Board given petition with 500 names

Gov. Livingston appeal sparks dispute on date

There was plenty of smoke but no real fireworks at the Regional Board of Education meeting Tuesday night when students from Gov. Livingston Regional High School, Berkeley Heights, presented a petition signed by 500 teenagers requesting that an area at the school be set aside for smoking.

The request, presented before some 15 citizens in the audience at Jonathan Dayton Regional High School, came after Charles E. Vitale of Kenilworth, health committee chairman, had presented a report urging that student smoking not be permitted in any way in any of the district's four high schools.

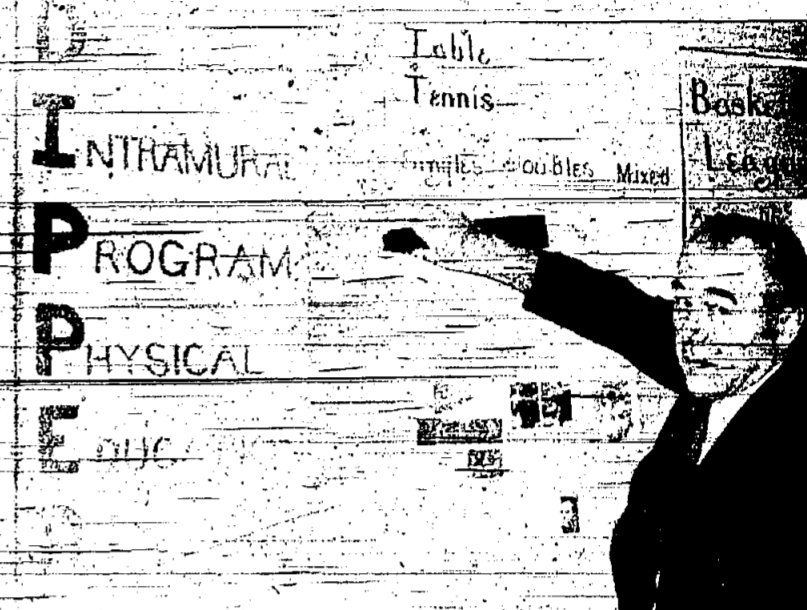
In response to a question from the floor, Vitale said his committee regarded smoking as a threat to the health of all who use tobacco, but he stopped short of calling for the closing of teachers' lounges for faculty members who smoke.

The student who presented the petition said that it had been signed by both smokers and nonsmokers. She said that some of the latter simply desired an air they could breathe in the hallways, which are frequently saturated with smoke "since there is no place else to go." She said a board member from Springfield asked the youngsters, "If one area should be set aside for smoking, would the students be mature enough to accept this responsibility and not light their cigarettes anywhere else?"

Another student replied that smoking areas, usually outdoors, had been designated at the high schools in Summit, New Providence, Maplewood and Westfield, and elsewhere. He added, "The reports I received were that the schools do take the responsibility to limit their smoking to specified areas. If they don't, the privilege can always be taken away."

Stephen Marciniak of Clark asked if setting aside an area would "encourage or encourage" any students to smoke.

NATALIE WALDT of Springfield, board member, said she would like to see the board (Continued on page 12)

Intramural tournaments begin for Dayton pupils

Basketball and table tennis will kick off the spring season of the first Jonathan Dayton Regional High School intramural program of physical education and recreation (DIPPER) events, according to intramural director John Swedish.

The 10 leading events desired by the boys who were asked in a poll to name their 1-2-3 choices were: basketball, 191; table tennis, 148; touch football, 145; soccer, 141; volleyball, 135; bowling, 123; soccer, 103; tennis, 73; golf, 67; and track and gymnastics, tied at 66.

The table tennis program will be held in the girls' gym every school day from 7:30 to 8:10 a.m. It will feature a ladder tournament singles for ninth, 10th, 11th and 12th grades and faculty members. Champions will be selected on each grade level according to the best win-loss record at the end of tournament play. Tournament play will start Monday morning. A grand champion will be selected from the four grade champions at the end of season's play in a playoff series.

Doubles and mixed doubles will also be held after singles play is completed. Champions will also be determined on a ladder-tournament basis. DIPPER Awards will be given to each champion in his category.

