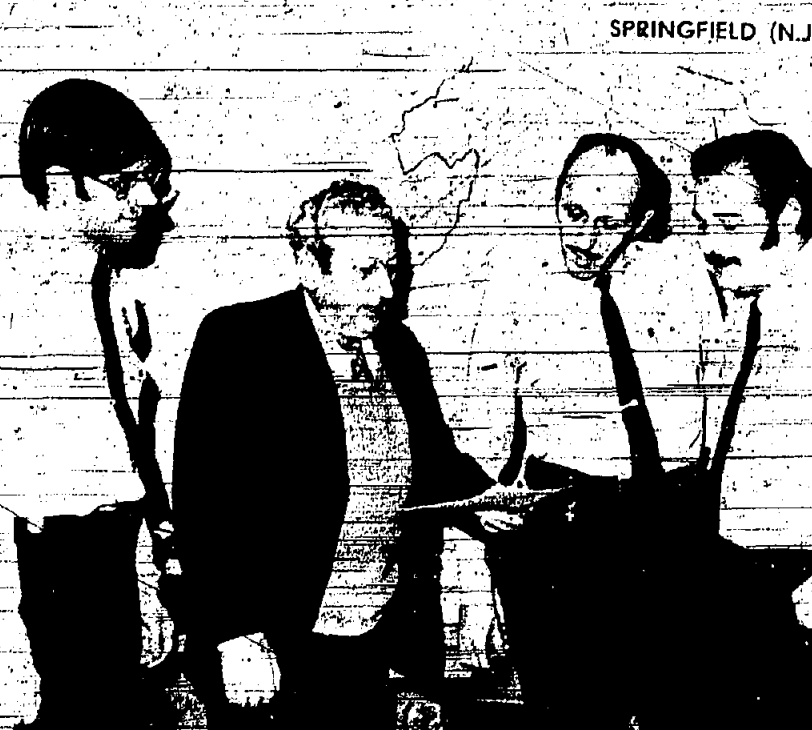

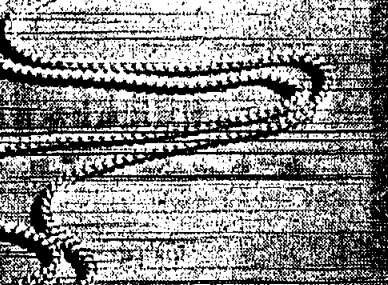

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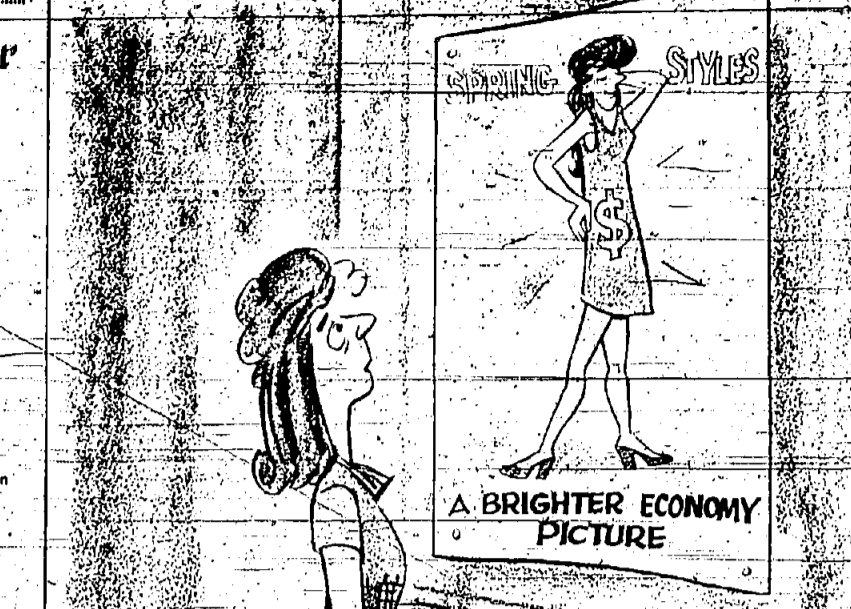

Summer study in Japan

Seton Hall plans third seminar

Seton Hall University in South Orange has been awarded a grant of \$22,000 by the Institute of International Studies of the U.S. Office of Education to conduct the third Overseas Institute in Japan from June 30 through Aug. 24.

