He was president of the New Jersey Field Naturalists and chairman of the author of a monthly column, "Afield in New Jersey," which appeared in more than 30 New Jersey newspapers, and of the book, "Wharton Tract in its natural state. He was also a distinguished list of New Jersey Trappers."

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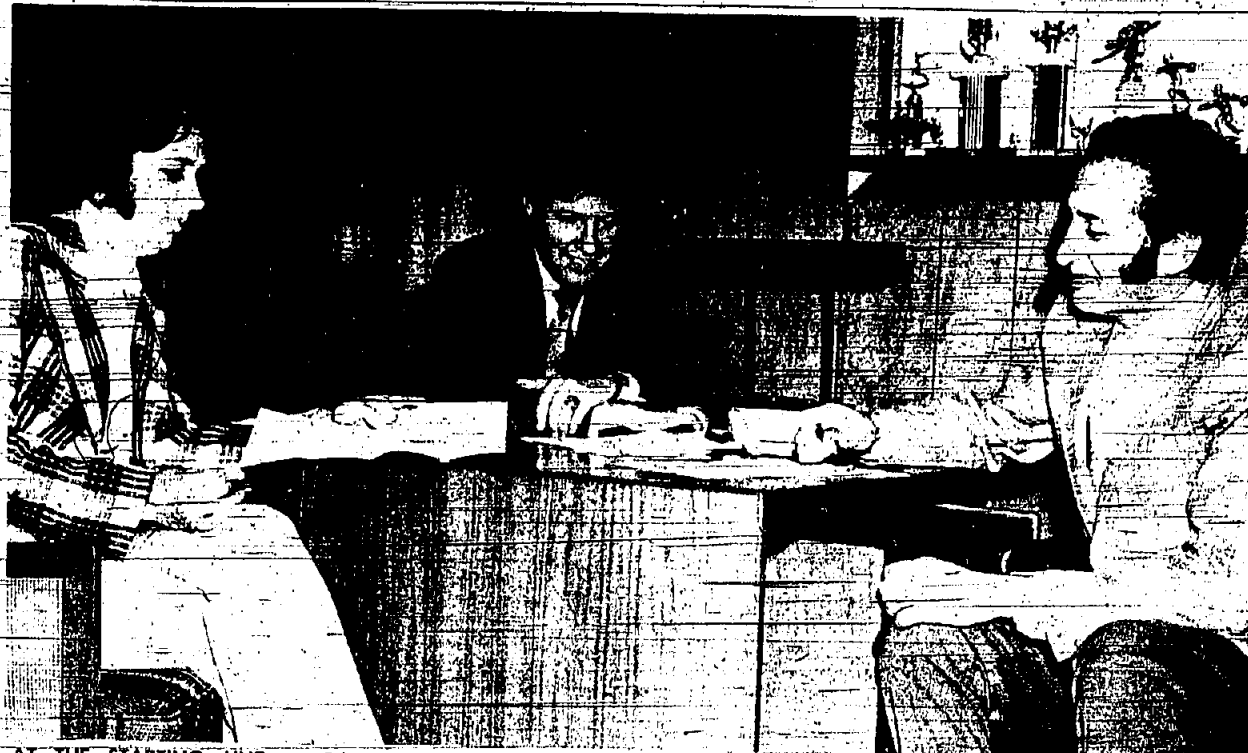
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Opposition melting to redistricting proposal

Critics now accept need for changes

Discuss best ways to achieve them

By the time the Springfield Board of Education discussed its new redistricting and reorganizing proposal with the public for the third time, at the monthly board meeting Monday night at the Florence Gaudinier school, most of the heat appeared to have evaporated from the issue.

These members of the audience who spoke from the floor tended to accept the need for changes, primarily to deal with a steady decline in school population, and concentrated their remarks on just how the changes could be best achieved.

Last Thursday at Gaudinier, in the second of two special meetings devoted to the proposal, opposition was expressed in much stronger terms.

The plan, unveiled a month ago, would combine the present neighborhoods served by the Raymond Chisholm, Edward Walker and Thelma Sandmeyer schools into one district. All kindergarten through the third grades would attend Chisholm, first, second and third grades would be at Sandmeyer and all fourth and fifth graders would study at Walton.

