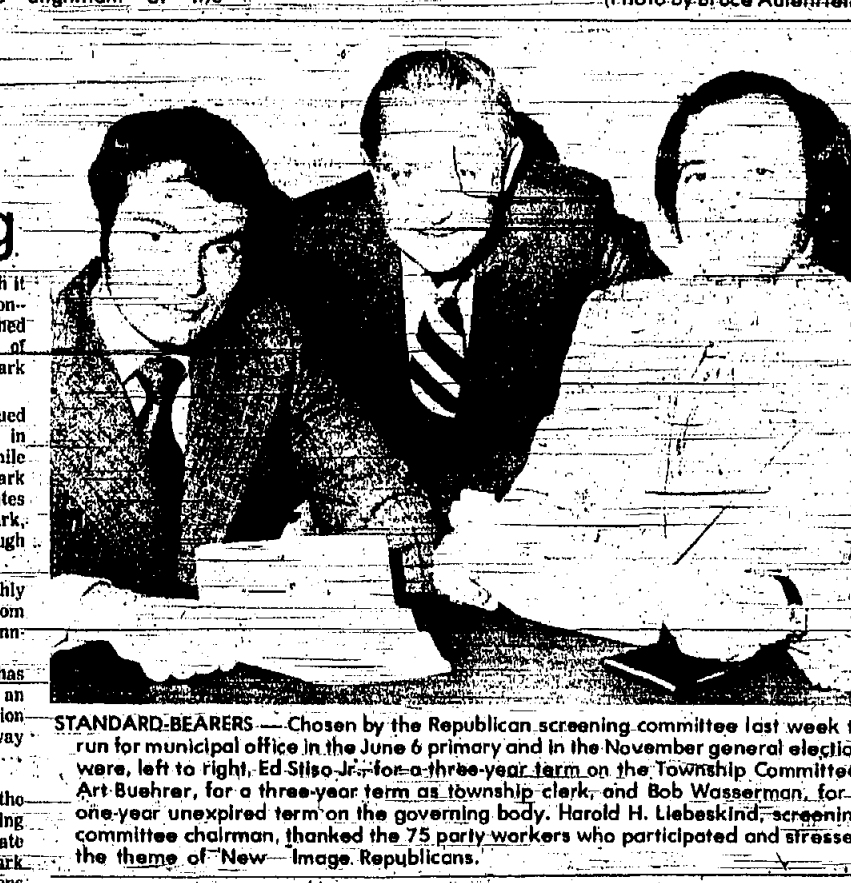

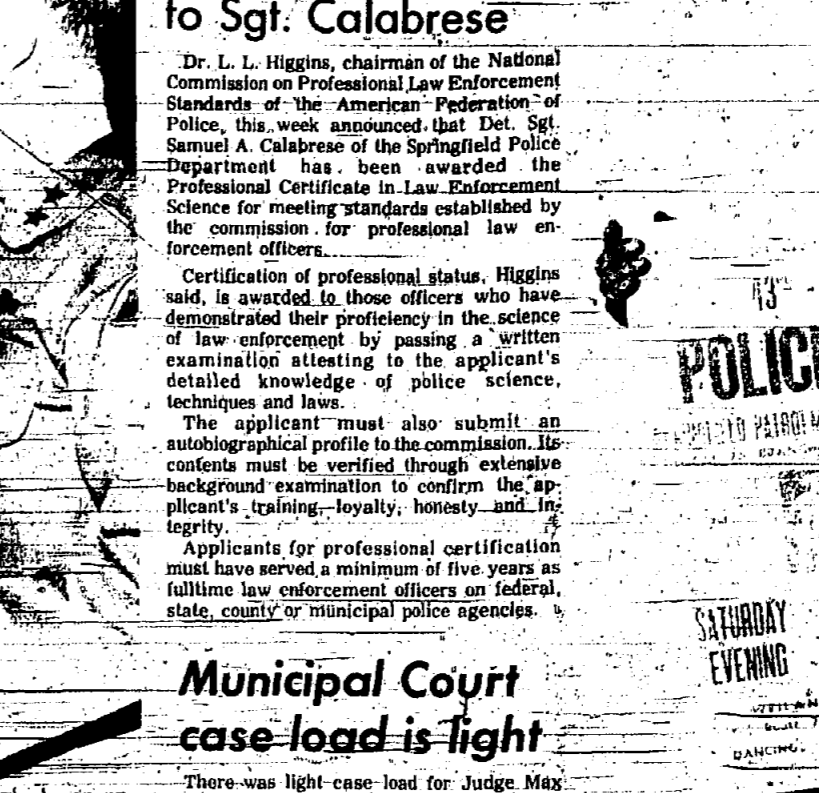
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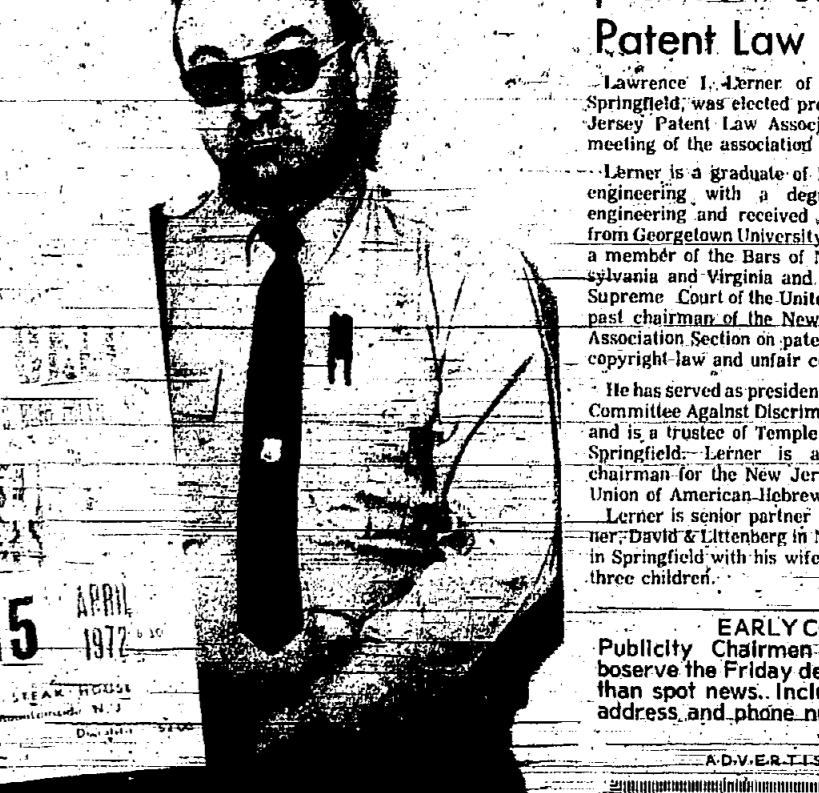
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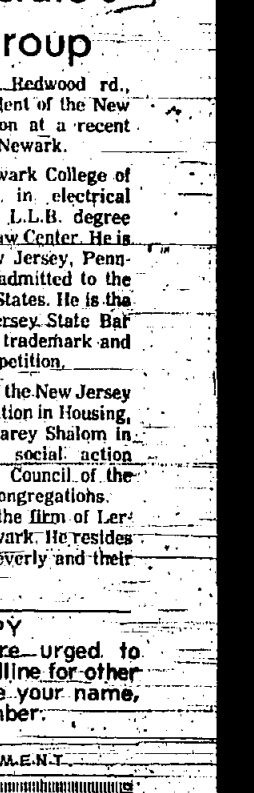
