarettes you smoke each day, or week, by work.

A good system is to decide only to smoke one or two cigarettes to stop smoking between the hours of 11 and 12, 1 and 2, 3 and 4, etc. And then to extend the nonsmoking times by half an hour, an hour, two hours.

You may decide to take the cigarettes you smoke each week, giving up one or two a week to Q Day.

How about smoking half of each cigarette? Is the prospect of reducing the number of cigarettes, try various possibilities: if you have one pocket in which you always carry your pack, put in another so that you will have one for it. If you always use your right hand to bring your cigarette to your mouth, use the left hand. Is it your custom to rest the cigarette in the right corner of the mouth? Try the left side.

Make it a real effort to get a cigarette. Wrap your package in several sheets of paper and carry it in a tightly closed box. If you have your change at home you won't be able to use your cigarette machine.

Shift from cigarettes you like to an unpleasant brand.

Before you light up, ask yourself, "Do I really want this cigarette?" or "Am I just acting out of empty habit?"

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

Do You Believe In "Cold Turkey" Quitting?

Yes, for some, no, for others. If you are a really "addicted" smoker, psychologists favor the sudden, decisive break.

For some, gradual withdrawal is less painful and usually satisfactory.

Some cigarette smokers find it easier to quit cold turkey than others. For some, the suddenness of the break is a relief. For others, the gradualness of the process is a relief.

What about going to a cigarette withdrawal clinic?

If there is a clinic or program in your community, you may find it helpful. The American Cancer Society favors such efforts.

Sharing your withdrawal experiences with others participating with them on a common problem is very helpful. The clinic may make it considerably easier in various ways to stop cigarette smoking.

However, remember, no clinic can provide a sure result. In this matter you must be both patient and physician.

Should I Make A Big Thing Of Q-Day?

Some find it most satisfactory to work on a schedule in which Q Day, quitting day, is designated as the important, decisive day in their personal lives that marked it.

Keep A Track Record

Many smokers have found that a useful step in understanding their smoking is the keeping of a daily record on a scale like the below.

In your greatest withdrawal you may decide to eliminate those daily cigarettes that you find are most 1, 2 or 3 on the scale; i.e. ones you want least.

On your way with you to Q Day, the cigarette you like most. In any case keeping a smoking log will give you information about yourself, and make you more aware of what your smoking habit are.

Some cigarettes are more important to you than others. This score card will show you how much you smoke. The lower the score the better you are doing. You can use this score card on a daily basis, or on a weekly basis. You need only 10 minutes to fill it out.

- Approaches in Giving up Cigarette Smoking
1. List the reasons for and against smoking.
 2. Select Q Day—change to low tar and nicotine cigarette.
 3. Chart your smoking habits for at least two weeks; how many cigarettes, when, the most and least important.
 4. Repeat each night at least ten times, one of your reasons for not smoking cigarettes.
 5. Eliminate one category of cigarettes, the most or the least desired.
 6. Secure a supply of substitutes, units, gum, inhaler, ginger root, etc.
 7. Quit on Q Day—try the different substitutes, as the wish to smoke returns, enlist your wife or a friend in a busy series of events, walking, going to the movies or theater, exercise and many more walks, moderate drinking.
 8. If you are depressed, see your physician and discuss your symptoms.
 9. Keep reminding yourself, again and again, of the shocking risks in cigarette smoking.

THE WEEK BEFORE Q-DAY

Think over your list of reasons why you should not smoke; the risk of disease; the blurring of the taste of food; the cost; the cough; the bad breath; the mess and smell of morning after ashtrays.

Concentrate each evening when you are relaxed, just before you fall asleep, on one dreadful result of cigarette smoking. Repeat and repeat and repeat that single fact. Drive home another fact the next night and another the next.

Review the facts that you know about the risks of cigarette smoking. Remind yourself that there, but for the grace of God go you, that you may indeed, if you continue smoking, lose six and a half years of life, that—if you are a heavy smoker—your chances of dying between 25 and 65 years of age are twice as great as those of the nonsmoker. Are the six minutes of pleasure to a heavy smoker in a cigarette worth six fewer minutes of life? Would you fly in an airplane if the chances of crash and death were even close to the risks of cigarette smoking? Think over why it is that 100,000 physicians have quit cigarette smoking.

How About Ashtrays?

One school of thought says that you have a better chance of giving up smoking if you have a large number of ashtrays. This is no more than a matter of habit.

Another school of thought takes a different view and even suggests carrying cigarettes in a pocket to prevent their being ashtrayed.

