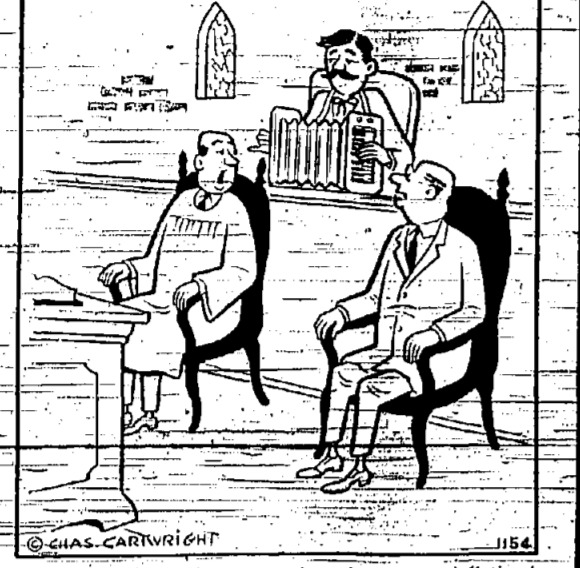

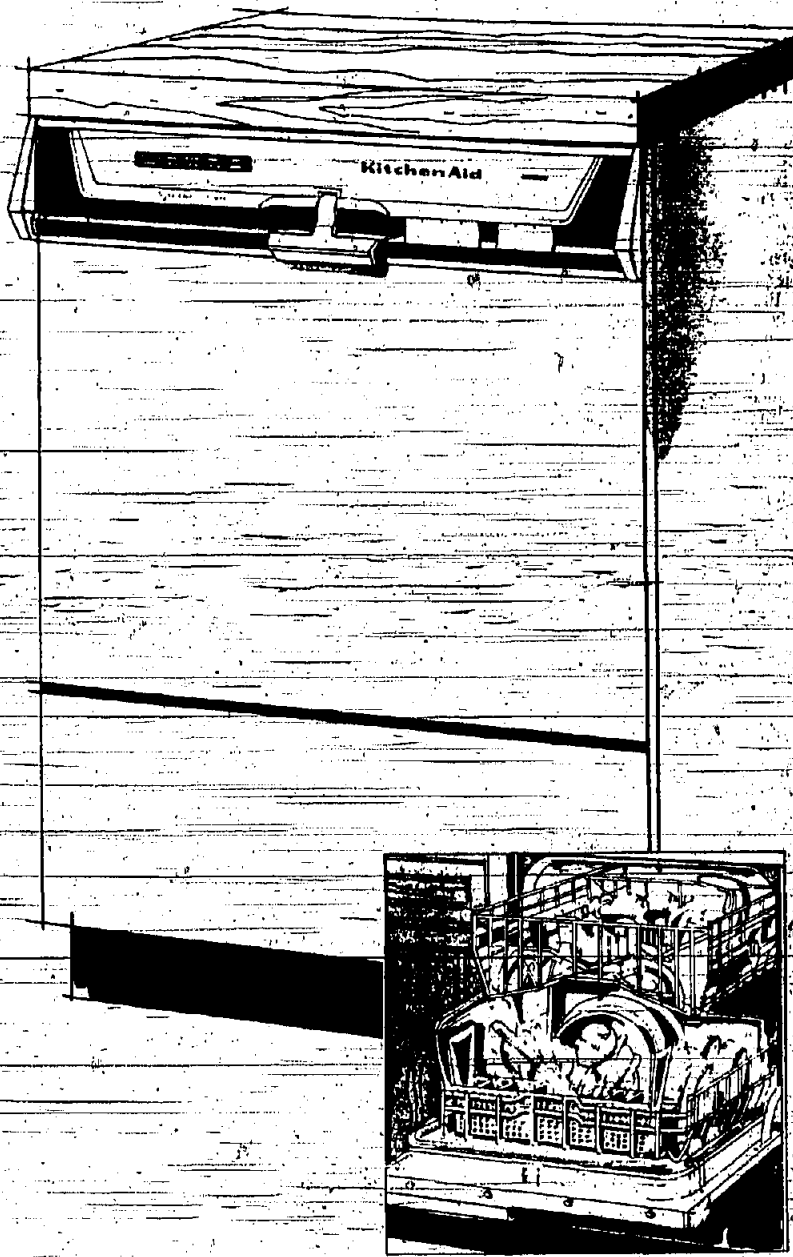

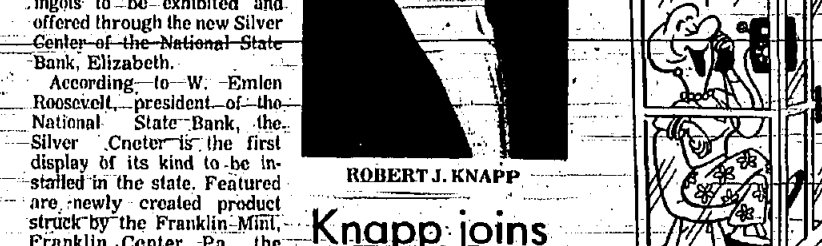

Retiring isn't easy
 NCE counselor offers help

When people start talking about the New Jersey Lottery they often start their conversation by saying "If I won the lottery, I'd retire tomorrow."