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THIS WEEK'S HEALTH NEWS

Otherwise complications of all sorts may be the order of the day. If the spine is injured, particularly avoid movement or changing position.

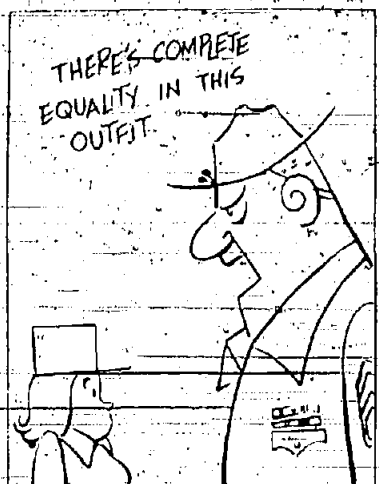
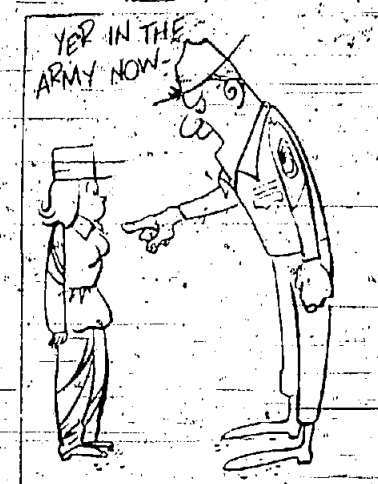