The plan would not initially affect the James Caldwell School, which would house the same children as it does now, from kindergarten through the fifth grade. A second step was outlined tentatively, however, to take place in some five years. It would call for closing of the Caldwell School as an outmoded and construction of new facilities in the Walton-Sandmeyer area to complete an educational park for all children up to the fifth grade.

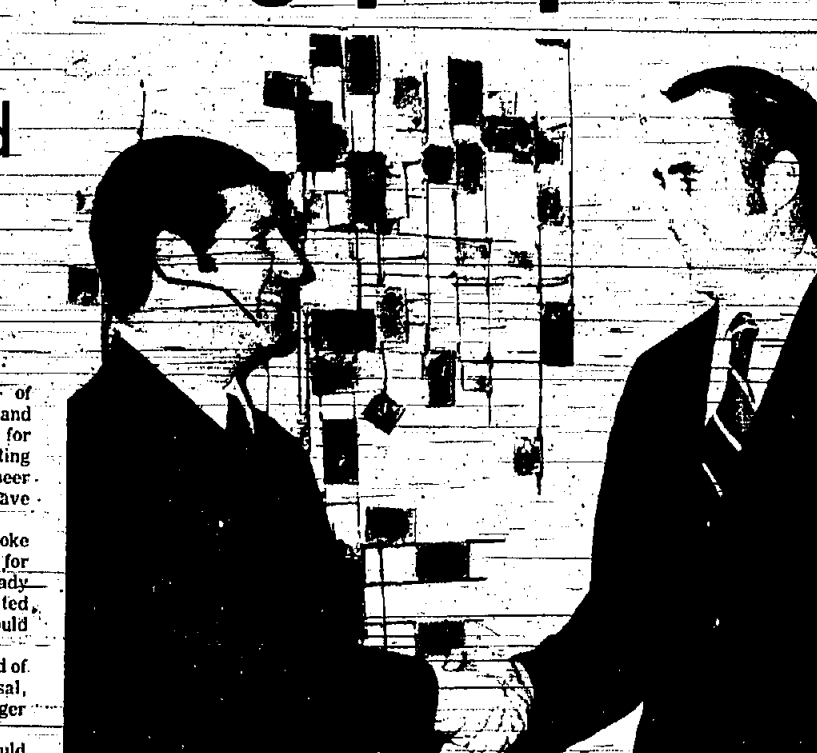
BOARD MEMBERS on Monday indicated that they had now heard all phases of public opinion on the plans and all phases of public responsibility to consider the plans further, to study each aspect, including whatever additional school sites are exposed in the process, and to take action on the matter.

Ruth Weisman, school board president, said that the decision might come at the next regular meeting, May 15 at the Gaudinier School. She stressed that the board wants to start preparations in motion as soon as possible for whatever changes are to be made—but not to act with undue haste.

The differences in general attitude between Thursday and the 45 special Monday can perhaps be illustrated by the tone of two statements presented to the board.

The Sandmeyer PTA board last Thursday presented a statement opposing all aspects of the plan and urging that all Chisholm students be moved to Walton this September in the event of implementation of this proposal.

The statement added, however, that the Sandmeyer PTA—however not against

Zucker, Donington get backing for committee

Leonard B. Zucker and John Scott Donington have been endorsed by a Newark-based Republican screening committee to run for the two contested Township Committee seats in Springfield, according to an announcement this week.

Zucker will run for the three-year term and Donington for the one-year term. The announcement indicated that they will be a contest in the GOP primary election on June 6.

The screening committee was open to all Republicans, including the officers and trustees of the Springfield Republican Club, the Young Republicans, the county committee members, all former and present Republican members of the local Republican Club and other party workers.

Zucker, an attorney and partner in the Mapwood law firm of Zucker, Goldberg and Weiss, is a graduate of Cornell University and a member of the Springfield Republican Club and is attorney for the board of trustees of the Springfield Free Public Library. He has been the local chairman of the United Federal Play Fund drive during the past two years and together with his wife, Leslie, and their three children, is a member of Temple Shalom.

Donington, an attorney and partner in the Newark law firm of Morgan, Mathis and McCord, is a life member of the Springfield Republican Club, the Young Republicans, the county committee members, all former and present Republican members of the local Republican Club and other party workers.

