 were Perry E. Hall, president; Oldin D., Sickley, secretary and Albert P. Cain, transmission.

SPRINGFIELD'S FIRST piece of fire ap-paratus was a two-wheeled hose reel, which was drawn to fires by man power. It is said that help in pulling it was sometimes furnished by trolleys of Morris County Traction Co., if they happened to be headed in the right direction. Then, in order to keep the tongue of the cart up while it was hitched to the trolley, it was necessary for two men to ride on the rear of the cart. and sometimes they had a wild ride. Water pressure at the hydrants was fur-nished by the Springfield pumping station of-the Short Hills Water Co. and pressure was stepped up when an alarm was sounded. This service was continued by the Commonwealth. Water Co., which bought out the Short Hills Company's plant in 1929. Fire-Headquarters from 1906 to 1921, when the present Municipal building was built, was in a frame building on the south side of Morris 'avenue, about 200 feet west of Mountain avenue, (then called Westfield avenue). 





Tips for traffic safety -SPRINGFIELD POLICE DEPARTMENT

Several years ago on Shunpike road a small truck ran off the eastbound lane while negotiating a curve and struck a tree. The driver died in the wreckage. It is suspected that Common_phenomenon_was_a_major_contributing factor; centrifugal force. An automobile is a mass moving at a particular velocity in a given direction. When the car changes direction when entering a curve, centrifugal force tries to take control.

In a left-hand curve centrifugal force_at: tempts to pull the car off the road if the vehicle's speed is greater than the maximum-sale speed for the curve, in a right hand turn the centrifugal force acts in the opposite direction - towards the center of the road. Add to this another car proceeding in the opposite direction and the chances of a head-on collision

are increased. Drivers can safely negotiate curves by: 1. Watching out for curve warning signs. 2. Slowing down before entering curves. 5.3. Accelerating slightly after entering the apex (center) of the curve, taking the curve cently and safely.

gently and safely. 4. Being on the alert for cars coming in the opposite direction. 5. Driving as close as practical to the righthand side of the road when-negotiating right curves. 6. Heeding the advice of maximum speed

advisory signs (posted under the curve war ning signs). These are speeds which the high-way engineers have determined as the maximum safe speed for the particular curve. 7. Avoid braking hard while in the apex of a curve when at speeds in excess of the safe