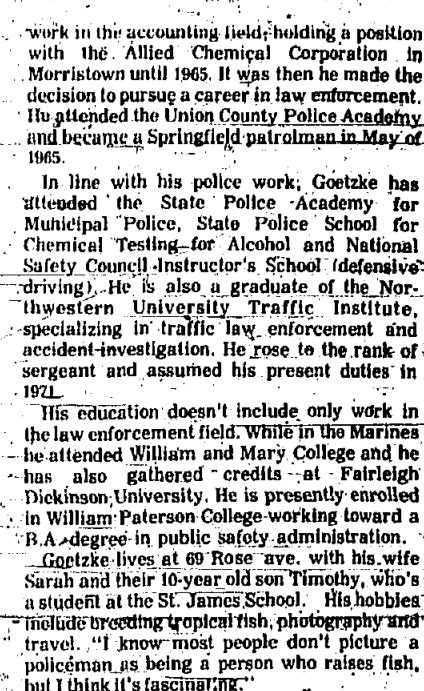

No. 94 riders: 'We need that bus'

Plan to discontinue service brings protest

IF TRACKLESS TRANSIT Inc. in East Orange presses for discontinuance of its No. 94 bus line, it can expect loud protests from the riders. The 94 line has served four years as the area's only north-south route. While it is relied on only occasionally by some, it is a necessary means of transportation for many.

THE BUS RIDERS list several reasons for using the bus. It takes them back and forth to work or to school. It takes them to stores, doctors, dentists, lawyers, restaurants and places of worship. It makes connections with other bus lines.

It's there when, for some reason, they can't get a ride. Last Thursday, a fair weather day, about 20 persons, including the bus riders, met at Union Center at Stuyvesant and Morris avenues going toward Irvington on their way home from work. Lines were running on schedule and the bus that arrived was already carrying about 20 passengers.

Asked what they thought about the possibility of the bus being discontinued, the riders objected to the plan. Virginia Oakley Irvington, who works at Johns in Union Center, has been taking the 94 for the past 10 years. If the bus doesn't run, she can't get to her job.

Mrs. Sophie Lang of Newark works in Springfield and relies on the 94 bus to make the necessary connections to her job. "If they stop the bus, how am I going to get to work?" She and the others agreed, "We need that bus."

THIS BUS ALSO STOPS in Union Center to pick up passengers headed toward Five Points, Roselle Park and Roselle. Mrs. Elizabeth Winter of Roselle Park remembers taking the bus for the first time the year she came to this country, 41 years ago. "And now they want to stop it!" she said. "What am I going to do?" Mrs. Winter says the bus to get back and forth to her job in Union.

Theresa Lofio of Carlisle place, Union, takes the bus back and forth to her job in Springfield. If the bus is discontinued, "I'll have to collect unemployment," she said.

Charles Schupka of Union works in Newark. He has a car but he prefers taking a bus to work. The 94 turned out to be handy during the bus strike, but even though Schupka doesn't need the 94, he believes "it's needed." Many people take the bus, he noted. "It would be a real hardship for them."

Edna Brunner of Grandview avenue, Union, is a member of the Golden Age Club of Union, which meets at the Recreation Center on

Shay's court avenue. If the bus is discontinued, hundreds of members of the Golden Age Club won't even be able to get to the meetings, she said. Many senior citizens have doctors and dentists and they would have no transportation, she added.

UNION TOWNSHIP OFFICIALS have rallied against discontinuance of the 94 since the bus was a key factor in the decision to erect several business and other facilities in the Five Points area.

The bus brings employees, patients and visitors to Memorial General Hospital in Union. Residents of a seniors condominium in Union Pointe who have no cars would be virtually stranded without the bus service.

The rider pointed out, "It's the only tie with East Orange." And on his way there, the bus crosses through Springfield, Clinton, 10th, South Orange and Central avenues before stopping at Brick Church (Main street) in East Orange. At those crossings, it provides connections with transportation bus routes operated by Union County and New Jersey and Irvington Terminal.