He is a graduate of Seton Hall University and St. John's College. He and his wife, Pauline, are members of the Roman Catholic Church, the same Republican-Screening-Committee members and Arthur Buchner as a candidate for township clerk. Buchner was also named by the previous screening group.

Torah procession leads Young Israel to new synagogue

A Torah procession and opening ceremony Sunday will mark the birth of Young Israel of Springfield, the new synagogue at 348 Mountain View, Springfield, N.J.

The opening ceremony will be held at the residence of Mrs. S. Stredewitz, 2800 Mountain View, at 8 p.m. on Sunday, April 23. The congregation has been conducting classes and services since last September.

The opening ceremony will follow the arrival of the procession at the Mountain Avenue site. Civic dignitaries and other guests will participate in the procession and in the opening ceremony.

Town sees no new Alexander's plans as speakers call for constant vigilance

After having been out of the limelight for several years, the possibility that Alexander's department stores might build a store or shopping center on property the corporation owns in Springfield again was the prime topic of discussion at the Township Committee meeting Tuesday night at Town Hall.

The other major subject at the meeting was some 35 citizens in attendance, was the ordinance passed earlier this month to permit up to six evening activities at the Municipal Swimming Pool—a measure which continues to draw some criticism.

The Alexander's issue was raised during the public discussion period by David Ross, who held recurrent rumors that the department store chain plans to build on the 20-plus acres it owns near the Howard Johnson motel on Route 212.

When the land purchase became known two years ago, the Township Committee changed the zoning ordinance to prohibit shopping centers or retail stores in the land involved, which includes most of the land involved. Alexander's, however, retains title to the land.

Mayor Robert Welch commented that such rumors spread throughout the town periodically, but that there have been no inquiries at Town Hall to indicate that Alexander's plans are active. "Alexander's would have to come to the Township for a zoning variance, and I have been opposed to such plans in the past."

At this point, Township Attorney Jay Bloom cautioned the committee against stating their stands on any future applications, but such statements "qualify them from being part in future hearings. He noted, however, that Welch and Committee member Nat Stokes had voted for past measures to bar a shopping center.

Heinz asks people to make Springfield cleanest in county

In a statement to all Springfield residents, property owners, merchants, businessmen and industrialists, town sanitation Harold Heinz this week said "We are asking for your cooperation, not only during the summer months, but all year in helping us make Springfield a cleaner place to live."

"By following these few simple rules you will make our job easier and help us become the cleanest municipality in the county."

"Do not litter. Keep it until you come to a trash container.

"Do keep your property free from accumulation of paper, cardboard and other debris.

"Do keep the weeds on your property cut at all times.

"Do eradicate all poison ivy or ragweed on your property.

"We do have the necessary ordinances to enforce these regulations, and will use them if we have to. However, we feel the people of Springfield will rise to the occasion and cooperate in every way possible."

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Cancer campaigners appeal for Springfield contributions

Mayor Robert L. Welch signed a resolution Tuesday designating April as Cancer Control Month in Springfield and urging the residents of Springfield to support the Union County Drive of the American Cancer Society's New Jersey Division in its cancer control campaign.

April, which was designated as Cancer Control Month by Congress, is the time when thousands launch their efforts in fundraising and educational work.

In Springfield, the drive is headed by Elton Dry, Jr. and the local campaign workers will attempt to visit every household in Springfield with life-saving information on cancer. In some of the neighborhoods, the Society is distributing "neighbor-to-neighbor" packets, which are passed along from one house to the next.

The citizens of Springfield have been urged to "pass these packets along to your neighbor as soon as possible in order that collection can be completed as close to the end of April as possible."

Editorial comment FOR EQUAL EDUCATION

Several thoughts are becoming clear as the Springfield Board of Education continues its public agencies over pupil distribution over the next few years.

The first is that everyone owes a major debt of gratitude to the board for its willingness to have the public share in the decision-making process.

In fact, some of the problems stem from that very willingness, which may have led the board to release for public consumption an internal report prepared in pedagogical terms with many technical terms and frames of reference unfamiliar to even an intelligent and highly literate public.

