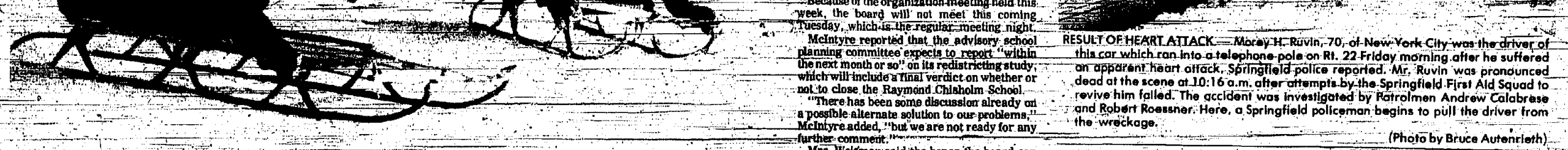

Jonathan Dayton: Inside story of an early statesman

Most of the historical research at the Springfield Public Library... Jonathan Dayton: born in Elizabeth Town, Oct. 15, 1760. A graduate of the College of New Jersey (Princeton), Revolutionary War soldier, lawyer, signer of the Constitution, a member of the State Assembly, the House of Representatives and the United States Senate, his term as a senator expiring on March 4, 1805.

Among the conspirators indicted on the charge, and released only because the case against their leader collapsed, was Jonathan Dayton, his lieutenant and most loyal confidant.

