

### Turnpike troopers start the new year with 137 arrests

The alertness of troopers patrolling the New Jersey Turnpike resulted in a record 137 criminal arrests during the first 10 days of 1972. Five and one-half times more than during last year's corresponding period.

Heading the list were more than 50 arrests involving narcotics valued at about \$27,000, and 49 for carrying concealed weapons. Other offenses included motor vehicle violations, with most occurring in the north of New Brunswick.

At the same time, the Turnpike Authority released statistics for 1971 that showed a total of 3,171 persons who thought they could make a safe getaway to their destination from a stop of Troop D patrols. They were arrested on a variety of charges, most of which involved criminal violations. Among the 1,187 persons arrested were 1,066 in 1971 and 429 in 1970.

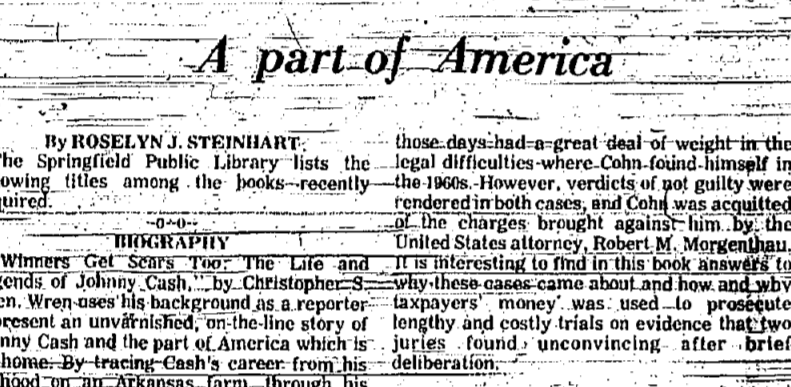

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### New Turnpike toll ticket easy to read; glare gone

The New Jersey Turnpike Authority has begun the use of a new consolidated ticket to cover more than 99 percent of its toll transactions.

The new ticket, which incorporates toll information on a single tabulating card, is built with black printing. This combination of color and black ink was selected after extensive field testing.

The change was brought about by studies conducted by the Authority's Systems and Data Processing Department which indicated that Class 1 vehicles—passenger automobiles, motorcycles, mopeds and bicycles—constituted 85 percent of the Turnpike's total annual volume.

Combining Class 1 with Classes 2-5—trailers, commercial vehicles and trucks with up to five axles—will save the Authority space at interchanges and at toll plazas.

During February, which has been proclaimed Heart Month, volunteers from the American Heart Association will be working hard to reach through the mails and on a house-to-house basis.

"Because of the urgency of the need to reduce the toll of heart disease, the importance of contributing to the Heart Fund this month cannot be emphasized strongly enough," the chairman declared. "Although progress has been made in reducing the number of deaths,