Second, the board will have to do something in the direction of planning or phasing out the Raymond Chisholm School. Declining enrollment and no longer ideal physical facilities have made this a step a necessity.

If the board fails to act on the new plan for a cluster grouping in the Chisholm, Edward Walton and Thelma Sandmeier schools, then it would presumably be bound by its vote of two years ago to transfer the lower grades from Chisholm to Walton, starting this fall.

The cluster grouping, with kindergarten for all three areas at Chisholm, Grades 1 to 3 at Sandmeier and Grades 4 and 5 at Walton, holds great educational promise.

From this viewpoint, those who have the most legitimate cause for concern are the parents at the James Caldwell School who fear that their children will miss out on educational advantages.

There is a second stage of the proposal which calls for eventual construction of new facilities in the Walton-Sandmeier area — not to accommodate all children in one educational park with Caldwell, but to be phased in, this is, however, far in the future, and even farther from the desires of many taxpayers.

Board and staff members assure that Caldwell need not be included in the Chisholm-Walton-Sandmeier cluster groupings because the student body at Caldwell is large enough to provide interaction, team teaching and joint activities.

That may well be true, but it would be much happier if Caldwell could also be included in the cluster grouping, with perhaps two grades of children from all parts of town meeting at that school.

There would be additional transportation costs, we realize, but there would be no barriers between schools and between neighborhood and neighborhood.

Springfield certainly is small enough for its children not to be fenced off from each other, by railroad tracks, neighborhood lines, socio-economic distinctions or any other artificial factors.

And among the same lines, we deplore the action of the Sandmeier PTA executive board in formally opposing the cluster grouping. Sandmeier, the first place, is the only school which did not convene an evening PTA meeting for full explanation of the proposal.

Those of its children to be transferred would have to go to Walton, just 200 yards or less for many youngsters.

We feel very strongly that no neighborhood in Springfield should be superior to any other. And speaking very personally as a parent with children who have enjoyed the fine education given at Sandmeier since it opened, we have felt that there has been one major handicap.

This has been the effect on children there of looking out the window to Diven street, where other children must walk past Sandmeier to attend the Walton School.

This has been done for what appears at best administrative and policy deficiencies — and at worst for the kind of racial segregation we all deplore when it is comfortably far away.

One of the major advantages of the new board proposal is that it does away with this sort of barrier between children, once and for all.

We hope, desperately, that all the parents in the mid-outer citizens of Springfield from all neighborhoods, will support the members of the Board of Education in their efforts to solve this problem for the benefit of all the children of Springfield — whatever their final solution will be.

Swim pool 'degradation'

The following letter has been sent to the members of the Springfield Township Committee relative to an ordinance altering the originally intended use of the Community Swim Pool.

At the Township Committee meeting of April 11, the Supervisor of the First Presbyterian Church of Springfield indicated to my concern over the revision of the ordinance amending the swim pool facilities. As indicated, the ordinance would allow the use of the pool for social events.

It is my belief that this amendment allows the serving and consumption of alcoholic beverages. This is a step towards making this presently great facility into something it was never intended to be — a social club.

It is my belief that this amendment allows the swim pool to be open on a Sunday evening until 12:30 a.m. — the following day. I believe it is wrong that attendance at this pool not be limited to swim pool members.

We are fully aware that this amendment makes provision for only two events where alcoholic beverages may be served and attendance not be limited to swim pool members. However, we are concerned that as easily as the amendment was passed, it is being changed to allow alcoholic beverages to be served during the day — every day.

It is my belief that this amendment allows the use of the pool for social events. This is a step towards making this presently great facility into something it was never intended to be — a social club.

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State shows boost in food stamps use

February was the sixth consecutive month in which participation in the Federal Food Stamp Program increased in New Jersey, an additional 14,292 low income persons were served.

According to the USDA's Northeast Regional Food and Nutrition Service Office in New York City, total participation in February stood at 2,274, which was an increase of 11,000 from the 2,164 in January.

Participation increased in 18 of the state's 21 counties, with the largest increase in Essex County, which reported a 1,000 increase in participation.

Participation in Camden, Essex, Gloucester, Monmouth, Passaic and Union counties, however, decreased. Participation in Hudson and Morris counties, however, remained the same.