In the other direction, it crosses Vauxhall road and Morris avenue in Union, Westfield avenue in Roselle Park, Grant and Second avenues in Roselle and St. George avenue at the Linden line, again providing hook-ups with

other bus service.

THE GREAT NUMBER of interchanges which the bus crosses proves both an advantage and a disadvantage. The number of traffic lights each bus must pass plays havoc with the bus schedule, and some of its riders find themselves standing in front of supermarkets with heavy packages for some time or out in bad weather for longer than they would wish.

Overall, however, riders of the bus think the service is "pretty good." One rider summed it up: "Sometimes it's late, but that's to be expected. I would take even that 30 minutes if it continues to run."

Trackless Transit, which operates the 94, claims it is losing money by operating the line. The company was granted a two-step 10 cent fare increase during the past year.

I am fortunate in that this area is blessed with so many devoted women who, I am confident, will rally to Israel's aid during the crucial months that lie ahead."

KNOW YOUR GOVERNMENT

From N.J. Taxpayers Association... N.J.A. SUGGESTS A COMBINED... If the State Legislature seeks voter approval of a proposed constitutional amendment to create the office of lieutenant governor in New Jersey, it might consider combining such a new cabinet-level office with that of secretary of state.

This was the suggestion of the New Jersey Taxpayers Association in a statement which also cited need for much more public information on the proposal that has been disseminated. Favorable approval by three-fifths vote of each house of the legislature will result in submission of the question to voters at the November election.

The association said its research had disclosed New Jersey to be only one of eight states without an office of lieutenant governor. Several features of the New Jersey proposal are patterned after more recent developments in other states. They include: joint election of governor and lieutenant governor to insure election from the same party; the lieutenant governor to serve solely as a member of the executive branch; the lieutenant governor first in line of succession if the governor is unable to serve temporarily or permanently.

N.J.A. Executive Director Frank W. Haines said in part: "Since the proposed amendment would make the lieutenant governor a cabinet officer, he could be assigned to head the Department of State... the executive department would make the lieutenant governor a cabinet officer and in number of employees. This concept is not new since it was developed both in Alaska and in Hawaii in their original constitutions. In New Jersey, over the past two decades, the head of the Department of State has served as political secretary to the governor. Haines pointed out that the 1970 Report of the Governor's Management Commission, 'Proposing to reduce state government'