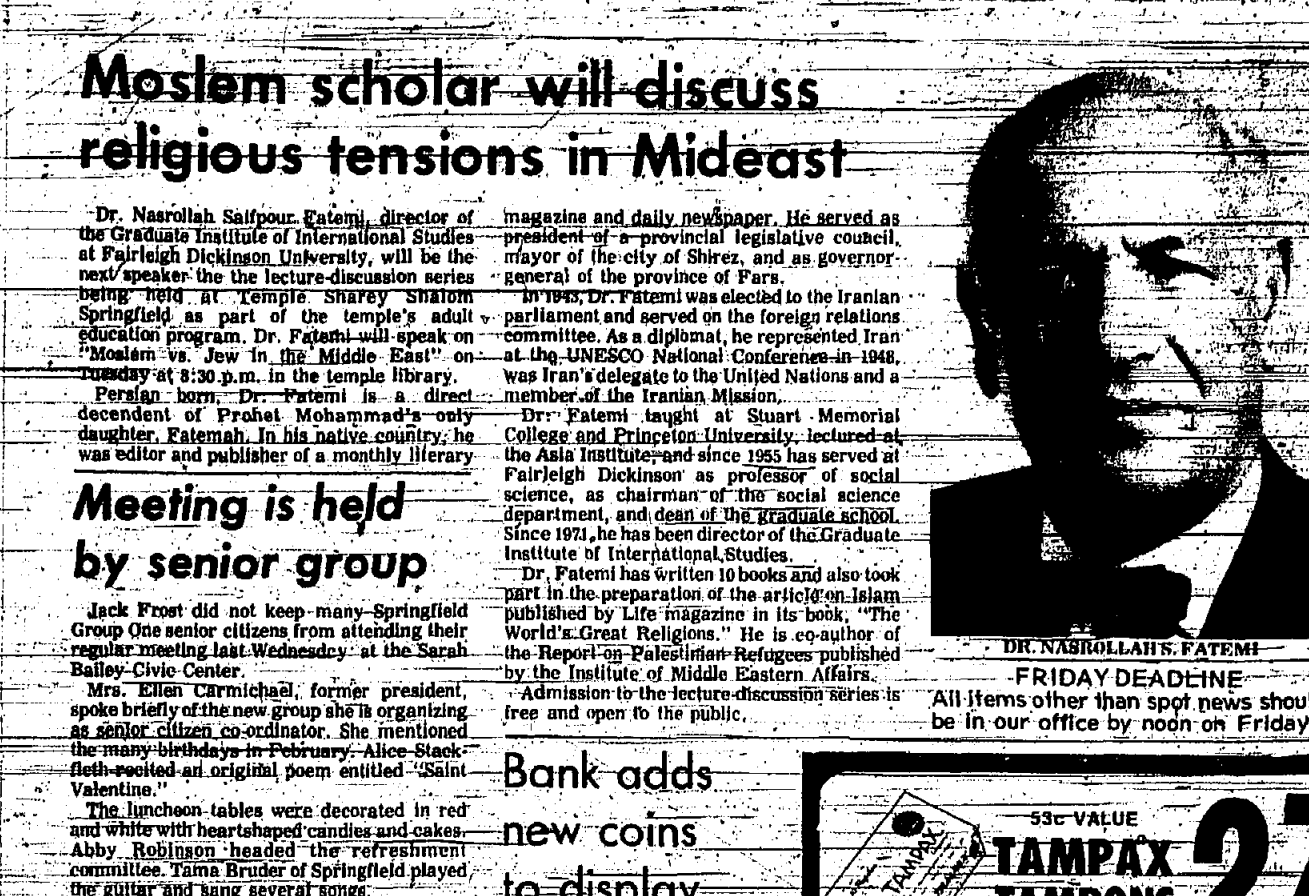

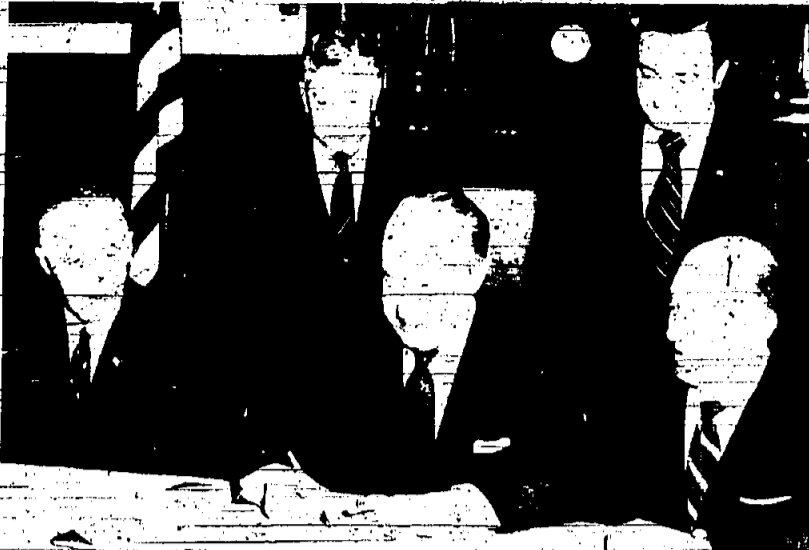

Increase in jobless rate smallest in five years

While unemployment in New Jersey normally rises in January, the increase last month was the smallest, percentage-wise, for any January in the past five years, Ronald M. Heymann, commissioner of the N.J. Department of Labor and Industry reported this week.

Heymann said that unemployment in the state rose by 25,300 in January. This was a 9.1 percent increase in the jobless rate bringing it to 7.2 percent of the work force.

After adjustment for seasonal variation, the unemployment rate dropped to 6.2 percent in January from 6.7 percent in December and 6.9 percent in November. Seasonal adjustment is a statistical procedure to eliminate the purely seasonal changes in a series and, thereby, reveal the basic economic trend.

