## Weltchek sees 'common goal' for committee

Robert Weltchek took over as mayor at the organization meeting of the Township Committee New Year's Day at Town Hall, continuing Democratic leadership of the governing body for a second year.

Two new committeemen were sworn in for three-year terms. They are William Ruocco and Norman Banner, both Republicans, who defeated Democrats Neil Prager and Elliot Dry in November. The other two Democrats on the governing body at the meeting were Nat Stokes, retiring mayor who was named deputy mayor, and Arthur Caprio, who had earlier announced his plans to resign this month. Weltchek congratulated the new members of the committee, adding, "We are now all part of a team, with the common goal of improving our town."

Addressing the standing-room-only audience, he said, "We are open for business the second and fourth Tuesday evenings of every month. Please come here and tell us about your problems, which are our problems."

Under its present form of government, Springfield does not choose a mayor by direct election. Instead, the five township committeemen each year select one of their own members to serve as presiding officer, with the title of mayor.

In his opening remarks, Mayor Weltchek recounted a story, possibly apocryphal, to explain why he had sought the responsibility.

He told of a young man who had come into town looking for the new mayor and had asked in various neighborhoods where he could be found.

Instead, the story continued, the visitor was told, "Marian Avenue. That idiot, who couldn't stop our floods."

On Colonial Terrace, "That madman, who was not able to find a quick answer to our parking problems."

Near the Raymond Chisholm School, "That fool, who still has no answer for our traffic problems."

On Wentz Avenue, "That phony, who couldn't do anything about our flooding, here or anywhere else."

And finally, by a young boy, "That dope, who can't help us find a place to ride our minibikes."

"Obviously," Weltchek said, "I ran for the (Continued on page 2)

## 'Birthday' gifts still waiting for first '72 baby

Here are the contest rules:

- Parents must be residents of Springfield.
- Entries must be received in the Springfield Leader advertising office, 1291 Stuyvesant Ave., Union, not later than 7 a.m. Monday, Jan. 10.
- The first baby born after the stroke of midnight Dec. 31 will be declared the winner, provided entry has been made before midnight in Rule 2 and is substantiated by birth certificate, physician's certification, town records or other official records acceptable to the judges.
- Entries—even for earlier babies—cannot be accepted after the deadline for entry has passed.
- Entries agree that pictures of the baby, the mother and father may be published in the Springfield Leader to announce and publicize the winning baby.
- The decision of the judges will be final.
- In the event that no babies entered by Jan. 10, the contest will be extended for another week.
- Envelope must be marked "First Baby Contest" in lower left-hand corner.

## Springfield school board presents its new budget

The Springfield Board of Education Tuesday night introduced a tentative budget of \$3,125,253 for the 1972-73 school year and scheduled a public hearing on the budget for Monday, Jan. 24, at 8 p.m. at the Florence Gaudineer School. It will be presented to the voters in the school election Feb. 8.

The budget as introduced, at a special meeting Tuesday at the Gaudineer School, calls for \$2,782,000 to be raised by taxation. The difference is made up by some \$100,000 in funds remaining from the 1971-72 school year, as well as \$293,000 in state aid.

The total budget represents an increase of \$107,506 or 3.6 percent from the amount for the current school year which was approved by the voters last September. The amount to be raised by local taxes is up \$128,580 or 4.9 percent from the figure for the present year.

The amount of state aid anticipated for next year is down from the present figure of \$304,000 largely because this aid is based on pupil population and the enrollment is expected to continue its decline for next year.

A board spokesman stressed that all figures for the proposed budget are tentative, pending study and approval by Dr. William H. West, county superintendent of schools.

No specific figures were released at Tuesday's meeting for teacher salaries. A spokesman commented that negotiations on a contract for next year are continuing with the Springfield Teachers' Association.

The meeting began at 8 p.m. in the Gaudineer cafeteria and was adjourned at 8:34. It was conducted by August Caprio, board finance chairman and a candidate for reelection. Other board members present were Ruth Weisman, Michael McIntyre, James Adams, David Brown and Seymour Margulies.

In other business, the board voted unanimously to drop the fees charged to the Springfield Recreation Department for the use of school facilities. There will now be no charge for use by the Recreation Department.

The audience consisted of school administrators, one reporter and two candidates for the board in the Feb. 8 election. They were Robert Southward and John Dwyer.