The project, which will be under the direction of Dr. Tadashi Kikukawa, will provide an advanced training for secondary school teachers and some graduate students of social studies to study three major aspects in a multi-disciplinary approach: (1) cultural heritage, (2) contemporary society and culture and (3) Japan and the U.S.

The initial phase will be four weeks of intensive study at Sophia University in Tokyo. The second part will begin in the fifth week when the institute moves to Tsukuba, 50 miles north of Tokyo, where the institute will visit a feudal castle, gardens and medieval samurai museums as well as merchants' houses.

The sixth week will include a study trip to Hokkaido, the northern-most island in Japan. Here the participants will see and study industrial development and modernization.

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Clergymen-counselors helping many

Special service organized by church

American tend to rely on their clergymen to help them when they need personal counseling. Many pastors, however, shy away from in-depth counseling like physicians, psychologists and psychiatrists. The six-month-old Clergy Consultants, a non-denominational, non-profit counseling service, sponsored by the Northern New Jersey Council of the United Methodist Church, is attempting to utilize the skills of the pastor who is experienced in counseling to meet the needs of the individuals requiring their help.

The Rev. Kenneth A. Austenberg, director of Clergy Consultants, observed that of persons who seek counseling help, 45 percent go to a minister, 29 percent to a physician and 12 percent to a psychiatrist.

Since the summer that service has served about 100 persons through 30 clergymen who are professional counselors. All of the coun-

sultors are ordained and experienced clergymen of various faiths who have been specially selected and psychiatrically screened on the basis of their maturity and the ability to be objective in helping people through counseling.

"The counseling pastors," said Mr. Austenberg, "all serve without financial remuneration and see consultants in their own church synagogues or temple offices."

Mr. Austenberg, who is also pastor of the First United Methodist Church in Hoboken, said "additional counselors are being selected and screened for inclusion in the service."

The clergyman, a professional pastoral counselor, and Dr. Ellis J. Mischel, a Summit psychologist and psychoanalyst, meet with a counseling supervisors frequently who in turn meet with the 30 clergymen counselors each week to insure that those seeking help will receive the most competent consideration.

Representative problems from those

service be undertaken. After two years a study was conducted and a standing pastoral counseling service committee was formed with members appropriated to finance the program.

A major thrust of the service has been to provide competent pastoral care and counseling help to persons and families, who are without church or religious ties or who for one reason or another cannot turn to their own religious leader for help. "Church people have long realized the comfort and guidance they can receive from their own pastor, priest or rabbi in times of trouble and confusion," said Mr. Austenberg.

Where professional psychotherapy or psychiatric treatment is indicated, the counselor in consultation with his supervisor will refer the individual to a suitable outside agency or institution, and the person and family can be seen by both at the same time.

There are no geographic restrictions for persons seeking counseling. Counselors are available throughout northern New Jersey. Financial considerations need not prevent anyone as there is no charge for services. A donation is requested of persons to help defray costs of supervision and other expenses, according to a suggested donation scale as determined by the committee itself.