Usually such kaffee klatch remarks are made in jest because most people are not prepared to retire "tomorrow," according to Dr. A. Penberton Johnson, director of Newark College of Engineering's counseling center.

Speaking before the New Jersey Society of Professional Engineers at a meeting held in Princeton, Dr. Johnson said there are many professionals who retire early, and he is enthusiastic about what you're getting into.

If organizational policy or health point toward an early retirement, do your best to make an opportunity of beginning a new life course of action to be entered into lightly," he said.

While the opportunity might offer freedom, escape from daily pressures, the chance to plan work to the age of 65 to take full advantage of retirement benefits.

A big benefit of working to 65 is that most company retirements provide for the greatest return at that age. Often an early retirement can mean substantially less income, Johnson said. He also noted that early retirement can mean the loss of a self-insured basis and that major medical expense insurance can be very costly. He also mentioned most tax breaks are aimed at those 65 and over and do not apply to early retirees.

Retirement brings with it a whole new set of interpersonal relationships, Dr. Johnson said. Especially with one's spouse and the friends who have not yet retired. A change in residence can also act against that long-term feeling of freedom, since it separates the retiree from old friends without guaranteeing the opportunity for new ones.

But with or without the daydream of "winning the big one" of winning that lottery, consideration of an early retirement should be approached cautiously, Johnson says.

"There has to be a careful self-examination," he says, "to make a checklist of all the social, financial and personal needs you have, well in advance." And he suggests some books on the problems and the opportunities of retirement.

If the facts are still not enough convince you, then ask yourself this one common sense question: "Would utilities build nuclear energy plants if they were not safe?"

100-million-vehicle year for Turnpike?

The New Jersey Turnpike authority is looking toward a 100-million-vehicle year as the state's 20th anniversary this month. On Nov. 5, 1951, the New Jersey Turnpike's first 53 miles from Delaware to Bordentown were opened to the public. There was no ceremony to signal the event, only a quiet excitement among the newly recruited toll collectors and the Authority's officials, tense and fatigued at the culmination of 19 months of planning. The Pike was opened another 40 miles to Woodbridge on Nov. 30, followed by subsequent openings to Newark Airport, I-2 and to the northern terminus at Ridgedale Park on Jan. 15.

The entire original Turnpike of 118 miles (it has grown since) into a 141-mile superhighway with two extensions, a westerly bypass route and a 20-mile long 12-lane section) was built in the record time of 21 months, under the leadership of the Authority's first chairman, Paul L. Trosel, in the administration of Governor Alfred E. Driscoll.

Former Governor Driscoll, who became Turnpike chairman in March, 1970, is looking forward to providing the public with even greater highway facilities in the future.

"We must keep pace with the needs of the growing public," he says, adding that the program underway for extending the 12-lane dual to New Brunswick and plans for a road from Toms River to Bound Brook are "a logical, realistic extension of the New Jersey Turnpike's reason for being. We are observing our 20th birthday without fanfare but with a determination to continue serving the public most efficiently and safely."

The rationale of the Turnpike, he believes, is based on the sound concept that divorces it from the tax structure, operating only on the revenues it derives from tolls.

The Turnpike's accomplishments are a proud record of safety, reliability and service. It is a far cry from that historic November 20 years ago, when 3,459 vehicles took the Turnpike on opening day. A total of 17,948,225 vehicles used the road during the first full year of operation in 1952. In 1970 the volume was 8,656,299—400-percent greater. This year the volume could reach the 100 million mark.

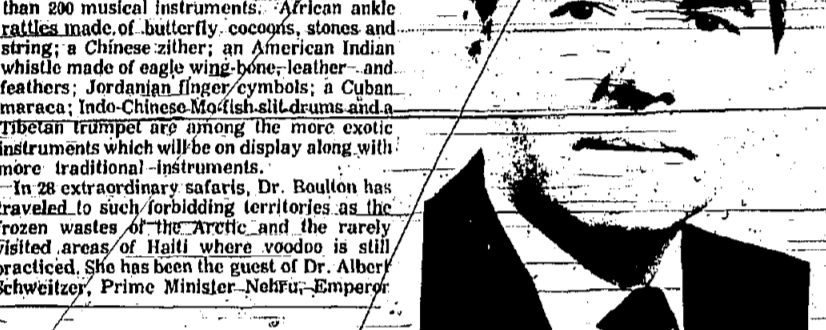