The Springfield board administers five schools—running from kindergarten to the eighth grade. Schools running up to the fifth grade are Raymond Chisholm, James Caldwell, Edward White and Thelma Sandmeyer. The Gaudineer School encompasses grades seven through 12.

Secondary education is the responsibility of the Union County Regional High School Board of Education, which serves six communities and operates four high schools, including Jonathan Dayton Regional in Springfield.

## Clancy chosen to fill Caprio's committee seat

The Springfield Township Committee was scheduled to name Donald Clancy to fill a vacancy in its membership, acting at a special meeting last night at Town Hall.

Clancy would replace Committeeman A. Arthur Caprio, whose resignation was to be accepted by the governing body at the same time. Caprio had recently announced his plans to retire from office because he is moving out of town.

Clancy's appointment would be for the remainder of 1972, and he will presumably run next November for election to serve out the remaining one-year portion of the term to which Caprio was elected in November of 1970.

A Democrat, Clancy will continue his party's three-to-two majority on the Township Committee. Mayor Robert Weltchek and Committeemen Nat Stokes and Dan Democrats. The two newly installed committeemen, William Ruocco and Norman Banner, are Republicans.

Clancy lives at 220 Balfour Ave. He is an executive of the Breakstone Company, a dairy firm. For the past several years he has been closely associated with Caprio in the leadership of the Colonial Civic Association. He has been a part of the municipal administration for the past year as a member of the Zoning Board of Adjustment.

Clancy is also chairman of the 1972 Springfield March of Dimes, raising funds which will be used to combat birth defects.

An administration spokesman said that Clancy would take over Caprio's Township Committee assignments, including supervision of the Department of Public Works. He would also replace Caprio as a Township Committee representative on the Board of Health.

Edward Fanning, who has been an alternate member of the Board of Adjustment, would be moved up to take Clancy's place on that body for the remaining two years of his term.

## First Aiders will install new officers Saturday

The Springfield First Aid Squad Saturday will hold its annual installation of officers. These to be installed include: president, Dan Kalem; vice-president, Gerald Harvey; recording secretary, Madeline Lancaster; treasurer, Spence Cannon; corresponding secretary, Dan Duffy; captain, Robert Vorhees; first lieutenant, Ruth Force; second lieutenant, Bill Harris; house committee chairman, Sal Esposito; trustee, Al Rago.

Since its inception in 1948, the squad has grown to 37 regular members and six exempt members. The volunteer group provides 24-hour ambulance emergency service, seven days a week. Each regular member must serve a minimum of 12 hours per week. In addition, a special oxygen patrol (Dan Kalem, Ruth Force, Gerald Harvey, Dan Duffy, Mildred Kotovsky, Jaclyn Herzlinger and Berl Bruder) is on constant alert to persons requiring oxygen can be helped within three minutes.

The squad also has six qualified first aid instructors—Carol Allen, Ruth Force, Dan Kalem, Jaclyn Herzlinger, Robert McCormick and Rose Marshall. Kalem, Mrs. Force, Mrs. Herzlinger and Mrs. Marshall are also certified instructors in cardiac pulmonary resuscitation.

All emergency calls are received by the Police Department which then alerts the duty crew by a special FM alarm system. The duty rushes to the squad house, gets the ambulance and proceeds to the emergency site. If the police are told that the patient requires oxygen, the police dispatcher will announce, "This is an oxygen call," and the special oxygen patrol will also go into action.

The growing need and use of the service are underlined by a comparison of the statistics for 1971 and 1970. In 1971 there were 901 calls compared to 550 in 1970. Of these, 594 were emergencies and 293 were for transportation. In 1961 there were 296 emergencies and 231 transportation calls. The ambulances totaled 10,766 miles in 1971 against 7,562 in 1961. Oxygen cases were 117 and 818 cardiac pulmonary resuscitations—40 years ago there were 53 oxygen calls and no CPR's.

The squad maintains two air-conditioned ambulances equipped with the latest life-saving devices.

## Irvington man finds shoplifting costly—pays a fine of \$35

Two drivers were fined \$15 each for careless driving: Barbara J. Scovozzo of Union for a violation on Rt. 22, and Colene Crawford of Summit for a violation of Shampke road.

Dennis DiPietro of Summit paid a \$15 fine for improper display of plates.