The basketball program will consist of two leagues: the American division consisting of teams from the freshman and sophomore classes and the National division consisting of teams from junior, senior classes and faculty members. (Continued on page 12)

Civil rights topic of talk

Students hear guest speaker

Jonathan Dayton Regional High School last week had as a guest speaker, the Rev. Wyatt Tee Walker, civil rights leader, who has played a key role in the development and progress of the black people.

In attendance at the assembly were the history classes of Jean Cusumano and Clarr Mason. The classes have just finished a study of the "Black Dilemma," and because of personal contact it was possible for Dr. Walker to come to Dayton.

He spoke on a variety of topics, running the gamut between President Richard Nixon's proposed anti-busing amendment legislation to intermarriage. Though his beliefs—as a vice-president of the Board of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference—are non-racist, Dr. Walker declared that if President Nixon's anti-busing legislation is passed the blacks in America will suffer such a severe setback in their struggle for equal rights that civil unrest would probably occur.

"How do you feel about the Black Panthers?" one of the students asked.

Dr. Walker feels that they are a "legitimate" group but their attempts are "suicidal." He said he prefers to have educated blacks move into such areas as Wall Street to help change the economic system.

Born in Brockton, Mass., in 1929, the 10th of 11 children, Dr. Walker attended the primary and secondary schools of Morohantville, graduating from high school in 1946 in the top 4th of his class. He attended Virginia Union University at Richmond and in 1950 earned a bachelor-of-science degree in chemistry and physics at the top of his division; magna cum laude.

The beginning of a long friendship, and the event that caused Wyatt Walker to earn the title of "the man behind Martin Luther King," (Continued on page 12)

New device will zoom in on speeders

Springfield Chief of Police George E. Parsoll, this week announced that his department has purchased a new weapon in the fight against one type of street crime—traffic crime.

Chief Parsoll said, "The loss of life, injury and property damage toll wreaked on the public by the traffic violator constitutes probably one of the most serious and least recognized problems today. In depth and scope it surpasses every other facet of crime. The new speed measuring devices now available to our patrolmen will enable us to direct a concentrated effort at detecting and apprehending the speeding violator."

Lead-footed motorists who already complain about innovative speed traps can begin preparations for a local assault on their dangerous pastime—speeding.

The new device, called Speed Gun, is manufactured by CMI Incorporated of Chantilly, Va. It is a self-contained unit that weighs a mere two pounds, resembles a movie camera with zoom lens and has the potential of making other speed measuring devices obsolete.

Speed-Gun's versatility is evidenced by the fact that it has a great amount of selectivity and can be operated either by a foot patrolman or radio cars 24 hours a day regardless of weather conditions.

Police Commissioner Robert Weltchek, following a demonstration of the new device by the Police Department, said he was very impressed at the effectiveness of the new radar unit.

Chief Parsoll announced that he plans to institute an aggressive campaign against speeders on all roads within the township immediately.

Girl Scouts plan enrollment drive

The Springfield Girl Scout Community has named Mrs. M.H. Herzlinger as chairman of the sustaining membership enrollment drive to be conducted by the Washington Rock Girl Scout Council during April.

Mrs. Herzlinger has been a registered Girl Scout for 23 years. She is the leader of Cadette Troop 471 and a second lieutenant and training officer for the Springfield First Aid Squad. She teaches first aid to the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, firemen and the adult school in Springfield.

There are 359 girls and 75 adults registered as Girl Scouts in Springfield. Some of their recent projects included singing for the patients in the extended care unit in Overlook Hospital, making placemats and favors for patients in the East Orange Veterans' Hospital and Greystone Hospital in Morristown, on certifying senior citizens and patients in nursing homes and helping with the Glass-Tin and recycling programs.

The sustaining membership drive is sanctioned by United Funds and the money collected will be used to supplement the operating income received from this agency. The drive is directed only towards friends of Girl Scouting.

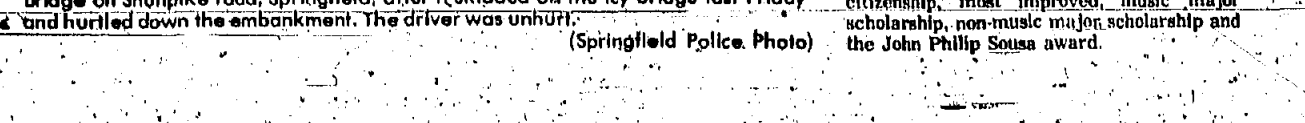
