Editorial comment FOR EQUAL EDUCATION

Several thoughts are becoming clear as the Springfield Board of Education continues its public agonies over pupil distribution over e next few years.

The first is that everyone owes a major debt of gratitude to the board for its willingness to have the public share in the decision-making In fact, some of the problems stem

from that very willingness, which may have led the board to release for public consumption an internal report prepared in pedagogilese - many technical terms and frames of reference unfamiliar to even an intelligent and highly literate public. -Second, the board will have to do

something in the direction of closing, or phasing out, the Raymond Chisholm School. Declining enrollment and no longer ideal physical facilities have made this-step a necessity. If the board fails to act on the new

plan, for a cluster grouping of the Chisholm, Edward Walton and Thelma Sandmeier schools, then it would presumably-be-bound by-its vote of two years ago to transfer the-lower grades from Chisholm to_ Walton, starting this fall.

The cluster grouping, with = kindergarten-for-all three-areas at Chisholm, Grades 1 to 3 at Sandmeier and Grades 4 and -5 at Walton. holds great educational-
