State tests millionth sample tor highways quality control

The Bureau of Quality Control reached the milestone last month in its continuing guar-

Currently, more than 200 different materials

Currently, more than 200 different materials from highway suppliers are checked for at least minimum conformance to pre-set standards by the Transportation Department. These are tested by one or more of the three different laboratory sections of the Quality Control Bureau, one of which examines the physical properties of components in materials such as concrete, metal and aggregate, A second tests the quality of bituminous products, and another section determines the exact chemical composition of various materials supplied.

Some of the many tests made: Compressive strength of concrete; hardness and strength of steel; size, hardness, durability and specific gravity of aggregates; analyses of alloys; fracture point and tensile strength of metals.

Material samples are subjected to an average of 3.5 quality control tests apiece. One million items processed over a spread of 53 years means some 3.5 million checks have been made of highway materials.
