has called for legislation requiring physicians to issue prescriptions for dangerous drugs in "The g Under Senator Rinaldo's proposal, the

Senator Rinaldo's statement follows: "The abuse, misuse and consequent shocking stories about drugs still continue, un fortunately, to occupy a great deal of news space. Every day we are confronted with new episodes of some youngster, teenager or young adult injecting tragedy into his life and the lives of the loved ones around him. "The drug abuse problem will be with us. I fear, for a few more years. There have been some encouraging signs that it has peaked, but

developed to deal with the users of dangerous drugs. Some have yielded encouraging results thers have been abysmal failures. As an accompaniment, law enforcement officials at all levels of government have escalated their efforts and awareness of the problem. "One of the most overlooked areas in the discussion of drugs is the abuse of prescripphysicians unwittingly-write out prescriptions addict, driven to desperation, will burglarize a physician's office simply to steal a pad of forms

specific problem. I will therefore propose in the State Senate a measure requiring doctors to issue prescriptions for dangerous-drugs triplicate, with one copy going to the state for availability to check on abusers. "A doctor prescribing dangerous drugs would be required, under my bill, to use threepart prescription blanks. He would retain one section; the pharmacist filling the prescription would retain the second, and the third would be sent to the state.