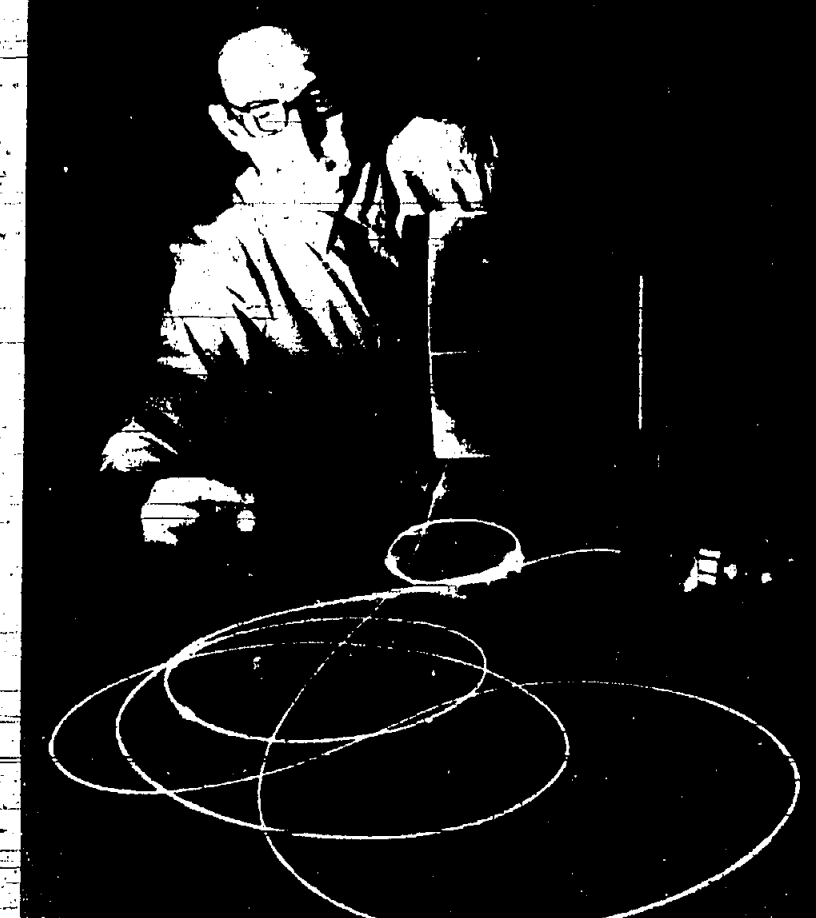

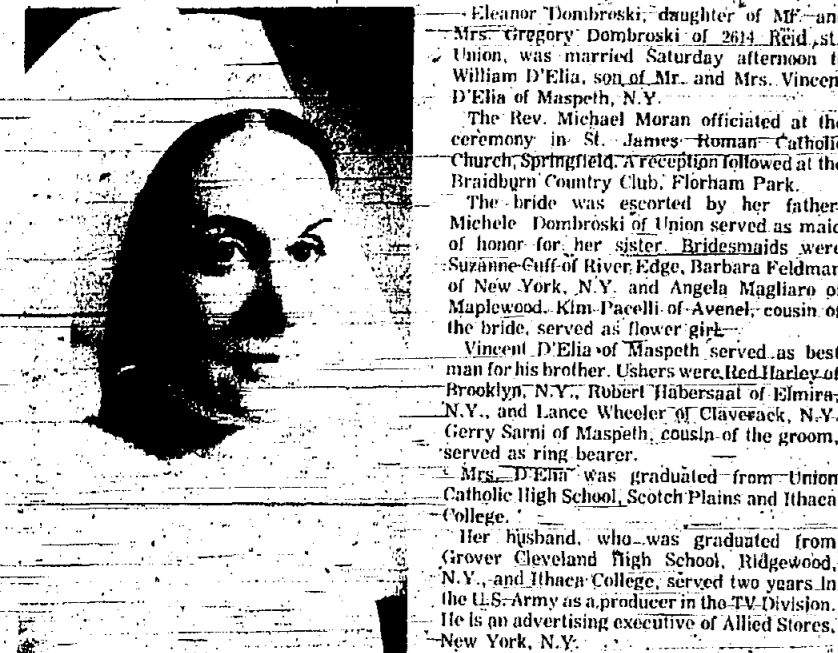

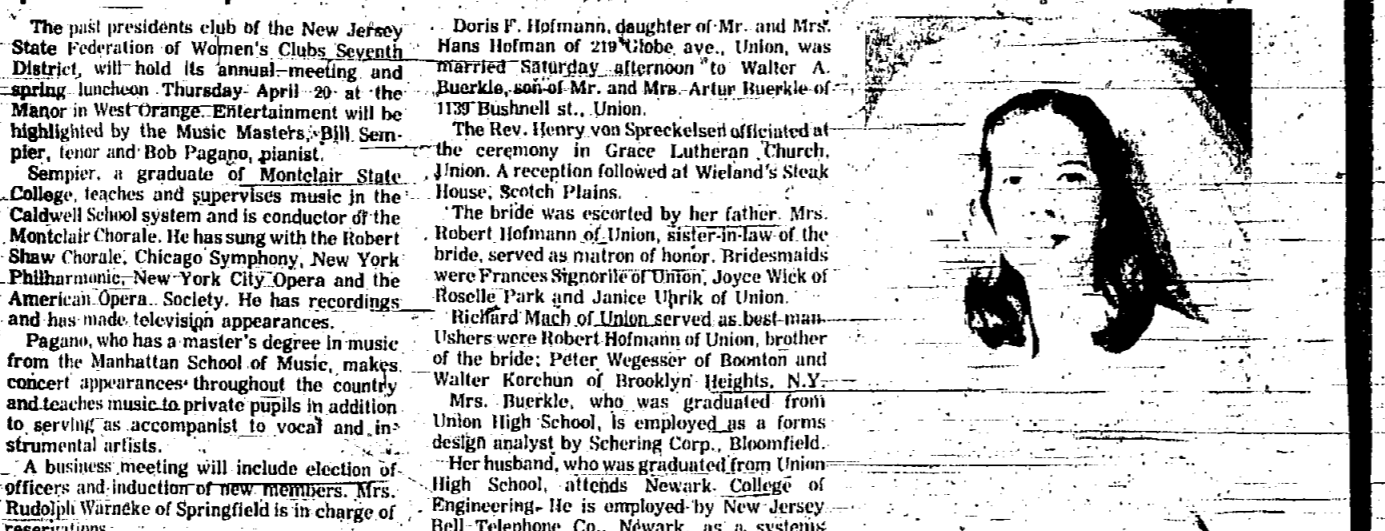

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Mental Health Matters

Stanley F. Yolles, M.D., Director National Institute of Mental Health

CHRONIC DRUGS: The familiar claim that Americans have become chronic drug users does not appear to be valid, according to new research evidence.