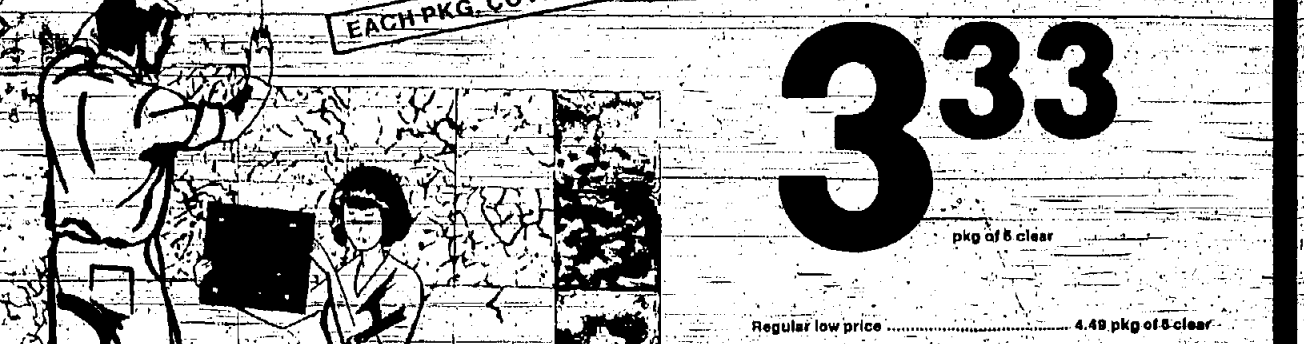

MENTAL HEALTH MATTERS

Stanley F. Yolles, M.D., Director

GOOD WORKERS
In these days when we hear so much about how hard it is to get good workers, business men and community leaders are returning to the responsibilities of daily life each year for the mentally-restored are finding that they make capable employees.

SEW WHAT?
The economic cost to the nation of mental illness has been estimated at about \$2 billion a year. Rehabilitation of the mentally ill is productive—capacity can drastically lower this high social cost.

There is definite proof of all this—Long-term studies of work records of the mentally-restored indicate that they have successfully filled every kind of job in the labor force, that they maintain high work standards, and that they have good records of tenure and job stability.

Here are "three easy steps" for community leaders in opening up jobs for the mentally restored:

1. Give most consideration to ex-mental patients for jobs. When you find out what good workers they can be, let others know about it.

2. Establish personal contacts with staffs of mental health associations, mental hospitals, and mental health centers in your community, and with patients on the verge of discharge, orienting them to the needs of business and frankly discussing work opportunities and requirements.