## Leaving driveway, hits truck, then tree

A 73-year-old Springfield driver was reported in satisfactory condition at Overlook Hospital early this week following an accident on Mountain Avenue involving a truck. Springfield police reported that Armando Altelli was hurt in the accident on Monday morning.

According to the report, Altelli's car ran into the rear wheels of a truck on Mountain Avenue as the auto pulled out of a shopping center driveway. The car, on the set and left roadway, went another 150 feet and struck a tree, police said.

Altelli hit his head against the steering wheel and received cuts on his head and face, and he also suffered chest pains, police stated. The car had to be towed.

The truck was driven by James L. Person of East Orange for Playal Treadway Inc. of Bantam, police reported.

## Pedestrian killed on Rt. 22 for first fatality of new year

The first fatal automobile accident of 1972, in Springfield occurred on the second day of the new year when a pedestrian crossing Rt. 22 was struck and killed by a car in rainy weather on Sunday night.

The pedestrian, identified as Morantz Vasilios of Astoria, N.Y., was pronounced dead on arrival by Springfield police at 9 p.m. He was hit by a car driven by Thornton Jones, 44, of Winfield Park, police reported.

Springfield detectives stated that no charges would be pressed against Jones, who was traveling down Rt. 22 in the eastbound lanes when the accident occurred. Jones' mother and his three young children were passengers in his car, police said.

Vasilios, an employee of a restaurant on Rt. 22, was apparently attempting to cross the highway from the east to westbound lanes, according to the report by P.I. Edward Kisch. Jones told police he spotted a man on the highway as he neared the Springfield Avenue overpass near Howard Johnson's. He applied the brakes and the car went into a skid, Kisch stated.

The Jones car left skid marks of 162 feet on the road surface and traveled 64 feet after striking Vasilios, the report said.

Vasilios' body was removed to the Sullivan Funeral Home in Hazlet.

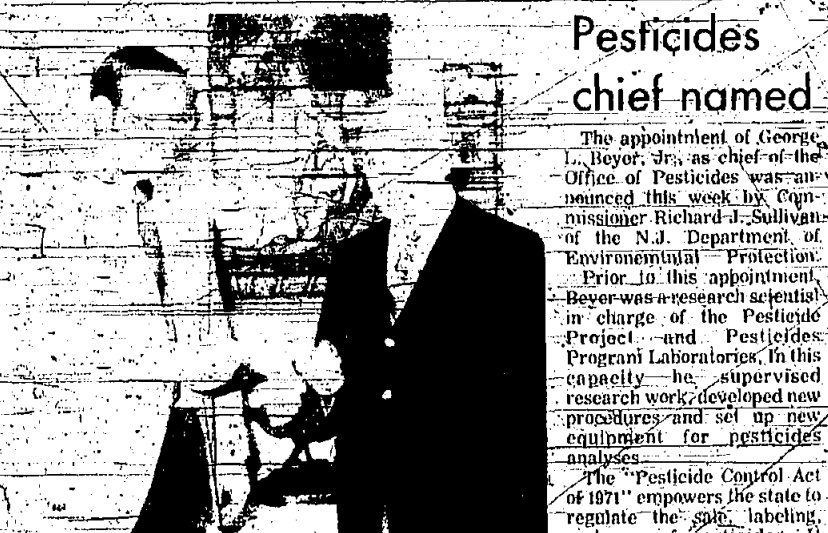

He added, "We certainly have problems. I promise that in 1972 we will solve many. This will be a year of progress and accomplishment to make our town a better place to live."

FIRST AMONG the problems he listed the imminent retirement of Eleanore H. Worthington, township clerk. Welchek said, "We will miss her much, but she has indicated to me that she will be retiring to the mountains and what a tremendous problem it will be to replace her."

Stokes, as the retiring mayor, expressed his thanks to everyone concerned "for the very interesting year I had. We tried to serve the community, and I think we did an excellent job."

Welchek announced the Township Committee assignments for the new year.

Banner will head the department of finance and revenue, including township real estate, insurance, budget control, treasurer, tax collector, assessment of taxes, pension fund and purchasing. He will be assisted by Russo and Welchek.

Caprio or his successor, will head the department of public works, including the engineering department, water, utilities and buildings. He will be assisted by Stokes and Banner.

Stokes will be in charge of the department of public affairs, including parks and public properties, animal welfare, Local Assessment Commission and recreation. Aiding him will be Caprio and Russo.