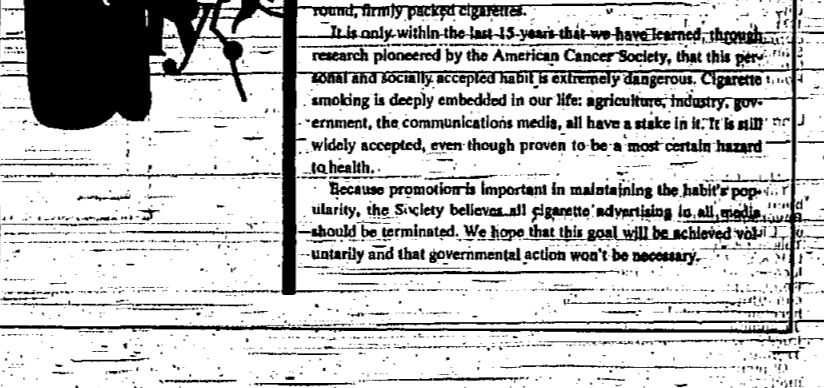

Why Do So Many People Smoke Cigarettes?

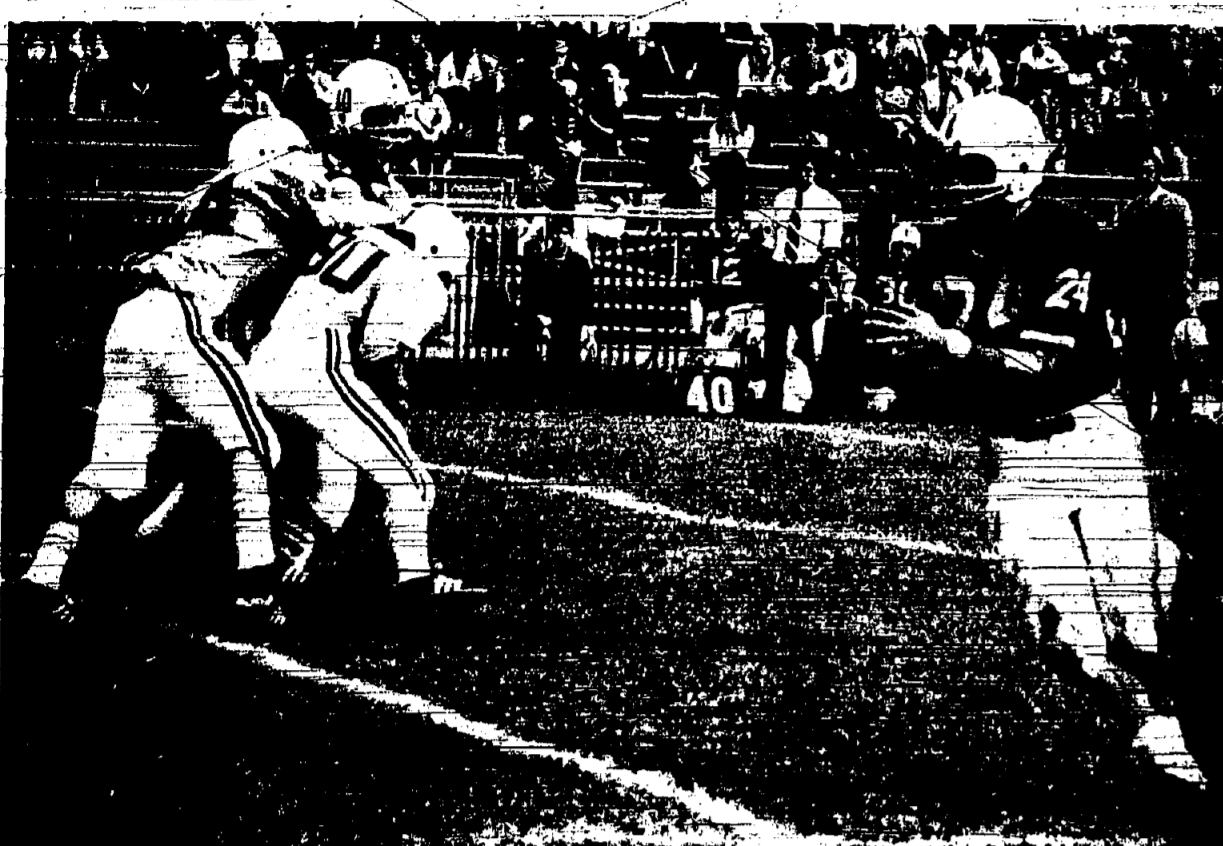