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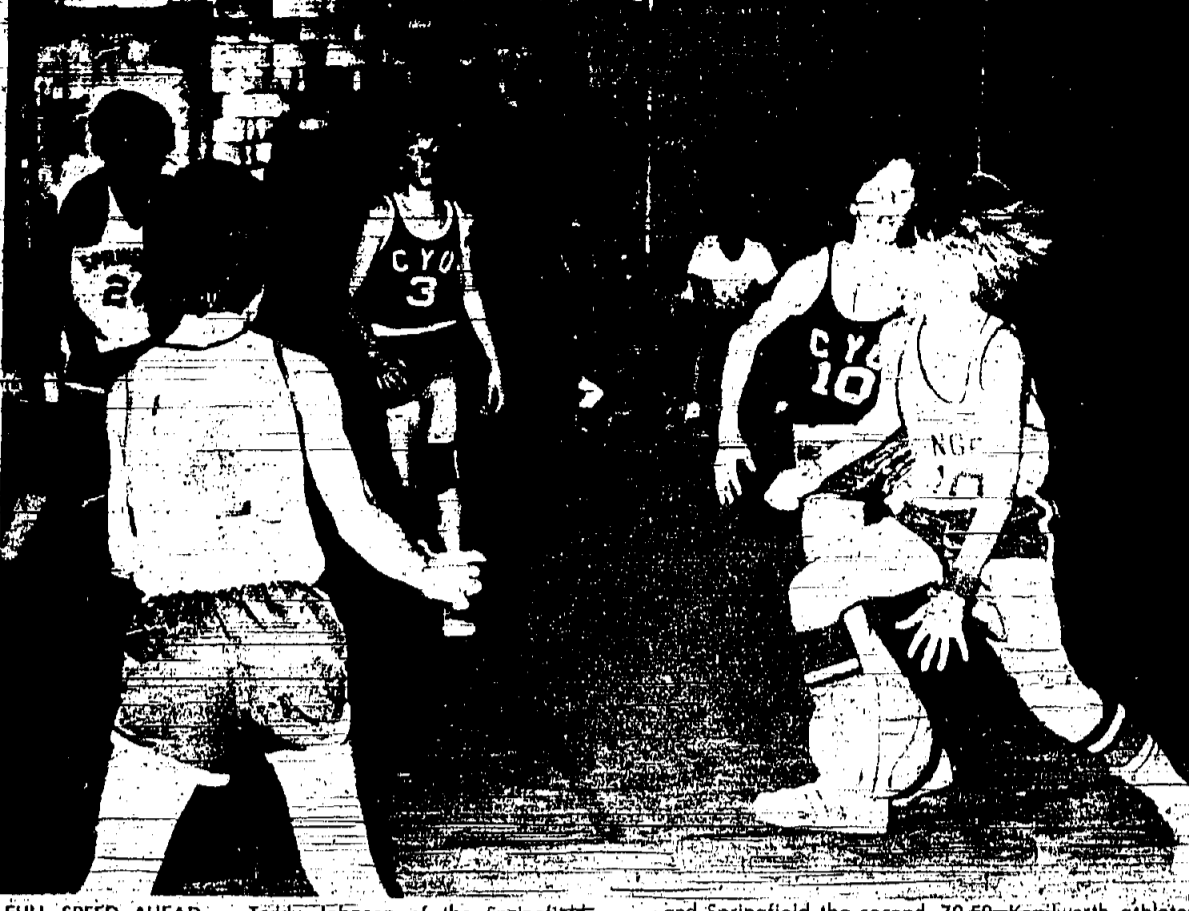