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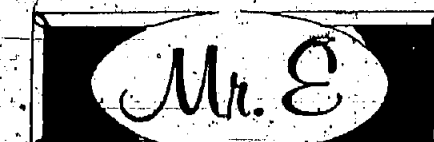
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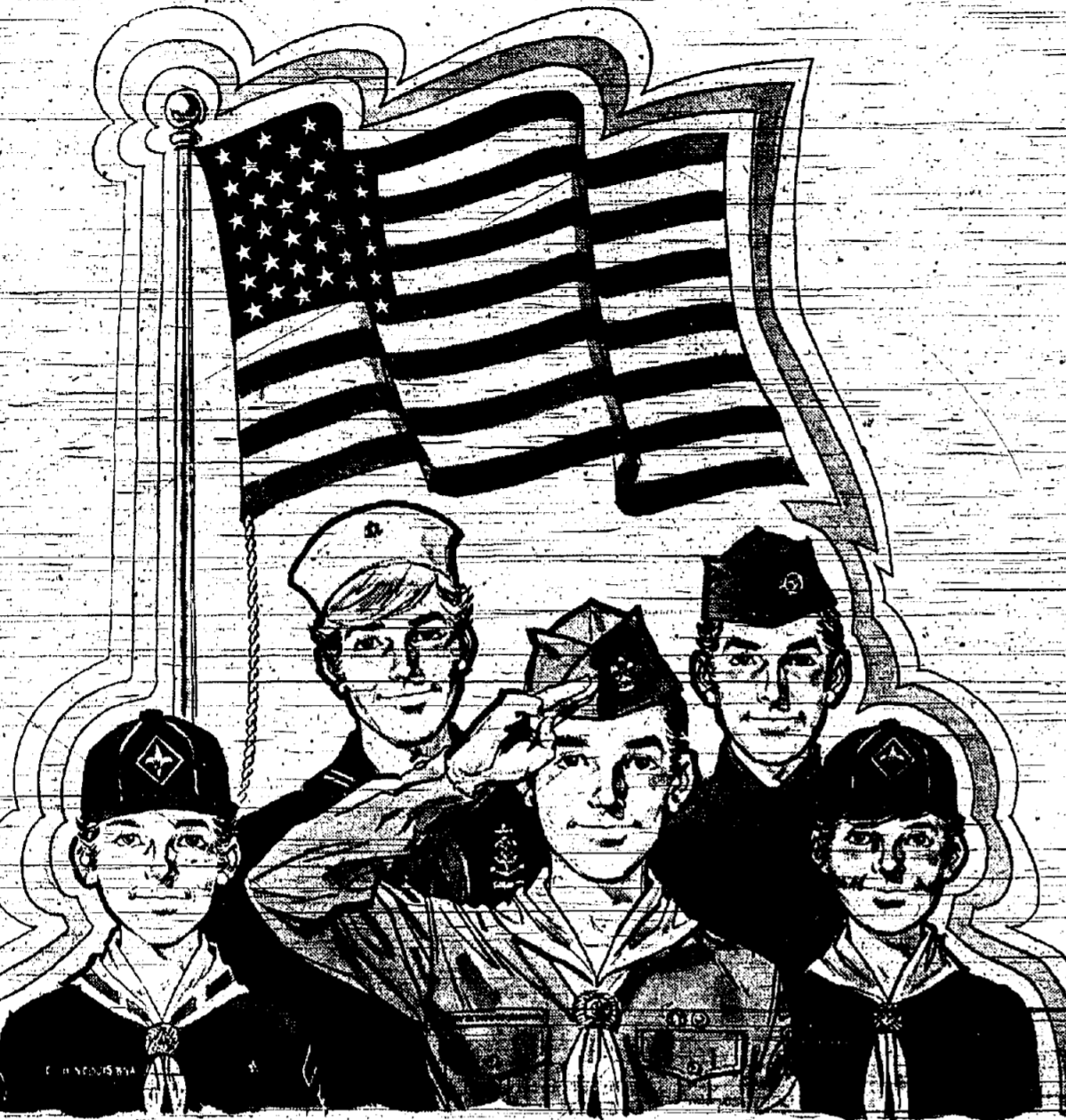
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Farms Church to hear speech by professor on Black History

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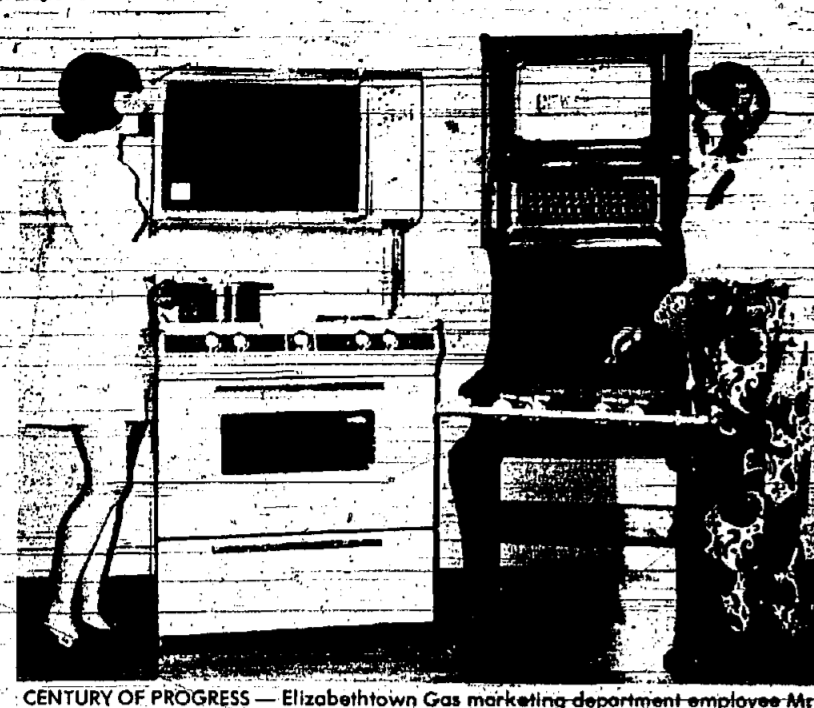