During the month, participants paid \$18.26 for food coupons valued at \$121. The difference of \$103,746, or bonus value of the stamps, enabled each participant to increase his food purchasing power by an average of \$9.81.

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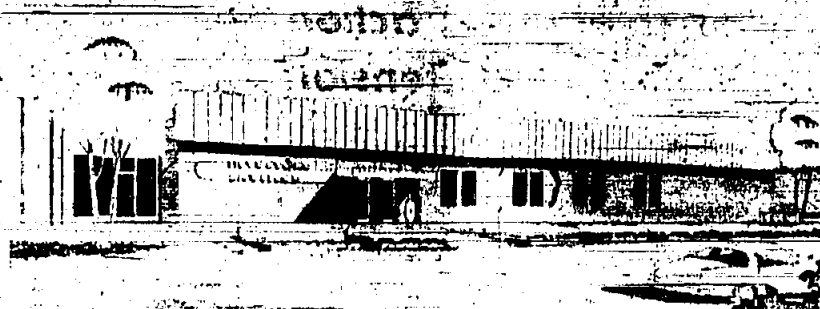
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Martha Mitchell to address bankers during convention

responsible, carefully studied educational innovations and is in fact looking forward to many of the new concepts as presented by the superintendent for all the Springfield elementary schools.

IN CONTRAST, a petition was presented to the board Monday by Mrs. Donald Ray, one of a group of Caldwell parents who had obtained 28 signatures, including those of about 150 parents.

Before presenting the petition, she stated that it "represents our desire to prevent the closing of the Caldwell School as in the plans before the board. It does not prevent any criticism of the Springfield school system, anyone in it or the Board of Education. The excellence of the Springfield schools is something we all wish to maintain."

The petition urged that Caldwell be maintained as it is now, for Grades K-5, and expressed opposition to changes "unless it can be reasonably proven that such a plan would be a significant benefit to the children of the Caldwell district and that the costs of such a plan would not cause an increase in per pupil expenditures."

Another statement was presented last Thursday by the Chisholm PTA. It expressed general support of the plan with small but asked that the change not be extended to Chisholm until September of 1973.

A MODIFICATION of the board's proposal which has been suggested by several citizens since the meeting of the board on May 14, 1972, was presented by Mrs. Paul Koppel, former president of the Walton PTA. She urged that the board not take any "hasty" measures to deal with small but balanced and called for implementation of the cluster plan.

She stated that the district changes could be made without any of the related innovations which had been proposed, such as multi-grade classrooms, and that these can be studied in the future.

Mrs. Koppel urged, however, that Caldwell be included in the cluster system, at least by 1973. Otherwise, she said, Caldwell children would be at a disadvantage. They would lose out in interaction among youngsters from different neighborhoods in the learning process.

She added that the board can simply regroup the grade levels among three schools, Paul Walton and Sandmeier, rather than just the latter two.

Several Caldwell School parents at last meetings, also urged that their school be included in the cluster system so that their children would have the advantages of centralized facilities for each grade level. They added, however, that such a plan would not work without additional school buses, routes, distances shorter than the two miles set by the state as the minimum for mandatory bus service.

Several added that if the entire town shared the Caldwell School and came to depend on its facilities, then any deficiencies in its use for modern education would be brought home to the entire town. This is the only way, they stressed, that a possible future reorganization for more modern facilities could ever be approved.

possible," according to Dr. Springfield Cusack, chairman.
"The solicitation this year," Dr. reported, "will be asking of every resident in Springfield to have your annual health checkup by Oct. 31 and Mrs. America? Do you know the seven warning signals of cancer? These questions will be asked about 25 million times across the country and about 100,000 times here in Springfield," said Dr. in explaining the leaflet that is being included in the solicitation packets being sent in the April Crusade of the American Cancer Society.

The leaflet also explains the question of health safeguards up to each individual," Dr. said. "It is our aim to persuade those 75 per cent of Americans who have never had a check-up to get one. It lists the warning signals of cancer and urges a visit to a physician."

Dr. said that the leaflet also lists a number of chief safeguards. "Chief among these," he said, "are the Pap test for cancer of the uterine cervix and the proctoc, a rectal examination for one of the most common cancers in both men and women."