A scientific study carried out by University of Pennsylvania and psychiatric in-stitute researchers challenges the claim and indicates that chronic Americans who do use psychotherapeutic drugs do not take them on a regular or long-term basis.

Instead, most people seem to be relatively conservative in their use both of prescription and over-the-counter psychotherapeutic drugs.

Unlike previous surveys based solely on drugstore records, data were obtained by interviewing a population cross-section of adults 18 and older, from whom the researchers drew a profile of usage patterns and reasons for drug use.

Studies have shown widespread acceptance and use of tranquilizers, anti-depressants, stimulants, and barbiturates and some 178 million prescriptions were filled in U.S. drugstores in 1971.

But the new sampling of American households revealed that, among the nation's 46 percent of the women interviewed, about one in five had taken drugs on a regular daily basis for six months or longer.

An important issue in the study was the extent to which persons become involved in using psychotherapeutic drugs. On this point, the researchers found that regular drug use is most likely to occur among those for whom drugs are prescribed by a physician.

Prescription drug takers who use non-medical sources (relatives and friends) were more likely to use drugs regularly.

Drugs most likely to be used by men on a long-term basis were the sedatives, mainly phenobarbital. Women on the other hand, were more likely to use minor tranquilizers over a long period of time.

Nationally, according to the researchers, the use of minor tranquilizers is much more frequent than use of stimulant drugs.