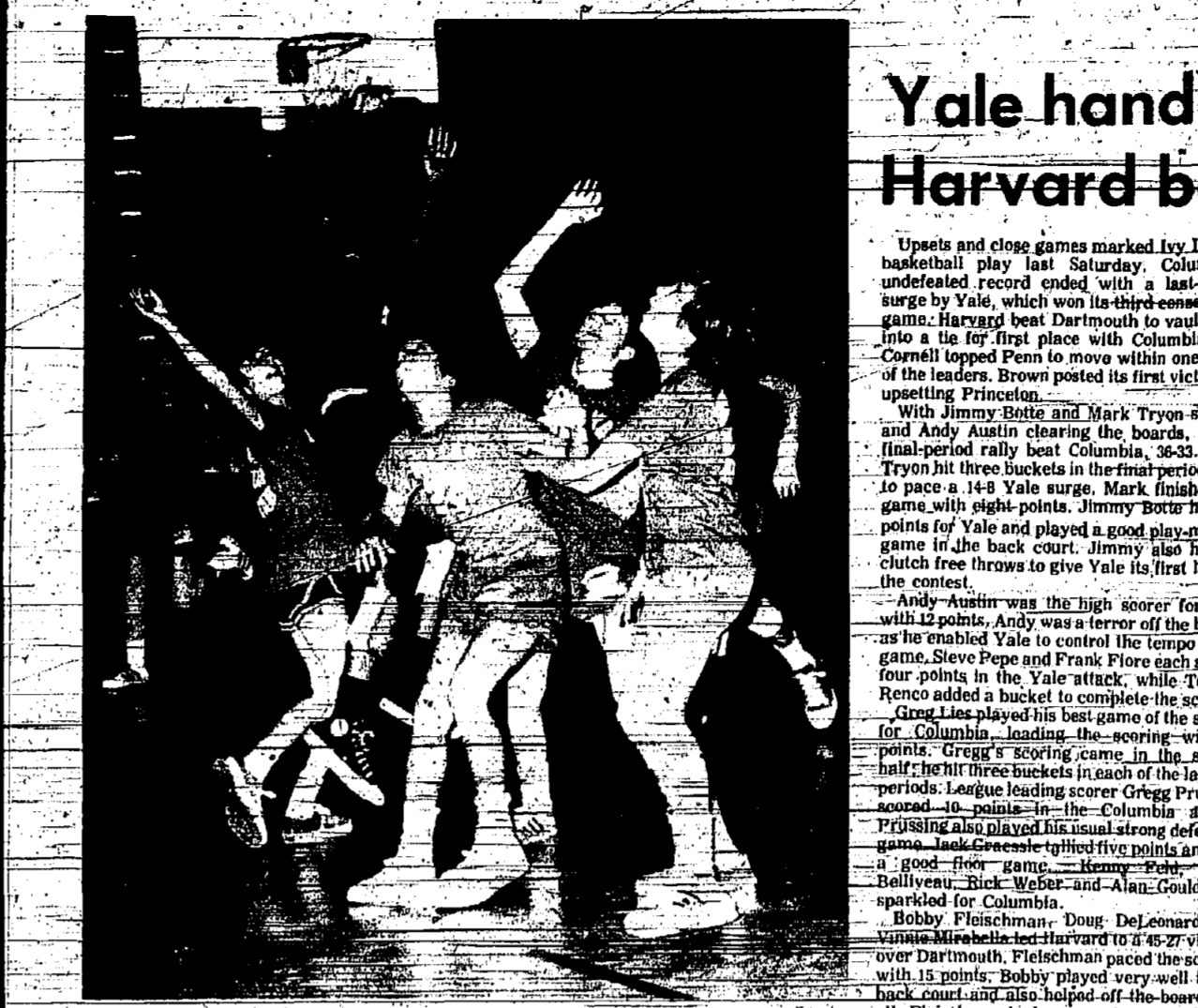

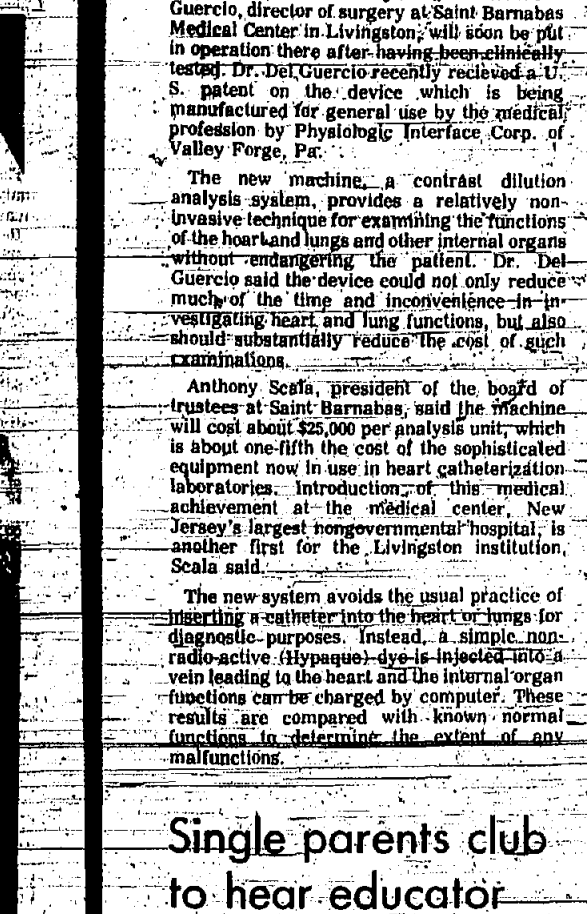

Iguanas getting their day at Rutgers

Scaling new heights in the interests of science

The first production model of a new diagnostic tool invented by Dr. Louis R. M. DeGuercio, director of surgery at Saint Barnabas Medical Center in Livingston, will soon be put in operation there after having been extensively tested at Rutgers University.

When the iguana came to Rutgers, they had a job to do. They didn't know it, but they were going to help a human being.

Reason for the strange project? "There's a new Department of Environmental Hygiene at the College of Agriculture and Environmental Science. And the scientists in it are trying to find out how different creatures react to environmental stress—heat and cold, and high altitudes.

The professor in charge of the iguana is Dr. Wesley Weathers. His major research area is temperature adaptations, but he's also interested in the high altitude studies of his colleague, Dr. James McGrath.

And Dr. Weathers is rather partial to iguanas.

He believes it's important to study "obscure" animals like these, before they perish, to learn something about the evolutionary process of adaptation to a new environment. Iguanas were captured several days ago and were being housed in an aquaria, and brought to Rutgers to see how they would respond to an inflation mountain—a low pressure chamber Dr. McGrath helped design.

The iguana, because of its ability to regulate its body temperature, is a good model for studying the effects of environmental stress.

The new system avoids the usual practice of inserting a catheter into the heart's lungs for diagnostic purposes. Under a simple skin incision, a radio-active (Iyopnoic) dye is injected into a vein leading to the heart and the internal organ functions are checked by computer. These results are compared with known normal functions to determine the extent of any malfunctioning.