Regarding the Pap test, Dr. said, "It's quick and painless and is named after the man who developed it. Dr. George N. Papanicolaou, a physician here in Springfield, was the first to study microscopic slides of cells which could be studied microscopically for signs of cancer. Early detection, often months or years before any symptoms or signals show up, has saved many women's lives. Similarly with the proctoc, it is a simple procedure which can be done in your own home. 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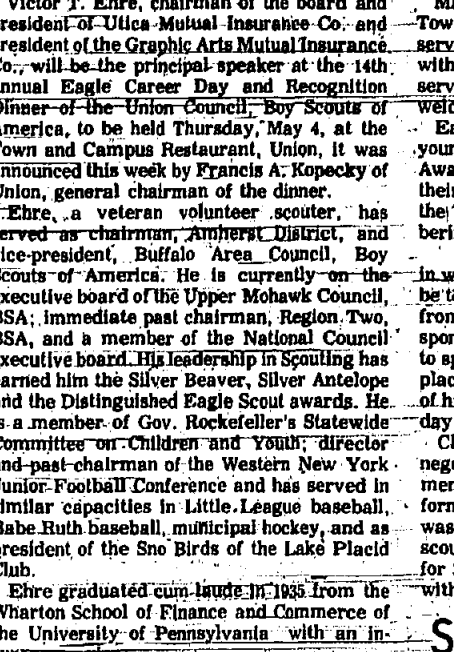

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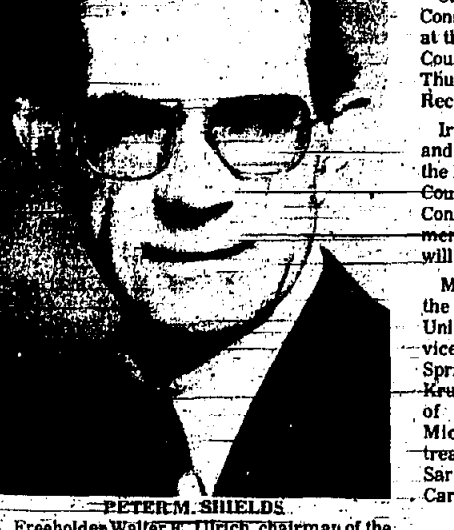

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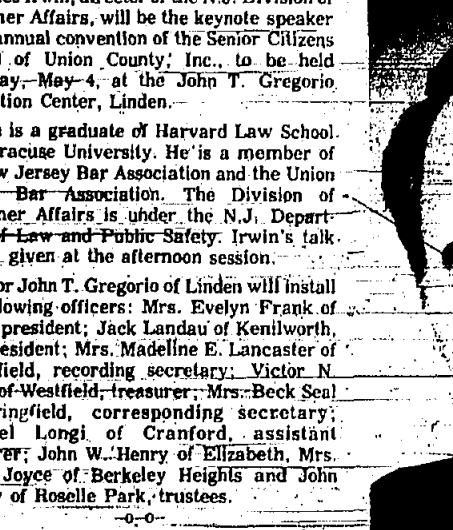

Want to paddle a canoe? State offers guided cruise

State park rangers will conduct the first of five "guided" canoe cruises along the Passaic River in Burlington County, Wednesday, May 24, Joseph J. Truncer, director, Division of Parks and Recreation, is saying.

The guided cruise will be limited to 12 cruises, with not more than three persons in each craft and, by pre-registration only. Children must be accompanied by adults and be 12 years or over. A life jacket must be provided for each occupant.

Each canoe should have at least one experienced paddler, preferably the steersman.

Truncer said, "Participants are to provide their own canoe. The latter may be rented at \$6 per day from June 20 to July 31 at the Passaic River launch near Green Bank. Rentals should be arranged at the earliest possible date. The cost of the launch is \$1.00. Reservations are: (609) 366-2011, 9:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.