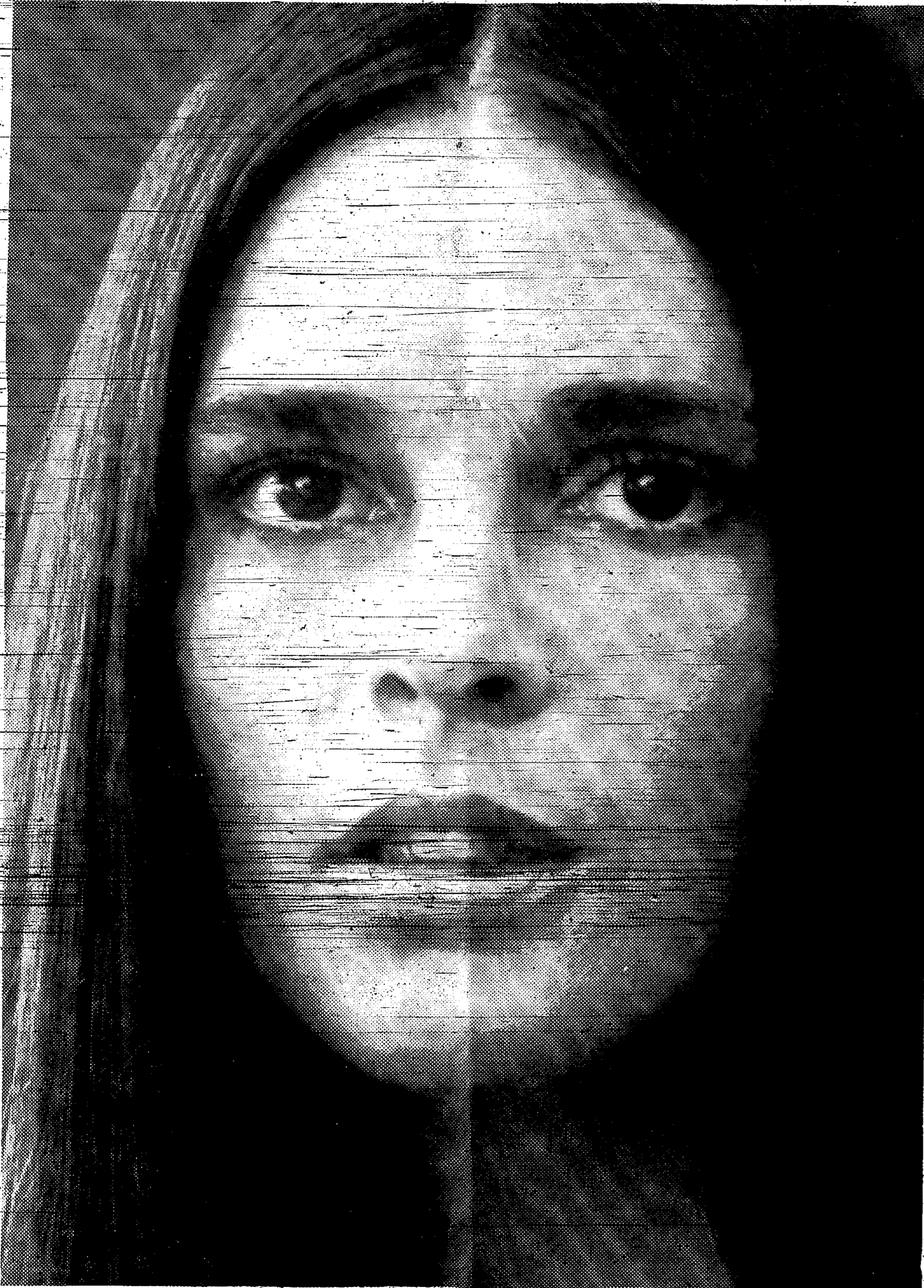

20-mile 'Walk-a-Thon' steps off at 9 a.m. Sunday

Union County's first "Walk-a-Thon" for the March of Dimes will step off at 9 a.m. Sunday from Warranaco-Park, Roselle, as marchers set out on a 20-mile, circuitous route through 17 of the county's municipalities.

Through the "Walk-a-Thon," funds will be raised to further the March of Dimes National Foundation's fight against birth defects. Participants in the walk will receive donations from sponsors for each mile walked over the 20-mile route. An example, a pledge of 50 cents a mile will net the March of Dimes \$10 if the entire 20 miles is completed.

Participants are asked to register at the walk's start in Warranaco between 8 and 8:30 a.m. Parents bringing children to the park for the start of the march are asked to drop them off at the park entrance on E. Third avenue.

Drivers are asked not to enter the park so as to avoid traffic congestion. Pick-up times in the same area should be arranged in advance.

As the first marchers return to the park, which is also the termination point, several bands will begin a rock festival. The bands will play until 7 p.m.

"Walk-a-Thon" officials have asked participants to use sidewalks where available and shoulders of the road where no sidewalks exist. Communications teams will provide information on traffic conditions along the route.

Marshall will be on duty to assure an even flow of march. The parade route through various municipalities will be posted on Saturday.

A sound truck will move along the route, providing music and messages of support for the fund-raising project.

First Aid and Civil Defense personnel will also be spotted at strategic points along the route. Residents are asked to provide disposal cans in front of their homes to discourage littering. Walkers have been instructed to make use of the receptacles.

On registration, walkers should present their sponsor cards. The cards will be later validated as to the distance walked and then presented to sponsors for collection of pledges.

There is no rain date for the "Walk-a-Thon." It will be staged Sunday, rain or shine.