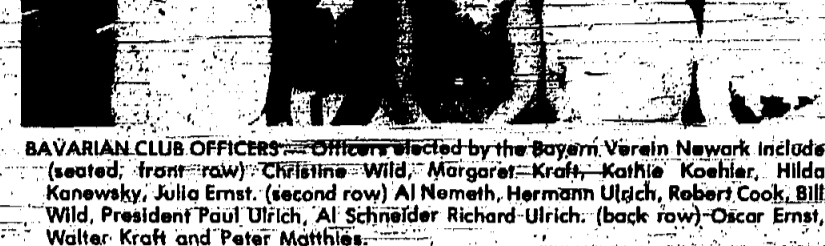

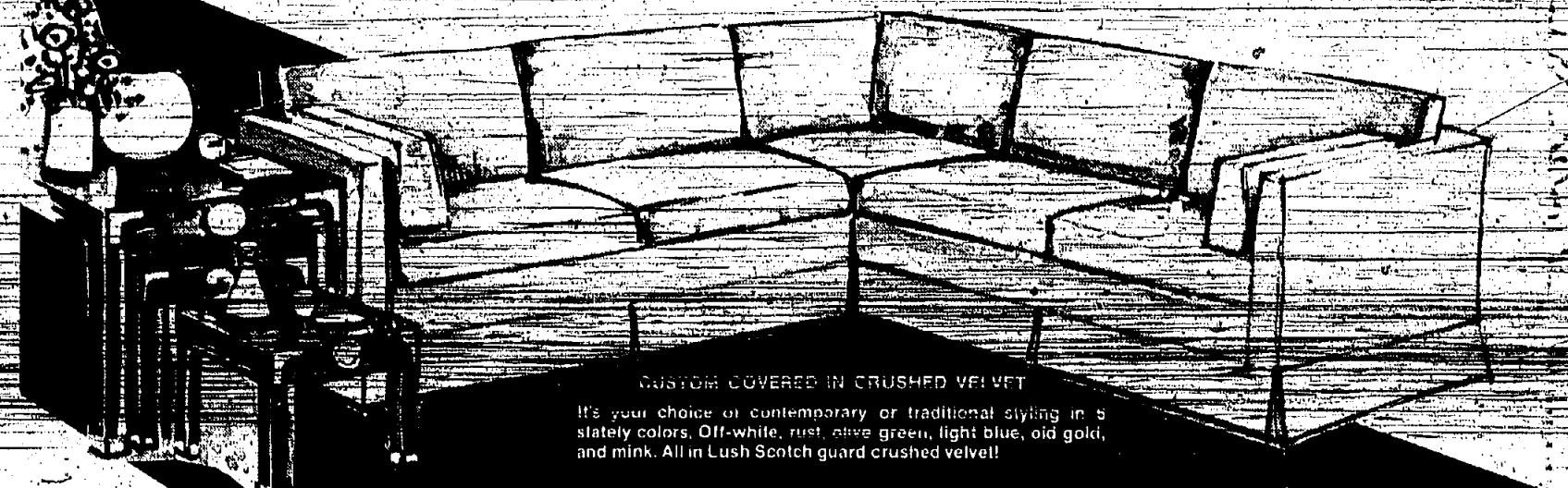

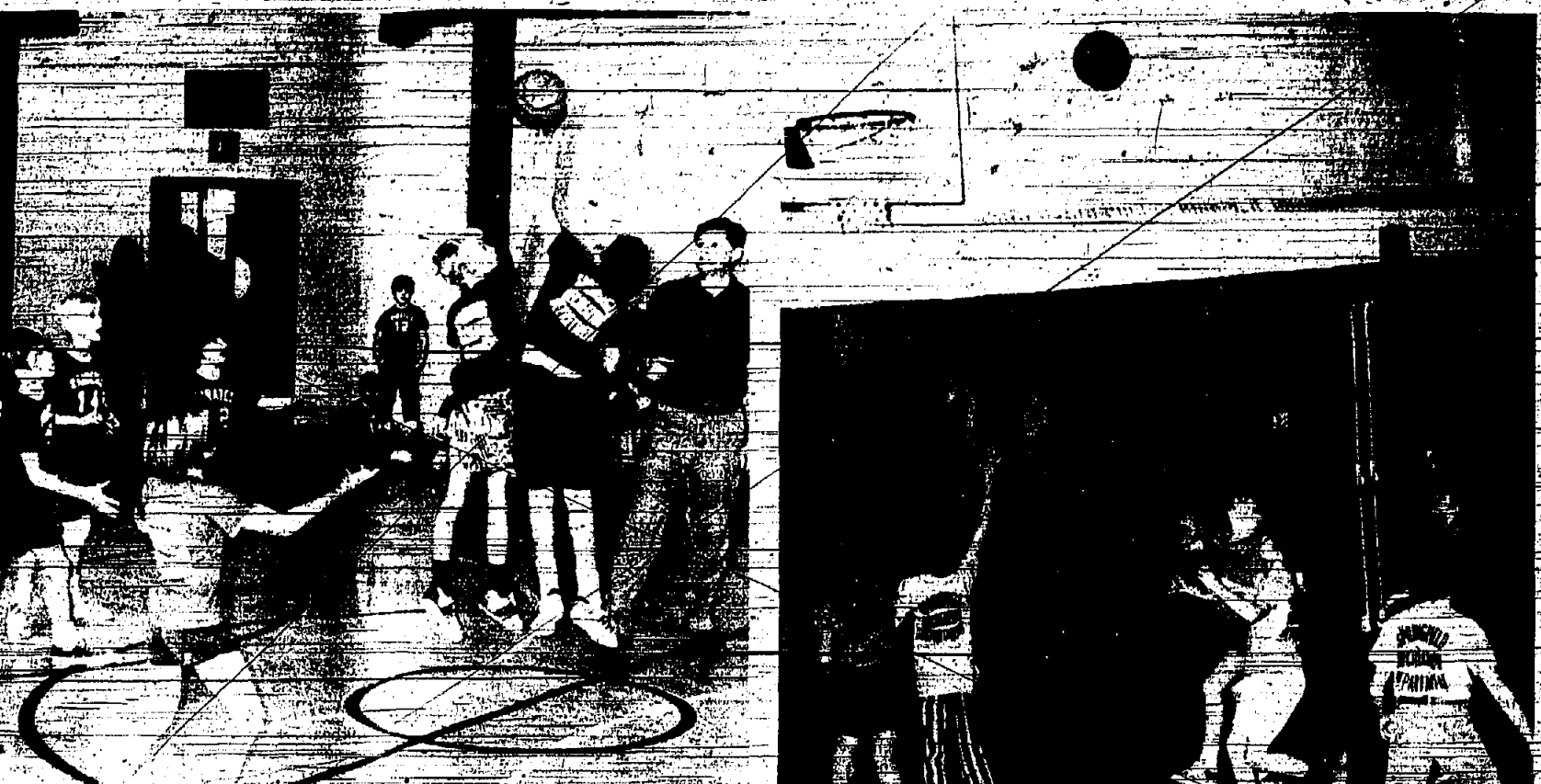

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# Sperry Observatory has new eye on sky

The average distance between the moon and the earth is 238,855 miles. However, it varies over four years' effort and more than 2,500 man-hours of labor on the part of amateur astronomers, it is estimated that the Sperry Observatory is still 238,855 miles away from the moon.