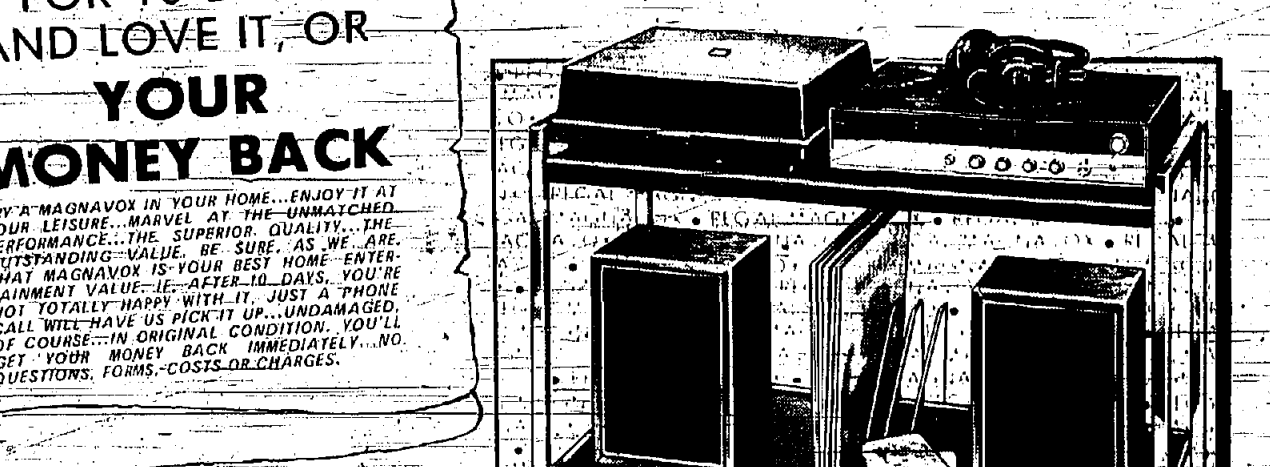
According to James J. Pennings, director of the State Office on Aging, the publication will be distributed free-of-charge through all 21 county and municipal offices on aging located throughout the state.

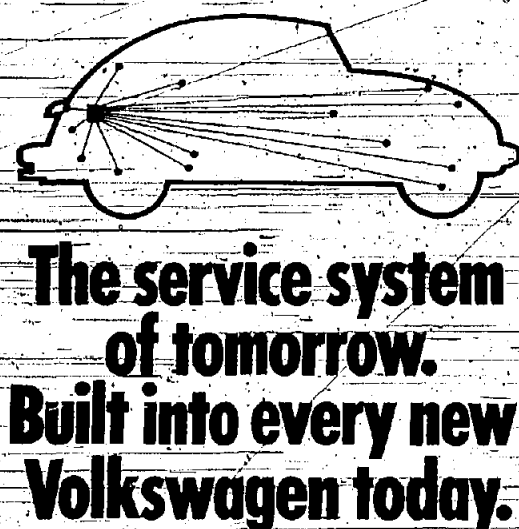
The concert, the last of the Symphony's four-program season, will be presented in the Campus Center Theater at 7:30 p.m.

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Trailside to show film on 'barrens'

"Natural History of the Pine Barrens," a film provided by Otto Iteck of Stockton, will be shown at The Union-County Park Commission's Trailside Nature and Science Center in the Watchung Reservation, on Sunday at 2 p.m.

The film will describe the sequence of flowering plants and show spring amphibians and reptiles existing in the area, as well as the effects of fire on plant life and animals of the "barrens."

Also on Sunday, at 2 p.m., 3 p.m., and 4 p.m., Donald W. Mayer, Trailside director, will present a program, "Platform in Space" at the Trailside Planetarium. This describes the proposed orbiting space stations—meaning to space exploration. A different program, "Eclipse '72," a preview of the Sun's eclipse in July, will be offered at 8 p.m. on Wednesday.

As the Trailside Planetarium seats only 25 persons at a performance, it is necessary to obtain a ticket from the Trailside office on the day of the show. Tickets are issued on a first-come, first-served basis. Children under eight years of age are not permitted in the Planetarium chamber.

Also on Monday through Thursday at 4 p.m., nature talks for children will be presented. The subject is "The Plains Indians."

The public is welcome to visit and participate in the programs at the Trailside Nature and Science Center each weekday except Friday, from 3 p.m. to 5 p.m., and on Saturdays and Sundays, from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Thousands of indoor exhibits may be seen.