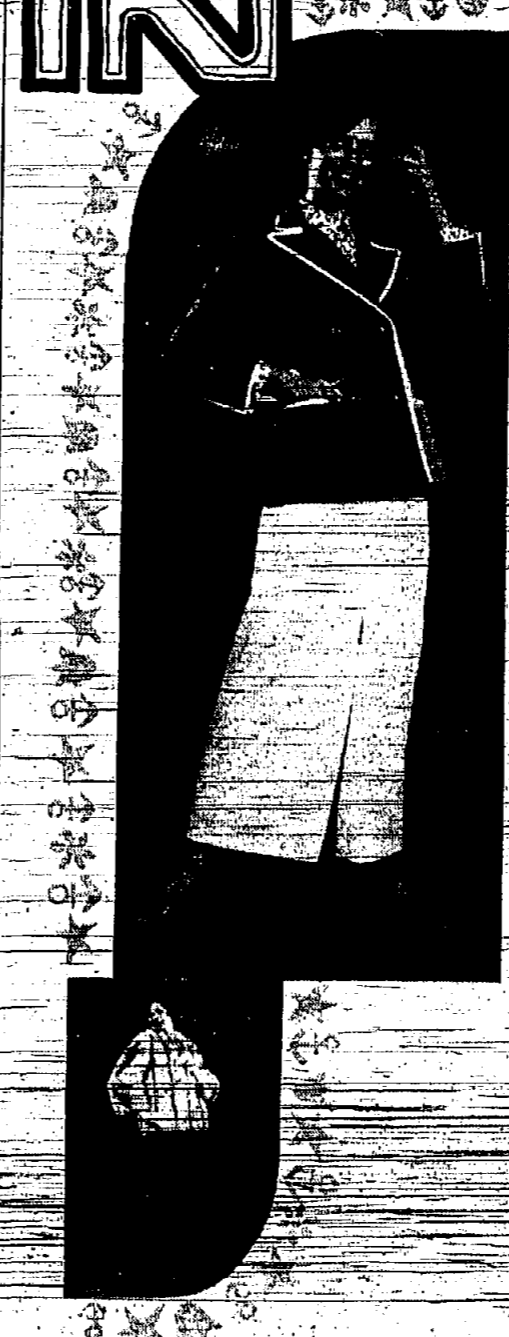

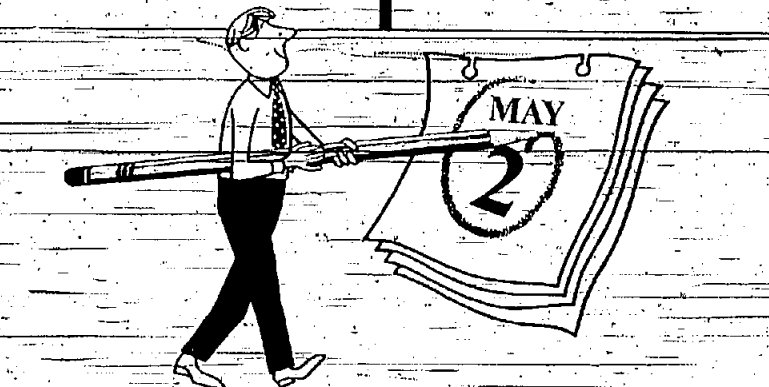

Hospital hooks into computer

Alexian Brothers Hospital's data processing system is scheduled to go on line today with a master computer operated by the religious congregation in Chicago. The Elizabeth hospital is the fourth Alexian Brothers institution to be connected by leased telephone lines to the central facility in Chicago.

Information on patients discharged, admitted or transferred is processed by the computer. The information is then sent to the hospital's terminal, where it is processed. Completed data is then stored on the wires to a printer at the Elizabeth hospital, where it is printed.

Administrator Cerio said the switch to automated operation is part of Alexian Brothers' long-range plans to keep patient costs as low as possible. The increasing volume of paperwork in every form of endeavor has forced a greater reliance upon the computer, he said.

Cerio said the full impact of the computerized system will be realized next year, when Alexian Brothers spends its \$10 million addition, that will increase patient capacity from 181 beds to 375.

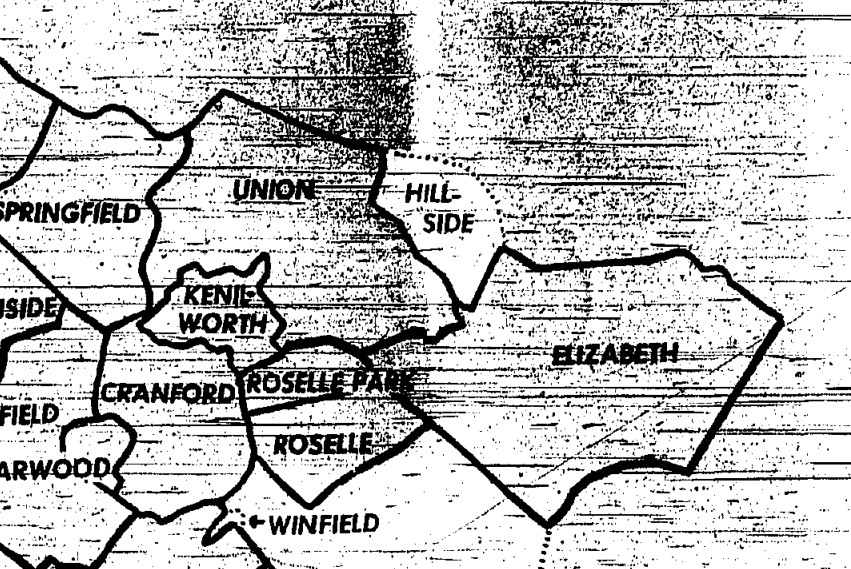