The new unit will occupy one of the two rotating turret domes rooms, while the other houses the 12-inch reflector telescope which will also usually be placed out by the college and AAI in favor of a 24-inch instrument.

Before the Sperry Observatory's debut, AAI had already begun the work of equipping the facility with modern, high quality astronomical telescopes. During the construction of these scopes, two smaller, immediately available instruments were installed so that the observatory could begin the task of educating the thousands who have now learned more and more about the heavens.

From a small beginning in November, 1958, the membership ranks in AAI has now swelled to a high of 288 members. The observatory project, replacing the six-inch reflector telescope which had

been in use since the observatory was first opened in 1967.

AAI operates the observatory in cooperation with the college.

The newest addition to the Sperry Observatory's sky-scanning arsenal is a ten-inch (diameter) refractor telescope—designed, constructed and installed by AAI, which will be available to the observatory's staff and to the public in the early spring.

The instrument's implementation will be the culmination of a four-year project, replacing the six-inch reflector telescope which had

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# Communal living—a temporary thing?

## Family structure not in peril—researchers

Rising incidences of communal living and unmarried relationships among young people today are most often an attempt not to replace the traditional family but to find a new way of living, according to two sociology graduates from Rutgers University.

Doctors Catherine Mathew Greenwald, 28, and Carl Danziger, 28, have been spending several months trying to get first-hand information on the new life styles.

Some of their preliminary findings indicate that while many young people are seeking new life styles, they are not "that growing up and them as life-long alternatives."

"As part of their research, Danziger traveled the country this summer talking to as many unmarried couples as he could find, while Greenwald lived for five weeks in an urban commune in New York City.

Hoping to use findings from a detailed questionnaire and personal observations as dissertation material and eventually as a book, the young sociologists want to speculate on the popularity of the new life styles and their future communities. Their research is aided by small grants from Rutgers and the State Department of Higher Education.

"In PRELIMINARY WRITINGS they note that many present-day sociologists, psychologists and clergymen have pointed to the erosion of the traditional family as a sign of social disintegration and a sign that society will continue to grow. However, we do not believe that family structure is in a declining state, but rather that it is being redefined by people going through a new stage in the life cycle."

Altogether, which they say ranges from entrance to college to the late 20's or early 30's, is one of "experimentation with different life styles, searching for orientation and a time for testing educational goals."

It is often a moratorium period in which marriage, personal commitment, definitive occupation and other manifestations of adulthood are delayed. The key word, the researchers point out, is "delayed."

An educational demands continue to push the marriage age upward there will be an increased opportunity for experimentation with alternatives, but many individuals, upon completion of this stage, will not settle for a great extent into traditional marriages, they say.

"THE FACT THAT traditional relationships do not work for a significant number of people makes it important, however, that alternatives be explored, Danziger and Greenwald feel. Communal life may not be the best alternative, however, says Greenwald, who bases his assumptions on experience. He describes his temporary residence as a "very straight, middle class commune, no drugs, no free sex, I only saw one bottle of ale the whole time."

He has labeled his people as the "Line Seven men, including Greenwald, six women and two children. Two adult couples were living together and one couple was taking care of the children. Jobs held by the commune members included driver, social worker and teacher. Some were students, some were professionals."

"This commune, Greenwald says, helps to dispel the "clique" image of commune people. He says, "I met many of them at an approaching middle class venue."

Nevertheless, few of the inhabitants said they were happy. Most of them said they were living in the commune to "put their lives together."

Most of them, Greenwald says, had earlier found it hard relating to people and they were hoping to improve their relationships. But he found it ironic that they wanted their privacy while at the same time seeking to merge people around them.

"They needed people, but at a distance," he says.

UNMARRIED RELATIONSHIPS, says Danziger, are becoming an increasing phenomenon but are not an alternative to marriage as a stage preceding it.

Many youths are beginning to identify themselves as "single" rather than "unmarried" behavior, formerly considered "out of bounds," but "not becoming increasingly acceptable as a life style alternative to a variety of ways, ranging from a full marriage to a matter of cohabitation."

In his survey Danziger is aiming at the college-age population specifically because "you know where college students or recent graduates are and they are the people who are most likely to be in the middle of this process."

He says that the "new" family structure is not in peril, but rather that it is being redefined by people going through a new stage in the life cycle.

### 3 new credit courses added to educational offerings at UC

Three new credit courses have been added to the educational offerings at Union College, it was announced this week by Prof. Elmer Wolf, dean of the college.

The first of the new courses is a six-week seminar on public relations at Union College. "Public Relations" will be the theme of a seminar to be offered by Union College beginning Tuesday, March 7, it was announced this week by Prof. Richard J. Sclaf, director of the division.

The course is designed for newly appointed public relations officers and for executives whose responsibilities include public relations. It will focus on the corporate and institutional relationships in the several important areas: the community public, the employee public, the consumer public, according to Frank Kabela of Princeton Partners, Inc., a Princeton-based advertising and public relations firm, who will conduct the seminar. The emphasis will be on understanding public relations by an understanding communication between employer-employees, the company and the community, the company and the media.

An introductory lecture will deal with the basic concepts and how they interrelate with the public relations effort, Kabela stated.