Welchek will head the department of public safety, including the Police Department, Fire Department, civil defense and disaster control and the Local Assistance Board. Aiding him will be Caprio and Banner.

### Teachers' Association seeking right to strike

The New Jersey Education Association is preparing a statewide campaign to win "fair play for teachers" at the negotiating table and in the courts.

In the campaign, NJEA will inform the public of conditions in the association's contract which are unjust—such as the "teachers cannot strike" clause that has caused jail sentences for some 500 New Jersey teachers in the last two years. NJEA will also seek passage of a package of "teacher fair play" bills in the State Legislature.

To run the campaign, NJEA President Warren Cummings, of Newton, is putting together a special action committee including at least one public school teacher from each county. Some of the teachers suggested for the committee have been sentenced or jailed for violating anti-strike injunctions by New Jersey courts.

Cummings will announce the names of committee members before the campaign's kickoff on Tuesday, Jan. 20, at NJEA headquarters in Trenton.

**TOP-PRIORITY BILLS:** NJEA's "teacher fair play" package includes:

A-125, which would give the N.J. Public Employees' Relations Commission (PERC) enforcement power over specified unfair labor practices by either the public employer or the public employee.

A-126, which would give Superior Court the power to decide whether or not an injunction should be issued in a strike involving public employees and would clear the records of teachers already convicted of violating anti-strike injunctions.

Neither the New Jersey Constitution nor state law prohibits strikes by public employees, said Dr. Frederick L. Hipp, NJEA executive director. The state's Superior Court prohibits them by issuing injunctions based on the English Common Law, going back to the theory that subjects may not limit the power of the king.

"Teachers do not want the blanket power to shut schools at whim," Dr. Hipp said. "Nor would A-126 allow this. A-126 would let public employees withhold services only if they could show that a strike presented 'no clear and present danger to the public health or safety.'"

At present, when an employer asks a judge to prohibit a strike, the injunction is issued almost automatically, the NJEA executive said. "Since a judge has no authority to do otherwise, he is usually forced to issue the order regardless of the circumstances. As a result, public employees can be enjoined from striking even when there is extreme provocation by the employer."

**ENACTMENT OF A-126** would "help" produce peaceful settlements in most disputes between public employer and public employee, the NJEA stated. "Because the courts would no longer issue an instant injunction without due process," Dr. Hipp said, "public employers would be more likely to resolve differences through good-faith negotiations."

Under A-126, the courts would still issue injunctions if the public employees failed to negotiate in good faith or did not follow procedures established by law. Dr. Hipp said: "The public interest would be served by the establishment of this reasonable and fair balance in the negotiation process."

NJEA's other top priority bill, A-125, would restore a power cancelled in 1970 when the N.J. Supreme Court ruled that PERC does not have the right to prohibit or remedy unfair labor practices in the public sector.

# Jersey's business outlook 'confident,' according to latest survey by NJMA

A total of 789 New Jersey business leaders plan to spend more than \$3 billion in 1972 on new capital facilities, indicating confidence that business conditions will be good this year, according to a survey released this week by Leonard G. Johnson, president of the New Jersey Manufacturers Association.

The statement is based on the results of the association's 13th annual Economic Outlook Survey. "Considering the collateral benefits to New Jersey's economy of new investment in capital facilities, the planned industrial expansion program planned for 1972 is more optimistic than in 1971," Johnson said.

Over 20 percent of NJMA's 11,500 members responded to the survey, which was sent to approximately half of all businesses in New Jersey. Three hundred ninety-four Union County businesses were among the 724 members who responded to the survey.

Compared with last year's survey in which 10 percent of all respondents planned to invest \$200,000 or more in 1972, 19 percent of those responding expect to invest that amount in 1972. Johnson pointed out that almost 20 percent of the respondents planned to invest \$200,000 or more in 1972, up from 15 percent in 1971.

One of the new water pollution control laws passed during the 1971 session of the Legislature may prove to be a greater help to the private citizen than anyone suspected.

A statute controlling the discharge of petroleum products into waters of the state (Chapter 172, P.L. 1971) was amended by environmental bills signed by Gov. William W. Cahill last June.

The law is the first to require a polluter to remove an oil slick from a body of water. It also requires the polluter to pay the cost of removal.