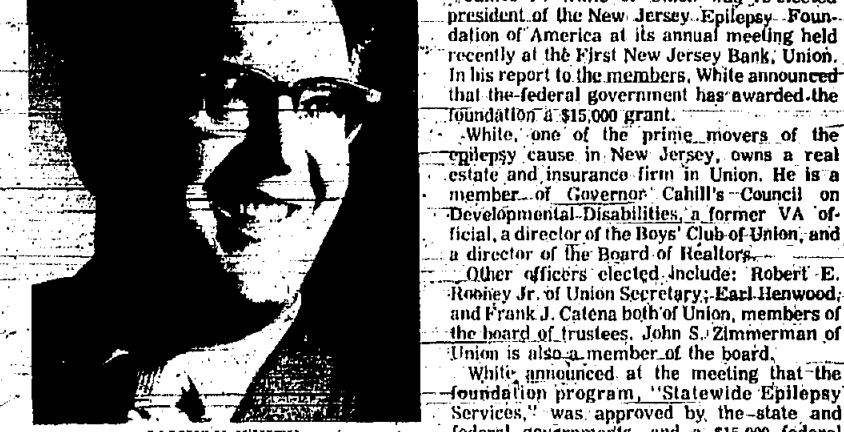

White again named epilepsy unit head



James F. White of Union was re-elected president of the New Jersey Epilepsy Foundation of America at its annual meeting held recently at the First New Jersey Bank Union, in his report to the members. White announced that the federal government has awarded the foundation a \$150,000 grant.

White, one of the prime movers of the epilepsy cause in New Jersey, owns a real estate and insurance firm in Union. He is a member of Governor Cahill's Council on Developmental Disabilities, a former VA official, a director of the Boys' Club of Union, and a director of the Board of Health.

Other officers elected include: Robert E. Howley Jr. of Union Secretary; Earl Henwood and Frank J. Cates both of Union, members of the board of trustees. John S. Zimmerman of Union is also a member of the board.

White announced at the meeting that the foundation program, "Statewide Epilepsy Services," was approved by the state and federal governments, and a \$150,000 federal grant was awarded.

White, commenting upon the federal grant, said it is the first of its kind in the history of New Jersey for the purpose of aiding epilepsy. He added that the plan encompasses a variety of services and a combination of objectives. It is hoped that the services will ultimately achieve an improvement of employment opportunities for those afflicted with epilepsy, thereby providing such persons with a more normal and productive life.

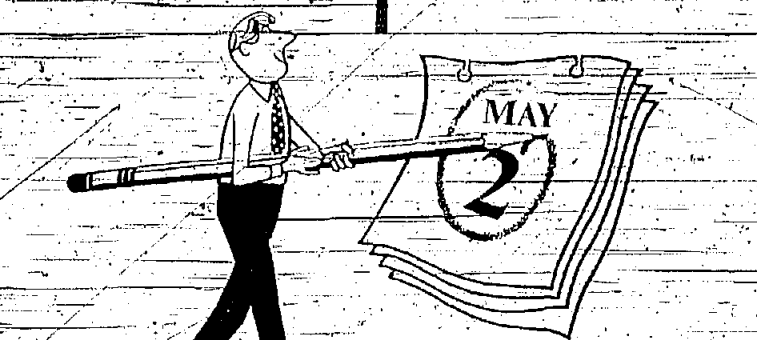

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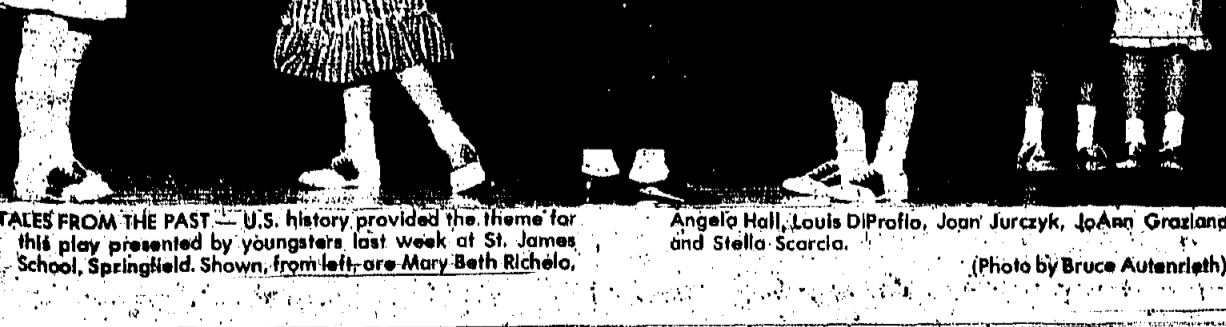