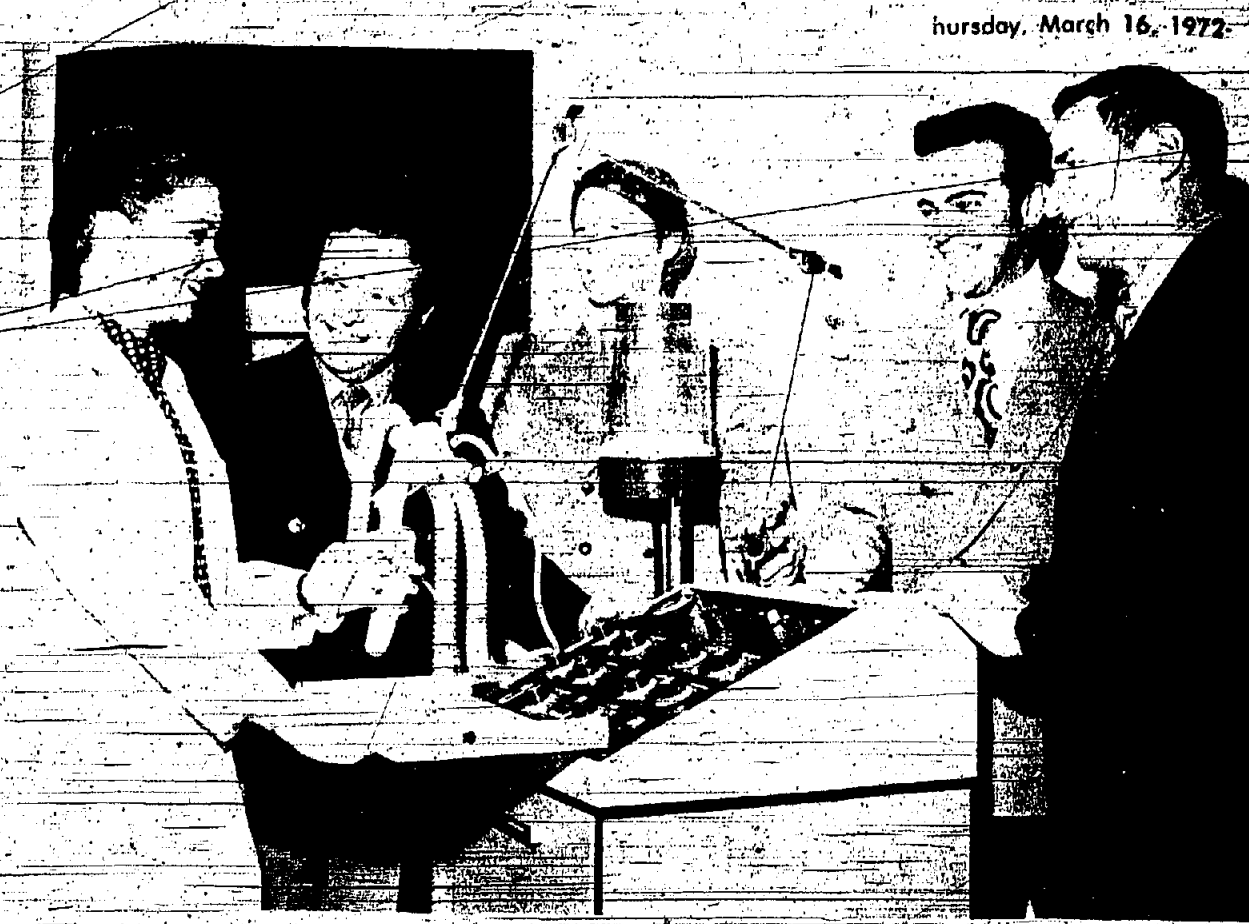

Yellow proclaims the coming of fall at spring. White-throated sparrows display distinctive yellow stripes above their eyes in March. Starlings bill are yellow in March. Survey reveals pattern in residency changes by inner city families

A geographical survey conducted by Rutgers Newark students has revealed what may be a consistent pattern in residency changes by inner city people and also indicated some social attitudes leading to changes in home locations.

Eleven students, members of Prof. Raphael J. Caprio's "Geography and Urban Planning" course, spent two months asking Bloomfield homeowners why they bought their present houses and what factors had influenced their decisions to move to their particular neighborhoods.

With the knowledge of Bloomfield officials, the project, one of continuing series of field studies conducted by the College of Arts and Sciences geography department, was initiated as an attempt to determine population movement, tax trends and the rate of property deterioration in the planning board.

Tabulated results were presented to the community last night, and Prof. Caprio and his students are now compiling a commentary on their work, which will also be forwarded to the town. Definitive conclusions on best use of the data, however, will be left to the discretion of the Bloomfield Planning Board.

"Among the most interesting observations made by the students," Prof. Caprio said, "were those concerning purchases of houses towards the ethnic background of their neighbors. Those who readily verbalized their tolerance or indifference to ethnic backgrounds live in areas least subject to change or areas of higher priced houses."

Bloomfield, an Essex County community of just over 50,000 residents, is typical of many similar cities whose boundaries are peripheral to Newark, according to Prof. Caprio. Although a racially-integrated community, it has a varied strata of economic means reflected in its housing. Considered a stable community, however, it is easily accessible to major employment centers in the New York Metropolitan area.
